Barbara Grattan: "That concludes Correspondence."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Barbara. Any Committee reports? Gentlemen? None? All right."

Well, the time having arrived, why don't we go to the public hearings? We have two of them on tonight. The time being 7:09, I'd like to open the first public hearing. Barbara, if you would read the affidavit of publishing and posting?"

Public Hearing opened: 7:09 p.m.

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York on September 4, 2001, at 7:05 p.m. regarding the special permit petition of Joseph Sciotto to allow an existing building located at New York State Route 25, Jamesport, to be used as a professional office."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Is there anyone here on behalf of the applicant? All right."

Garret Strang: "Good evening, Garret Strang, architect representing Dr. Sciotto. I would like to bring up and present the affidavit of posting and mailing and the receipts for (inaudible)."

Barbara Grattan: "Thank you."

Dawn Thomas: "Mr. Strang- "

Garret Strang: "Yes."

Dawn Thomas: "Your testimony has to be sworn for the record. Raise your right hand, please. Do you swear the testimony you are about to give to be the truth, and nothing but the truth?"

Garret Strang: "I do. Our application, I believe, is straight forward. We've had several meetings with both the Planning Office and the Architectural Review Board. Obviously the report (inaudible) with respect to the special permit requires this use in this zoning.

In my opinion, I believe it is a well suited site for this particular use. It's a dental office. Obviously it's a very low intensity of use and I think will lend itself very nicely to (inaudible) to the west by other uses that are a little bit more intense than ours. I don't believe it would be in conflict with those and if there's any questions of the Board members, I would be happy to address them."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This property is located east of the Century 21, what used to be the Bookmiller Real Estate office?"

Garret Strang: "Immediately (inaudible), yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay, and what is the size of the building and are there going to be additions to the building?"

Garret Strang: "There's going to be a minimal addition on the building to the east behind an existing porch area, if you will, that's already there. It's going to be extended back a few feet. The garage would be converted into the reception office area."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Garret Strang: "For all intents and purposes the size of the building (inaudible)."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. And what are the other site improvements that will be necessary? There will have to be a parking area added on?"

Garret Strang: "We are doing parking and driveway of course and we are working with the Architectural Review Board with respect to the actual- we have on the site presently shown where we envision the parking going. By that, their suggestion we're looking into other alternatives (inaudible) work it in (inaudible)."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Are there any problems with that area along the roadway as far as site distances or anything that would cause a problem as far as where the driveway comes in and off of the Main Road?"

Garret Strang: "Not in my opinion. It's a good clear line of view, sight, both east and westbound and the existing using- using the existing driveway access point as present- was previously a residence - so (inaudible)."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Any other questions? Okay. Is there anybody else who would like to speak either for or against the proposal for- made by Joseph Sciotto for a special permit to allow an existing residence to be used for a dental offices? Not seeing anybody move, declare the public hearing closed at the time of 7:13."

Public Hearing closed: 7:13 p.m.

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Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The time still being 7:13 p.m., Barbara, would you- I declare open the second public hearing and, Barbara, would you read the affidavits of publishing and posting- "

Councilman Kent: "The second one is for 7:15."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Oh, is it?"

Barbara Grattan: "Yes, two minutes."

Councilman Kent: "We are going to have to fill- does anybody have any jokes?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, why don't we- is there any cards? We'll have one speaker come up and- just so you know, because there's been a lot of concern about the five minute rule being adhered to, I'm going to ask Barbara to be the official timekeeper. She's going to have a yellow card when two minutes are left and a red card when the five minute rule has been- or the five minute time period has been concluded.

What Barbara also has is a stopwatch so that they will be consistent and when the person arrives at the podium, the stopwatch will be clicked and, hopefully, we can keep some order that way.

Barbara, do you have any cards?"

Barbara Grattan: "Yes, I do- oh, plenty."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Ken- "

Ken Lebohner: "Good evening, Mr. Supervisor and members of the Town Board. I'm Ken Lebohner. I live at 4 Ida Lane, Aquebogue. Approximately a year ago there was an application before the town to install three greenhouses on Church Lane in Aquebogue. I spoke favorably for this application since we are an agricultural community.

But at that time, I requested a screening of some type be put in to prevent debris from blowing in to Church Lane. I'm here tonight to report to you that they have not given us 100%, they gave us 500%. They put a berm; they landscaped it with white pine. They've put all kinds of shrubbery on the front. They've also taken the house and they've landscaped that and they've done a gorgeous, gorgeous job. It's a real credit to the town and it shows that government does work when people come out. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Ken."

Councilman Kent: "All right, somebody is happy."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We've got a couple more seconds and 7:15- "

Councilman Kent: "That's great. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Let the official time reach 7:15 and then we'll- okay, we're there. Seven fifteen."

Councilman Densieski: "Can you see that second hand?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I can barely see it- barely see it."

Councilman Kent: "I want all the speakers- I want all the speakers to be consistent with that first speaker. Okay? There's good things going on in town, okay? Let's have a positive attitude."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Let the record reflect that the time of 7:15 p.m. has arrived and it's now time to declare open the second public hearing."

Public Hearing opened: 7:15 p.m.

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York on September 4, 2001, at 7:15 p.m. regarding the sale of a non-exclusive easement over Water District property not required for the purpose of the Riverhead Water District and authorizing the sale of said easement to Ronald Schmitt and Lilliam Schmitt in partial settlement of a pending lawsuit for the sum of \$1,500.00."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Do you wish to speak to this one?"

Dawn Thomas: "Yes, I can do that. This public hearing is held pursuant to Town Law Section 198, Subsection 12 for the purpose of considering the sale of an easement, a non-exclusive easement, over a 25 foot strip of property currently owned by the Riverhead Water District located on Tuttle's Lane in Aquebogue.

The tax map number is 0600 Section 46 Lot 3 Block 9. It's approximately 25 feet wide and about 438 feet in length. The property- currently access is a seven acre piece of Water District property as well as a parcel of privately owned land to the north of the Water District parcel.

The sale is made as the public notice stated in connection with the settlement of a lawsuit by a neighboring landowner who asserted his right to use the 25 foot strip.

The reason that the public hearing is being held is that the proposed sale is for more than \$1,000 and is for- the Town Law Section 198 requires it. The Water District Superintendent has recommended the settlement based upon the fact that the 25 foot strip is already encumbered by another private easement and also that the town intends to ultimately dispose of the seven acre piece as there is no current need for it.

And I think- that about covers it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "If anyone has any other questions, hopefully, we can respond and answer those. The- what we're looking to do as indicated is by a bargain and sale, provide a non-exclusive easement over this portion of land which means that others will be able to utilize it as well and will not be exclusive to the individuals concerned.

Is there anybody who would like to address the Board either for or against this particular matter? Bill Kasperovich and then Steve Haizlip. It's \$1,500 is the sale price and as part of the settlement they're also picking up any attorney's fees that would have been incurred by the town to defend the proceeding, the lawsuit that they commenced pursuant to Real Property Actions and- or Real Property Law."

Dawn Thomas: "That was through Real Property Law."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Dawn Thomas: "And also just for the record, the \$15,000 purchase price was determined based on an appraisal that the town obtained through Patrick Gibbon & Associates (phonetic)."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. I didn't get up to make comment at the previous public hearing but once again the Town Board is permitting people to come up here in a public hearing and not have any documents posted prior and at the day of the meeting.

This allowance of people to come up here without explicit diagrams and documents for the public to see prior to the actual hearing is just a lack of rectitude in many directions.

Now in this particular hearing in that it's an odd shaped- it's an unusual or difficult area to describe in a simple manner and no drawings or diagrams are shown or seen. The public notice is almost impossible to follow with the information given. The tax map numbers are easily found, however, there is a- well before the description, what is being read to us tonight as a 25 foot wide strip and other information that was read, was the first time given to the public.

Now, you want to come- get somebody to stand up here and swear that they will tell the truth, the whole truth and nothing but the truth but you do not give them enough information with which to conclude that this is so or it is not so. And to read additional information other than what was given to the public is to me illegal. We have enough pencil pushers in this town building to make a simple diagram to show- indicate what's involved.

In the public notice there's a reference and I'll read from the notice, with the easement being over that portion of the District's

property that runs along the length of the westerly boundary of the property owned by Ronald Schmitt and Lilliam J. Schmitt, etc., etc., tax map so and so. Well, from the description as read, it would be the entire strip of land not on the one side or the other. And it is not on the westerly side, it's on the easterly side. You don't know east from west? And this is the extent of the description, I say you have no grounds to conduct a public hearing.

And I'm addressing the four people in front of me here that have an extensive legal education and experiences and yet on a simple matter of this sort you cannot come up with a proper legal description of a piece of land. What the court suit is about I have no way of knowing. However, this piece- this strip of land that's on one side of these people's property is the only connection to the Riverhead Water District piece of land that some 420 odd feet in from Tuttle's Lane and is the only access to this seven and a half acres of land owned by the Riverhead Water District.

So what allowances or easements are given to these people? I don't see any clear cut indication that we will not be short changing or creating something that will be a difficulty to the Water Department in the future. This easement should be clear, precise, specific to the actual land, what's in the easement by the Water Department, and the Water Department has exclusive rights to it no matter what these people are temporarily privileged to do.

If there was reason for this easement, then there should be indication why there- that reason is no longer valid. So, and if it takes \$1,500 to get our way for the benefit of the township and the Water Department, then I say that's a paltry sum to spend to have our way for our advantage. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Bill. Steve Haizlip, please."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip from Calverton. You know what's concerning me is why is it the Water District can go buy land and then all of a sudden people can start driving over it and then if they- and then if somebody tells them, hey, this is Water property or land here and you can't be driving on it, then they come up and they sue so they can drive on it. I mean I don't know which way this thing is going, with the cart and the horse and how they're placed.

If it's a tract of land there and it belongs to the Water Department, why is anybody on it? And then when they bought it, who

did they land lock? That's the question there. Did they land lock somebody and then wouldn't give them an easement? You know, I don't quite understand this. That's why I'm asking these questions."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The- are you talking- are you questioning if the Schmitt parcel is land locking another parcel?"

