Barbara Grattan: "That concludes Correspondence."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Any Committee reports?"

Councilman Densieski: "Yes. We got a letter from the DEC praising us for our STOP Day hazardous material collection which was a positive thing, and also the Rec Committee talked about raising developer fees to increase recreation for town residents."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Any other Committee Reports? Being none, the time of 7:10 has arrived. Barbara, and if we can open the first public hearing that was noticed for tonight."

Public hearing opened: 7:10 p.m.

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, 200 Howell Avenue, Riverhead, New York on July 5, 2000 at 7:05 p.m. regarding the special permit petition of Schembri Homes to allow the construction of a single family dwelling on property located at North Wading River Road, Wading River."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I do see the applicant here. While he's stepping forward, this is a special permit to consider the establishment of a single family residence on North Wading River Road. The property is known as Tax Map 600-27-2-25. It is zoned Business C. It's a small area of Business C that's zoned on the south side of North Wading River Road and under the applicable zoning statute, in order to establish a single family use on that premises and in a Business C zone, the applicant needs to apply for a special permit which has been done in this case. Saying that, I'll turn it over to the applicant."

Pete Schembri: "I am Pete Schembri. The whole area that's there is mainly all residential homes. The site is just a little over a third of an acre which we didn't really feel was necessary to put up

a commercial site there with poor access also with parking and cars coming out onto that road. It's kind of a hazard I would believe to come out onto that road, how it comes off of an embankment there to have a commercial site.

I think residential would conform with the area. I don't think the neighbors really are looking to have a commercial site there. So we'd like to continue with the residential home.

I spoke to a couple of the neighbors and they were more for doing the residential housing than doing anything commercial."

Councilman Cardinale: "Which is good as I understand since the house is already up, isn't it?"

Pete Schembri: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I was going to mention that."

Councilman Cardinale: "I'm glad you like it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I was sure there was going to be perhaps a comment with respect to that. What had happened from what I understand, you had made an application for a building permit for a single family residence- "

Pete Schembri: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And there was error in the way the tax map or the zoning map was read. Is that what happened?"

Pete Schembri: "Yes, yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And it was the belief that this was what- Residence A or Residence B?"

Pete Schembri: "Yes. Everybody told us Residence B."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. All right. And I know I've looked at the code. There's a number of uses that are allowed as of permitted uses which would include offices, personal service shops such as a barber shop, beauty parlor, professional studio, bakery, bank. You're not interested in doing any of those uses- "

Pete Schembri: "No. No, we're not."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- is that what you- and you would like to establish as a single family residence."

Pete Schembri: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Any other questions from the Board? Anybody else who would like to address the Board? Rolph Kestling."

Rolph Kestling: "Rolph Kestling, Wading River. First I'd like to say that map what you put on the wall there is misleading. Why did you highlight my property, Mr. Schembri's property and the next two neighbors' property? If you take the one all the way on the end, that's Residential A by the Two by Four there, but that's continuing use. So anybody looking at the map- all right.

As far as residential, yes, I'm better off if it's residential. No question about it. So, I'm for it, too. My next question is, do you rezone everything now, will you make it all residential or will it stay Business C even those he gets permission to keep the house there. Will it still be Business C zoned or are you going to zone it Residential?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, we haven't even discussed the rezoning of that premises so I can't- even address that issue at this time."

Rolph Kestling: "Well, it would make sense because everything from his property down is all residential. I don't know how the heck they ever made it Business C in the first place. In fact, years ago, every place was occupied except his lots and a couple of feet, 10, 20, 30 feet down further another little separate piece were unoccupied. Everything else was residential. So somebody made a mistake.

Now, the next thing I want to ask. Assuming he gets permission, he's a builder. Somewhere down the road he's going to sell the house perhaps. Yes, no. Now whoever buys the house and they're on commercial property, can they turn that into a commercial establishment?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I would think that they could come back and make an application and they would be allowed to use it for what the zoning permits. Correct? Unless we take up your suggestion which is to rezone it to Residence B."

Rolph Kestling: "Or put a covenant on it and say that's all it

can be. Either one."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Correct. That's the other alternative."

Rolph Kestling: "Now, if he goes into commercial, there's different building codes I imagine. You couldn't have-- like a sanitary system, he's got a minimum sanitary system there. You put a commercial building, you're going to have to double up all that so there's a lot of things."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There are other factors as well."

Rolph Kestling: "There are many factors there."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There would be a need for off street parking for any use that would be required."

Rolph Kestling: "Right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And clearly if he could fit in with the lot coverage which in this case is 30%, he could establish one of those business uses abiding by the state building code, abiding by off street parking and other things that would come into play under those circumstances."

Rolph Kestling: "So I would like to see that it would be made Residential A or something like that. It would protect me, too. I mean I'm Business C, too and I have no intention of making a business there."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "You're not going to open a deli or- "

Rolph Kestling: "No, no, no, no."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right."

Rolph Kestling: "I mean the deli that's down there is, you know, continued use, too. Okay. That's it. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Councilman Densieski: "Pete, is it your intention to maintain the residential?"

Pete Schembri: "Yes. Keep it single family house."

Councilman Densieski: "Okay."

Councilman Cardinale: "Would you object to a covenant specifying that in perpetuity the property would have to be used for residential purposes in consideration of the special permit being issued?"

Pete Schembri: "Yeah, I've got a problem with that. Yeah."

Councilman Cardinale: "Which would avoid a zone change which is kind of cumbersome. Thank you."

Pete Schembri: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody else who would like to comment on today's public hearing regarding the special permit application? No sign of any hands. I declare the public hearing closed at the time of 7:18. Thank you."

Pete Schembri: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Public hearing closed: 7:18 p.m.

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Public hearing continued from June 20, 2000 at 7:18 p.m. regarding the special permit petition of Maggie Evans to allow the construction of a 7,000 square foot day care center (Grace's Place-Agri-Business Child Development).

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I know that from the last meeting, we had an afternoon meeting and there was some comment, an inquiry made to Councilman Kent questioning why it was 2:00. Let me reaffirm that that was not something that was purposely done but I know there were a lot of people who had indicated the desire to address us concerning the application of Agri-Business Child Development or Grace's Place, ABCD. That public hearing was held open for further public comment tonight so I know I received a couple cards up here concerning child care center or day care center. I'm going to now ask anybody who wishes to come forward to address- if you could raise your right hand or raise your hand and we will bring you up. Mr. Matthews."

James Matthews: "Thank you, Mr. Supervisor, Members of the Town Board. I would like- at the outset, I had faxed over a memorandum. I have non-faxed copies for the Board as well as a copy for the record. I'd like to bring that up to the Board now if I may.

At the last meeting, our architect wasn't here and we brought the architect to make a brief presentation and with the Board's permission, I'd like to introduce him and have him do that as to the site plan, and I also have the contractor, the general contractor here for any questions as well. This is Mr. Rick Campos who's the architect. I'd like to be able to get an easel and set this up. We also have 8 and ½ by 11 handouts of the general site plan. One thing I'd like to be able to do (inaudible) on the previously submitted plans I (inaudible) there was an easement- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Matthews, you're going to have to- "

Councilman Kent: "Yes, if you could place that and- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- you can place that and still speak into the mike because we won't get it all on the record."

Councilman Kent: "That's good."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Looking at the- "

Councilman Kent: "And then you have to step back to the podium."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And then you have to step back to the podium so we can get it on the record."

James Matthews: "On the one change on the prior site plan that you received last meeting, there has been shown an easement, there was some question. That's been removed, that's not part of the plan, not part of the submission of the application. Without further adieu then, I'll ask Mr. Campos to explain it and answer any questions."

Rick Campos: "Okay, my name is Rick Campos. I'm a licensed architect in the State of New York. I'm the architect- okay, I'm a licensed architect in the State of New York. I'm here to represent Agri Business in the development of the site. I prepared a set of working drawings that was already submitted to the town.

The site is simply a 7 and a half acre site that has a 7,000 square foot building on it which is about 2% of the site. The amount of the site that's being developed is about 2.9 of the total. That includes the driveway and the outdoor play yard and the buffer areas that surround it. All of the specifications and data that is shown on the site plan as it is as part of the record conforms to the town ordinances.

That's about it that needs to be said."

James Matthews: "Yes. Does the Board have any particular questions at this time? Again, we'll available throughout the evening."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Has an amended site plan which now deletes the proposed right of way or easement been submitted to the Planning- or to the town, I mean?"

James Matthews: "No."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. So we don't have an amended plan as of yet. That's just for today's presentation?"

James Matthews: "Right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. And you'll be submitting an amended plan if need be?"

James Matthews: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right."

James Matthews: "I'd also like to introduce Mr. Nick Rackanelli, Rackanelli Contractors."

Nick Rackanelli: "Hi. My name is Nick Rackanelli, Rackanelli Realty Services. We'd be hired as the contractor for this project and we would certainly guarantee the town and the Board that it would be built according to code and the main goal is to make a quality project. We've been building on Long Island for over 40 years and I think that it would be a nice addition to the community. So I'll be here for any questions if anybody has any. Thank you."

James Matthews: "Now, although the particular structure itself and its design isn't specifically up for approval tonight, we are

prepared to go through the plans if the Board would like us to do that with the architect and/or contractor explaining the layout of the classrooms and any of that sort if you feel that would be helpful."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I had a question from looking at the minutes of the telephone- I mean the videotape that had been provided. The one hour catchment area, is that one hour each way or is that a round trip or how is that determined as far as where the one hour catchment encompasses? Is there a defined rule or a social service standard that we can be cognizant of or made aware of so that we know what we're talking about? Because it was unclear to me whether it was one way out, one way back, one way round trip on the way in or one way both in and out."

James Matthews: "I'll let- "

Maggie Evans: "All of the above. No- "

James Matthews: "Introduce yourself."

Maggie Evans: "I'm sorry. Maggie Evans from Agri-Business Child Development. It is the time that the child gets on board the bus. He or she can only be on the bus for a total of an hour coming or going to the center. So that the farthest kid out, his or her travel time has to be an hour or less. Each way."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's the question. So if they are picked up in the morning, from their point of pick up to when they're dropped off at this particular facility, the maximum they can be on the bus for the trip in is one hour."

Maggie Evans: "Correct."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And then the same on the way out obviously."

Maggie Evans: "Correct."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. I also had another question which was related again to comments during the videotape. Is there or was there an assessment or survey or an analysis done which determined the local need for this particular facility?"

Maggie Evans: "Yes. And I provided that to the Town Board at our first meeting. There was a community assessment done back in

1998. That information you should have and if you don't, I will certainly provide it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I just wanted to put that on the record. Okay. You are looking to have I think it was 76 children serviced and there was a lot of discussion about the number of children or the possibility there could be additional children at the site."

Maggie Evans: "Correct. We're licensed for 76 children on any given day. That's all we can have on any given day. As children perhaps come and go from the area, we would fill that slot with another child."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Councilman Cardinale: "On the community assessment, which- what community was assessed or what area?"

Councilman Kent: "How was it defined? How was community defined?"

Maggie Evans: "It started in the Riverhead area and the surrounding areas. So Suffolk County was included in the assessment."

Councilman Cardinale: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. I know there's been- any further comment? Anybody else who would like to address the Board at this time? Yes, Rita. Is that Rita Hoden?"

Rita Hoden: "Rita Hoden, Calverton."

Councilman Kent: "Rita, could you pull the microphone on your left towards you?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There you go."

Rita Hoden: "We never had day care. My mother worked, we never had day care. My kids never had day care. My grandkids don't have day care. Now, my mother's 92. You start taking this property off the tax roll and putting it on my mother, I'm going to have to go back to work to pay her taxes. Is she going to be non for profit? She worked picking potatoes at five cents a bushel. I worked most of my life picking potatoes for ten cents a bushel. Nobody gave me nothing."

I mean where is this thing going? You want to take the property off for these group homes, for this thing here and we're going to pick this up? We're not making that kind of money. And we get no benefit and we're paying state tax, county tax and our Riverhead tax. We're paying for it three times and we get no benefit from it. I don't think so. Don't put it on my tax bill or my mother's because you will have a lawsuit."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Rita. Thank you, Rita. Steve Haizlip."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. At the initial hearing I mentioned the same fact that Rita is mentioning right now. All these people that want to come and include themselves from taxes, property taxes, what have you, and then these people already (inaudible) to pay for somebody somewhere and you want us to have to continue (inaudible). Now, upstate, I'm sure George can tell you about it, where there's places that the state has subsidized, controlling, taking care of institutions. They're paying the taxes. Why do they come down here and say go down to Long Island and pick out a spot and they'll pay the taxes for you, we won't have to pay because Long Island is rich. I don't believe that and I don't want to hear it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody else would like to address us? George Schmelzer."

George Schmelzer: "Who's sponsoring this?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "You asked this same question at the last public hearing and they- "

George Schmelzer: "I'm a little confused."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The applicant is a not for profit by the name of Agri-Business Children's Development, ABCD."

George Schmelzer: "Who's paying the cost of this, the final cost? You or the kids?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "They have monies that are coming from the state and from federal funds."

George Schmelzer: "Well- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So I guess the answer is if it's approved or used, it's coming out of your pocket as a taxpayer."

George Schmelzer: "Well, that's what I figured. Any special school district tax where the kids live?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Would there be a school district tax collected?"

George Schmelzer: "Yeah."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "From this use? No."

George Schmelzer: "Well, how are they collecting taxes then if it's- if the school district doesn't pay?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "They would only pay special district taxes and I don't believe school district would be one of those."

George Schmelzer: "Well- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Property taxes would not, county taxes would not."

George Schmelzer: "Then it comes out of the air then, I guess."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The money, you mean the funding?"

George Schmelzer: "Yeah."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Or the money to pay for the use on the property?"

George Schmelzer: "Well, it's all funded. The cost to bring the kids there and teaching them whatever they're doing or just taking up space or sleeping. I don't know what it is. Who bears that cost and what source of taxes? Would it be school district in any way?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Not that I'm aware of. I'll have the applicant come up and address the question with respect to the source of funds."

George Schmelzer: "Nobody knows where the funds come from, huh?"

Maggie Evans: "Can I share the mike with you?"

George Schmelzer: "Yes."

Maggie Evans: "Thank you. Our funds- we get approximately 65% funding from the New York State Department of Ag & Markets. Mostly it's fee revenue from growers that is fed back to our program. We are about obviously 35% federally funded. We are a delicate agency of East Coast Migrant Head Start project which is based in Virginia. So these- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Sixty- you said 60 or 65% from Ag and Markets."

Maggie Evans: "Sixty-five percent."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Maggie Evans: "That's an approximation. So, the budget is already passed. These monies have been allocated to our program year after year, the same way in the federal government as well. Does that answer it?"

Councilman Densieski: "Miss Evans, I have a question for you also, please."

Maggie Evans: "Sure."

Councilman Densieski: "Nobody from the farming community has contacted me in regards to needing this. Has anybody from the Riverhead area as far as the local farmers, have they contacted you and said, you know, this would be a needed thing in Riverhead?"

Maggie Evans: "We are working on that relationship. Joe Gargelo from, excuse me, Joe Gargelo from the Long Island Farm Bureau said he would be here tonight to talk on our behalf. So- Gargelo- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Joe Gargelo, who just raised his hand. He's in the back."

Maggie Evans: "Where is he? Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Under the Exit sign."

Councilman Kent: "We'd like to hear from him, yes."

Councilman Densieski: "Thank you."

Maggie Evans: "Sure."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right."

Councilman Kent: "Why don't we have Joe come up?"

George Schmelzer: "So, 65% of the kids are considered agriculture, I guess, huh? What do they call them, farm animals? Farm employees or the equipment, or what? How are they going to be classed?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Children of migrant farm laborers. One of them has to be a farm laborer."

George Schmelzer: "Where are these migrants from? Where are these migrants from?"

Councilman Densieski: "Anywhere within an hour circumference."

George Schmelzer: "No, I mean the migrants. You're talking about the kids living within an hour. Where do the migrants come from?"

Councilman Densieski: "Anywhere within an hour circumference."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "They have to live- "

George Schmelzer: "No, no, not the kids. When they're living here. Migrants come from someplace else, another country, or the other side of the world, a different country, a different state or whatever. Where do they come from?"

Councilman Densieski: "I think it would probably be mixed. I don't think it's- I don't think you're saying one group of people. Right?"

Maggie Evans: "No."

Councilman Densieski: "It would be mixed."

Maggie Evans: "It's the agricultural community. Period."

George Schmelzer: "Where are they from? Migrants. You call

them migrants. Why do you call them migrants for?"

Maggie Evans: "Most of them are seasonal local agricultural workers according to Mr. Evans who spoke last week that said there are no migrants. But it's from the local community."