Steve Haizlip: "Well, he's the guy on here that's suing."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Correct."

Steve Haizlip: "And that's the one I'm referring to so what did they do? Land lock the Schmitts and then- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, no, no. The way their property lays out, I believe that- "

Steve Haizlip: "Well, where are they entitled to anything?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, that's another issue and then clearly that's a- I think if we were to pursue this in litigation as I understand it, adverse possession or proscriptive easement rights, it is highly unlikely or entirely remote that they would be successful in winning if they were to bring- if we were go to the full way and pursue this through the entire avenue for litigation.

What I understand is the way their property had laid out, there was the use of the Water District property which would have been adjacent to theirs in order to access their property to the rear. They couldn't- I guess because of the way the garage laid out and other structures in conjunction with the house, they could not reach the rear of the property without going around the side of the garage and therefore over the Water District property. Okay?

So they didn't land lock anybody else but what they did was for the sake of being able to access the rear of the property I understand principally for wood and moving wood that they had chipped and put into piles in the back, that's the way they got around the garage and that's the claim.

But to answer your question, I think they would not be successful if it were to go the full way but in looking at this and discussing this with the Water District Superintendent, with Mr. Pendzick, the question came up whether this was something that would impair the property down the road and whether there was any other considerations.

There is another easement which I understand services a property to the rear as well over a similar portion of the premises. Am I correct in that statement, that there is already an easement in effect?"

Dawn Thomas: "Right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So they would share an easement area with another individual who also has rights over that strip of land, Mr. Haizlip."

Steve Haizlip: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right? Anybody else who would like to speak either for or against this particular matter which involves the sale of Water District property, a non-exclusive easement for the sum of \$1,500? Okay, not seeing anybody respond, I declare the public hearing closed at the time of 7:31 p.m. having arrived."

Public Hearing closed: 7:31 p.m.

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Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm not sure if the Board has had a chance to look at- there's two resolutions which were still being drafted when we met this morning with the long weekend. One of them is due to the fact that there was a resolution or an application that came in fairly late for an outdoor 50's music karaoke event at Doc's Tavern this Sunday, September 9, 2001 between the hours of 2:00 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. That's a resolution that we may take up for consideration off the floor.

The second one that was still being worked on as we met this morning and was discussed generally at our work session this morning involving the resolutions was a resolution which is entitled denies special permit application of Edward Partridge TS Haulers. They have been distributed to the Board members. If there are none out there on the table, I'll see that we get two more copies on the table so that if people want to look at the resolutions they can and then they can have an adequate opportunity to comment on them.

That having been said, as indicated we're going to try out a new system here today. If Barbara feels comfortable with it, she has the stop watch. When there's two minutes left, she will put up the yellow card. When your time is up, she will put up the red card. Okay.

Sandra Mott."

Barbara Grattan: "We're going to have a little boo-boo's for a while."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There it goes, okay."

Sandra Mott: "Sandra Mott, Riverhead. First of all- "

Councilman Densieski: "One second, Sandra."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right, so it should be- you've got to press start- "

Councilman Densieski: "Then before the next speaker, you press re-set."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "You have to press stop when the speaker concludes and then press re-set for the new speaker. All right?"

Barbara Grattan: "Okay. So now she's on five."

Councilman Densieski: "Press re-set."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Press stop. Press stop first and then press re-set. There you go. Now, you've got it. Okay."

Sandra Mott: "Say when."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Go ahead."

Sandra Mott: "Okay. Ironically I had- "

Councilman Densieski: "Press start- "

Sandra Mott: "-- I had just written a letter to the News Review about this particular approach and either you read my mind or whatever, I'm glad it's being initiated, number one, since the time is passing.

I'm going to discuss several old issues. One, I saw the sign, thanks to Bob's indication as to where it was located regarding the abandonment and the illegality of abandonment of domestic animals on Sound Avenue. I'd like additional signs to be erected on the existing

animal shelter signs that are throughout the community. There are some on Mill Road. There are some on Route 58 and there are some on West Main Street. If that could be considered, I would appreciate it. The more signage the better regarding people that it is illegal to dump abandoned domestic animals.

I was wondering if the animal shelter relocation to the Water District property has made any headway since the last time I was here."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I did speak to Jim Lull about that in order to bring it up in a work session discussion. We talked about a number of things and I think the bottom line is we're still looking at the purchase of land from the other party but I think we as a Board should take it up and determine whether we want to go in that direction, whether we want to stay where we are and expand what we presently have up at Youngs Avenue and make a decision finally one way or another."

Sandra Mott: "Even though it's- well, that's not a good idea and we all know my reasons why not. First of all, you are going to be reclaiming, capping, whatever you are going to be doing up there at that Youngs Avenue dump and that's going to be a safety issue. Even Mr. Reeves said that when I originally started this four and a half, almost five years ago now that it would be an unsafe condition for man or beast. And this is even within four or five years of Mr. Lull's projection as to how much time we take to relocate the facility.

And, also in the last election, you supported the idea of a new location and an outside not for profit. So I hope that that consideration will be made and if you do have it on work session, can you drop me a note so I know when it's going to be?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Certainly."

Sandra Mott: "As to safety, were any no swimming signs put up along the Peconic regarding the children swimming in that filthy water? Has anyone investigated that?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't know if any- I was down there just the other day as a matter of fact. I don't recall any no swimming signs having been placed on the area that you are talking about so the answer is no. I mean as far as investigating it, it was turned over to the appropriate parties but I don't recall seeing any signs down there, Sandra. I was down there yesterday."

Sandra Mott: "Could some- "

Supervisor Kozkaiewicz: "I don't know how often it happens. Is this something that's happening on a daily basis?"

Sandra Mott: "I'm not down there on a daily basis."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Sandra Mott: "I don't know. But once would be more than enough to have a tragedy."

The Showmobile on Mill Road and Route 58 across from Hit Man is still there. I'd like to know why the town property is sitting there idle and being covered with graffiti. Your answers don't inflict on my five minutes, does it?"

Barbara Grattan: "Yes, it does. It's five minutes, is five minutes."

Sandra Mott: "Oh, it does? Well, go ahead."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Do you want me to respond to- "

Sandra Mott: "Yes, well, I'm not here- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I mean, I don't want to eat up your five minutes and this format obviously eats up the five minutes."

Sandra Mott: "But there's no- how do you get an answer?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yeah, you know, well, call during the business days and we'll call back."

Sandra Mott: "I did call during the business day and it was (inaudible) but it's still having graffiti written all over and that's an expensive piece of property up there. Why don't you perhaps sell it- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It was sold, it was sold at the- "

Sandra Mott: "Why is it there?"

Councilman Densieski: "It's been auctioned off."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It was auctioned by the town. It's not our property anymore. It was sold at the last public- at the last police auction."

Sandra Mott: "Then why is it sitting there on that vacant piece of property?"

Councilman Densieski: (Inaudible)

Sandra Mott: "Pardon me?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's not- it's not the town's property anymore."

Sandra Mott: "But it has the Town of Riverhead all over on it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Understood. But it was sold at police auction."

Sandra Mott: "Well, then can you find out why it was dumped there? Who owns it? Who owns it?"

Councilman Kent: (Inaudible)

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I can check who purchased it at the auction. I don't recall off the top of my head who purchased it at the auction."

Sandra Mott: "Well, can you find out why it's there being covered with graffiti?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Because they- it's probably the owner of that property. That's where they've stored it."

Sandra Mott: "How nice. Um, in regard to the trucks on the other side for sale on Mill Road and Route 58, they're still there, the Long Island Ice Company trucks. Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'll pass that along to Code Enforcement."

Sandra Mott: "And Glenwood Village public hearing which is a really important issue I want to make mention of is going to be scheduled for the 19<sup>th</sup> of September which happens to fall between the holiest week in the Jewish faith of Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur. I'd

like you to reconsider moving it to another week so that people of that faith could participate in the public hearing because even if there were written comments requested, they couldn't participate. It's really unfair. The last time it was Holy Week when you had the scoping session. I think it's really unfair that that kind of situation that's going to affect a lot of people of all faiths and I think it's really inappropriate.

And as to the definition of idiots, I thought you'd like to know what that means. This is just to summarize. I read in the Long Island Women Activists and Innovators book a sub category, one of ours by the World of Jeannette Edwards (inaudible). It was a book about women, important women on Long Island. Quoting Edith Hamilton, our word idiot comes from idios, the name given by the ancient Greeks to those who did not participate in the affairs on the community. And that was in the East Hampton Star in November 16<sup>th</sup>, 1907. I'd like you to know that we are not that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay, thank you, Sandra."

Sandra Mott: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Marilyn Binder."

Councilman Lull: "Can I answer one of her questions, Bob?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, let's wait until we get all- "

Councilman Kent: "Yeah, perhaps for this five minute, maybe they should pose all their questions and we should answer them at the end."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "If we can, sure. Go ahead. It's a good idea."

Marilyn Binder: "Marilyn Binder, Calverton. I think I probably should address my question and it should be answered, hopefully. Addressing it to the Supervisor, who was utilizing the runway between 8 and 9 p.m. Sunday night?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This past Sunday night? I would have to say and I wasn't out there, so I'm guessing. Well, rather than guess, well, I don't know. I don't know who was using it other than I know the people who are allowed to, Skydive, the operation is allowed."

Marilyn Binder: "(inaudible) skydiving is not at night, that the runways would be completely lit up?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I can only tell you who's got authorization to be out there, Skydive and the Aerial Advertising. If it was someone other than that, it would be information that- I mean, I don't know other than Skydive or Aerial Advertising. They are the two agencies who are permitted to operate and utilize that 10,000 foot runway."

Marilyn Binder: "Right. Could somebody check that out? If the lights are on, we're paying for them."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

Marilyn Binder: "Okay? And I also have another problem. Why did the three Board members overrule the Planning Department on the Middle Road Properties? It was- was it to save the developer the EIS fees? When everybody else has to conform to certain rules and regulations, how- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All of those projects you are asking, all of the change of zones which allowed for senior developments, that's Saddle Lakes, Sunken Ponds, were all without EIS. Some of those involved more units per acre than what was permitted in Mid Road Properties."