George Schmelzer: "No, you say migrants. Now you say there isn't any. Which- when are you telling the truth?"

Councilman Densieski: "We go through this every week."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "George- "

George Schmelzer: "Make up your mind. Are they migrants or not? If they're migrants, where do their parents come from?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm not sure that's relevant to the inquiry. The question- I think- what their nationality is, what their ethnic origin is- "

George Schmelzer: "I didn't say nationality. I said where do they come from. I didn't mention nationality at all, you did."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, I think that's what you are inferring."

George Schmelzer: "No. You can think what you want. I didn't mention that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Anything further- "

George Schmelzer: "I just want- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anything further with regard to- "

George Schmelzer: "I just asked if they come from outside the country, where do they come from?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. I- then I must have inferred wrong. But do you have any other comments for the Board?"

George Schmelzer: "I just want an answer. If they come from within the country, most of them, or outside of the country?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We don't know. Anything further?"

George Schmelzer: "That's nice."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anything further?"

George Schmelzer: "No, no thanks."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We know where the children must come from. We've been advised that they have to be within a one hour catchment area, that they need to be- have one parent employed in the agricultural industry as defined in the first public hearing. One of the parents must work in that industry and there's also income limits which were set forth in the prior hearing. Any other questions?"

George Schmelzer: "Can't get a straight answer."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Fine. Any other questions?"

George Schmelzer: "You've got two parents, one of them should take care of the kids. The other working. That's usual. I mean the kids shouldn't- the parents shouldn't take care of the kids, the taxpayers have to. Comes out of the agricultural department so that's money the farmers don't get for their crops or their research. It will go to this."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "You're opposed to the application then?"

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, sure."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Anything else? Anybody else who would like to address the Board? Sandra Mott."

George Schmelzer: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "You're very welcome."

Sandra Mott: "Good evening. Sandra Mott, Riverhead. I was wondering if this group had considered reusing any of the buildings that are currently standing in the town that would be large enough to accommodate the facility rather than using farmland that you're considering on Doctor's Path. Is that where it's going to be?"

Councilman Densieski: "It's not farmland though."

Sandra Mott: "Oh, it's not farmland."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's a wooded parcel on Doctor's Path."

Sandra Mott: "Have they considered using- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This is on the same side as Mr. Brown's house which would be- if I leave Northville Turnpike and I head on Doctor's Path, it would be on the left hand side. Correct? All right. I just want to make sure- I thought so. I saw the sign up there. I just wanted to make sure. When I went by the right piece of property, I was pretty sure. Okay."

Sandra Mott: "But it's undeveloped right now."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's a wooded lot that's not developed. Correct."

Sandra Mott: "Okay. Have they considered using some of the buildings, as I said, currently in the town rather than starting from scratch and have they also considered blending their activities with the I believe it's the Baptist Church that's planning to build a facility as well as the YMCA and this group. Couldn't they work together and cut all of their costs and expenses and overhead? I mean they're all going for the same point, aren't they? To service the children in need. I mean granted there will be a few less executive directors.

Having worked for not-for-profit, I know that, you know, the schedule of employment, executive directors make quite a bit of money even in not-for-profits or non-profits or whatever you want to call them. It's just a consideration rather than going the route that they're going since they're getting opposition.

Specifically, there's a piece of property on Kroemer right down the lane from the Kiddie Academy that's for lease or for sale, I believe. I don't know what it was used for previously but it's just north of- "

Councilman Densieski: "That one was just sold. I know which one you're speaking of."

Sandra Mott: "All right. But, okay, if that was sold, then something comparable, something similar."

Councilman Densieski: "I don't know if they looked at anything else or not. I'm not sure."

Sandra Mott: "Maybe they could consider that. They could cut a lot of expense out of their process. Maybe it would benefit all of the neighbors who are concerned about their property values as well. And it would really save a lot of money, I think. That's just a thought for them to consider. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anyone else? I saw a hand come up. All right. Joe Gergela."

George Schmelzer: "One of the Grumman buildings. They've got plenty of buildings there to use."

Joe Gergela: "For the record. My name is Joe Gergela. I'm Executive Director of Long Island Farm Bureau. I'm not here to speak about this particular proposal but more about the program and what they do and why that's important to the agricultural industry out here."

I'm not going to get engaged about the siting or any of that kind of stuff. That's not why I'm here. The program that these people bring is what's important to the agricultural industry because we are dependent upon labor in our greenhouses, in our nursery, in our fruits and vegetables operations, etc. So we have to have a labor supply if we're going to have agriculture survive out here.

Many of the laborers that we use nowadays have children and families here. And they have needs. And we support the concept. This is the sixth largest day care facility of its type in the United States, this entity that is doing this facility. It is regarded as a national model. It is supported not only by the Governor but the Speaker of the Assembly and all the people at the New York State Assembly and the Senate. They put money in this program every year. They view it to be very, very important for the long term survival of agriculture in the State of New York.

They have locations around the State. So as far as the need for agriculture, we are concerned about our labor situation. We want to make sure that their needs are met and I'll leave it at that. We are not- I'm not going to get into it because you're dealing obviously with people that are concerned about the siting issues. More- I'm more important about the concept and what the program does mean to the agricultural industry. So, thank you very much for allowing me to

speak."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anybody else who would like to address the Board? Yes, I see a number of hands."

Louise Stalzer: "Hi. My name is Louise Stalzer. I'm the Director of Peconic Community Council which is a health and human service coalition of about 200 agencies out here. We look at the health and human service needs of the east end community. We are concerned about everyone in the community. We did invite this group to our meeting last month to present their proposal and it was very well received by the human service community as a great need for the children here. Child care, early education is a great need.

One of the areas we're working in is transportation. Transportation for child care so people can go to work, is a very great need. We are applying for grants to help low income people. This program will provide some of that help, leaving other resources available for the rest of the community. And I certainly like the idea that open spots would be used for the east end community.

The- on the east end, the five eastern towns, Riverhead has the lowest median family income and much lower than Suffolk County. So it's to me a win-win for the community. And I hope you'll consider it. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Marty DiPiero."

Marty DiPiero: "Good evening. Thank you for this opportunity to speak to you briefly. Technically I'm not a Riverhead resident but I put in such long hours when I was director of the East End Arts Council that I've always felt that there were a lot of people on the east end who didn't know I wasn't a Riverhead resident at that time. And my heart has remained with Riverhead and in hoping that all good things would come to the residents of this town. So I was delighted in December to hear a program telling about this child care center that was going to be established in this area where we have so many agricultural workers, where our farmers need more agricultural workers to help them bring in their crops. And I thought it such a wonderful idea.

So I was really appalled and disheartened when I read in the paper of the comments that had been made. I just wanted to come here and speak very briefly to you about the importance of education for children, the importance- these are things you know, we all know in

the audience. The importance of child care. The world has changed considerably. I was able to stay home with my children until they were in school. Not many families can do that now in any area but those who are paid to work on farms earn even less and need even more to have two at least two wage earners in the family. Outstanding child care is something that we're not offered often. We don't have anywhere near enough for any part of our society. We know that we have long waiting lists at our Head Starts and very few licensed child care centers to help our people take care of their children.

So this is a wonderful opportunity to come to Riverhead to serve the people who work here and in areas that are very close to us. And I particularly thought about this yesterday. We celebrated the 4<sup>th</sup> of July. When my family came here from Ireland the signs were up saying Irish need not apply. And men who wanted to work and pay for their family's expenses were not given an opportunity. They had to fight for those opportunities.

When I celebrate the 4<sup>th</sup> of July, I celebrate the fact that this is a nation which gives opportunities to all the people who come here, who need those opportunities and I would hope that in that spirit in this new millennium we would all turn around and help the people who need most to have an improvement in their lives. There's no way to improve your life better than to start out pre-school education and an outstanding education.

So I urge you to support this project. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anyone else who would like to comment? Yes. I saw a hand up on the right. Okay."

Lourdes Parker: "Good evening. My name is Lourdes Parker and I'm a resident of Riverhead for the past 16 years. My husband grew up, was born in Riverhead, and so was his family members. I live right across the street from Mr. Brown on Doctor's Path. I understand that there might be a need in our community or anywhere in Suffolk County for day care. And I have no qualms about having day care in Suffolk community. I'm a mother. I'm a mother of a special child. I've gotten no services ever from nowhere. When I had to take care of my kid, I had to stay home. My husband worked three jobs. I got nothing. Why? Because we're considered too high in our income bracket. All the middle-class suffer. I have no qualms about migrant workers. I'm Puerto Rican myself. We all migrated from somewhere. But I say that you have to consider the area.

The street that I live on there's accidents on that corner on a regular basis. Children get hit by buses and cars. I can't take my kid outside because we don't have sidewalks. You consider this area a child safe area? I don't. I've lived there for long enough to know that that's not a place to have children at.

Bring it in if you're going to bring it in but just don't bring it into Suffolk County and Riverhead. There's other areas. You want to consider another area in Riverhead, fine. The area you're considering is a residential area. There's a lot of senior citizens. There's not a lot of children in our area. My kids are always in my back yard. We don't have kids in our neighborhood hardly.

I just feel that there's a lot of services out there for migrants and the rich get richer with their businesses but what happens to us middle-class who need sometimes and we're turned away right here in our own town. You know, I really am hurt to hear that we're here serving the, you know, the migrants, the agricultural. That's fine. What about the people who have special needs, our senior citizen, our disabled people? We don't get consideration sometimes. No, we have to fight for everything we need.

I just hope that you consider not voting for this in our area, please. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. The gentleman, you have your hand up? Do you want to come up? Yes."

Charles Parker: "My name is Charles Parker and I am a resident of Riverhead. I've been here for over 40 years. That was my wife who just spoke. I'm sure everything that these people want to do is good. I agree with them. But I don't understand why they want to put it right smack in the middle of a residential area. There are people that live around there. You're talking building on five acres, is that what you're talking about?"

Councilman Densieski: "Seven."

Charles Parker: "Seven acres, starting with five. Or starting with two."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No. They're going to build out or use two acres and there's a total of 7.5 or 7 and a half acres, the total property."

Charles Parker: "Okay. What's not to stop them from developing that whole seven acres and putting a parking lot right in somebody's back yard?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The Planning Board has suggested that a restriction be placed on the deed, a covenant and restriction, and the applicant through the attorney, stated at the last meeting on this particular matter that they would, in fact, agree to a covenant and restriction being placed on the property not allowing them to expand."

Charles Parker: "I understand that. But things do change. But I just feel that it's a residential area. There are people living there, families, and there is other places within Riverhead or some other place where this place could be built and serve the same purpose. I just don't think it should be there. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Gus LaPorto. I'm in trouble here."

Gus LaPorto: "Good evening. My name is Gus LaPorto. I don't know how many people in Riverhead know that we have a Head Start here in Riverhead now. We've got about 45 kids that go to Head Start on 24 from Riverhead in Flanders. What becomes of those kids? What becomes of those children?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Gus, Gus, address the Board."

Gus LaPorto: "Yeah, what becomes of the kids that are going to Head Start on Route 24? We've got about 40 of them from Riverhead alone. What becomes of them?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "When you ask the question, are you asking what- will they be included as part of this program, or - "

Gus LaPorto: "Yes. Why should we have two? Increase the other one, do it all with one. We've been there for seven years. I've been a volunteer for seven years. I never heard anyone speak about Head Start. No one. Why do we need another Head Start? It's there to be had."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So the suggestion is that we take advantage of what exists. Is that your suggestion?"

Gus LaPorto: "Right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Anybody else who would like to comment? Bill Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. This is a very sensitive and delicate area because we're talking about little children that have been brought onto this earth not by their choosing and we want to give them the best of what America stands for. Let us keep in mind the realistic position that we have here. The State is handing out money to organizational work, administrators and employees where they're not for profit. They are for spending the money allotted. And if we are doing something for the good of the farmers, I have yet to hear one utterance on what the farmer is contributing. A piece of land that is not too fertile or a piece of land that has been sort of boxed out by developments or golf courses and the farmer will profit by this without contributing anything.

Now this is a hard hearted thing to say when you're talking about the little kids that are going to profit, profit in a sense of being put into the hands of people that are educated and understanding and capable whereas their parents work on their knees in the vegetable fields. Many years ago, I followed through with the migrant workers housing, with the migrant workers accommodations to survive when there was no work. These people came in from all over the world. George asked the question of where the parents are from. He didn't get an answer. And the only answer I was listening for, are these people American citizens? I don't care what state they would come from. That if they are imported by agencies or international bureaus it should be known.

Also, in the past years when the state made allowances to people where-- and this where it comes to me where one of the parents work on a farm, they would get benefits. All kinds of fakery came up. All kinds of shenanigans were put together. People lived in my neighborhood, all over the place, and all they did was make a deal with the farmer-- in my neighborhood, the farmer, and so I'm cynical about what people are going to do to get this state money. And, yes, this type of labor is needed and I think if we lived in California closer to the Mexican border we could probably multiply this problem a thousandfold.

But the participation of the farmer to augment this program because they are ultimately receiving the benefits, I say should be one of the prime concerns. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody else who would like to address

the Board? Odell Evans."

Odell Evans: "Odell Evans, Doctor's Path. I have two questions from last time. I wanted to know, six other sites have been considered for this day care center and also I want to know a census of how many kids are coming from different town to maybe this day care center."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. What were the six other sites or five other sites?"

Odell Evans: "Five or six. It doesn't make any difference."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. And the census where were they coming from."

Odell Evans: "Yeah, like 10 kids from Riverhead; 20 from Southampton, that type of information."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Is there anyone from the applicant who can address those questions, what the other sites were that were looked at as possible sites for the facility and the census that was done, how many were from the town of Riverhead and from adjoining townships."

Maggie Evans: "I still don't know the five other sites. Bagshaw Realty was the real estate agency that showed us those sites. The census on the people that we've served to date, 17 families come from the Riverhead area; 11 from the Greenport area; 4 from Cutchoque; 3 from Southampton; 1 from Southold; 1 from Flanders; and 1 from Hampton Bays."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Those are the- with regard to the 50 that you presently have- "

Maggie Evans: "No. That's 50 from inception that we have served."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Maggie Evans: "And those are the families."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Evans, any other questions?"

Odell Evans: "I'm still confused. Now, first of all, no one

knows the other sites they went to. I don't understand that. Did they go- know what street they went down. But they don't know (inaudible) the five sites. That's hard to believe. And number two, counting kids, only 40."

Maggie Evans: "Those are the families."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Just, yes, those were the families so there could be more than one from a particular family."

Odell Evans: "That's what I don't understand. Did anyone take a census for how many children we are going to serve? I don't understand that either. Do we need a school for 76 or 1,700? I don't know. Someone should know how many children are going to be served as of now. How do you know we need a day care center for these children? Do you understand my question?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Your question, I think is, how do we know today as we sit here whether there's, in fact, a demand for 76 kids?"

Odell Evans: "Not really. I want to know how many kids will be served as of now."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "How many kids will be served as of now."

Councilman Densieski: "Seventy-six."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No. That's what the facility can serve."

Odell Evans: "Facility can handle. As of today. Let's say this will open up tomorrow."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right."

Odell Evans: "How many children will be in the school?"

Councilman Densieski: "My guess since it's subsidized it will be 76 with a waiting line."

Odell Evans: "From where? That's what I'm trying to find out."

Councilman Densieski: "Within an hour- "

Odell Evans: "So they all could be from Huntington, not from Riverhead that they're telling me. Theoretically. That could happen."

Councilman Densieski: "I think the Riverhead- you're right, I guess it could. But I think Riverhead residents get preferred treatment. Is that true?"

James Matthews: "I was just going to say that."

Councilman Densieski: "Okay."

James Matthews: "Yes. The Planning Board suggested that and ABCD agreed to that to give a preference system to Riverhead residents."

Councilman Kent: "And maybe-- could you clarify the hour bus drive. You mean from the moment the child is picked up, let's say the first child is picked up on the bus, do they have to be at the center within an hour. Is that what you're saying?"

Maggie Evans: "Yes, correct."

Councilman Kent: "So we're not saying that this would be an hour's drive from Riverhead because you're going to be picking up other children on the way."

Maggie Evans: "Right."

Councilman Kent: "So we're saying that the most it probably would really be realistic a 30 minute drive if you got in your car and drove there."

Maggie Evans: "Probably, yes."

Odell Evans: "Now we're offering all these free services to these children, where does the money come from (inaudible) one million dollar interest free loan? That's question number one."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm sorry. Just restate that again."

Odell Evans: "Yes. All these children are getting free services, the migrant children. So they're- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "If they qualify with respect to the

income- "

Odell Evans: "Right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- guidelines. Correct."

Odell Evans: "True. Who's going to pay us the one million dollars interest free loan? Where's that money coming from?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's already been budgeted but it's ultimately, I mean the question, I think, is the same question that perhaps George or someone else asked. Where does the money come from? It comes from monies and fees and taxes collected from you and I, from the Ag & Markets we learned that some of it's from fees collected from the agricultural producers. So these are where the monies that are raised or given as far as this loan come from."

Odell Evans: "Okay. On Channel 12 about two hours ago, Margaret Smythe (phonetic) was talking. She said that there will be nature trails on the other five and a half acres. Who's going to pay for these and who's going to maintain them? I'd like to know also who asked for them."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I guess the question is- you're asking the Town Board who's going to pay for them or are you asking the applicant who's going to pay for them?"

Odell Evans: "Whoever has the answer."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't know who's going to take care of maintaining- it's not town property. They're not going to be a town of Riverhead owned parcel, so I assume the applicant who's going to put the trail in will be responsible for maintaining them and using part of the monies they receive from the funding for that purpose."

Maggie Evans: "Correct."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. LaPorto."

Gus LaPorto: "Gus LaPorto. We already have about eight Head Starts between here and Greenport. Eight of them. Different units. Why we need more? Why can't that 20 be put within two miles, three miles away. We have already 40 in Flanders from Riverhead, 100 and something from Southampton. Why do we have to jiggle around thousands of dollars, millions of dollars? We don't need it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anybody else who would like to address the Board? Yes. In the back. Gwen. No, in the back, you're in the front."

Councilman Kent: "George- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Gwen."

Gwen Mack: "Gwen Mack, Millbrook Gables Civic Association. I have a question. We've been waiting 11 years to have our neighborhood cleaned up. How can they come within say six months to a year, and get theirs pushed through and we've been waiting 11 years. I don't understand that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't even know how to respond to that. This is a special permit application for a singular piece of property as opposed to a neighborhood revitalization."

Gwen Mack: "I understand that. But we've been waiting- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So this is one piece of property that has been brought on by a special permit application so we have to make sure we look at it from that standpoint. You're looking at a community-wide revitalization effort, I think is the question. And I guess you're wondering why it has taken so long to get that community-wide revitalization through."

Gwen Mack: "To go through the process."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All I can address is the special permit application that's before us. I don't know how to address the other aspect which is the Millbrook Gables except to say that we had as you know a meeting. We- there's been- the Long Island Housing Partnership who has, in fact, built some new structures and houses in your neighborhood which I think are working out well. There's been an effort underway to change the way the Gables is perceived and I think there is certainly a great deal of spirit and a good direction that's occurring in the Gables. They have an application that's been referred, a special permit, that's been referred to the Planning Department and Planning Board for their recommendation back to us which involves 14 units if my- "

Gwen Mack: "Thirteen."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thirteen. Thirteen on land which will

involve a reconfiguration of the road so I see it move forward. As we discussed at the last Millbrook Gables meeting, there is some real tight time constraints on getting that project done but by all hopes and desires and efforts, we should get that underway. So- "

Gwen Mack: "I understand what you're saying. But what I'm saying to you is it seems to have taken us so long to go through the process where they're just going right along through the process. It seems like- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think the same could be said about downtown Riverhead- "

Gwen Mack: "I understand that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- that it's been stagnant for a great deal of time and it's taking a long time to be revitalized. There's other parts in the town that have gone in a bad direction."

Gwen Mack: "I understand what you're saying. But we have no opposition. They have opposition. So why is ours like at a standstill?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't believe yours is at a standstill. It is moving forward- "

Gwen Mack: "Well, you've only been Supervisor for how long?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Six months."

Gwen Mack: "I've been on the Civic Association for 11 years and I can tell you it is not moving fast."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. All right."

Gwen Mack: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We're not going anywhere with this. We're just- all right. Sal Mastropolo."

Sal Mastropolo: "Sal Mastropolo, Calverton. I can appreciate the need for the school, okay, but we get IGHL shoved down our throat and we have no choice about it and it takes land off the tax roll. This we have an option, okay. If they agree to pay the taxes as a normal piece of property and not come off the tax rolls, I would have

no problem with it. But if it's taking land off the tax rolls, I'm against it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anybody else. George. I don't know what that means. I guess that means something."

George Schmelzer: "There's no potatoes around here hardly. Where are they going to work- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Hold on. Everybody, we can't hear George. Go ahead. Now I'm ready. I heard you saying there's no potatoes around here."

George Schmelzer: "That's right. Where do they work? On ornamentals? Because ornamentals, that's not food."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That would qualify, sod farms would qualify."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, sod farms, that destroys all the topsoil. They have too many crops, then there's no topsoil."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

George Schmelzer: "So you buy ornamentals, there's sales tax on it; you buy food, there isn't. So what if there's just- a half a dozen big outfits are raising ornamentals, have 20 or 30 people, they get cheap labor, and we take care of the kids at taxpayers expense, and then I haven't heard an answer from anybody, you or the lady here, where these people come from. Where is she? Maybe she knows."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Is it the question that George Schmelzer is asking?"

George Schmelzer: "That's the question I got. Yeah, and- well, that's the question I got. All I get is weasel answers."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, let me just define it because last time I attempted to interpret what you said, you said I interpreted it wrong. So what is it you're exactly asking? Are they coming from New York State? Are they coming from outside the county of Suffolk?"

George Schmelzer: "Outside the country."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. So you're asking if- well, and then I think I asked- I'm not going to go--so you're asking if these are individuals who have relocated here to Suffolk County from outside the United States of America. Is that the question?"

George Schmelzer: "Well- they're relocating- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Is that the question?"

George Schmelzer: "If they relocated here they'd be a resident, wouldn't they?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well- "

George Schmelzer: "What do you mean well?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The question is- "

George Schmelzer: "It's well for them, not for us. Come on."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "What's your question?"

George Schmelzer: "Where do these people come from?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Maggie Evans or Mr. Matthews, can you respond to that question?"

George Schmelzer: "I guess she went home, huh? Well, if they come from other states or other countries, you encourage them to stay here."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Matthews, are you able to respond to this question from Mr. Schmelzer as to where the individuals who would be receiving the services come from? I'm not sure why it's relevant, but that's the question."

James Matthews: "Yes. I don't believe they maintain that information. I will check that. I don't know that it's lawful- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right, okay."

George Schmelzer: "Huh- anybody comes along, they don't ask them where they come from. You believe that? I don't."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Okay. Anything else?"

George Schmelzer: "He don't believe it himself."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anything else? Anything else?"

George Schmelzer: "So where can I get an answer?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anything else?"

George Schmelzer: "Really. Somebody's ashamed to give it. Are they afraid to give it or ashamed?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think there might be federal laws which say you cannot discriminate based upon race, national ethnicity and other things like that and it's probably not a fair question."

George Schmelzer: "Gee. Well, there- it's illegal then to have a certain group have to be tax free when the rest of the citizens have to pay taxes? Doesn't that discriminate you?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't think anyone is suggesting that the group be tax free. This is a not-for-profit operation. The group is not necessarily operating tax free, the individuals."

George Schmelzer: "Pardon me. Why don't these people- pardon me- you finish, please."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, you go ahead."

George Schmelzer: "These people here tonight, I think they're not doing it for no profit, are they?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The Agri Business Development is a not-for-profit corporation."

George Schmelzer: "The guys here tonight, I think they're doing it for profit, they're not working for nothing, are they?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm not going to comment on that."

George Schmelzer: "Maybe-

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Are you in favor of the application or are you opposed to it?"

George Schmelzer: "No, I'm not in favor of it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Thank you."

George Schmelzer: "Wait a minute. Who said I was done?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. I thought you were. Okay."

George Schmelzer: "No, I'm not. I'm waiting for a straight answer. I can't get an answer."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't have- George, I've told you I don't have an answer. I asked Mr. Matthews, I asked- "

George Schmelzer: "Well, I'm surprised you should get an answer."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't have an answer."

George Schmelzer: "Well, are you going to try and get one?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't think it's- I don't think we can legally ask the question. I'll take it under advisement."

George Schmelzer: "I'll ask them the question. Please furnish it. Will they? See they disappeared already. Yeah, they went. So very convenient not to know. I don't believe that. I don't think you do either. Do you?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm not going to- anything else, George?"

George Schmelzer: "I'll think of something when I'm sitting down. I'll reserve my time- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Thank you."

George Schmelzer: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Odell Evans, did you have anything else?"

Odell Evans: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. If you could, please. And, you know, hopefully we can answer the questions."

Odell Evans: "Well, I'm repeating one. How do I find these five sites that were looked at? Who's got the answer? Where do I go to get an answer to that?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I guess the question- I guess the real question here is whether this site is a suitable site. Rather than get into looking at- "

Odell Evans: "I'm not convinced this is the best site. I'm trying to- "

Councilman Lull: "You may be right. But that's not our business as to where they went first."

Odell Evans: "Repeat that. I missed that."

Councilman Lull: "They don't come to us for a choice."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We have to- we have an application before us, Mr. Evans, which we have to look at from the criteria that's spelled out in the zoning ordinance."

Odell Evans: "I know."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And that ordinance has certain criteria which we have to look at. The question of what other sites they looked at, whether there were other sites for consideration, I don't see that as weighing in the equation of whether they have met the requirements or whether a special permit should issue with respect to this particular site or not. I understand what your frustration is. You're finding it maybe a little hard to believe- "

Odell Evans: "No. I'm not frustrated. I'm just trying to get straight answers, that's all."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- that, right. We don't have the answer today. I know we asked Mr. Matthews to come up; we've asked Ms. Evans to come up and indicate what the other sites are and they've indicated to us they don't have that information. We could ask this another 15, 20 times and I don't think the answer is going to change and we'll be here until midnight asking the same question."

Odell Evans: "I understand. I'm not asking any more tonight but I'm sure that someone knows the answer."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right."

Odell Evans: "They just don't want to tell us. It's obvious what that's all about."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right."

Odell Evans: "Okay. On this special aid district zoning, the 108.21B(6), it mentions non-profit, year round resident day care institutions with (inaudible) open space, agricultural use on a parcel of no more than 50. What does that mean?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's the Timothy Hill Ranch code amendment that was put in place to allow Timothy Hill to establish a residence on Middle Road and that legislation was done back in the '70's in order to provide for a facility such as the Timothy Hill children's ranch. So that's what that use is."

Councilman Kent: "Yes, the key word there is residence. Meaning they'd have to- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right. It's actual residence. The children reside on the property as opposed to a day care or nursery school. It's actual residences. So that's the distinction."

Odell Evans: "Okay. On this Kiddie Academy application that was adopted, I don't- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We have their counsel here so maybe he can answer some of the questions."

Odell Evans: "Excuse me?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The counsel for Kiddie Academy is sitting in the front row so maybe he can help answer some of the questions."

Odell Evans: "Oh, okay. Maybe so, maybe so. I'm not making out too well so far. The use is not suitably (inaudible) a school, church, theater, recreation area or a place of public assembly. Now what does that really mean? Does this involve between a day care center and a church or what? I don't know what that means."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think with respect to that particular application, they were looking to see what other traffic

was being generated in close proximity. And there was a determination made by the Board- I wasn't here at the time- from looking at the language, that came to the conclusion that it was not high traffic in the area and, therefore, it was a good location to place the Kiddie Academy. So they reached their conclusion by saying there weren't these other places of public assembly which would involve a lot of traffic, a lot of people, a lot of cars. So that was the concept or why that finding of fact was included in that resolution approving the Kiddie Academy."

Odell Evans: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right?"

Odell Evans: "Yeah. Get back to the nature trails again. Now, who is this for? Is this for the residents in the area or for the children? I didn't get a good answer on that. Who are these nature trails really for, the five and a half acres?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I was under the impression it was for the children using the site, the facility. But I guess we can get clarification for that. Any other questions?"

Odell Evans: "Let me think about it."

Maggie Evans: "Yes, that's correct. It would be for the children."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And would that also be for staff as well?"

Maggie Evans: "Well, staff would have to be with the children. They would have to be supervised."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, that's- okay, yeah. Of course, okay. All right. Mr. Evans."

Odell Evans: "That's what baffles me. Why do these young kids need five and a half acres of nature trails? I don't- "

Supervisor Kozkaiewicz: "Well, it comes back to the same problem which you've indicated to the Board. Why seven acres?"

Odell Evans: "No, we just wonder about taxpayers money buying five and a half acres of land we don't need. That's the problem."

It's my money and everybody else's money in this room."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, it sort of still comes back to the same issue. You know, why all the land for a nature trail. I mean it's sort of the same argument."

Odell Evans: "Oh sure, you're right, yes. I think George was the one that mentioned it before or Bill, you know. I know you guys keep telling me they can't go to the farm district but I find that hard to believe. You can't get a variance or anything else to put there. This is for the farm families, farm children. But you've got to put it in a (inaudible) neighborhood for some reason. I don't understand that yet and (inaudible). I know I won't get one, that's why I make a point of that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Ah, yes. Hand on the right hand side. Oh, Mr. Brown, did you want to also address the Board? Okay, I'm sorry, I didn't see your hand up."

Lourdes Parker: "Lourdes Parker. I have a question. Will they be also servicing special children of agricultural workers or is this just for regular children, normal children? Will they be servicing children with disabilities, autism, cerebral palsy, or will they be still shipped to BOCES and St. Charles in Port Jefferson and Southampton? Are they going to service special children also?"

Councilman Densieski: "I think the number was one out of 25. Maybe Ms. Evans can clear me up. I think- do I remember that correctly? Ms. Evans, that it was one out of 25 may have special needs. Is that correct or incorrect?"

Maggie Evans: "I'm not sure where you're getting that from."

Councilman Densieski: "No. Okay, maybe- "

Maggie Evans: "But we do serve children with disabilities. We contract with local health organizations and we actively recruit and enroll children with disabilities. I would- we are mandated to have at least 10 slots by the federal government open to children with disabilities. And we do a tremendous job serving those children as well."

Lourdes Parker: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Brown?"

Ralph Brown: "My name is Ralph Brown, 313 Doctor's Path in Riverhead. I've been there for the past 70 years and I want to clear up a few things tonight that I've heard said in the last meeting and also in this meeting. I hear people talking about immigrants. One lady got up in the last meeting, I think her name was Mrs. Herrera, and she said that we're all immigrants. And we come here to get opportunity and to do great things in this country. Believe me, my great grandfather in Africa didn't decide one day that him and Jenny or whatever her name was, let's take a trip to the United States where we can get a better opportunity. He probably came on the Amstead. That might be irrelevant to a lot of these people but the fact is that somehow we came out of all of that and we came out to Long Island from Virginia almost 100 years ago on the north fork, my parents and some of the parents on the people here with me. It will soon be 100 years and now we find that people want to move into our area, in our residential area with a day care center, nonetheless subsidized.

Now when we grew up in Riverhead, the farmer built a little house behind his barn and that's where we lived. How come the farmer can't do that today? And we went to the same school, Bob, that your uncle went to."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "My father, too."

Ralph Brown: "Father, all the same schools. There was nothing special for us. And when it came time to build a house, we had to find someone who had the audacity to sell a black man a piece of ground. And we found a man. And for two and a half cents a bushel of potatoes, with no mortgage. You couldn't get a mortgage. My father put the eight kids in the field and we picked potatoes for two and a half cents a bushel. And if you picked 100 bushels, you had \$2.50 and you did good that day.

It's almost an insult to us to move a subsidized day care center into our area. Our farming days have long since ceased. We don't farm anymore, we just live there. We struggled to build our little community. A lot of blood and sweat went in and we want it to remain a residential area.

I think I said enough in the last meeting; I voiced my opposition and I'm still opposed to a day care center being built on Doctor's Path in Riverhead. Some people say that we are racists, we're bigoted because we don't want Spanish speaking people in our neighborhood. Nothing could be further from the truth. If anyone know me within a 50 mile radius or 100 mile radius in the past 70 years, there's only

one man I know that can call me a racist or a bigot. When I worked at Brookhaven Lab I was on the Affirmative Action Committee for 30 years and I tried to hire all of the Hispanics that I possibly could. All those that were qualified to take a job. There are people on that Town Board that know this to be true.

So I rise tonight to voice my opposition. I heard Sister Smyth in the last meeting said, for God's sakes, this is all about children. Yes, it's all about children but it's also about our neighborhood, about my retirement home. It's more than just children. We raised our children, too. And we're saying leave our area a residential area. I implore this Board to deny this petition.

I have here with me tonight- I'm just one voice and I'm speaking as many who have signed this petition to urge the Town to deny this special permit application. I'm going to submit the original to Barbara. Barbara, you know, you've got it made."