Marilyn Binder: "Even though there are tiger salamanders, excuse me, and wildlife on that property?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I have in a report that's been provided to me by Coastal Environment, that's Jeff Seaman, that did not identify- did not locate or identify any endangered specie or threatened fauna on the property."

Marilyn Binder: "Even though it was next door where the original water skiers were going to be? It was identified on that piece of property which we had given to- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Not on this piece of property."

Marilyn Binder: "They don't walk across? Okay. And- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I can tell you I have the- the report's in my file and if you wish I can certainly make a copy of it

and share it with you."

Marilyn Binder: "I'd appreciate that. Thank you. Also, Health Department, you didn't need anything from the Health Department on that piece of property before you made your decision?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There was no subdivision approval here so there would be no implication of Health Department. When they go to construct, there will be a need to have Health Department, yes, but not at this point."

Marilyn Binder: "Oh, not during- and even though the Planning Board's recommendation was not to go through with it, you can override that?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Marilyn Binder: "I see. Okay, thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "You're welcome. Art Binder, please."

Art Binder: "Art Binder, Calverton. As most everybody on the Town Board knows, I am against a commercial airport at the former Grumman plant. Having been viewing the political landscape the last couple years as probably everybody in this room has been from the president's indiscretions a couple years ago to what's going on right now with Gary Condit, I think we realize that the politics is an art and it's practiced on a national basis if not an international basis. And I had a long hard discussion with myself and I decided that in exchange for certain considerations, I could be persuaded to accept general aviation at Calverton.

My consideration that I would require and that the town naturally would own and support, just as they would the airport if there were one, would be a 60 foot sport fisherman yacht and I would like twin 600 horsepower caterpillar motors, outriggers, tuna tower with duals. Walter Gazzari (phonetic) owns (inaudible) systems, he probably makes the finest chairs in the world, they put them in submarines, I want (inaudible) chairs in the boat and it's got to have dark tinted glass. If you've ever seen a 60 foot sport fisherman with dark tinted glass, you would want the same thing.

Once again, just as the airport would be town owned and maintained and I would be supporting it, the boat should be town owned and maintained and the townspeople should support that as well. Um,

anybody have any questions?"

Councilman Densieski: "If Phil goes for it, I'll go for it."

Art Binder: "Thank you. Oh, Mr. Supervisor, I'll also need a captain. Put that on notice."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Ann Miloski."

Ann Miloski: "My name is Ann Miloski, Calverton. At Thursday's work session, Councilman Densieski talked possibly of having a referendum on the ballot for a general aviation airport at Calverton. In my opinion while he researches that, I think it would be wise to let the town taxpayers know what it will cost us for insurance, general insurance and liability insurance.

As you know, these small planes have been crashing at an alarming rate. If this should happen at the Grumman site, not only should be concerned about our insurance coverage at the site, but also lawsuits against the town. By the town, I mean us, the taxpayers.

Private planes will have a 28% increase on their insurance next year. What will our increase be? In my opinion, we see no economic advantage to a general aviation airport on the Grumman site. We urge you to study liability carefully. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Ann Miloski: "And then I have one more, I don't see any yellow flags going up, so I have a few more--"

Barbara Grattan: "Oh, you've got plenty of time, Ann."

Ann Miloski: "Okay. This is- I'm talking for the greater Calverton Civic Association Vice-President. We have a few questions about the sewer extension and hookup for the State incubator. First, we understand that a New York State grant will pay for the above. Will you wait until you receive the grant before proceeding? That's number one question.

Number two, if Stony Brook University backs out similar to what happened with Swezeys and our beautiful federal post office that never was finished, who will be responsible to pay for the water going into the site and the sewer extension? Those are my two questions for our association."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "If they back out, there will be no sewer and water being consumed at the site, correct?"

Ann Miloski: "But who's going to pay for that sewer going up to the site if the grant doesn't come to the town? Suppose they don't have the money in the budget because we're economically going downhill?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think we've gone past that point. One of the things we looked at today and talked about was the question, as you may recall, the December resolution asked that the incubator petition for water and sewer connections. One of the things we had today was a discussion about whether there was enough sewer needs to meet the demands out at the property and we spoke to Mr. Russo from H2M as well as Michael Reichel from the Riverhead Sewer District.

One of the things we're going to do is follow up with counsel as well and at this point it may not, and we're going to verify this, be incumbent upon them to actually connect the sewer. They may be able to meet Suffolk County Health Department Services guidelines by doing an on site system for the type of flows that they're predicting they will have on a daily gallonage flow basis.

If that's the case, we will probably- we will leave the resolution tabled and address it in a different fashion.

As far as the other question, the water, again, I'm not sure if I understand your question. If it's not built, there will be no water needs. Right? So."

Ann Miloski: "Right. But there will be- to bring it up to the site, there will be some type of money spent, right?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "At their expense."

Ann Miloski: "But if they don't build, how are you going to charge them?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "If we- "

Ann Miloski: "If the incubator doesn't get built- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think one goes in conjunction with the other. If they're going to build, they're going to need to do an

extension just like a subdivision does, just like any other property owner or contract vendee that's acquiring property. We require them to post monies up front for engineering fees and whatnot so that we know the monies are here as well as the monies to provide for the extension. Then we go out to bid like we do always and the monies are put up front by the party who is seeking the extension so that we don't proceed forward with the extension until we have the monies on hand. That's our way of doing it in each and every case and that will be the way it's done in this case as well."

Ann Miloski: "Okay. And one other thing you talked about that they might not have to connect to the sewer, that there would be a different- does that mean like cesspools?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's correct. That's one of the things that we talked about this morning."

Ann Miloski: "I think you better really follow that carefully because the State won't have to do a SEQRA, right? And that- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Excuse me?"

Ann Miloski: "The State will not have to do a SEQRA and that will possibly contaminate our ground water. They're going to be doing things in that incubator that some of the stuff would be taken off the site they even said. So I think that's something to really look into very carefully."

Councilman Kent: "We are."

Ann Miloski: "Thank you."

Councilman Kent: "We are looking into it carefully."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. That's one of the reasons it's not- Bill Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. I hear you speaking, Mr. Supervisor, that you're looking into things very carefully. But, maybe I'm not looking in the same places you're looking into but I don't see that the town has been looking into things very carefully with regard to this water supply and sewage connection."

Councilman Kent: "No, we are looking into it. As far as the .

sewage connection, we are looking into it very carefully. We haven't approved anything as far as the sewer goes yet. The water supply we have approved."

William Kasperovich: "Well- "

Councilman Kent: "No, not well, water. It's going to be public water."

William Kasperovich: "I tried to disrupt the meeting so it would not be approved and since there is nothing on record that we have deeded the property or that they have accepted the property, this is not appropriate and the items that were listed were not items that normally are installed by the Riverhead Water District. There are items in that approval that the Riverhead Water District has never, absolutely never installed. So how are you looking into these things so carefully?"

If I didn't make my point clear at the last meeting, it's because you people aren't listening or aren't capable and educated to the point of coping with these problems. All right.

Resolution 921 adopts a vehicular and traffic law making a piece of road between the Peconic parking lot and the marine- and the Riverhead Grill which to date is a two way street double line marked and this is to convert this street to a one way street going south that is to say going from Main Street down into the parking area. Now, the street has been used for many years and just by converting it to a one way street is only half the answer to the problem. You haven't spelled out parking or standing. Standing is a problem because the diner has a side door entrance. So parking, standing, has got to be addressed when we convert this to a one way street. And this has not been done here. I think somebody is asleep at the switch.

Resolution 920 authorizes the attendance of two police officers to a training conference for a three day session at Lake George, New York and Resolution 933 and 36 accepts the retirement, resignation and retirement of Police Officer Frank Mackey as of August the 11<sup>th</sup>. Now here there are going to be three men for that weekend that we will be shorthanded in the police department. If we don't have an example of being shorthanded in the police department, this is the kind of thing that should make you people pay attention that we need more men on the force."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Bill, five minutes has arrived. If you could sum up, please."

Councilman Kent: "Tell him about the six police officers."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The six that we have in the academy?"

Councilman Kent: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That will be on next spring."

Councilman Kent: "Right."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We have six in the academy as we speak. We were anticipating the resignation of this one officer, who are in the academy and undergoing training and my understanding is their graduation date is February 1<sup>st</sup> of 2002, so we'll have them available. They'll start training prior to that date. Their graduation date, however, is February 1<sup>st</sup>."

William Kasperovich: "Well, I hope you realize that you are placing the taxpayers and the residents- I should have put that in reverse. The human beings that live here and expect a great deal that they've been getting from the police force is not going to be available to them."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Bill. That's it for the- oh, no, I have one more, I'm sorry. Dorothy Pennell. I almost forgot about you, Dorothy. I don't know how I could do that."

Dorothy Pennell: "Does slow travel time be included in that five minutes?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, we start it once you start."

Dorothy Pennell: "Dorothy Pennell, Jamesport, New York. My big problem was to my amazement, embarrassment and anger. On August 3<sup>rd</sup>, I was watching a rebroadcast of Cablevision of the town board meeting and it was suddenly interrupted and I have never- and I am, I think, a fairly sophisticated person, well traveled, worked in public relations, marketing for a national known company, and so that I am not a very naive person. However, when I saw what I saw on Cablevision, I- even though I live alone, I yelled. I said I don't believe this. What is the matter with this town? And I turned off, it was so repulsive. And I called Cablevision, spoke to a very nice

young lady. Unfortunately I didn't get her name because I was so incensed at what I saw.

And it was the interruption was in the middle of a conversation or part of a meeting, and she said she was unaware of what had happened and I understood that and she said she was very sorry, apologized, and I said would you find out how that happened? She said what channel were you watching? I was watching 71. So she said well, I- and she said what town are you in? And I said well, I'm in Jamesport and she said- she must- I don't know where she lived or whatever, but anyway, she said is that part of Riverhead? And I wanted to say a few things but I held my tongue. I wanted to say, I'm sorry, it is.