Barbara Grattan: "Why?"

Ralph Brown: "When I was in the- back in the '30's, I was telling the group we met with last night, that when we wanted a hunting license we went to Harry Kratoville's house and knocked on the door at night."

Barbara Grattan: "You can still do that, Mr. Brown. I'll take them home and you still can- "

Ralph Brown: "That's a deal. And if we had legal questions, we went to see Mr. Wilson Stout (phonetic) and Mr. Kratoville and not only the black people in our community, but the Polish people who couldn't handle the English who had just immigrated to this country. I could name a few of those families down there when Mrs. Kratoville would say hey, Joe, bring in the kids and I'll give them milk and cookies. So I'm just trying to hold onto a little piece of Riverhead. Maybe after I'm dead and gone things can change dramatically but please for my sake, just deny this petition and leave me hold onto this little piece while I have time to live.

I want to submit these petitions. There's one here for each. You'll see many more voices other than my own speaking in disapproval of an agreement to this petition. That's the original and that's a copy for each member of the Town Board. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Mr. Brown."

Councilman Densieski: "Mr. Brown, I'd like to make a comment on that if I could."

Ralph Brown: "Yes, sir."

Councilman Densieski: "On that segment of your speech where you said about Brookhaven Lab. For the record, I'd like to clear that what Mr. Brown says is true. I know it to be true because I worked for him in the early '80's and I found him to be one of the most honorable persons, one of the most fair persons, and one of the most decent human beings I've ever met."

Ralph Brown: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Mr. Brown. I saw another hand up in the back. Is there someone else who would like to address the Board? Sandra Mott."

Sandra Mott: "Hi, Sandra Mott, Riverhead. I've only been here seven years, not like this gentleman for 70. But I've been up here discussing with you various issues that pertain to special permits and whether it's one end of Riverhead or the other, I think the word special was designated for a particular reason. It has to be special. There are other accommodations for this group. I support child care centers; I support their objective. I agree with the gentleman. It's his residential area; it's his inheritance and his family's. I've been up here saying the same thing. As I said, I haven't been here 70 years, hopefully I will be."

But the long and the short of it is the focus must be on special when you make your consideration and determination. As I said, I've traveled a lot through the town, the back streets, Main Street, side streets. There are enough other buildings in this township that can accommodate this group in conjunction perhaps with the other groups who are also interested in building facilities, the Y and the church groups. And I think that blended approach might be the best. That's a restatement of what I said before.

Granted some people aren't going to make as much money out of it if it's refurbishment of a particular property rather than building, you know, from the ground up. Maybe the town won't make as much money in regard to the permits that are offered and so on and so forth. But I think for the betterment of all concerned and as several people said, for the little kids, you know. They don't need as much property as they're projecting that they're going to buy. There are enough

vacant buildings that certainly could be revitalized and I think that that approach really must be considered before you make a final decision. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Carol, do you want to address the Board as well?"

Carol Joynes: "My name is Carol Joynes and I'm from Riverhead. In fact, I have property within the 500 feet of the designated site and I probably should have had a letter on the desk for Barbara Grattan, but due to many problems I didn't get it there. I'm sorry, Barbara."

Barbara Grattan: "That's okay."

Carol Joynes: "But I would like to say that I did not receive a letter even stating about the special permit and I'd like to find out why."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Are you talking about with respect to the certified letter for the last hearing?"

Carol Joynes: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Councilman Kent: "She's referring to public notice required."

Carol Joynes: "Public notice required. It's in your code."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. I know there were a number of certified letters and receipts handed up the last meeting. Those would be based upon addresses that we have on our assessment records is the way we ask the applicant to fill them out. I- Barbara, do you have those with you today?"

Barbara Grattan: "I don't have them with me."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Barbara doesn't have those right now. We'd have to look at those certified letters and see if by chance one- you said you have a number of properties, correct?"

Carol Joynes: "Yes. I have a number of properties and I do have one that is within the 500 foot radius of the proposed site."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. I don't have an answer for you or I can't respond to that right now. We can certainly look at it together at the Town Clerk's Office or visit Barbara and see whether it was one of the lists of the certified envelopes or certified mailing sent."

Carol Joynes: "Thank you very much."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Harriet Gilliam."

Harriet Gilliam: "Good evening. Harriet Gilliam, Town of Riverhead. I'd like to address some of the comments that I've been listening to this evening and first we have heard from some of the technical people who have been engaged in this project, because that's what it is, a project, a proposed project. The builder who described it as a nice addition to the community. I don't think that he lives in this community to be able to assess what would be a nice addition to our community. Then we heard from some of the local health services agencies located in Westhampton concerning a meeting that took place there outside of the town of Riverhead to determine what the Town of Riverhead needs. Why we have a meeting outside of our town to determine what's best for our town by people who don't live in our town.

Then we heard from the Executive Director talking about she's working on establishing a relationship with the farming community. Now if we're going to be serving and facilitating the agricultural industry in this area, why has not the farming community been consulted before now? Why at this juncture of the project are they now working on establishing a relationship? And to add to that, Mr. Gergela came up and I've know Joe Gergela for many years and worked with him on some projects even when I was on the Town Board and I have a respect for him, but he was talking about concept and we're talking about reality. This is not about concept; it's about reality; it's about people's real homes; it's about people's real lives; people's real quality of lives within their communities; people's real expectations in terms of their retirement communities. And we're not talking about concepts. Mr. Gergela also talked about the Governor supporting this project and Speaker Silver supporting this project. Well, I haven't heard one resident from the Town of Riverhead stand up at this podium tonight or at the other hearing to say that they support this project for the Town of Riverhead.

Also, you hear talk about this being in terms of the servicing of the community that there are 17 families that are being served within

the Town of Riverhead and 11 from the Greenport area. You can make numbers say anything you want them to say. You could have 17 families with one child each and you could have 11 families with six children each. So to say that this is serving 17 Riverhead families and 11 families somewhere else, that still does not address the question that was posed by myself last time as well as some others in terms of hard numbers, how many children out of the 50 children in the existing programs in Greenport, Southold and Mattituck come from the Riverhead area. Nor does it address the issue of how many of the 76 children will be from the Town of Riverhead.

It's fine to say you're going to give first preference to the Town of Riverhead but what does that mean in terms of actual numbers? Does that mean that if there are five children within the Town of Riverhead who need this service, they'll be given preference and then you'll start bringing children in from Greenport, from Southampton, Bridgehampton, Mastic, wherever? As long as you technically can say that you are in compliance because you're giving preference locally, that still does not address the issue of how many children in Riverhead area need this service.

And we haven't really heard from the farming community in terms of where are the farmers? I mean, Rita comes from a farming background and she got up here and spoke about concern about taxes, about the impact of projects like this on the senior citizens in our community. We know that we have a lot of senior citizens here and they're on fixed incomes. They've paid their dues; they've contributed to society and now they're looking to enjoy their golden years, not to have additional strains put on them by projects that are actually taking property off of the tax rolls and properties that are going to not be contributing to the quality of life in terms of the betterment of the entire town.

And this whole situation really brings to mind to be a medical condition. If you want to think of it in terms of the Town of Riverhead being the patient and you have outside consultants who have been called in, outside specialists who have been called in to assess the condition of the patient. These outside consultants really don't know anything about the patient. They really may not care about the well-being of the patient. All they're interested in doing is convincing the patient that the patient needs their services. And that's what ABCD is trying to do. Trying to convince the Town Board, trying to convince the Town of Riverhead, that the town is in such condition that it needs their services.

And I, for one, am not convinced and I think there are other people who have spoken here tonight who are not convinced. We're not convinced by their proposal; we're not convinced by their lack of numbers, their lack of information in terms of other sites have been provided; and it's just like calling in a doctor to try to convince a patient that that patient is sick. And to add insult to injury in this case, not only is the patient not sick but they're saying well, if you're not sick, we can bring in people from an hour away and we'll consider them as part of your sickness, too.

And the medicine that they are offering us costs more than we want to spend. And I urge the Town Board to deny this application. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Harriet. Is there anyone who has not had an opportunity to address the Board and who- or who has a different question or a different- something else that needs to be offered as part of this hearing? All right, this is something you haven't asked? All right."

Gus LaPorto: "The very thing- Gus LaPorto. The very thing we are talking about, Head Start does all of this therapy, speech (inaudible). They do it all. Why do we need another one? Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Maggie Evans: "A pretty big difference between regular Head Start and migrant Head Start is that we serve birth to five. Regular Head Start serves three to five. We also have multi bilingual staff on board as well that sometimes Head Start might not have on board."

Gus LaPorto: "Thank you."

Maggie Evans: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Is there anything else that hasn't been stated to us, considerations, items, that you haven't had a chance to address to the Board? All right. You have something else that you have not asked? Something that's different? Come on up, Mr. Evans."

Odell Evans: "I asked about these other parcels before. So you tell me that that's none of my business?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, no, no, no. I didn't say that."

Odell Evans: "I'm trying to- "

Councilman Lull: "None of our business."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, no. I think what we said is we have to judge this issue, the special permit that's before us, this particular property, and judge by the criteria. I think your question is a fair one and you've asked the question and we haven't received an answer from the applicant what other sites were considered. I know there was one, Osborne Avenue, because that was discussed or disclosed at the last meeting. I don't know where the other sites are."

Maggie Evans: "I'll call Bob Pace and I will ask him and I will get the answer for you."

Odell Evans: "Okay. And the last question for now. Why was that easement was taken off, what would make this plan change in two weeks?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I would have to ask the applicant's attorney and their engineer or architect to address that. I can only surmise that it may have been something to do with the comments from the Planning Board, the original application having come in prior to that."

James Matthews: "Yes, the easement was originally put on there to preserve the right to develop the property. That was in the early stages. As we stated previously, there is no plans to develop the property. We're willing to tie it up in perpetuity without further development and so when I inquired about the easement as the Board asked a question at the last hearing, I- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Mr. Evans asked the question."

James Matthews: "Mr. Evans asked the question and then we inquired and realized that it's inconsistent with our position which is to embrace the recommendations of the Planning Board and so I directed that it be removed because it's not part of this application any further."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Odell Evans: "Can I make a comment?"

Unidentified: "If you have to."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Sure."

Odell Evans: "Now, like I said before, these young children don't need the nature trails. What's going to happen if you find all the neighboring kids are going to use these trails for motor bikes? That's what's going to happen. So don't kid me about the nature trails; that's just a joke. (Inaudible) That's what's going to happen because kids are already back there now with their bikes. And with nature trails they'll be more bikes back there racing all the time. So, this is all just a joke so you know push this project through as far as I'm concerned and justify the other five and a half acres."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Maggie Evans: "We would have the property fenced to provide security for the children."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Is there anybody else who has any other comments other than what they- Mr. Brown, you have additional comments?"

Ralph Brown: "Ralph Brown, Doctor's Path, Riverhead. Twenty-five years ago, I'm the historian in the family- twenty-five years ago my wife and I went to buy a house and a real estate agent out in Jamesport he gave us a deal. And we put some money down and when we got there the people found out who we were and they didn't want to sell the house. But the real estate man says they will sell you this house. And I'm going to see to it that they sell you it. And my wife and I said we don't want it because we want to be around good neighbors. So I'm wondering why these people knowing that we don't want this project in our community, is still insisting that it be there. It seems to me the sensible and logical thing for them to do would be to withdraw that proposal and seek another area. Why would you want to be in a place where all the residents one after another have come forth and said please don't put it there? That's the end of my- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Mr. Brown. Maggie Evans."

Maggie Evans: "Hopefully this will be the final comment, hopeful. Yes. It has taken us more than two years to come to this point. Sister Jean (inaudible) has been visiting the Island for over six years trying to establish a presence here. We have spent- I gave

Jim the tally just since August, I believe of last year, \$44,000 trying to establish a presence here. That's travel time, fees for the survey of the land, etc., etc. We have also paid \$101,000 and change for subsidized care for the 50 some odd children that we've served. And I really speak from the heart. We have a lot of integrity. We're not trying to dump anyone. We feel our services are a tremendous asset to these kids and we are truly coming from the heart. We are not trying to hurt anyone; we are trying to help. We are trying to help the children; we're trying to help the community.

And people are telling me not to take this personally. But it's really hard because this is a fabulous quality, comprehensive child development program. And I've said it before. It would be a true shame if this did not become a part of your community.

Those tax dollars that people- tax dollars that people are complaining about, that line item in the budget is already allocated to our program. If we do not spend the \$750,000 annually in the Riverhead area, it will be spent somewhere in New York State. Why not give it back to your community?

So, I don't know how much those taxes would be for a 7,000 square foot building. So I can't answer- I don't know."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. I'd rather not have a discussion between the audience."

Maggie Evans: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think the fair statement is that no one is trying to take this against you personally- "

Maggie Evans: "I know."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- I think your spirit and you're- and whether you're reputable in the organization, it's a good organization, is not the issue. I think the issue is as indicated by the residents who have come up to address the Board and voice their opposition to this particular special permit, the location, I think is what I'm hearing from the particular individuals here."

James Matthews: "One final comment. We have tried from the very beginning to work with the town, its departments, its community and we continue to be interested in doing that to reach some solution that's acceptable to everyone."

Councilman Densieski: "Can I ask you one question, please? I'm sorry to delay this. Did you look at any other towns besides Riverhead?"

Maggie Evans: "No."

Councilman Densieski: "Can I ask- thank you."

Maggie Evans: "Wait a minute, that's not true. Calverton. We looked at Calverton."

Councilman Densieski: "That's still Riverhead."

Maggie Evans: "Is that- all right."

Councilman Densieski: "I'm just curious why Riverhead. I mean maybe some other town would love to have you if it's, you know, I'm just curious why Riverhead."

Maggie Evans: "We love Riverhead."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It is something different or is it the same thing again, George, because if it isn't, I'd like to close the public hearing. We've gone on long, long overdue."

George Schmelzer: "According to the lady, the State has a lot of money they don't know what to do with. Let them pay some taxes on the land they got in town. They refuse to do that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right."

George Schmelzer: "I've tried to get that done for two years (inaudible) investigations upstate- nobody wants to listen, the State doesn't want to listen. But now they want to throw money around for something we don't need. There you go. That's all. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. All right. Unless there's something else that hasn't come up tonight or at the last meeting, anybody? All right, at this time, the time of 9:50- 8:50 having arrived, I'm going to close the public hearing, Mr. Evans, thank you. Okay. All right. We'd like to take a brief recess. Mr. Evans, it's not that I'm trying to disrespect you or anything. It's just that the hearing has gone on. All right. Thank you. Okay. We're going to take a brief recess to discuss things. Thank you."

Public hearing closed: 8:50 p.m.

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Councilman Densieski: "We're taking a recess?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "About a 10 minute recess. We'll reconvene it. Is 10 minutes enough? All right."

Recess: 8:50 p.m.

Meeting reconvened: 9:24 p.m.

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "In view of what Town government and Town Hall and Town Hall meetings are about."

Peter Danowski: "Pedro, stand up. Come on up here. Annually we try to take in an exchange student, the Riverhead Rotary Club. A lot of families help in hosting. Pedro is heading back home to Brazil. He hopes to attend Stanford University. He's #1 in his class in Brazil, his class has 400 people. His Dad is an architect; his Mom is an interior designer and he's absolutely goofed off this year.

We were just talking to George Schmelzer about his heritage. Everyone says well if you're from Brazil, you must be Portugese. Most of his heritage is Danish. But he has a combination of a lot. He found it interesting here tonight. He wants to be a politician- "

Councilman Densieski: "Don't do it."

Peter Danowski: "And maybe he'll be president one day in Brazil. But let him say anything else he wants because he's not shy and he's more than happy to speak to anybody."

Exchange Student Pedro: "Thanks, Pete. It's nice to meet you guys and it's a pleasure to be here. And I experienced all that and all I can say is that if you guys get inquiries about the exchange program it would be great because (inaudible) for you and your kids. So think about it. And like it's fun to be here. It's really entertaining. (Inaudible) So thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. I'm not sure if everyone would agree entertaining is the way to describe the process."

Councilman Densieski: "I think he was talking about Phil when

he was saying that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I do have some cards that have been handed in and I also want- would open it up for public comment on the resolutions that are before the Board tonight and anything else that's affecting you and what you think is a town-wide concern. If you could limit your comments to five minutes, it's been a long meeting already with the prior public hearing. I am going to call one card and that's Dorothy Pennell. Dorothy?"

Dorothy Pennell: "Dorothy Pennell from Jamesport. I thought I had done something wrong when Bob called. I didn't do it, I didn't do it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No. Not at all."

Dorothy Pennell: "My questions to the Supervisor and to the Council, I would like to know what progress has been made as far as the Smarga (phonetic) corporation is concerned, whether the clean up of that area. Because nothing has been done with it. The foliage, if I may, is like that song higher than the corn in Iowa. So has there been any activity?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, certainly with regard to the clean up, we have asked Leroy to work with the Town Engineer to do the clean up and exercise that second order which was to clean up the premises and then charge that back to taxes. With respect to the building itself and the lawsuit that's going on, there's a resolution tonight where we're authorizing the retention of a law firm to bring, hopefully, to a conclusion that lawsuit against Smarga, LLC."

Dorothy Pennell: "Oh, good. I saw that and I just wanted to know what it was about. But there has- evidently there hasn't been any attempt by the Town to have that- the growth there cut down. And now as I- well, I had mentioned a couple of the other neighbors had called Mr. Barnes relative to the clean up, and it, you know, it was cleaned up and then-- I'm still President. In fact, I was just re-elected for another two years of the Association, and I mentioned it at the annual meeting on Saturday that Mr. Barnes indicated that the debris that has been accumulated there was put there probably by the residents of the Jamesport Campgrounds Association which is not true. And I- when I brought that, there was an uproar from the members. There's no proof of that and there is- and furthermore the people- they're summer people, the ones who were at the meeting, most of them are, well they're all summer people excepting myself. And they just

came out like on Friday of this past week. So it was none of their doing unless they sent it out United Parcel."

Councilman Cardinale: "Is Leroy here?"

Councilman Densieski: "No. He's not here tonight."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No."

Councilman Cardinale: "Leroy once again- well, apparently not here tonight. Leroy once again endearing himself to the public by telling the Association that they were the dumpers, huh? Let me add something to- "

Dorothy Pennell: (Inaudible)

Councilman Cardinale: "I know. And they weren't even here. It wasn't even 4<sup>th</sup> of July yet. Let me add- I spoke to Leroy and I don't know what he- why there is a delay in it but he has committed I guess as of four weeks ago at a meeting, I think due to your nudging him- "

Dorothy Pennell: "That's right."

Councilman Cardinale: "-- to do the following. To enforce the order which would secure the building, meaning get the doors and windows secured; mow the grass; remove the trailer that is dilapidated there; and remove the charred debris that still remains from the fire. That's all part of an order that he had promised that he would immediately enforce but immediately is four weeks later. What he has done to his credit or discredit, is he has removed the six or eight black garbage bags that were there which were not dumped by the Association of Campground but were dumped by some other people moving through Jamesport I'm sure on their way out.

But in any event, the real question is when is he going to do what he said he's going to do four weeks ago which is secure the building, mow the grass, remove the trailer, and remove the debris- the charred debris. I don't know. I asked him as recently as a couple of days ago, he said he was going to get to it. Maybe the influence of the Supervisor will be greater than my own and he will do it tomorrow. What do you think, Bob?"

Councilman Densieski: "If I could expand upon that a little bit. I went out there also with the Assistant Town Engineer and Leroy and we did look over the site. There are windows that are going to be

boarded up and also the scale house which has about 20 or 30 Budweiser cases in it, empty unfortunately, that scale house- "

Dorothy Pennell: "I claim the ones- I didn't drink all that beer, but I got \$27 in nickels from this stuff. I had somebody come in with rubber gloves because I can't physically get all that junk out. They also dumped more and, I mean, those are locals- that's local debris because it's been there for quite some while and not due to summer people because they wouldn't do it. It's right- that weigh station is right there and they've broken the door and they've broken the window. And I don't know whether they realize the expense of that equipment that's in there but it can be- it's a costly thing. I don't even think Smarga whatever his name is, that he's aware of the value of that. So, but there's a- there are like I guess where they would unload some of the chemicals for the mixing in the fertilizer business, there's a little sort of a scooped out part of that building and there are cartons of beer, the empty cans and everything, down there. But I don't touch that. I (inaudible) because, you know, it's dirty and everything. But I would appreciate it because of the fact that I think if we can get Mr. Barnes moving on it, because it is a health hazard.

Now the County owns that one piece right on Railroad Avenue and they, I guess, when our neighbor (inaudible) prevailed upon the County to have that taken care of and they did it last week and they straightened it out. But that building, is that one of the objectives that you are, hopefully, looking forward to the demolition of that?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's- you mean the building itself? That's part- yes, that's what the purpose of pursuing the lawsuit is so that there's no outstanding litigation to cloud up that issue."

Dorothy Pennell: "Because that whole area, I mean even where that fire was and the debris that's dumped there and the burn out, it's a disgrace and it's got to be taken care of. So I'm going to be like George and I'm going to come every meeting and harass you."

Councilman Densieski: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Let's move from a card. Is there anybody else who hasn't submitted a card and would like to talk? And then I'll go back to a card. Mr. Evans, Odell Evans. Haven't heard from you tonight, have we?"

Odell Evans: "Just one quick question. Now the public hearing

on (inaudible) is closed."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Odell Evans: "What happens next?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We will consider it at a work session; we'll discuss it and then we'll next after that address a resolution either approving it or denying it."

Odell Evans: "When is the next work session?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm not sure we'll get to it next work session. Next work session would be the 13<sup>th</sup> of July."

Odell Evans: "Okay. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Thank you. All right. Sandra Mott is the next card I have up here."

Sandra Mott: "Hello, Sandra Mott, Riverhead. I have three items. I have two distributions I'd like to give to you. Let me discuss them and then I'll give- well, let me give them to you and then I'll discuss them."

Councilman Densieski: "Thank you, Sandra."

Sandra Mott: "There's one for each. First of all, the East End Veterinary Emergency Center which is a private veterinary emergency center that is newly opened next to Toys R Us at 1149 Old Country Road, Route 58 in Riverhead. I don't know if they've advertised or not but I'm going to advertise for them since we have a problem with coverage in the town for emergencies with animals. You all have it- I hope that maybe you can coordinate a meeting with them to see how maybe they can be available to the town, should the animal control officers be in need of care for any animals they come in contact with. And also I was wondering if you could advise them with copies of the two pieces of information, the animal control officers, the police department, the bay constable, the park and recreation staff and the highway department. Since they all come in contact in one way or another either with injured animals or people maybe commenting and asking questions.

The second flyer pertains to the wildlife rescue center at (inaudible) Pond Park on Montauk Highway in Hampton Bays. It has a

wildlife hotline number of 728-WILD. It's a 24 hour per day number. These people take in injured wildlife. As a matter of fact, the bay constable- now I don't know if it's the Town of Riverhead Bay Constable or Kevin McAllister, (inaudible) Siegal (phonetic) came to the Riverhead Animal Hospital and was referred to them. They met part way- at the big duck, which I think is really ironic because between Hampton Bays and Riverhead that would be a good halfway mark for anyone in need of assistance for wildlife.

Again, I hope you would distribute it to your appropriate departments and let them be aware of their opening. I have no affiliation with either one by the way, I'm just letting the public know.

My third concern is is Joey MacLellan available and Chris? Is Chris here?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Chris was here."

Sandra Mott: "Was here. Okay because I left a message- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I know they read the record."

Sandra Mott: "Okay, they do. Okay. Then let me read something to you- make my life simple."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I have a feeling you may have given it to me."

Sandra Mott: "Did I give it to you?"

Councilman Densieski: "Let's not give it back."

Sandra Mott: "It's late; I'm tired. I thank you. The long and the short of it is, I don't know how many people do or don't read the Suffolk Life June 28<sup>th</sup> article that was entitled Cat Lovers Criticize Town for Negligence. Official says new shelter is in the works. I'm going to read you a letter because I don't know if it's going to make it into the Suffolk Life since my number is unlisted and I'm going to say that I also sent it to the News Review and the Traveler Watchman because first and foremost this is a rebuttal of Joey's comments about Tamara Rose (phonetic) and myself which you all knew my concern at the last work session. I'm sorry for disturbing it but it was really upsetting.

Quite frankly, let me read it.

Dear Sir/Madam: Joey MacLellan's statement in the Suffolk Life article of June 28<sup>th</sup>, Cat Lovers Criticize Town for Negligence, that the picture Rose- sent Tamara Rose of the Riverhead Animal Hospital who out of her own pocket, time and effort spent a lot of time and money caring for animals that she didn't have to and Mott, are painting- the picture Rose and Mott are painting is flat out unequivocally untrue, is itself a lie.

First and foremost, I have never lied to this town about the animal concern and I don't really appreciate your putting in print that I am a liar. Well, excuse me, if I'm not speaking the truth, then that's a lie. Picture this Joey. Hundreds of displaced cats and kittens, emaciated sick or dead. There would have been 106 more had Tamara Rose and I not stepped in to help. Try reading the past two and a half years of articles in the Suffolk Life, the News Review and the Traveler Watchman. Try reading the minutes from the Town Hall board meetings or watching Cablevision's public access programs on the subject. As a former journalist, Joey, you should research and check your facts before you call people liars, Joey. I expected better from you. Your disdain was quite clear.

As an appointee and not an elected official your comments are quite frankly ill conceived not to mention incorrect. By the way, the Osborne Avenue location was town property, water district property to be precise that I located during Vinny Vilella's administration under his direction. With the help of Laverne Tennenberg and her staff and the Assessor's Office, we reviewed a long list and came up with that general area. It was Mark Kwasna, Town Highway Supervisor, and Gary Pendzick, Town Water District Supervisor, who offered their support and expertise. They offered it. I give them the credit for pursuing the survey along- for pushing, pardon me, the survey along after my discussions with Bob Kozakiewicz during his first weeks as Supervisor which he was gracious enough to give me and see me about.

So let's give credit where credit is due, Joey. No quote unquote untruths have been painted quote unquote by either Tamara Rose or me at any point in time. Believe me, the truth is bad enough. It needs no exaggeration from anyone regarding the care or lack of care for cats and kittens in Riverhead."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right, Sandy. I have to ask you to sum up- "

Sandra Mott: "I want to- I have one- I know, I know. But I think I deserve this because this might not get in the paper."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, everybody who's out there- everybody- "

Sandra Mott: "A full public written apology is due Tamara and me. Get it. This is the gist of it. A full public written apology is due Tamara and me. Unless you build a new shelter (inaudible) with a no kill policy for cats and dogs and all creatures in need, then we're still right and you are flat out unequivocally untrue in your remarks regarding our concerns. As to walking before you can run, watch out or I'll be running for Town Council myself with the specific goal of building a new town facility faster than you can spell C-A-T. Comprende, Joey? My feeling is you have no right to infer- and it's not funny- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Sandra, there was no- "

Councilman Densieski: "Sandra- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There was no inference. You made a statement that town officials had already declared this was going to not be a facility accepting cats."

Sandra Mott: "No, no."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And I read it- "

Sandra Mott: "Because that's what he told Tamara Rose. And I feel that if somebody doesn't make a decision soon, we're going to be in big trouble. Okay. Because it's abuse and neglect. And my feeling is I'm not making any comment. I read your comments, I hear other people's comments, I hear other people's support and then I hear him telling other people that it's not going to ever happen. All right. Now I feel that somebody owes me an apology and it's not you gentlemen, it's Joey MacLellan and as for Tamara Rose, she works a 12 hour shift. She couldn't be here. I am here and I'm not going away."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Sandy, I have- I do have to ask that you sum up."

Sandra Mott: "Fine. I'm going to sum up with one thing. One thing only. When are we making a decision on this matter? I am here to help you. I am here once you find a total number. I will make the

money gathering before you. I have people running after me with money. I haven't taken once nickel because you can't make up your mind or I know it's a process. I need a total. You did it for the inline skating, in house, contract it out or (inaudible). Get me that number and I'll get you the money. (Inaudible) And public funding (inaudible) and jointly. I want to know how much it's going to cost and however you do that, you've got a planning and you've got people in accounting and so on, someone can come up with a number. That's my summation. I don't care what you call me because my skin is getting very thick in this process and as I said, I'm not going away. You're not going to infer that we are liars and if you won't make a public apology then that speaks a hell of a lot. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Somebody who hasn't submitted a card. Sal Mastropolo."

Sal Mastropolo: "Sal Mastropolo, Calverton. A couple of comments. One is in last week's News Review there was a public notice on the Farahzad condominium project."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That would be from the Planning Board. Correct."

Sal Mastropolo: "Yeah, it had an incorrect address in the public notice. The Farahzad condominium is not on Sound Avenue. It's on 25A. So you may want to republish that public notice."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That would be, yeah, the Planning Board I think so we'll pass it along to the Planning Board."

Sal Mastropolo: "Another thing is I don't know if you're aware of it but I guess at the last meeting you approved the transfer of the receiving area."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Correct."

Sal Mastropolo: "Okay. I heard last week from a reliable source in Wading River that that piece of property where Farahzad wants to put the condominiums, okay, that low area in the back, that swale, the swale is there because they used to mine clay out of there for making bricks in Wading River. You may want to check with one of the local Wading River historians. It was a clay mine at one time. So it's going to create a problem if he's going to try to put in additional square footage and put in additional ground water. Okay."

Resolution 583. Can you tell me what purpose that serves other than to satisfy some of the people that are against the jetport. My concern is you pass this resolution tonight and the first time somebody comes forward, for example, like maybe Fed Ex asking for permission to land a couple of cargo planes for their new distribution center, are you now going to have to request a special permit for each and every one of these? I mean it seems ridiculous to pass this resolution. Okay. It's just going to make additional work later on when the first person comes with a valid reason to land a cargo plane at Calverton.

Going on to 591."

Councilman Kent: "Before you go on, with 583, Sal, not that I necessarily favor the resolution. The resolution does not change zoning or anything."

Sal Mastropolo: "No, I know."

Councilman Kent: "If (inaudible)."

Sal Mastropolo: "They just say no. But what happens when somebody comes with a- "

Councilman Kent: "With a good one?"

Sal Mastropolo: "Yes. That means special permit process, right? Which costs the town money."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, as- "

Councilman Kent: "No. Not a special permit- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "As pointed out, the zoning is still the same as far as the underlying zoning on the property. We're just saying we definitely do not want this on the property."

Councilman Densieski: "We're being accused of wanting to bring a commercial aviation airport there. And this is just setting the RDC and our real estate agent, Grubb and Ellis, to not entertain any offers of commercial aviation because I don't think anybody on the Board or anybody in town wants it. Just to straighten the record out."

Sal Mastropolo: "Okay. I guess the one concern I have is the

word or cargo port business. Okay. You know, commercial jetport, I agree. But cargo port business, I mean, if Fed Ex has a valid reason, hopefully, they would come to you with their new site at Edwards Avenue to want to land a couple of cargo jets there. Overnight, right?"

Councilman Densieski: "Ninety-five percent of cargo is in the (inaudible) of passenger terminals so if they're going- it's going to go somewhere else."

Sal Mastropolo: "Okay. All right. 591. Okay. You've got- you put lists out and you leave yourself wide open. If you look at page 2 of the list of things that you're giving out to bid, okay, item #51 chin strap snaps \$433. It sounds awful expensive for chin strap snaps. Okay. And then if you look at a couple of the other items, look at item #81, pro down 4 point chin strap low hook up, \$188. Okay. Look at item 49, low hook up chin strap 4 point, \$5. Something's wrong. I mean- "

Councilman Densieski: "The decimal is in the wrong spot."

Councilman Kent: "Are these- these two columns the way they go here, I don't know for sure but we can ask Jack. I think one of those columns is per item and the other one might be purchasing- "

Sal Mastropolo: "No, no, no. The three columns are the three different bidders, Calree, Riddell and Passons."

Councilman Kent: "Oh, yes. They might be per item as compared to in a bulk."

Sal Mastropolo: "Well, shouldn't it say- "

Councilman Kent: "It should say that."

Sal Mastropolo: "-- for chin strap snaps, shouldn't it say 100, 1,000 or 10,000."

Councilman Kent: "Some type of a lot."

Sal Mastropolo: "Okay? There's also an item #48, Ridell or equivalent chin straps 4 point low hookup, \$1.88. I mean- "

Councilman Densieski: "Sal- "

Sal Mastropolo: "Something's wrong with the numbers."

Councilman Densieski: "Sal, I think you're right. We're going to make a motion to table it and get it straightened out."

Sal Mastropolo: "Okay. I think those are the only items I had."

Councilman Densieski: "Good point, Sal."

Sal Mastropolo: "One other question. On the CDA stuff, okay, what I don't understand is how we can give out a contract for 2,100 square feet for \$2,500 a month and then we give out a contract for 23,000 square feet- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Just what we were just talking about."

Sal Mastropolo: "-- for \$8,000 a month. Don't we have any kind of guidelines of how much per square foot- "

Councilman Lull: "Exactly."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The square foot, we do have a guideline. This involved some tie down space and runway use as well. But we're going to change that."