But I said would you be kind enough young lady to speak to your supervisor and find out how that possibly could happen? Because this was being broadcast to many other people and hopefully a lot of people so that they can come back and bat somebody's head with something for permitting anything like this.

So she was gone about five minutes and I know I'm belaboring this and if I get five minute notice, it ain't going to work. So anyway, she came back and she said her supervisor said that this was at the request, and I'm quoting this young lady, this was at the request of Mr. Kozakiewicz, the Supervisor. And I said, I'm sorry, would you repeat that? I wanted to say this is being recorded. Unfortunately, I don't have a facility.

And she said Mr. Kozakiewicz is the Supervisor in Riverhead and it's at his request that we can interrupt the Town Board meeting. Now- "

Councilman Densieski: "Did you believe that comment when you heard it?"

Dorothy Pennell: "Yes."

Councilman Densieski: "You did?"

Dorothy Pennell: "I certainly did. Because I have a follow up here which I'll- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "You actually- let me allow you to finish, your five minutes, and then I will respond. Go ahead."

Dorothy Pennell: "I couldn't believe that. I've been in the Town of Riverhead for about 40 years, not full time. Only the last 24 years. But I have never, never- been that angry- I've been angry about a lot of things and upset, disturbed, but I was truly embarrassed, and I still are, and I was more embarrassed as I look back in retrospect to hear someone in authority, this young lady had checked with her supervisor, saying that it was at Mr. Kozakiewicz, the Supervisor of Riverhead, at his request that we could- that they could turn that- that they could discontinue the Town Board meeting and put this other junk in.

So I don't- I'm just repeating what this young lady said and what I plan on doing although I haven't been feeling that well so I couldn't pursue it at that moment or the last week or a couple weeks, I would like to go to the FCC and find out exactly what the status is. Is it an obligation when Cablevision permits you or I don't know all the ramifications of it, the arrangements with the town with broadcasting the Town Board meetings and what they're allowed to do, what they're not allowed to do.

But I was very, very disturbed to think that that could happen in what used to be a nice community, what does have the potential of becoming an even nicer community if we all work together on an upward swing and add a little culture, refinement, historical values to the town such as they have done- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Dorothy, I do have to ask you to sum up."

Dorothy Pennell: "I know. But I'm- before I go or before I'm booted out. But anyway, I have- I've been privy to this information, it came to me today, I don't know from whom although I know the person who wrote it and apparently it's going to the editor of the papers in town.

Recent events over the past few weeks cause me great concern for the citizens in the Town of Riverhead. I recently changed political parties after registering as a Republican for over 37 years. I am ashamed of the Republican party and I am fearful it looks more like Tammany Hall rife with corruption, deceit and moral decay. Why does our town government support the shared use of public access channel on the same pay per view channel showing pornography? Why does Mr. Kozakiewicz only allow partial showing of the town meetings? They are limited to three and a half hours. No town meeting has ever been that brief.

The incumbent Supervisor has allocated a half hour of his own free political spin time. This past week, the Town Board meeting was preempted by the Supervisor and he substituted it with his own meeting with Mr. Grucci. This usurping of the Town Board's power and keeping vital information from the taxpayers is totalitarian and highly suspect.

What was it that so frightened the Supervisor? What happened at that Town Board meeting late into the night that the Koz didn't want the taxpayers to observe? What type of censorship is this? Why is Cablevision taking orders from one individual on the Town Board?

I believe the public has a right to know about the sinister peculiarities of the after midnight resolutions that were pulled off the table without prior warning to the public. One of these granted a zone change and a special permit to Mid Road Properties, a developer and contributor to the Supervisor's campaign. The resolution increased the developer's yield from 60- on 76- from 60 on 76 acres to 126 units on 76 acres.

The second resolution amended the two year old resolution from Foxwood, Stark's senior citizen mobile development- home development so as to permit Stark to buy pine barren credits. This allows \$15,000 an acre which can be out of Riverhead town instead of purchasing acreage in Riverhead at the rate of \$30,000 per acre. This results in a net gain of \$240,000.

I question the moral aptitude of these decisions. How much- pardon me- how much does the Koz owe these people and how far will he go to keep the voting public in the dark? Would he prefer us to be relegated to the porn only or see the possible conflict of interests so apparent when Town Board members do not abstain from voting on issues in which they have a personal interest?

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you, Dorothy."

Dorothy Pennell: "And I hope that none of this is true. But I'm sure that this person would not have submitted something like that, certainly to- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's your daughter, Dorothy, and you and I know each other for a long time and I thought we could speak

frankly with one another. I never told Cablevision to do what you are suggesting, that authorize porn, soft porn, anything like that to ever take place. It's been a struggle with Cablevision. We were on Channel 70; we got shoved out of Channel 70 because the public access became too great so that we didn't have any space on Channel 70. I fought to get 71. Never, never- believe me, when I saw it one night I was shocked. It was never something that I would have willingly or knowingly authorized or allowed. So let me say that.

I was shocked when I saw it in the evening, believe me."

Dorothy Pennell: "Oh, no, I'm sure that you were, particularly since you have children. But even an adult of normal honesty and codes of living would find what I saw completely and utterly objectionable."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'm not saying- believe me, I was offended when I saw it."

Dorothy Pennell: "Can they not, if- do we pay for having this done? Did we pay Cablevision for televising these Town Board meetings?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, we don't pay Cablevision."

Dorothy Pennell: "In other words, it's a public service as far as they're concerned."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's something they've done for years."

Dorothy Pennell: "Oh, I know."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And they've done it on Channel 27, then 70 and now 71. So it's something that Cablevision has provided."

Dorothy Pennell: "Well- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Dorothy Pennell: "-- the FCC should be informed about it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Absolutely. Pastor- "

Dorothy Pennell: "And I'd appreciate it if you would- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Pastor Woodson, please."

Councilman Cardinale: "Bob, moving away from porn for the moment. Did you, in fact, direct them not to show the Town Board meeting last Friday?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, no."

Councilman Cardinale: "Because I did call myself because several constituents asked me why was the Grucci deal- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, actually I was asking them to do longer hours. I want them to do longer hours and put in the entire Town Board meetings as well as Grucci or anything else that's happening."

Councilman Cardinale: "Well, but when I called and asked why was the meeting on- why was the meeting not on 4 to 7:30 as planned, Eileen Shanahan- you better get over there if this is incorrect- because she told me that the Supervisor's office had asked them not to run the Town Board meeting including the midnight resolutions incidentally, but to run the Grucci meeting with you instead."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I never had that conversation with anyone over that. Pastor Woodson- "

Councilman Cardinale: "Okay- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Pastor Woodson- "

Councilman Cardinale: "-- that's Teresa indicated Eileen Shanahan said that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Pastor Woodson."

Pastor Woodson: "Pastor Robert Woodson, Riverhead, New York. I just want to make a couple of comments. In my push to run for Councilman here in Riverhead, I have recently achieved 500 signatures, 510 signatures. I need 410 so I was 100 over. Maybe 450 of those are valid signatures. Also we registered 150 new Democrats and 150 new registrants, not all Democrats, and from the beginning I've been challenged since I announced I was running for Councilman. I've been told I have a felony on my record. I have to carry a sheet with me to prove that I don't have a felony. I've been told that I can never win. Also I've been told basically that a certain party had no use

for me.

So I have continued, me and a few others went over in over 100 degree weather and received these signatures and we're continuing to push. And the same people that told me I could never win and that there was no use for me, these are the same people that are objecting to my valid and legal petition.

So I'm working now to continue, try to fight to represent the people of Riverhead and sit on the Town Board. I've been talking these things. I don't know who my enemies are, who my friends are, but I guess I'll find out. But I've been talking about- making comments about change and believe me I'm not saying these things to be arrogant or- I've been making comments about change, diversity needed in government, and representation for all the people.

So I just wanted the town to know where I was. I'm still fighting to sit on the Town Board, fighting against many enemies, unfortunately, but we are still pushing and still trying to win a seat on the Town Board. So I will be continuing to walk and talk to people, attempting to get elected- "

Councilman Densieski: "Are your signatures to get on a ballot or what are your signatures for?"

Pastor Woodson: "I'm running as an Independent. I was forced to run as an Independent when I was not-- when I was told that there was no use for me, so I was forced to run as an Independent and that required 410 signatures which I received 510 signatures. My wife and I and many others went out. I've been told a couple of things and a couple things have not been filed by the Board of Elections and I'm challenging that so we're still pushing to get elected. I'm still pushing, you know, still pushing.

When I was born in this community, born in this town, my father told me about good men and women. He didn't tell me about Republicans and Democrats. And he told me that. So this is why I'm running. In the beginning I was told there was no way I could win but those that filed objections obviously think I can. So I just want to let you know where we're at.

We filed an article in the News Review running Thursday. We will file an article in the Newsday if we have to and we will go- we will go to Eyewitness News Channel 7 because I feel there's some things that have been have not been legal. We we're still pushing in this

fight to gain a seat on the Town Board."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Councilman Densieski: "Good luck."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody else who would like to, Vinny Villella, please, and then Steve Haizlip."

Councilman Densieski: "Pastor Woodson, did you ever see the old saying, be careful what you wish for?"

Vinny Villella: "Good evening, Town Board. Vinny Villella, Baiting Hollow. Resolution 918 and 922. Can you please clear that up for me a little bit? I know it's a special public hearing that you are publishing. Do you have the date on that for the Head Driver?"

Councilman Kent: "Headriver."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Headriver."

Vinny Villella: "Headriver, Head Driver."

Councilman Kent: "October 16<sup>th</sup>. October 16<sup>th</sup> is the- "

Vinny Villella: "It feels like my head's driving into- 16<sup>th</sup>?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Correct."

Vinny Villella: "Okay. And 922, can you explain what that's all about?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's a professional business office district overlay on .76 acre of land zoned Agriculture A. They're looking to convert an existing residence measuring approximately 956 square feet to professional office."