Sal Mastropolo: "That was my other question."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Sal Mastropolo: "The last two- the two items #16 and 17, do they include use of the runway? In which case- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Sixteen what?"

Sal Mastropolo: "In which case I would think we'd get more money per square foot rather than less money per square foot where they're not using the runway."

Councilman Kent: "That's why in the one that was 1375 a square foot I believe it was- "

Sal Mastropolo: "I don't know. It doesn't say square footage price."

Councilman Kent: "Right."

Sal Mastropolo: "I just do a quick division."

Councilman Kent: "The higher one included tie down and runway use. So we had a conference- "

Sal Mastropolo: "Well, wait, the higher one is #15 which is R&J Electronics- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, no- "

Councilman Densieski: "No, that's 450."

Sal Mastropolo: "Wait a minute- it's skydiving."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That was #16, skydiving."

Sal Mastropolo: "Hang on. #16 is, okay, skydiving, right. \$2500 per month for 2100 square feet. All right. #17 is Excel Aire which is 23,000 square feet for \$8,700 a month."

Councilman Kent: "Right. Because one included use of the tie down area and runway and one didn't. But it's not really specified in the agreement so we're going to change that."

Sal Mastropolo: "Okay. Yes, thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. I have one- I'm going to keep going back and forth between the cards and then we'll do you next- Bill Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. I noticed a number of resolutions appointing people, ratifying appointments, people whose names I've seen here working here for a long time. How come if you don't mind telling me and the people listening what this ratification of so many people are."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "What we're looking to do is to spell out the terms of employment of the various people who are the subject of those resolutions. Previously they had contracts with the town and this Board had a lot of discussions with respect to the particular individuals involved and rather than give a contract, an employment contract, we determined that we would prefer to spell it out in a resolution format. So what the resolutions do, and maybe they should

have been entitled instead sets terms of employment for the respective employees. So I guess maybe that would have been a better explanation or a better way to entitle or title those particular resolutions but that's the reason why we're doing this."

William Kasperovich: "I'm rather confused here. When you refer to secretaries- secretary to the Town Attorney, secretary to the Highway Superintendent, secretary to the Supervisor. Is this an office secretary or is this a personal secretary. Secretary is a rather ambiguous title. To the individual or to the office?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't know if I understand the distinction. The secretary to the Town Attorney is the individual who's assigned to that particular office and who's working in that capacity. The same would be true with respect to the secretary who is assigned and working at the Town Highway Department and likewise it would be true with respect to the office of the Supervisor."

Councilman Cardinale: "I think I know what Bill is asking."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm not sure- "

Councilman Cardinale: "It would- these are not civil service employees and, therefore, I've heard the term that you're using. In effect, they are secretary to the individuals and they are not- they don't get- they are not civil service employees so special terms and conditions of employment have to be set for them. And these people never had them set and this is what this resolution that they're proposing attempts to do. Set the terms and conditions including salary of the people named who are not civil service. There's only a handful of them in the town and they are these people."

William Kasperovich: "There are a couple things here that I'm not particularly settled with. On Resolution 610, be it further resolved that the Town Clerk be and is hereby directed to forward a certified copy of this resolution to the Planning Department. That's- you're sending a copy of this resolution to a Department? I would think that you would be sending it to the director of- the man who's in charge of the department instead of the department itself."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's going to end up as part of their record so that they- there's a record that has the terms of employment. I'm not sure if I see a big distinction but if you want us to put the department head in there we can amend the resolution so noted."

William Kasperovich: "Well, if a man's in charge, he's in charge."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

William Kasperovich: "Normally when we send people to a seminar or a course or a different learning session, we usually establish a cost maximum. And terminology of and reimbursement of reasonable expenses. Don't fully understand why we're making such a distinction or am I getting into personal affairs that is none of my business."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Are we talking about the one that's sending a member from the CDA?"

William Kasperovich: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. I've discussed that with the department head. It's at a cost of approximately- the total cost will be approximately \$2,000. That particular department has not sent anybody on a seminar for approximately four years. The monies that are being used for this purpose will come out of- intended to come out of grant monies. This is a conference that involves the establishment of EDZ zones and it's a conference that's pretty critical to that department as far as future use with respect to the EDZ. So that's why they've asked for us to consider that request."

William Kasperovich: "Well, it's nice to hear that you have such good confidence in a capable individual. I'm all in favor of sending him and I'm glad you've considered just what the maximum would be."

Well, at the last two meetings, I presented two very serious situations here in Riverhead. I'm waiting to hear the Town Board since you are the controlling personnel of the destiny of the town itself, of what actions have been taken. I am not particularly happy to have in our township a police officer in blue uniform act as enforcement, judge, jury and jailer. This is the kind of history I have been taught in my teens that happened in Germany prior to World War II. It is a serious matter and I do think the Town Board has to take a positive serious stand for the future. With that, I'll say thank you.

Oh, yes. One other thing on a little more lighter vein."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Bill, if you could sum up."

William Kasperovich: "If we stay here after 11:00, can we get midnight cocktails at your expense?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The answer is no."

William Kasperovich: "No?"

Councilman Densieski: "I vote yes."

William Kasperovich: "All right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Joan Griffing."

William Kasperovich: "Then we'll get home early."

Joan Griffing: "Good evening, Joan Griffing from Calverton. Just quick question. Osborne and Reeves drainage problem that's been having- a meeting or two ago you said Mr. Kwasna was going to take over that project."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right."

Joan Griffing: "Is there any progress on it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The- we established a budget and I don't think he's been out there yet but it's certainly on his list of items to do."

Joan Griffing: "Okay. And what's the progress on the Burman deal?"

Councilman Densieski: "Yeah, Bob."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We had a conversation or I had a conversation with his consultants. We are expecting a subdivision plan to be filed by Mr. Burman and he is working with his consultants to prepare that plan and file it with the town."

Joan Griffing: "Okay. And number 578 amends the site plan to Tradition Links- Traditional Links?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Correct."

Joan Griffing: "It says it changes the clearing to not more than 61 and a half acres. What was the original clearing- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That was the original resolution provided for clearing of a certain amount and we knew that when the application came in when they're out in the field, the field conditions might be such that they might have to move clearing lines one way or the other. And they have encountered some changes that are needed as a result of the field condition. So they're still staying within the findings of what the Town Board had adopted back then as far as limits of what the total clearing would be."

Joan Griffing: "Okay. And #16 and 17, just get back to those for a second. Will- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "These are the CDA resolutions?"

Joan Griffing: "Right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Joan Griffing: "I'm sorry. Excel Aire, will that allow helicopter usage also to come in there?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think his proposal did have a helicopter use as far as maintenance and upkeep. Yes."

Joan Griffing: "For maintenance and upkeep- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "If I remember he did have a- did he have a helicopter- "

Councilman Densieski: "I'm not sure."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I- "

Councilman Densieski: "I could find out and let you know."

Joan Griffing: "Okay. And is there insurance for these two companies coming in, the skydiving club- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We require all licensees to provide insurance for the premises."

Joan Griffing: "Okay. And last question. FAA approval on the runways, isn't that needed?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Joan Griffing: "And who gets it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes. The town."

Joan Griffing: "The town gets it and that's been approved?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We've made an application but it hasn't been approved."

Councilman Densieski: "These license agreements are effective August 1<sup>st</sup>."

Joan Griffing: "But can they use it without the FAA approval?"

Councilman Densieski: "No."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No."

Councilman Kent: "Subject to FAA."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, they cannot."

Joan Griffing: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Nor can they use it without the town's permission with the way the FAA application was filed because it would be municipally owned private use."

Joan Griffing: "Okay. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Thank you. Going to a card. Gus LoPerto."

Gus LoPerto: "I've said enough."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Thank you, Gus."

Councilman Densieski: "Thanks, Gus."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody who doesn't have a card in? You have a card, George. I'm going to get to you next. Yes?"

Marie Becker: "My name is Marie Becker. I live in Wading River. We have a situation in our community that needs some rectifying. We pay very high taxes in our community as other

residents in Riverhead. But I'm sure that other residents in Riverhead get more for their taxes than we do. We have an association that four years ago some morons probably approached Riverhead and got a- and got some kind of a dispensation where they own the roads. Right? Am I making myself clear? They own the roads."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There are some situations- "

Marie Becker: "As a result, our roads have not been paved or taken care of for four years. We have roads that are worse than tobacco road. My next door neighbor plants grass seed in the road so that the mud doesn't slide into his front yard when it rains. That's how bad our roads are. What does a person do out here when we pay these high taxes? I lived in Great Neck, Long Island for 50 years. I just sold my house there. I have- I'm living in Wading River now for 14 years. We paid high taxes but we got a lot for our taxes. We had roads that were maintained, they had cobblestone- beautifully maintained roads with cobblestone curbs. We had sewers, a very good school system. We had gas piped in. We had all the facilities. Out here we pay high taxes and get nothing. I mean I'm here to ask Riverhead either you reduce our taxes or give us some services."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Where are you in Wading River? What road?"

Marie Becker: "On Cliff Road. I pay \$6,000 a year taxes for a two bedroom house and I'm not even waterfront. So I really feel as if we're being screwed. We're being screwed. We get nothing. Nothing. We have garbage collected one day a week. If you call up the police department they tell you there's nothing they can do because our roads are private and if somebody is illegally parked in our roads, they can't give them a ticket because our roads are private. So who needs private roads if we don't get any services? Now what can we do about it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Cliff Road is a private road according to the town records. The road can be improved to make it a road that's donated to the town. There's a number of mechanisms by which that can be done. It can be road improvement- "

Marie Becker: "Well, I'd like to know what those mechanisms are."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There's road improvement district would be one way which would be to establish a special improvement

district. It would require us to have a public hearing, establish what the cost of the improvements would be, and then unfortunately the downside is there would be some additional taxes to the people there for that road improvement."

Councilman Kent: "But you can get services- "

Marie Becker: "Why should we be taxed for that road improvement when you've been off the hoop for four years?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There must have been a determination--"

Marie Becker: "You've been collecting taxes, giving the residents nothing for their taxes, and now we have to pay to improve the roads?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The understanding of these private roads there would be homeowners associations and groups that would maintain and keep these roads- "

Marie Becker: "They have not been maintained and kept up."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- and, therefore, they could keep others out of the private road system and it would be a private or a gated or a private community. And that's the whole reason of why these private roads were established. There's others in the township as well. There's- and Locket Drive in Aquebogue, some of these are maintained very well such as the Locket Drive Association. Some are not maintained so well. But there was a decision made by the developer, the individual who built out these communities back 40, 50, 60 years ago that they wanted those communities to be a private community and there was no effort or no desire to dedicate or transfer those roads to the town. We can take those roads as town highways. If they are in acceptable condition to the town highway superintendent and there's ways, as I said, one of those would be to the road improvement district in order to make them meet the standards and specs that our town code and the highway superintendent ask for."

Councilman Kent: "That started- yes, that's started by a petition of the homeowners though. You have to have more than- "

Marie Becker: "Unfortunately our community has so many rented homes that can't really vote on a petition like that, that it's very difficult to get anything done. And the other thing you ought to look into is how many of these residences have two families living in them

in a one family structure which is illegal and nothing is done by Riverhead in those instances.

Now you have another gripe that I have. You have- we're on a beach at Hulse Landing and you have all these- you put up a billboard with all the rules and regulations but you don't enforce them. Four wheel drive going up and down the beach like it's the Long Island Expressway at night after 10:00. What are four wheel drive doing on a beach after 10:00? Last year I came here and presented this to you and you said the four wheel drives have to be on the beach for fishermen. Fishermen don't fish in the dark."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's not true. Some fishermen do fish at night. What they call- it's called bottom fishing."

Marie Becker: "Well, if they do, then they should- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And you throw the bait out and you let it sit on the bottom and when the fish bite, you do go fishing at night."

Marie Becker: "At 10:00 at night, 11:00, 1:00 in the morning?"

Councilman Densieski: "All night long."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "My father used to do it often. He was very fond of going down the beach after a hard day of work on the farm, taking some bait with him, throwing two or three poles out, putting the fish holders up and staying there for a couple hours to see if he'd catch a striped bass or a blue or whatever."

Marie Becker: "But how about putting the car in the parking lot and walking down to the beach which is just about from here to the door? And not having these cars race up and down the beach at night. Something has to be done because our community is going down the tubes and Riverhead is just collecting money and giving us nothing in return for it. And I'd like to know what the procedure is in getting something done."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "On a road improvement district, there would be a petition. We would establish a mapping plan, estimate the cost, and assess the cost of that improvement against the property owner. That's the mechanism by which a road improvement district could be established for purposes of making your roads fit with the town specs and improving them as you've indicated you'd like to have

them improved. That's the mechanism."

Marie Becker: "Well, can I come and see anyone on the Board and get such a petition made up to your specifications so I can get these signatures?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We could put together what's been done in the past to give you an idea of how it's done. Sure. You can call my office and schedule an appointment to do that."

Marie Becker: "Well, I'm going to call your office."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Marie Becker: "And I seriously feel that Riverhead owes us something in return for what we pay in taxes. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Rolph Kestling."

Rolph Kestling: "Rolph Kestling, Wading River. Sixty-three years ago, my folks were charter members of the Wildwood Hills organization. So I think I know more about the place than you know."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Oh I'm sure you do."

Rolph Kestling: "I'm no longer- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I've only been here 43 years."

Rolph Kestling: "Okay. How- well, Wildwood Acres, that's the other section where I live now, gets a lot of work done on that road. We walk that road or my wife does practically every day. They have big sections of road where they do a complete road job on. I mean a real good job on it. Why can't they do the same for people in Wildwood Hills? They are paying a lot of tax money, those houses on the cliff. They're paying probably more than all Millbrook Gables pay. You know that, too. You've got houses \$7,000 and \$8,000. Sure they can afford it, too. But they come out weekends or something like that. Or some of them get rented. Now, you're giving Wildwood Hills short shrift and that's the whole thing about it. You can do more for them. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Marie Becker: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Steve Haizlip, you put in a card, Steve?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steven Haizlip from Calverton. I'm looking at the resolution here on 609, says you want to get rid of fixed assets. Assets are either property or money. Now- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This is property. It's chairs and furniture and other items."

Steve Haizlip: "Oh, that explains that then. Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This is- what we- there's an auction this Saturday which is held at the municipal garage which- wherein we auction off vehicles that have been town owned and also taken in various circumstances as well as motorcycles. It's also property that's seized as part of police inspections and recovery. We also have another resolution in here which is establishing a list of items that were town property items and assets that are being sold at the auction and then a list of items which are not to be sold but instead are to be discarded such as if there's a chair that has only two legs, it's not likely someone is going to bid a great deal on that and it's going to cost us more to move it from one site to the municipal garage, have nobody bid on it, and then move it again to discard it. So, those items have been culled out so they're not part of the auction."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay, now I fully understand. Just a couple words, I didn't get it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Steve Haizlip: "The resolution, I think it was 583- no that's been discussed. Regardless of what the number is, I don't want to hold up time, but I see there's a bid in here to get some nice white paint to guide me at night."

Councilman Lull: "That's you, that's yours, Steve."

Steve Haizlip: "And make it nice and bright. Well, the roads are getting in very bad deteriorated non-white existing. And I'm glad that this bid is in here and I want to see it as soon as possible. And I've been fighting Southold town for Sound Avenue up to the town line and the guy tells me that it's a state road so I had to get Yakaboski straightened out on that."

Now, all right. Now, you know, Bob, excuse me, let me change that. Mr. Supervisor- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Bob's fine."

Steve Haizlip: "You know, our parking lot, there's a need for more space. I have noticed that we have a town vehicle compliment considered the size of a battalion in the army. And they're taking up all the space. So we need that extra parking to the north, that wooded area as soon as possible."

Okay, next item here. I've been asked to direct attention to this stop light project and communications that Mrs. Lewin and I started for Sound Avenue and Edwards Avenue and the traffic not getting any better, it's getting worse, and you go up there and you pull and here comes big trucks wanting to come down Edwards. And you want to back up a little bit to give him a little more room and it ain't there. So, you've got to get a little control there.

Now, as far as the light on Route 58 and Harrison. In '98, July of '98, soon be two years- I think it was '98, I'm pretty sure, no light yet but resolution 106 says there's agreement to get a light. What I did was I write to Bob Gaffney about it, to get him to push it with Mr. (inaudible), my middle initial which is "O" becomes outcast. And nothing happens. The only thing it looks like sometimes that a community advocate is good for is supply the taxes, give them a good salary, and be sort of (inaudible) with it, not intending by your name, and sort of not pay too much attention to what the needs is out there. And now, every intersection of 58 has a light except that one and they say we want to study it, we want to study it. What is there to study? You stand out there, Irwin Garstein has been in here saying the people can't get out of his place for lack of light. There's nothing to study. They got some excuse that Mr. Serota is going to help them.

Mr. Kozakiewicz, you mentioned that you got your town engineer to look into this. At the last time I talked to you, the town engineer hadn't got back to you. I hope the town engineer by now has gotten back to you on it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I actually spoke with Mr. Bartha (phonetic) and you're right. They were- they were hoping that the Serota project would come along and that was part of the reason why the light was not being placed up at County Road 58 with Harrison. I'm told that given the fact that the Serota application does not

appear to be imminent, the county is going to undertake putting the light up. This is what Mr. Bartha told me through his offices. I don't recall when. I'm sure that's going to be your next question, when, and I know, you know, they didn't give me a firm commitment or a date that it would be up by. But I'm told as you were told that the Serota application was the thought and that Serota would pick up the cost of the installation of the light."

Steve Haizlip: "Right. I have one on here to ask you but you explained it to Bill already about ratifying the appointment of the people. Now I understand because it was explained. And, now, the shrubbery to TS and (inaudible). Is that just dormant? Has any word been sent out to these people to try to replace this dead shrubbery, especially at Rita's garage (phonetic). I believe Kent can verify that. He probably goes by it once in a while to see how ugly that is and with all the weeds growing up around that place and the varmints getting in it, and speaking of varmints, I called up Mark today, the highway superintendent, about at least during these summer months to form a rat patrol. And that (inaudible) road accident to animals of traffic. They are laying out all over. Different roads, county roads, state roads, town roads, and they just get smashed, obliterated in there and the animal control could go out and check these roads and get all those dead animals up off the roads but they just seem to lay there, nobody ever seems to see them. And I call all the time and that's about sometimes when you get action and sometimes I don't get action until the next week I call up. So Mark said he's going to work on that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right, thank you."

Steve Haizlip: "Thank you very much."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There's two in the back. Directly back and then I'll finish up with you, George, if you don't mind. Is that okay? And Steve will be second and then I'll finish up with you. Yeah, I've got your card, you're going to be the last one unless there's someone else who wants to address the Board?"

Janet Balero: "My name is Janet Balero and I live at 128 Cliff Road, in Wading River. I'm here to speak to you guys and some of my neighbors for immediate support and help we desperately need. We need police patrolling Hulse Landing Road going to the beach and the adjoining streets of Cedar, Dogwood and Cliff, especially during the summer months. Last night, there was a fight that took place on Hulse Landing Road about 11:00. About 20 youths started a fight which led

to one boy beaten up very badly. He needed an ambulance. The police were called in, they finally contained the group and these fights are every weekend in the summer on Hulse Landing Road.

After this altercation took place, they took the kid away in the ambulance, the three police cars that were at the scene shut their lights off and pulled away. At the same time on the same road, 80 feet down the road right where the beach starts, the cops had blocked these other cars and trucks in. They were shooting fireworks from the back of pickup trucks, the kids were drinking, they had coolers, there were beer bottles being thrown all around. When the ambulance took off with the kid that got beaten up, the cops took off. Never went down that 80 foot to disrupt and disperse those other 30 kids. Plus what was on the beach with kids doing fireworks, kids making fires and the trucks that Mrs. Becker had called. They're not fishermen. They- fishermen- my father was a fisherman and he'd park a truck and he'd- this is the Long Island Expressway. They go up and down. They backfire, they come- they screech up the hill. It's horrendous.

Hulse Landing Road, the beach and the surrounding street is now an unsupervised hangout for local kids and non local kids. I have a cousin who's got a kid that lives in Rocky Point and they know this area is never patrolled by cops. Last week, two carloads of kids came from the beach about 2:00 in the morning. They're parked on Dogwood Road, they started fighting over a remaining case of beer that wasn't drunk- drank. One of the kids took a beer bottle, smashed the window on the car, trying to get the beer from the other kid. The police were called but the police came after the incident and after they left.

I was just wondering if we could get the police to ticket all the cars and the trucks that are in the parking lot off Hulse Landing Road. They have no permits. Most of the people there are from believe it or not out of state on the weekends.

Also, if the cars that are parked on Dogwood Road, there's a hill or an incline. They park on the wrong side of the road, they park the wrong direction and then at 2:00 in the morning they come down and they come from the beach and they go to their cars. Or also these kids are drinking, they're all under age, they're driving away intoxicated, and I know the police have more important things than just patrolling the beaches or going down the private community streets, but I feel if they got these tickets it would deter the kids from coming. You guys maybe would make extra money or the Suffolk County police. But I mean we don't know what else to do. We just are

at wit's end. Do you have any like explanation or where I could go? Do I write letters or, you know, what can I do- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No. We've heard you. The chief just stepped in the back, Chief Joe Grattan, and certainly we can ask him to follow up with parking enforcement up at Hulse Landing Road and having the police try to enforce the regulations with regard to beach use and after hours gatherings on the beach."

Janet Balero: "Yes, I mean they could really do, you know, I would love to be just a helper and go around and ticket everybody. Or, it's just so out of control and like I said, everybody is, you know, let's go down to the beach and hang out and it's 2:00 in the morning, 3:00 in the morning. You just- I would love to, you know, the best thing to do is just talk to you or should I, you know, now send a letter to the police department?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This is on the record."

Janet Balero: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The chief is here. He's heard that there's a problem down at Hulse Landing Road with respect to parking and with respect to beach goers, so I'm going to ask the chief to follow up on it and have his police units- "

Janet Balero: "Yeah, during the winter months, you know, the kids don't- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right."

Janet Balero: "-- don't go down. It's too cold and whatever and it's not bad. But I really appreciate it. Thanks."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Steve Kirschenbaum and then George."

Steve Kirschenbaum: "I have to commend you guys for being able to stay up this late. It's past my bedtime. On Resolution 16 and 17, I'd like to commend the Town Board on having the courage to bring aviation use back to the Grumman site and the economic benefit it could bring to the town and I think it's fabulous."

Resolution #583, I'd just like to state one thing. That aviation or airports for a whole aren't ugly dirty things. Airplanes bring our

friends, our relatives, they bring our packages, they bring our freight, they rescue our boaters, they provide for the defense of our country. Aviation was a part of our community for 50 years and on a scale of 1 to 15- 1 to 10, the aviation use we had in this town was a 15 in intrusiveness and it was a good neighbor. Anything that gets allowed at the Calverton site will be a good neighbor and put up no noise and be good to everybody.

The Grumman Alliance of which I'm a part of has been a proponent of general aviation not of commercial aviation, not a scheduled passenger service, and Dick Amper is putting out his garbage all over town saying that we're going to destroy and everything else. And I'd just like the town to know that that's a fund raising tactic and a scare tactic.

I commend the town but on Resolution #583 I'm against the fact that you don't tell a town agency how to think and I think the fact is a commercial airport is- a passenger airport is not needed in Calverton but you shouldn't tell a town group or agency how to think. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "George Schmelzer."

George Schmelzer: "I think a week ago you had a meeting in Caracciola's office about 58. What happened? Anything? Any conclusion?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "They are- more studies."

George Schmelzer: "Huh?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "More studies."

George Schmelzer: "This has been going on for years. How many- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "They're going to do an analysis of the destination point and the origin place- place of origin these various trips are passing through. They have some numbers of the number of people who are coming off the expressway, how many are passing through the traffic circle, how many are going through Northville Turnpike and how many are reaching the intersection with 105 up by Apple Chevrolet."

George Schmelzer: "They also discussed- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "They- go ahead."

George Schmelzer: "Pardon me. Also discussed the possibility of extending the expressway to 105?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We had some discussions about extending the expressway and to do that there's going to have to be some very neat maneuvering. Because if you take the way the expressway ends and draw a line straight out from that, you would be going through a great deal of property that's already been developed."

George Schmelzer: "(Inaudible) was their intention to go even further than that and nobody there pushed it when they had the chance. So maybe you can push it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And if we can figure a way to avoid all the property that's going to cost a great deal of money to condemn."

George Schmelzer: "Well, they could have done it before. It was- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It would be going through a great deal of property that's been developed."

George Schmelzer: "It was on a map for years that's where the extension would be, nobody cared. All right. Then as far as the airport is concerned, somebody said that's important a minute ago, that people don't want an airport. No. How do you know? One way to find out, have a referendum in November, airport, yes or no. Say yes, no. That's all. And the whole town would vote for it. And that's at a regular election which is better. Don't act like the library does. They have library votes on odd times so the ones that want it are the only ones that vote. That's why they get their approval, see. They told me that themselves. Good trick.

Now this ethics board (inaudible) you're thinking about, do our neighboring towns have ethics boards?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes. Some do and some do not."

George Schmelzer: "Does Brookhaven have one?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I believe they have."

Councilman Cardinale: "It's seldom used, however."

George Schmelzer: "They ended up with (inaudible) that way, didn't they? Boy oh boy. By the way- "

Councilman Cardinale: "They call it the grand jury."

George Schmelzer: "Pardon me?"

Councilman Cardinale: "Brookhaven's ethics board is the grand jury."

George Schmelzer: "This drain pipe on East Main Street hasn't been looked at yet, has it? Well, maybe looked at but nobody's cleaned it out."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Actually we did. It was Mark Kwasna and oh, boy, I can't believe I've forgotten his name, Mr. Caffrey did take a walk out along that particular area and, in fact, went out to where that culvert and drainage and swale continues on, because we were trying to figure out- what- the "

George Schmelzer: "Under Route 25."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Under Route 25 over by where Brookside Auto is- "

George Schmelzer: "Where Sky used to have his tires. Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes. So actually we did take a look. We're trying to figure out why there's standing water, trying to figure out where the blockages are but yes we did take a look at it."

George Schmelzer: "Well, there's all sorts of junk inside there."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, it's not in that culvert. We followed it- or they followed it. I didn't go out with them. They started off of here on Howell, continued right through where the drainage goes under that overpass, continued on through where in back of Gallo's- "

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, by the sewer works, too."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No. They didn't go- but they couldn't

find what the source was, why the water was blocking up. They're going to continue to look at it to see if we can get that flow going."

George Schmelzer: "I think the state should clean it out. They don't want to get their hands dirty so I suggest you buy a couple pairs of gloves- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, I think we've got to- I think you've raised the issue and I did ask them to go out and see if we could somehow rectify the problem."

George Schmelzer: "Buy a couple pairs of gloves for them, they won't get their hands dirty. Tell them to go in there."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, but it's been there since 1922, it hasn't been cleaned out. If it's plugged up completely, then the water will go over the road, see. Then you'd have a problem. If they clean it out the water table drops two feet you'll never have any damp cellar here. I didn't say damn cellar, I said damp cellar."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Damp cellar. I got you. With a "p"."

George Schmelzer: "Okay. Thank you very much. I'm getting tired."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Ditto. Ditto. All right. At this time, what I'd like to do is adjourn our meeting and open the CDA because I see we're all about to fail."

Meeting adjourned: 10:32 p.m.

Meeting reopened: 10:43 p.m.

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And we'll reopen the town board hearing and take up the resolutions."

Resolution #578

Councilman Lull: "578 amends the site plan approval of Traditional Links, LLC. As was described earlier, in answer to a question, it doesn't change the configuration of some of the clearing that's being done. It does not in any way even come close to reaching the approved clearing amount that was approved for that property. So

moved."

Councilman Kent: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes."

Councilman Kent: "Since this resolution only modifies the area of clearing without exceeding the clearing limits that were shown on the original site plan- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We've got an amendment."

Councilman Kent: "Oh, there is?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There's a slight text change we need to make- "

Rick Hanley: "Right. On one of the Whereas's."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The third Whereas."

Councilman Kent: "The one that tells you the area, acreage limitation?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Correct. It slipped my mind. Thank you for being here, Rick."

Councilman Cardinale: "What is the- "

Councilman Kent: "Oh, it just talks about the SEQRA fund."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right."

Councilman Densieski: "I'm still going to vote yes. I don't care."

Councilman Kent: "In addition to- it's not inconsistent with any of the SEQRA findings previously made."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So we're going to make a- there's going to be a motion to amend- "

Councilman Kent: "Yeah, we have to move to amend."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It starts at the third Whereas- will read Whereas such modification has been reviewed by the Planning Director and John Raynor, PE and LS and it has been determined that such amendment is not inconsistent with any relevant SEQRA findings including that no more than 61.5 acres be cleared and that a balance cut and fill be maintained upon the premises. So- "

Councilman Lull: "I'll move the amended resolution."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Is there a second?"

Councilman Kent: "Is it my second? My second, yes."

Councilman Densieski: "Seconded."

Councilman Kent: "I seconded it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's been moved and seconded as indicated on the resolution. Moved by Councilman Lull with the amendment and seconded by Councilman Kent. I have the changed language for you. There you go."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "With the addition of that Whereas clause, I couldn't possibly support this resolution. I'm only kidding. Yes, yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes.  
The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #579

Councilman Cardinale: "579 classifies action, declares lead agency and determines the significance of the condominium housing development of The River Club LLC. And it resolves that this is a Type I action which may have a significant impact and that a draft environmental impact statement be determined- be prepared. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "And that we are lead agency."

Councilman Cardinale: "And that we will be the lead agency. Right."

Councilman Lull: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #580

Councilman Kent: "This classifies the action and declares lead agency on change of zone and attendant petitions of Midroad Properties LLC and refers petition to the Planning Board. Again this has been determined that it's a Type I action and we are referring it to the Planning Board as lead agency. We are the lead agency referring it to the Planning Board. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #581

Councilman Kent: "Resolution 581 authorizes the law firm of Smith, Finkelstein, Lundberg, Isler & Yakaboski, LLP as special counsel in connection with the lawsuit entitled Eileen Miller, et al v. Robert Kozakiewicz, Supervisor, et al. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes."

Councilman Cardinale: "This is a yet again another Riverhead Center lawsuit, number- how many is it?"

Councilman Kent: "Nine or ten."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Nine."

Councilman Cardinale: "I will vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #582

Councilman Cardinale: "This resolution authorizes the law firm of Smith, Finkelstein again to act as special counsel to the town in connection with the lawsuit entitled Somarge, LLC v. Town of Riverhead. This is in regard to the Lebanon building in Jamesport and I am pleased to see that this will result in quick action I hope. So I will move this."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #583

Councilman Densieski: "Directs Riverhead Development Corporation (RDC) and Grubb & Ellis real estate company of New York, Inc. to reject without consideration any and all regularly scheduled commercial airline business at the Calverton site. So moved."

Councilman Cardinale: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "I just want to make a quick point about that. That the RDC is an advisory board that acts on the direction of the Town Board and due to misrepresentations of the Town Board, I think this is an important resolution. So I vote yes."

Councilman Cardinale: "I would like to suggest a change or addition to this. I believe that there has been some suggestion that the town was going to utilize this as a- for commercial airline business and it is good to put that to rest. But I think the real issue here is a question as to whether the town is entertaining in contravention to the current zoning general aviation use at the site.

So I would suggest that in the resolution clause that we add three words. When we say that Resolved that the Riverhead Town Board hereby directs the RDC and Grubb and Ellis, the town's broker in connection with the site to reject without consideration any and all

offers to purchase, lease, license or use that Calverton facility for regularly scheduled commercial airline business, we should add or for general aviation use. Since general aviation use is, of course, inconsistent with out zoning and a lot of the debate has been about whether we're prepared to use this for general aviation use. So, I would ask that there be an amendment of this resolution by adding or general aviation use."

Councilman Densieski: "I would make a motion that it be voted on as it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well is there a second to move the amendment?"

Councilman Kent: "I'll second the move of the amendment."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right."

Councilman Cardinale: "And it will cover- my argument for advancing the change and the vote on it is that it truly will, I think, put to rest any question of whether the Town Board is divided. Certainly the Town Board is not divided they don't want to do commercial airline business at the Calverton site. But the real issue, I think, before us is whether any- whether we are going to entertain a zone change for general aviation use at that site. And if we are not we should tell the public and if we are we should advise the public of our position.

I think Chris and I are clear on our position."

Councilman Kent: "Yes. But I'm not so clear about the resolution to tell you the truth. I think this is just a sense resolution. Really we're bound by the zoning on the site- "

Councilman Cardinale: "That's right."

Councilman Kent: "And- "

Councilman Densieski: "I'm not so sure about that."