Vinny Villella: "So it's under 10 acres then, okay, fine. I wasn't here at the last Town Board meeting but usually I am here until the wee hours, if I'm here. I, you know, I'm embarrassed when people come up to me and they say why are they doing this? Why are they taking these petitions, I mean not petitions, resolutions, and doing them, taking it out of their pocket or whatever the saying is, and passing them (inaudible), against special permits and zone changes when the people spoke in Wading River not to have any zone changes or

special permits until the moratorium is put in place? And you just didn't listen to the people.

I mean, you just- after you had an argument about this two months earlier or a month earlier, you still did it. And I'm really ashamed at the three guys up there that voted for this because stop the zone changes and stop the special permits now until you get the moratorium in place and I'll show you that that master plan will be there just like that because something's wrong here. That master plan should have been done sometime this year and it's not and it won't be done. But in the meantime there are special zone changes. You were right, we did do Saddle Lakes and we did do Sunken Ponds but Sunken Ponds, Chris, by himself, got extra property, acreage, on that deal so that we sterilized acreage so that they wouldn't be able to build somewhere else. So we got something for that.

There might have to be a study. The Planning Board is right. I think they're on the right track by doing EIS or a report to find out do we have enough senior housing in the Town of Riverhead already. At least do a study on it. But you're not listening to the people that spoke at the public hearing and the three of you aren't listening to me right now and I'm getting ticked off."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No. I wanted to- I just got a resolution passed up to me which is the one on TS Haulers which I talked about."

Vinny Villella: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Since you are familiar with Sunken Ponds and Saddle Lakes, you are familiar, therefore, that neither one of them required an EIS as well. Is that correct? Neither one was pos dec'd."

Vinny Villella: "That was correct. At that time we had- there was nothing else. These- those were the first ones that were done in the town for quite a while."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Riverhead Landing, John Wesley was already in place."

Vinny Villella: "John Wesley was in place. That had nothing to do with me. That's another thing."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "But they were there already."

Vinny Villella: "They were there."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right."

Vinny Villella: "And then these two were there and I think that it's time that we take a step back instead of still going full gun. Did we make a mistake? Maybe we did."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The amount of units that were approved- "

Vinny Villella: "But at least we admit we're making a mistake. Don't give change of zones. It's plain and simple. Why are you doing this when the people are asking you to step back, work on the master plan which is God, we spent so much money and time on this. It has to be done. And the only way you're going to get it done if you stop change of zones and special permits and you'll see how fast that master plan will be in effect. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anybody else who would like to- oh, Steve Haizlip. Steve."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. My number one item here today is according to the newspaper and all the information that's been (inaudible), Vic Prusinowski is going to be the Chairman of the Cable Advisory Committee. Right in the Chair where Mr. Kent is sitting Vic once said I will never do anything to hurt this town. The town is of the people that pays the bills and the taxes to keep it going. Now, I'm going to hold Vic to his word that he's not going to do anything against the people. And I hope by him being a Republican that he don't go along to get along."

Ah, I've been getting complaints and hearing complaints about South Mill Road, the railroad side crossing. Just north of the main track, that people are going over it and they are bottoming out. So in order to try and get something done and get it renovated and they're speaking true because I went over it myself to test it. I have written a letter to the President of the Long Island Railroad but that doesn't mean that he's going to answer me and do anything but at least I've made an attempt.

According to a New York State official that if the incubator is built and the land ever gets properly deeded over that us taxpayers would pay for the sewer and the water. If any taxpayers are going to pay for anything, I want 62 counties paying because after all it's a

New York State University incubator and it's going to benefit all of New York State if that's the case.

Now, I'm going to tell you right now, you better start getting a traffic engineer for Route 25 and Edwards. Since the Charter School opened up and all those developments up there, that intersection is getting to be a real traffic jam. No arrows to hold up traffic, let them go one way and above all people going west and people want to turn left and then the east traffic they want to go up Edwards Avenue north, somebody is going to get creamed because they just go around and it better get cleared up and get a traffic.

Now, Edwards and Sound, another accident up there. So I hope you will push to get the light and try to clear that up.

Now, you, today I picked up the Newsday, looked in there and a tragedy in Huntington on that guy with the cesspool. I'm telling you right now, any of you people in this town has got a pool that's 40 years old or better, you better get it replaced. I've done it, Mr. Tuttle has done it, and it's going to go in. So, there.

And my last item here, Bob, I'm glad you spoke up with the Grucci about the post office and telling him what a deplorable and ugly site that's growing there and you're asking to try to get something done. Well, I hope that he don't have a tunnel through his head."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anybody- Sandra, can I have someone else get up? Rita Hodun, please. I have other hands."

Rita Hodun: "Rita Hodun, Calverton. I understand in John Wesley Village there's children, there's school buses going in there. I thought that was for adults, a village for adults. Why is children in there?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't know the answer; we'll look into it, Rita. It is a senior project."

Rita Hodun: "My next question is you said all these senior homes, 55 and over. When you negotiate, is that with children, 55? People can still have children. You said no children. Is that in the contract that there's no children allowed? I mean some of these people don't have children until they're 40, 42. So 55 doesn't mean they're without children. You can have people 55 but there's children going into these senior adults and then they're going into our schools."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I know that in order to be eligible either one or both have to be more than 55. There's a standard in state and there's a standard at federal level. And off the top of my head, I don't know which one's which, Rita. But that- when they provide for these, in order to get the assistance and the tax credits, they must meet certain criteria."

Rita Hodun: "The Charter School today, they had cars there 8:00 in the morning on both sides of the road and then they had cars there in the afternoon. They have no parking. These people are parking on a main road and walking across this road to the Charter School. And they don't have parking. They can't have these big things going on there and parking all over, not with the post office and the deli and everybody else has to have off street parking."

Councilman Kent: "Can we require them to have a site plan or is that beyond our jurisdiction?"

Rita Hodun: "They don't have parking. They can't have these cars all over the main road, not by Edwards Avenue."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think this gets into the same question that they had brought to us that they're treated in some respects similar to other state schools and when we have a state school, whether it's the Aquebogue Elementary School, Riley, we don't nor do they make themselves available to us for site plan approval. They, however, need to meet criteria established by the education department- "

Councilman Kent: "For safety."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right, at the state level so that they, I guess what we'll do is follow up with the State Education Department. They probably are violating the State education rules for establishment of this school, Rita."

Rita Hodun: "I mean it's close to the post office; it's a dangerous situation."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay, okay."

Councilman Kent: "We have to address that whole intersection. It's terrible. If you're trying to go north on Edwards Avenue and somebody is trying to turn left, you can't even get by. One car each light is going through up there."

Rita Hodun: "Oh, we drive there many times a day so we know- "

Councilman Kent: "Yeah, I do, too. So I know that."

Rita Hodun: "And the other thing, when you had the incubator and the sewer line, where is the sewer line going to go in Grumman's? Along the runway or in the Burman property? I mean, you have a site plan where this sewer would go?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "If we were to allow it the way it is now, it would have to go within the Burman property. That's where the sewer plant is located."

Rita Hodun: "And he would allow this?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We have cross-easements and other easements that both parties are giving to one another in order to preserve rights. Yes."

Rita Hodun: "And you said something about they could use cesspools. When we went to the incubator in Stony Brook, Stony Brook said they had to be hooked up to the sewer. They could not have private wells. Sewers. They could not have their own. They had to be hooked up to the sewer lines."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think, as I said, we talked about it Thursday briefly. We followed up with a discussion today. We're going to ask our sewer counsel, Mr. Isler, to provide us with some assistance in this regard and make sure that whatever we do, it's the right way to go. It was something that was raised by Councilman Kent. I had a discussion today."

Councilman Kent: "There's several open issues still that have to be resolved so there's no firm decisions made yet on that matter. We're going to have further discussion on that, okay?"

Rita Hodun: "Okay, thank you very much."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. There was another hand in the back, yes, Joan Griffin, and then Lyle."

Joan Griffin: "Good evening. Joan Griffin, Baiting Hollow. First of all, I would like to say thank you for following up on an idea that you probably already had about the household batteries and the container to collect them. It makes life easier for everybody to

drop them off."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "And I want to thank Councilman Densieski."

Joan Griffin: "Thank you, Ed."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "He had wanted to see that get done. He followed up with the Solid Waste Committee to see that that got implemented."

Joan Griffin: "Okay. Once again, thank you. The website is coming along beautifully. The information is getting out there."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We're getting a little better."

Joan Griffin: "Yeah."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thanks to your husband."

Joan Griffin: "Well he's a pushy guy. And then I'd like to thank Barbara's office. I was there the other day for about two hours and the ladies all there helped me with things I need to get a hold of and they were very cooperative and didn't get tired of me. Thank you, Barbara, and her staff."

Barbara Grattan: "Thank you."

Joan Griffin: "Um, I guess this question is about the referendum for an airport. When does that come up for a public hearing, I guess is the right word to talk about it?"

Councilman Densieski: "There's no public hearing required if it goes to a public vote."

Joan Griffin: "Okay. Ah, then I have a couple questions for the reason for the airport to push on it. Is- one of the things that I keep hearing is it brings high paying jobs. What's considered a high paying job? I really never got an answer over the months that we discussed this."

Councilman Densieski: "Well, in my opinion, a high tech, high paying job would be that versus retail, Tanger Mall, etc."

Joan Griffin: "Is there a dollar figure you have in your head?"

Councilman Densieski: "I did get a report from Excel Air (phonetic) who was interested in coming at one time and they gave a complete breakdown of every employee. I can try and find that for you if you'd like."

Joan Griffin: "Ball park range."

Councilman Densieski: "Everything from, you know, \$150,000 right down to, you know, \$50,000."

Joan Griffin: "Okay. Because I got from New York State the airport system plant off the Internet, and they say in their writings it is estimated that there are over 400,000 jobs that are in some way provided for or supported by aviation in New York. These jobs have an associated annual payroll of 10.8 billion, with a "b", dollars.

Well, that sounds very impressive until you break it down with the calculator. Now, I know some jobs are high paying, some are low, but for 400,000 jobs that comes out to \$27,000 per person. That's not a lot of money."