Councilman Kent: "And this is a direction that this current Town Board is giving to agencies or groups that are acting on our behalf, one being our broker, the other being the RDC, both act on behalf of the Town Board. We're just directing them. That can be changed by a subsequent Town Board. This is not an amendment to

zoning. This is just the sense of this current Town Board that- I'm just- don't want to mislead the public by what this does. This is just our sense that we do not want to entertain any offers at this time for either commercial airline business or general aviation use."

Councilman Densieski: "Right. That's exactly what it does."

Councilman Kent: "It does not amend zoning; it does not say that a future Town Board cannot change the direction or policy of the Town Board or of the Town with the reuse of the Calverton site. So with that being understood, it's a sense resolution. It has about the same value as the one that we did on the Millbrook nuclear power plant in Connecticut. We didn't want it."

Councilman Cardinale: "It's simply a sense statement."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Saying that."

Councilman Kent: "It is good that we're making a statement. I think it's- we've been talking about this for six months and I think it's reached the point where we should at least make a statement that we do not want to redevelop it and this is a formal statement. But it's no more than just a statement; it's not anything that impacts zoning whatsoever. So just as long as people understand that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Vote on the amendment."

The Vote: "Densieski, no; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, no; Kozakiewicz, no."

Barbara Grattan: (Inaudible)

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "As amended. All right. Now there was a motion to move it as without the amendment and that was moved by Densieski. Is there a second?"

Councilman Cardinale: "I would ask if in regard to the language if in order to get my head straight on this, if the language were added a general aviation use inconsistent with current zoning, are we- I don't get this- are we saying that we want general aviation use up there which is inconsistent with zoning? Are we saying that?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The current zoning has a definition of what's allowed and it goes along the line- "

Councilman Cardinale: "It excludes general aviation use."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- and it says excludes general aviation uses."

Councilman Cardinale: "Right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And they seem to be somewhat inconsistent. The first four, five terms or the words that are used in the definition seem to imply a use that could fall within general aviation as defined under the FAA standards. Then it says excludes those so I'm not clear in my mind what's exactly allowed and what's exactly excluded. And that's one of the reasons why I think to try and phrase this in this resolution would be misplaced because then we would be getting into a zoning question."

Councilman Densieski: "With all due respect, I've asked that the resolution be voted on. Is there a second?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Jim?"

Councilman Cardinale: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Moved and seconded."

Barbara Grattan: "Without or for general aviation use, right?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right. As it presently- "

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "I'm going to- as far as the resolution goes, I agree with it. Accordingly, I can certainly vote yes. However, I believe that the absence of the words I've proposed, strongly implies that at least three members of this Board wish to use that facility for general aviation use because this is a sense of the Board's resolution. And the question before the Board is is it- are we going to redevelop it as a commercial- as a commercial airline business location? No. Resoundingly. Are we going to use it- is it the sense of the Board to use it as a general aviation use? Apparently that is not a resounding no because I was- my motion was unable to carry. So I'm going to vote yes because I agree with it as written but I wish we could go further to alleviate the concerns the people have about the Board's direction and intent presently."

The Vote (Cont'd): "Kent."

Councilman Kent: "I'm going to vote yes also because I think it's a good first step at least letting our agents know that we do not want to encourage or even consider commercial airline business at Calverton and I hope that in the future we'll be strong- more strong in our direction as to what we do want to have develop at Calverton. But this is a good first step. So I vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull."

Councilman Lull: "I'm tempted to vote against it and the reason I'm tempted to vote against it is the very reason why things move so slowly in Town Hall, why they move so slowly in government. I've been involved in this process here for five years. In those five years, the opinion of the five people sitting up here, different people, has not changed. It has been consistent throughout. And the zoning that we passed last year recognizes that consistency from reuse plan to zoning to the present time. And yet although there's since- although there have been no significant change in the Board's opinion, if we feel it necessary to express to these people who are the people we employ to handle this, I say send them an interoffice memo. I don't believe it is necessary to go the resolution route. You want to go the resolution route if we can ever come to any agreement as to what general aviation means, I believe as I'm in agreement with Excel Aire we've already gone past that. But I don't know about that-- definitions of general aviation are very broad.

Anyway for peace and harmony, yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #584

Councilman Kent: "This authorizes the Town Clerk to advertise for bids on the application of traffic paint striping. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #585

Councilman Cardinale: "This resolution authorizes the Town Clerk to advertise for bids on precast concrete drainage pipes and rings and associated items. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #586

Councilman Densieski: "Awards bid for Cliff Road West drainage improvement project. So moved."

Councilman Kent: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #587

Councilman Lull: "587 amends Resolution 510 of this year in which it was award bid for town-wide construction and four of the items were awarded incorrectly. They are corrected on here. So moved."

Councilman Cardinale: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #588

Councilman Cardinale: "588 awards the bid for Extension No. 56 Sunken Pond Estates, Section 1. So moved. Water District."

Councilman Kent: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #589

Councilman Densieski: "Awards bid for Hubbard Estates Riverhead Water District. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #590

Councilman Kent: "This awards the bid for police uniforms. So moved."

Councilman Cardinale: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull."

Councilman Lull: "Is there a question as to what happens if this is voted down, Phil? No uniforms? Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #591

Councilman Lull: "Awards bid for sports equipment. As I understand it we were talking about- "

Councilman Kent: "Yes. Desire to table this."

Councilman Densieski: "Table it."

Councilman Lull: "Move this one aside."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Maybe there's a question or maybe there's a way to clarify the particular item. I understand this is a bid that's got some time sensitivity to it, the sports equipment. There was a discussion on item 51 chin strap snaps for a sum of \$433. Is that for a lot, a whole package of them, 1,000 or 2,000? Do we know Jack?"

Jack Hansen: (Inaudible)

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right."

Councilman Kent: "It says F- I guess football- I think it says football SS through triple X which- "

Councilman Densieski: "Time sensitive, what is it?"

Councilman Cardinale: "I think I can trust you on that one. Do not pay \$433 for one."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This is for the PAL. For their summer- "

Councilman Kent: "But since it's listing all three, are we- I guess that that one is only one but some of them have- are they awarding a low bid there? Is that what?"

Councilman Densieski: "We told the taxpayer that we were going to table it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, I know. I wish we hadn't."

Councilman Kent: "We could always take it up some kind of special action."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "At a special Board meeting. Who's going to move to table it?"

Barbara Grattan: "Tabled, yes."

Councilman Densieski: "(inaudible) the next time, I bet."

Councilman Cardinale: "I'm going to abstain here until- because I haven't yet heard an explanation of how we need \$4,500 from the retirement system for the Bay Constable's auto repairs. I thought he drove a boat, so- "

Councilman Kent: "He's got a pickup truck."

Councilman Cardinale: "\$4,500. I could buy a pickup truck."

Councilman Kent: "I don't get it either to tell you the truth."

Councilman Cardinale: "So I'm going to abstain."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent."

Councilman Kent: "Yes. I wasn't present when we discussed all of these. I guess, so I'm going to abstain also because I don't know what I'm voting on."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #604

Councilman Kent: "This approves the temporary sign permit of Old Navy. So moved."

Councilman Cardinale: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #605

Councilman Cardinale: "This approves the temporary sign permit of Crabby's, 316 East Main Street. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "Welcome to Riverhead. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Cardinale, yes; Kent."

Councilman Kent: "Yes. Riverhead now has Crabby's Scoop Shop. So moved. Yes. I vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Councilman Kent: "This transfers a provisional account clerk typist in the Accounting Department. It's Billie Jo Jaeger. I had the pleasure of interviewing her I guess about a year ago and she expressed at that time that she was from a financial background and interested in being in the finance end of the Town Hall and now she's been moved there. So I will move the resolution."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "That's Billie Jo sleeping in the second row. I'll vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "I find the third Whereas clause to be perhaps one of the most amazing and outstanding I've read in two and a half years. Councilman Densieski: "Appoints members to the Riverhead Town Board of Ethics. Those people are John Ofrias, Timothy Buckley, William Welsh and Allen Smith. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "It does also include the Town Attorney."

Councilman Densieski: "Oh, I'm sorry, Dawn. I didn't mean to slight you."

Dawn Thomas: (Inaudible)

Councilman Densieski: "Okay, thank you."

Councilman Kent: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "I'm going to vote yes and note that Bill Welsh, his name is spelled with an "S". So I vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Densiski."

Councilman Densieski: "These are volunteers trying to help out Riverhead Town at no cost to the taxpayers. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #616

Councilman Kent: "616 appoints Evan Bucholz as a fill in beach attendant, Level I to the Riverhead Recreation Department. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #617

Councilman Lull: "Appoints Victoria Tomao as a fill in lifeguard Level I to the Riverhead Recreation Department. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #618

Councilman Lull: "Appoints Sharon Bilunas fill in lifeguard to the Riverhead Recreation Department. So moved."

Councilman Kent: "Second."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #619

Councilman Kent: "Appoints Debora Hennenlotter a fill in lifeguard to the Riverhead Recreation Department. I have no problem with Hennenlotter, but Riverhead screws me up a little bit. So moved."

Councilman Cardinale: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #620

Councilman Lull: "620 approves a six month non-paid leave of absence for Marie Buday, account clerk typist. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It is moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "I'd like to- in regard this, I would like the public to be aware that unique to I think only Riverhead, we permit our employees to take six months leave of absence when they get a new job elsewhere just to see if they like it or they'd rather come back. When they start a new business just to see if it goes well or they want to come back. And also we hold open the job during that period. Now usually we ask them why they're leaving but in this case we're making a new first to my two and a half years on the Board because we haven't asked this young lady why she wants to leave for six months. We're just granting her the leave. You did speak to her? Okay. Well, he knows; I don't. Councilman Kent: "Mold spores, right."

Councilman Densieski: "Ratifies appointment of Laura Lenox as paralegal assistant (Account Clerk Typist) to the Town Attorney. So moved."

Councilman Lull: "I'll second that. Do we want to change any of these titles or just let them go as they are?"

Councilman Kent: "Yeah, 'cause the ratifies, it's in the title but it's not in the resolution itself. We're really just setting the terms and conditions of employment, right?"

Councilman Densieski: "I would just like to state that the next four or five resolutions are resolutions. They're not contracts. I vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "I have a question. On #10, the health insurance, says amending to 100%. Do we- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Which is the present contract."

Councilman Cardinale: "Yeah, which is the present contract."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That she had, yes."

Councilman Cardinale: "Well, how does that compare to CSEA?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "CSEA, they contribute."

Councilman Cardinale: "They contribute CSEA. So that is a difference."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "But her interim contract had that provision in it."

Councilman Cardinale: "Oh, okay. Now I am also pleased that we're doing this by resolution as opposed to contracts and I am very well pleased with this particular employee so I vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes.  
The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #622

Councilman Kent: "This sets the terms and conditions by ratification of the appointment of Susan Beal as secretary to the Highway Superintendent. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "I believe the increase in salary here is 6%?"

Councilman Densieski: "Yes."

Councilman Cardinale: "I had reservations about a 4% increase on the CSEA so I'm going to abstain because I feel I'm inconsistent if I vote on this."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent."

Councilman Kent: "I believe we can justify it because these employees are not- do not qualify for merit raises and they would not be getting any step increases as the CSEA contract provided over the life of the contract for some step raises. This does not provide for them. And there's not merit- no ability to obtain a merit raise so I

think it is somewhat consistent with CSEA. So I'll vote yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I vote yes. As pointed out by Chris, this particular position because it's outside the CSEA collective bargain agreement would not be eligible for a merit raise or step and, therefore, I think it's a fair raise."

Councilman Densieski: "Very competent. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Cardinale, yes; Kent."

Councilman Kent: "This is at the salary that was put in place as of January 1."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Correct."

Councilman Densieski: "There's no raise- "

Councilman Kent: "And this provides her with her terms and conditions of employment and they are consistent with CSEA bargaining agreement and I vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #624

Councilman Cardinale: "624 ratifies the appointment of Trina Miles as Town Board Coordinator. So moved."

Councilman Kent: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "I think she's doing a great job. I'm going to vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "I'm going to abstain on this vote. I had indicated when we hired Trina on that I felt that this was a position that the Town could afford to do without. I was overruled then; I'll be overruled again, but I still feel that way."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent."

Councilman Kent: "I'm going to vote yes. Trina agreed to a pay of only \$25,000 when we had a budget line of I believe 35 or at least 30. And I think she's doing a good job and she's serving us as a group, she's serving us well, and she's serving us each individually. So I think it's- and she's done a great job at that and I vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

is a 6% raise, correct?"

Councilman Kent: "Yes."

Councilman Cardinale: "But I think what Chris said about justifying the raise made sense. I vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Councilman Kent: "I'm going to vote yes. I think once we get rid of- I think the department may not be necessary but if we're going to have a department it's good to have someone like Trish Green work in it and I think she's does her job capably and I vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Councilman Lull: "635 ratifies the appointment of Dawn Thomas as Town Attorney, let's say sets the terms and conditions of same. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski."

Councilman Densieski: "Dawn's doing a great job. I definitely vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "This was an employment that was when initially made over budget and still is. I believe that Dawn is a capable attorney but I'm going to abstain on the same basis that I- on the same statements I made earlier in the year."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent."

Councilman Kent: "I'm going to vote yes. It's not longer over budget because we don't have an Assistant Town Attorney. So- "

Councilman Cardinale: "That's how it is over budget because we don't have an assistant."

Councilman Kent: "It's within- it's within budget now."

Councilman Cardinale: "Yeah, we get one for the price of two."

Councilman Kent: "Right. So, I'll vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's not four weeks, so- "

Councilman Cardinale: "Three and a half. It's 120 hours, right? 35 times 3 is 105 plus 15."

Councilman Kent: "No, it's 105 hours."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's 105."

Councilman Cardinale: "It's 105 hours he only gets. It's over three weeks, sorry. I added wrong."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Councilman Densieski: "Do you want to change your vote?"

Councilman Cardinale: "It would not change my vote."

Barbara Grattan: "Joey, you're in."

Councilman Densieski: "See you tomorrow morning, Joey."

Joey Mac Lellan: "It was unanimous?"

Councilman Kent: "No."

Councilman Densieski: "Go back- "

Councilman Densieski: "Authorizes Town Clerk to publish and post notice of public hearing for recreation fees. I think I probably spelled it- recreation fees. And what that is is we're going to have a public hearing discussing whether recreation fees should be passed on to the developer at \$2,000 or \$3,000."

Councilman Kent: "This is another one, we don't have the notice but- "

Barbara Grattan: "Yeah, you do."

Councilman Kent: "We do?"

Councilman Lull: "It's there. It's there someplace."

Barbara Grattan: "Do you want to see it?"

Councilman Kent: "No, I don't want to see it. Okay. I'll second the motion. I'm sorry, are you finished?"

Councilman Lull: "My only question I had is whether or not we should take up at the same time the issue of whether or not the money or a portion of the money for these recreation fees for senior citizens development should go into senior citizen recreation."

Councilman Kent: "Right now we don't include- "

Councilman Lull: "Yeah, we do some."

Councilman Kent: "If they're condos, we do."

Councilman Lull: "Yes."

Councilman Kent: "But if they're co-op or apartment we do not."

Councilman Lull: "That's a question we can talk about at the public hearing."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'd like to move this- "

Councilman Lull: "I'll vote yes on that."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #638

Barbara Grattan: "And now move to pay bills."

Councilman Kent: "Pay bills."

Councilman Densieski: "No, we're not."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We've got to do bills first. That number is 638."

Councilman Densieski: "Make him wait until the bitter end."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Councilman Densieski: "I'm sorry, Barbara."

Councilman Kent: We've got (inaudible) in the back waiting."

Councilman Densieski: "638 to pay bills. So moved."

Councilman Kent: "I'll second it."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes to pay bills; Cardinale, yes to pay the bills; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The bills are paid."

Barbara Grattan: "Authorizes the Supervisor to execute a letter of intent in connection with the Riverhead Volunteer Ambulance Corps."

Councilman Kent: "Right. I'll move it."

Councilman Lull: "I'll second it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

Barbara Grattan: "Who seconded it? Lull?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Lull. Moved by Kent. Seconded by Lull."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Councilman Kent: "Are we ready to approve the site plan of the Byzantine Church?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "One to come off the table."

Councilman Lull: "I'll bring it off the table. It's unnumbered but to bring it off the table to approve the site plan of-

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "418. Resolution 418."

Councilman Lull: "Is it 418? Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "What happened was the- "

Councilman Lull: "I'll bring 418 off the table."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It was tabled because we didn't have a

fee on it."

Barbara Grattan: "I only got one."

Councilman Kent: "They finally got their collections together."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right. So it's coming off the table. We are not going to- "

Councilman Lull: "So I vote to bring it- I move to bring it off the table."

Councilman Densieski: "Second to bring it off the table."