Councilman Densieski: "Yeah but if you average it out, I mean Long Island pays way more than say someplace upstate in a remote area. You know, Long Island has higher costs and higher pay."

Joan Griffin: "So does New York City, so does Buffalo, so does the other big cities."

Councilman Densieski: "Well, I don't know. I'm just- the only thing I can tell you is the report that I received had a salary breakdown. If you want me to try to find that, I will."

Joan Griffin: "I would appreciate it, yes. And then, um, general aviation. I know the definition by the FAA. What is the Town Board's definition of it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think the better question is what was meant by the zoning that was put in place and we've been unable to get a real clear idea of what was meant. It says aviation uses excluding general aviation. So I think it's not necessarily what we think it is. I think it's what the intention of the Board was when it adopted the zoning back in 1999. And based upon what the discussion was, what the interpretation was and what the intent of the Town Board was at that time, that would be the guiding answer to what was meant by exclusion of general aviation at the time. And I think that's the

better question and I haven't been able to get a firm answer from anybody as to what it really meant.

There's a couple ways we can approach it. One is to revisit this issue and be more exact in the definition language of what was meant by general aviation if we can't get some clear understanding of what the intent of the Board was in 1999 when it adopted the zoning."

Joan Griffin: "So when the referendum comes up, it will be defined in simple language the residents- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I haven't seen the proposed language. I know it was discussed at Thursday's work session. It would have to- I don't know if it's going to get in to the general aviation question as opposed to- and correct me if I'm wrong- whether we should preserve the 7,000 and 10,000 foot runway and provide for air space over those two. I guess that's the question."

Councilman Densieski: "Are you opposed to the public having a voice on this or- "

Joan Griffin: "The public should have a voice but it should be a voice- or the question should be asked of the public in plain simple language. Because last year- "

Councilman Densieski: "I absolutely agree with you."

Joan Griffin: "-- you guys couldn't agree on the wording of any of that."

Councilman Densieski: "I agreed on it."

Joan Griffin: "Well, out of the five of you, you couldn't define any of the words in there. But that was last year. Um, also, I got a hold of the Economic Development property listing for airports from the State of New York and they have 48 local airports. They exclude Kennedy, JFK, McArthur, those types. These are for the smaller airports. And out of 48 airports, 43% of them have one runway only. Why do we need two?"

Councilman Densieski: "Because we have two. I would never propose to build them, but we have them, so it would be like having- if somebody gave us a marina and took out- take out the docks. I mean, we have them for free. We have a multi-million dollar asset that we received for free."

Joan Griffin: "And on the Epcal site on Riverhead, Long Island, or RiverheadLI.com, it shows one- the 7,000 foot runway is gone. It's been covered over by whatever part of the red- "

Councilman Densieski: "Okay, the 7,000 foot is not open, Joan. That's probably why it's not on that map. It's not recognized as an open runway right now."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It's closed."

Joan Griffin: "And you're trying to make it an open runway?"

Councilman Densieski: "I would like to. But I'd like the people to vote on it is exactly what I'd like to see."

Joan Griffin: "And when would this resolution or referendum come up for discussion?"

Councilman Densieski: "Hopefully it will be on November's ballot. That's- if I had my way."

Joan Griffin: "And when do we get to talk about it? Is it in September- "

Councilman Densieski: "Talk about it right now."

Joan Griffin: "But when will the public be able to come down? I found out about it by one person. What about the rest of the public?"

Councilman Densieski: "Well, it was on the work session agenda last week."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "It was on the work session agenda the end line of which was the Board- I think we all said we don't really know what it is that we would be voting on as far as the form of a resolution. Would you go back and fine tune what it is we, as a Town Board, is voting on? There is a chance that it will be on the next work session agenda once we have some clear understanding of what the language of the referendum will be."

Joan Griffin: "So it will come up on September 18<sup>th</sup> for discussion again?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Well, it will come up at the work

session- "

Councilman Densieski: "At the work session would be the Thursday before that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "-- prior thereto which I think is the 13<sup>th</sup>."

Joan Griffin: "Okay. And the 18<sup>th</sup> is a daytime meeting, 2:00 p.m.?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's right."

Joan Griffin: "Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Lyle Wells and then- Lyle first, I know."

Lyle Wells: "I just have a- Lyle Wells, Aquebogue. I just have a question. I was told that there was a possible resolution tonight in regard to capital expenditure for properties along the Peconic River, just east of Tanger Mall."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Lyle Wells: "That is true?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There is and but- "

Lyle Wells: "923 is it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yes."

Lyle Wells: "Okay. The question I have is what- where the funding would come from to purchase that property? What type of appraisal was done on that property, if any?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There was an appraisal done by the county which has- do you have a copy of it now? Which has been provided to us."

Dawn Thomas: "Yes."

Lyle Wells: "Okay. And was that based on its current zoning? Was it based on the fact that it's within the Wild & Scenic Recreation

Rivers Act? And what type of money are we talking about expending here?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "The idea is to expend- it would be a total of 17 acres with the county which would join together with other properties that have also been acquired by the county so that there would be a contiguous what, 26, 27, 28 acres along the waterfront on the Peconic River for recreation use, kayak use and otherwise. And therefore available to the public as opposed to being- and the number, I think, the town showed would be somewhere in \$560,000."

Lyle Wells: "Okay."

Councilman Cardinale: "Did you indicate that this was 923?"

Lyle Wells: "Yes."

Councilman Cardinale: "This is talking about \$143,000, 83- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right. Because there had been a prior resolution which I think had already been issued approving it so this would be the additional amount to bring it up to that amount."

Lyle Wells: "Okay."

Councilman Cardinale: "Approving the purchase?"

Councilman Kent: "No, approving- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Approving a budget to authorize the purchase. I think we're going to need a separate resolution to still do the purchase."

Councilman Kent: "Yeah, I don't think we approved this. That was the prior greenway funding."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right, right."

Councilman Cardinale: "Right. We have not approved it yet."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "No, no."

Lyle Wells: "And this property would then be used for recreational purposes?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Passive recreation. Yes."

Lyle Wells: "Okay. And the source of funding to pay for this, I had understood that it possibly could be the Community Preservation Fund?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's something we'd like to explore, yes."

Lyle Wells: "Okay. I just questioned the legality of using this fund for a non open space, non farmland preservation."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I don't think the 2% legislation limited it to farmland acquisition."

Lyle Wells: "No, it's also open space. But when you go into recreational uses, then there's no longer open space. What I suggest is that the town rather than looking at the Community Preservation Fund, look within their recreational budget which is \$3,000 per unit on a subdivision approval and construction and those funds be utilized rather than the CPF fund."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Lyle Wells: "Okay."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Sandra Mott."

Sandra Mott: "Sandra Mott, Riverhead. Um, in regarding to the Cablevision issue, I left early on the 21<sup>st</sup> prior to the situation that occurred with Zabby. I can tell you personally that I'm most appreciative of her efforts. Um, I personally miss the whole Town Board meeting in full, unedited or abbreviated by whomever, for whatever reasons. I want to see the whole thing, I like the whole package so that I can make up my mind when the time comes to either come to these meetings, to vote on the issues or whatever. Bits and pieces will not count."

The News Review, the Traveler Watchman, the Newsday are not going to cover the whole thing like Cablevision will. That is our source of information. Not everybody can park themselves here for six hours at a whack, unpaid, being told you have five minutes.

According to Mr. Lull, Zabby's ejection, and his concern was based on the fact of her not being a resident. Well, I know for a

fact that there are a number of people who were formerly on or who might still be on- I don't know if there is a committee for the Animal Shelter Advisory Committee who are not residents, and there was no issue that they were participating in activities that involved the citizenry of the Town of Riverhead. They didn't pay taxes here; they didn't live here; they didn't care. But they were on the committee.

Zabby's use of her time, efforts and energy should be recognized and appreciated. You should be giving her a proclamation, not an ejection.

Where are the church leaders? Where are the minority leaders? Where are the women's groups? Where's the PTA? When that Hooters proposal came to town, they were all lined up in this community. I know where they are. They're afraid to come here. They're afraid to speak. I don't blame them.

But when they did come, it was shot down, it didn't happen. It's nothing any different from seeing that garbage on TV before, during, after, in between, whatever, on 71, 86, whatever station you're bouncing us around to, unable to find out the information that we need to make a rational decision. Election Day is not that far away.

Mr. Prusinowski is on the committee. How is he and the others chosen? I'm available. I'm a literate, well read, well prepared, and obviously well spoken. We need to go to the FCC and we need to go and let them know that what is happening to our publicly owned, by the citizens of the US airwaves is illegal. We have to go to the ACLU and let them know that our freedom of speech and our civil rights are being denied. And don't flash any cards, I'm not in the mood."

Councilman Densieski: "Thank you, Barbara."

Sandra Mott: "As a matter of fact, I could read to you my editorial letter to Tim and it pointed out that Mrs. Grattan is an impartial person and she should have been given that responsibility a long time ago because I trust her. Because as beauty is in the eyes of the beholder, so is hearing in the ears of the beholder. Okay? You don't like what we say, that's too bad. Resign. Move on.

As to the 55 community- senior communities having children. Damn right, they have children. Remember when I asked months ago, years ago I think it is now what the 80/20 definition was? You better look it up because the more you approve it the more children you are going to get wether you like it or not. They live in the community; they're

burdening the school system, and they're not being born and bred to children- people who were born and bred in the Town of Riverhead. These are people coming in- 80/20.

Ms. Thomas said she couldn't look it up for me as a private citizen. I'm not asking as a private citizen. I'm asking on your behalf before you approve these communities. You don't need any more. Try going to the emergency room. Ask the nurses, ask the doctors what they have to contend with. Bring in people 55 and up, many more up than 55, the system is burdened.

You don't have the infrastructure. You don't have the emergency, you don't have the fire, you don't have the police. A time for atonement is the time for the Jewish high holidays. Well, we're going to all atone for our sins if you don't go down the right path. I have nothing against any one of you personally. I disagree with you on particular items.

You don't kill the messenger because you don't like what they're having to say. That's your jobs. You're getting paid damn good money. I wish I were there. I'm not getting any petitions like this gentleman, God bless him for obvious reasons. I just made particular conversation with Phil. I'm not going to elaborate it. I didn't run for particular reasons. I'm grateful for those who are.

As to Glenwood Village. Now I understand. Now you're having a meeting on the 18<sup>th</sup> of September at 2:00 p.m. and you're going to have a special date for Glenwood Village's- whatever their new category of their neighborhood quote unquote extension which is illegal. They're not supposed to have any more new communities in your township for senior citizens. On the 19<sup>th</sup> at 3:00. Why are you having that?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "One deals with the SEQRA compliance where we're holding a hearing on the SEQRA. And the other is on the actual petition itself."

Sandra Mott: "You can't have it in conjunction with your other meetings? That has to be separate and apart so people have to schlep back here?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "We have been doing it that way for quite some time and it's been our policy to do them that way, Sandra."

Sandra Mott: "Well, I'll tell you what. Don't expect many people here. All I can say- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I mean there's nothing being done differently with this application than what's been done in the others."

Sandra Mott: "No, but I'm saying- I'm saying, you know, that you have to recognize that we're not here for our health, really. We want to speak because we want you to know the people are concerned. As I said, the definition of idiot is a non-participating party in the community. We are not idiots."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Anybody else? Mr. DiPierro."

Nick DiPierro: "Hi. I'm Nick DiPierro from Wading River. I really wasn't going to get up here to speak tonight but the comments that were just made about Zabby, I guess I do have to speak because I have seen that channel from time to time and that to me is just- I guess we're all entitled to it, but it's just a person who has a political agenda and we have one of the Board members with Zabby every week when they're on it and I'm very glad to see that that camera is not in this room tonight. I don't know how- I guess we all have whoever the Supervisor is.

I know when Vinny was up there, he had a man who was always after him and now that Bob is up there, we have someone that's always after you. I guess that goes with the job. But there should be only one authorized camera and that's the camera that's on me right now. If there was another camera here tonight, I was going to hold up my book so I wouldn't be on TV. Because when I did see that Zabby channel on there, there was only certain segments. The bits and pieces that they chose to show. And well like I said everybody's entitled to do that if we're on public TV- access- public access channel.

I did call up that channel, Cablevision, and I don't know how we can get the channel longer. Three and a half hours is really not enough. There have been a lot of complaints. I'm sure you are listening to a lot. I thought I could do something by calling up Cablevision directly, but apparently I can't. They gave me the telephone number for Channel 71. They gave- they wouldn't give it to me for Channel 70.

Well, another thing, I guess, is when you first became- sitting in that seat, Bob, I saw that a lot of the same people are always called on first and there are a lot of people here who would like to speak but after a while, you know, I'm glad to see that five minute

rule is in effect. Maybe it should go to seven minutes because some people can't really say what they have in five minutes. Sometimes you have to stretch it- it will get like- like was recommended tonight to hold the questions and answer the questions at the end. That's a good idea.

Those of- and the audience and the general public who were complaining that the five minute rule is bad, well, if they ever become- if they ever are fortunate enough to sit in one of those chairs, if they want to listen to someone speak for a half hour or 45 minutes week after week, they're entitled to that. But I think right now it's a good rule. Thanks."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. Zabby."

Zabby: "Well, I'm just gone for two weeks and you guys botch up amendment or resolution 886. Bob had the good sense to want to go along with Phil Cardinale and table that resolution. When Mr. Kent decided to rely on Bob and fix up the amendment and unfortunately he didn't know what he was doing so the amendment is just really funny. Especially when you took federal- especially when you took the New York State law and decided to change the wording of New York State law, I was laughing. It was like a comedy.

But anyway what I'm here to speak about is censorship and I also noticed- I- I got a call also about the substitution of the last part of the August 21<sup>st</sup> Town Board meeting for Mr. Grucci and Bob Kozakiewicz. And I noticed when Phil Cardinale tried to address that and give information, he was cut off. And so at the end of my five minutes, I do want to hear from Phil Cardinale who said he did call the studio and found out that the Supervisor's office decided to preempt the second half of the soap opera.

And on that second half, by the way, was a resolution 910 given by Phil Cardinale addressing the Cablevision matter in a logical and articulate and concise way. This town is doing business with Cablevision when they are in breach of contract on at least five major things including this town not getting a franchise fee of three percent of the gross profits of Cablevision like all the other towns in the east end. Senior citizens who are not going to get six years back directly into their pockets. They're the ones who missed the discount. Mr. Cardinale wanted to get that. I wanted to get them a rebate directly in their pockets, but, no, because Bob is going ahead with these negotiations and, in fact, he preempted- so the public has no- can't find out what it was in Cardinale's resolution. And that

was what was preempted and that was the purpose of Bob Kozakiewicz preempting this.

And so I do want to hear from Phil Cardinale because you know what? It's very interesting how people sometime get- their actions are misrepresented, misconstrued, mischaracterized. Recently in the paper, in the News Review, Phil Cardinale was- the owner of the News Review- was it the News Review, Phil?"

Councilman Cardinale: "Yes."

Zabby: "Said that you were grandstanding because you blew the whistle on the airport situation and it turns out Bob doesn't know that the airport is being used and the lights were on we heard, you know, and people are landing at night and he doesn't know about that.

We need, you know, I think it's interesting how people, you know, take something that's really important, whistle blowing, and at the end though of the news article, the editorial, they said Mr. Cardinale is going to grandstand all the way as he wins the election because he's going to expose and blow the whistle. He's an Independent. He's neither Democratic Republican, and he's going to expose. And I'd like to hear him expose this because he was saying how he got testimony from the manager who I know, Eileen Shanahan, through Teresa the woman there and Eileen Shanahan, I hear, was told and called by the Supervisor's office to put Mr. Grucci on instead of, I guess, Phil Cardinale because Mr. Kozakiewicz doesn't want the people to know that he's mismanaging Cablevision and Phil Cardinale was going to blow the whistle.

So, Phil- "

Councilman Cardinale: "Thank you, Zabby. I can say this that Mr. Warnerowski (phonetic) of Riverhead and several other people called me on the afternoon of Friday before Labor Day. They indicated that the Board meeting was not on. Why? I called the Town Hall, there was nobody there. It was about- a little after five. I called Cablevision. I spoke with Teresa. She checked with Eileen Shanahan in return and indicated that they received instructions from the Supervisor's office not to run the Town Board meeting you just described but to run the Grucci meeting with the Supervisor.

I- Mr. Warnerowski was upset about it; I was upset about it. But there wasn't much we could do so I went home and enjoyed the weekend.

The other thing I'd like to say is Frank Palmieri (phonetic) who is our security force up there, I asked him who authorizes take offs and landings at that site. He indicated the Supervisor's office and he indicated Tara and the Supervisor. And he's our security force up there so all I can tell you is what they told me and then the Supervisor can explain if it's correct or if it's not correct or if it's wrong or right. But that's what they stated."

Zabby: "Keep grandstanding, Phil."

Councilman Cardinale: "Yeah, thank you."

Zabby: "More power to you. And power to the people."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you."

Councilman Kent: "Can I just respond to one thing? I was trying to- she spoke about misrepresentation of facts and things. I was trying to understand exactly what she was referring to in my amendments to the resolution. I tried to add you to the Committee. Is that what you were referring to? When I tried to add you to the Advisory Committee?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think it's the sections of law."

Zabby: "You're asking your question- "

Councilman Kent: "Yes, I'd like to know where you were saying that- first of all, I voted no on the resolution to set the record straight."

Zabby: "I thought that was kind of funny after you had put it all together. Mr. Kozakiewicz- "

Councilman Kent: "I tried to strike- let me speak first and then you can speak. I tried to strike language that I thought was unacceptable because I knew it was going to pass and if we're going to get a resolution that passes, at least the language should be acceptable."

Zabby: "I knew you knew that it was going to pass and you didn't vote for it though. It would have been better to just do a- and I appreciate Bob because he was- "

Councilman Kent: "And I also moved to amend the resolution to

include you on the Advisory Committee."

Zabby: "Yeah, well you knew that wouldn't work. And so at any rate, Bob was- "

Councilman Kent: "So I probably shouldn't have done it. That was probably the thing I did that I shouldn't have done."

Zabby: "Oh well, well, I- it reminded me of- "

Councilman Kent: "In hindsight."

Zabby: "-- it reminded me of when you made the- you relied on Bob that in regard to the Suffolk Theater vote that the residents would have to pay \$50,000 to have the votes at their polling places and that was wrong. That was an error. The residents got to vote on the Suffolk Theater thanks to Phil Cardinale for fighting that too for the public. And they didn't have to pay a cent. But you were wrong and that's why you were annoyed with me. That's why you were annoyed because I hardly ever talk to you. You've not available."

Councilman Kent: "And that's why I tried to amend the resolution to include you as a member of the Advisory Committee."

Zabby: "Yeah, well, actually Bob Kozakiewicz, I have to applaud him for being genuine. He wanted to do it by having the resolution that Ed Densieski was going to bring on as an alternate and that would have been the right thing to do. Because the idea of having a committee is red tape, it's bureaucracy. Vic Prusinowski said that when he was there- he told me in November to my face and he testified that the committee does not work and that's going to hurt the town. It's not in the public's best interest and, in fact, it's ridiculous. It's ludicrous.

It's not even required and so Bob when he called the woman and got the information he was getting it on a whole different thing, on 595.4. So you had your decimal points wrong, the 4's, the 1's. I mean it's just a hodgepodge of an amendment. You should rescind it and you should go ahead, Bob, and do the right thing and second Ed Densieski's amendment and do it the right way. But that amendment is messing up your thing. You have lawyers in- you have lawyers in Florida who are handling this- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. Chris, do you have any other questions?"

Councilman Kent: "No."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right. I think- "

Councilman Kent: "You've answered everything."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Anybody else who would like to speak tonight? If not, I'm going to take up resolutions. Yes, Mr. Davis."

Councilman Kent: "Somebody wants to talk about the airport."

Mr. Davis: "A little background, been an old farm boy for many, many years and I also earned my pilot's wings at Mattituck Air Base about 50 odd years ago. And I'll touch on that later. There have been statements made by- "

Barbara Grattan: "Could you just state your name, please, for the record?"

Lester Davis: "Lester Davis. There have been statements made by the anti-general airport people that the other three publicly owned airports on eastern Long Island, East Hampton, Westhampton and Brookhaven are not paying their way financially. I've spoken to the officials, managers of all these three airports and they state their respective airports are paying their way by you being self-sufficient financially. If anyone wants to discuss this with me later, I'll gladly answer them.

Some have said why do we need the Calverton airfield when we have Westhampton? The answer is the Westhampton field is unusable 33% of the time because of fog. Also, the anti-airport- when I say anti-airport, general aviation, say no substantial income to be derived. In that regard, I've spoken to the owners of the Mattituck Air Base and any people in aviation circles know they have merged with one of the world's largest aircraft manufacturers and they will be needing additional substantial space and in that regard they would be interested in a move to Calverton.

To put their operation in perspective, there have been times when Mattituck Air Base has been the largest employer on the north fork with a payroll of about two and a half million a year and that's not shabby for out here. Thank you."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Thank you. I was going to go to resolutions, Vinny. Everybody has had a chance to speak."

Vinny Villella: "Just one thing. I have the Cablevision letter in front of me, I just want to clear everything so everybody can get (inaudible)."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Which letter is that?"

Vinny Villella: "When I was in office in 1999- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This is the letter to you?"

Vinny Villella: "Yes- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Regarding their television- their televising the meetings?"

Vinny Villella: "I'm just going to read one paragraph."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay, good because I'd like to take up the resolutions."

Vinny Villella: "Government programs work differently. We will continue to handle these shows as part of our local productions. They will continue to be produced by you, meaning the town produces the Cablevision shows, and directed- and with assistance of our staff should you need us. So what they're telling us is the Town of Riverhead is in charge of putting the programs on Cablevision 24 hours and not the other way around.

Because when I was sitting up there, we had the Town Board meeting on four or five times a week."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's right. It was only on Channel 70 and they hadn't been squeezed out by the public access producers. That's correct."

Vinny Villella: "True. And we should have not just the Town Board meetings. We should have work sessions, the Planning Board, the Zoning Board of Appeals. The people in this town have got to know what's going on definitely and with this letter I think the Town Board should play hardball with Cablevision like we did and say we are taking this over, we are producing this show, we want this, this and this, all these programs. Grucci's program was good but you've got to have the Town Board meeting."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Absolutely."

Vinny Villella: "Okay. I just wanted to get that across because we have the letter stating that."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay, thank you. Okay. All right. Let's take up resolutions."

Resolution #918

Barbara Grattan: "Resolution 918- oh, he's not here. Councilman Kent, do you want to do that- Councilman Lull."

Councilman Kent: "Resolution 918 refers the special permit petition of Headriver LLC to the Riverhead Planning Board and authorizes the Town Clerk to publish and post a notice of public hearing which shall be held on October 16<sup>th</sup> at 7:05 p.m."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "There's got to be one change. The notice of public hearing, the Suffolk County Tax Map number, the very last one should be 001.2 instead of 01.1."

Barbara Grattan: "001.2?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Right."

Barbara Grattan: "Okay."

Councilman Lull: "And before I second it, I would also like Riverhead spelled correctly in the title. I'll second it."

Councilman Cardinale: "And- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded. Any other changes?"

Councilman Cardinale: "Yeah, one other. On the Resolution clause which is what, of course, counts. I believe it should read that the Town Clerk be authorized to refer the petition to the Planning Board for its report and recommendation."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "That's correct."

Councilman Cardinale: "Okay. So I would ask that that be included and with that, let's vote."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay, vote, please."

Barbara Grattan: "Hold on, I'm still writing."

Councilman Densieski: "You missed it? What happened, you missed it?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "You've got that all, Barbara?"

Barbara Grattan: "Yeah, I think so."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay."

The Vote: "Densieski, abstain; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #919

Councilman Lull: "Approves amended site plan of REJ Corp., Riverhead Building Supply. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Okay, I'm getting there buddy. Second that motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent."

Councilman Kent: "I'm going to abstain because I- to tell you the truth, I have not seen this site plan. It says it was dated August 28<sup>th</sup>, I guess it was presented Thursday at some time when I wasn't there or something so I'm going to abstain on this."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yeah, it was presented on Thursday. You must have been away at that point, Chris. But we did see it, we had some discussion with Mr. Hanley and I think based upon the fact that it's subject to a DEC permit, the Town Board was all right with going forward. So, yes."

Barbara Grattan: "The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #920

Councilman Lull: "Authorizes the attendance of two police officers at New York State Crime Prevention Coalition training

conference. So moved."

Councilman Kent: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #921

Councilman Lull: "921 adopts a local law amending Chapter 101 entitled Vehicles and Traffic of the Riverhead Town code. This particular resolution simply directs for a change in traffic to a one way traffic at the entrance- which will now be an entrance only to the Peconic River parking area. There are six entrances to that parking area. We have been one at a time re-doing each one. This is in- just simply the change to one way. In the spring the road will be re-done and the sidewalk will be re-done and will be tying into the boardwalk along the river. So moved."

Councilman Kent: "I'll second that. The effort here is to make it a nicer roadway with wider sidewalks on both sides of the road. And I think at some point we will take up the issue of amending the no parking, standing on that roadway also. And I'll second this resolution."

Councilman Lull: "Yes."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "Yes, and I think that the remarks of Mr. Kasperovich about standing and parking were well taken. I'm going to vote yes because I understand they'll be addressed."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Lyle Wells, who is the Chairman of the Town's Farmland and Open Space Preservation Committee tonight questioned the use of CPF funds. I was actually glad to hear him question that. I had similar questions. That Committee did not review this acquisition yet and that is the appropriate Committee to review this proposal."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "This is bond money."

Councilman Kent: "I understand but I think we should know where the money's coming from- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I think we should address it and they meet tomorrow coincidentally- "

Councilman Kent: "We meet tomorrow night and I think we could take it up at that time. Also though, I'd like to receive the entire appraisal- "

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Yeah, it was 60 pages so we- "

Councilman Kent: "I know it was 60 pages but it says right in the- we only received a little summary, about five pages out of the 60 pages, and it says that the report should be read in its entirety.

What's significant is that this property is located in the Scenic

and Wild River corridor. It's affected by that zoning restrictions and I think that should have an impact on its value. And if you read it, it's valuing the piece at 1.1 million for 14.79 acres or over \$73,000 per acre, almost \$75,000 per acre. And I think that's kind of high for property that's got limited development capabilities. So I would move to table this so we could discuss it further and also have the opportunity to read the entire appraisal."

Councilman Cardinale: "Seconded."

Councilman Densieski: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded to table. As I said, that's okay."

Barbara Grattan: "Moved and seconded?"

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Vote. Moved and seconded to table. Chris moved and Phil seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "Yes, to table."

Councilman Cardinale: "It's an acronym, right."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes.  
The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #925

Councilman Lull: "Is also a budget adjustment. This one in the Water District. So moved."

Councilman Densieski: "Second the motion."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Moved and seconded."

Councilman Densieski: "Motion to adjourn."

Councilman Cardinale: "There's two."

Councilman Kent: "No, we're going to take up Resolution 956 which approves the application of Doc's Tavern to have a party in the parking lot and karaoke."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Did I give you that one already?"

Councilman Densieski: "Yeah, I think you did."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right."

Councilman Cardinale: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Who's moving it? Did someone move it?"

Councilman Kent: "I moved it."

Councilman Cardinale: "Chris moved it."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Councilman Kent and seconded by Councilman- I talked about this. This is to approve a one day event for- "

Councilman Kent: "956."

Barbara Grattan: "956."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I'll tell you after the meeting. All right. Moved and seconded."

The Vote: "Densieski, yes; Cardinale, yes; Kent, yes; Lull, yes; Kozakiewicz, yes. The resolution is adopted."

Resolution #957

Councilman Kent: "I have resolution 957 which is a resolution which denies the special permit application of Edward Partridge for TS Haulers, Inc. I just would propose two amendments. I think it's been circulating around for the last four or five days."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "All right, what are the amendments?"

Councilman Kent: "Just two minor amendments really. Donna has been basically providing new copies of the resolution as I've been going over it with her."

But in the ninth finding, just to be consistent with the eighth finding, I think we should change the word outdoor storage to open storage because that's what it says in the code. Open storage to be consistent with the language of our own code.

In the twelfth finding it should say materials set forth in Section 108-3 of the town code of the Town of Riverhead comma wherein the term wholesale business non-nuisance is defined. I think-

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "So you're going to put in the wherein the term- "

Councilman Lull: "Wholesale business- "

Councilman Kent: "It's non-nuisance. I think I actually wrote this on there and she circulated the new resolution."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "I have a copy of that. Yeah, we all have that."

Councilman Kent: "Okay, and that's it. And I move that. I move the resolution with those two amendments."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. So it's moved with the amendments. Is there a second?"

Councilman Cardinale: "Seconded."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "Okay. Any discussion? If not, take up the vote."

The Vote: "Densieski, abstain; Cardinale."

Councilman Cardinale: "For the reasons set forth in the resolution and for the reasons set forth in the applicable law, upon careful review, long reflection, I vote yes to deny the special permit."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kent."

Councilman Kent: "I think the resolution is very, very well worded. It's quite lengthy. I think it sets forth all the findings that we made over the three and a half years I've been here dealing with this topic and for those reasons stated, the findings we have made, I determine that- and the determination set forth therein I'm going to vote yes for the denial of the special permit."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Lull."

Councilman Lull: "A very thorough job by the Town Attorney. Yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): "Kozakiewicz."

Supervisor Kozakiewicz: "For the comments- following the comments previously made, yes."

Barbara Grattan: "The resolution is adopted."

Councilman Densieski: "Motion to adjourn."

Councilman Kent: "Second."

Councilman Densieski: "Good night, all."
