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Supervisor Cardinale: "Good. We have a special treat to begin the meeting.

We're first going to do the Pledge of Allegiance as we always do and we'll be led by Harriet Haas who is here to do more than simply lead in the Pledge of Allegiance but to sing us a patriotic song or two and, Harriet, why don't you start with the Pledge of Allegiance, please."

(The Pledge of Allegiance was recited led by Harriet Haas.)

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you, Harriet. We have one town board member who is permanently absent until November and Jim Wooten had a death in his family with his- I guess it was his brother's long time friend, girlfriend, who passed away so he won't be here today. And he probably won't be here Thursday incidentally because I think that's the funeral.

So we're going to move forward with the beginning of the month of- patriotic or song by Harriet Haas who has a beautiful voice for a woman of any age. So why don't you go ahead."

Harriet Haas: "Thank you. Where do I stand?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "Do you wish us to stand? What are we doing? What kind of a song?"

Harriet Haas: "I've Been Working on the Railroad."

Supervisor Cardinale: "All right. That I guess I could sit for."

Harriet Haas: "Which way should I face?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "Which way should you face? The audience. Don't worry about us. Face your public and the camera."

Harriet Haas: "Hello everybody. Nice to see you all in this wonderful town of Riverhead. Riverhead and Greenport. Okay."

(At this time, Harriet Haas sang I've Been Working on the Railroad)

Harriet Haas: "And one more will be patriotic now."

(At this time, Harriet Haas sang another song)

Harriet Haas: "Thank you. Have a good meeting and a good end of the summer."

Supervisor Cardinale: "I want to thank you. It was beautiful and, Warren, thank you again for chauffeuring Harriet to us. Appreciate it. Harriet, thanks for coming."

We have— we were going to swear Barbara in as Deputy Supervisor but she has a thing about being the third vote for that, so she's— we're going to wait until Jim returns, probably next week. So that means that we can— and we'll withdraw the existing resolution so that we can make up a new one when we meet to do that task which will not have her offering the resolution which makes her Deputy."

Councilwoman Blass: "Thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "You are a sensitive soul but I would like to do the hearings and I have pretty much stalled effectively because the first three hearings are all related. The one at 2:10, 2:15 and 2:20 and I'd like to hear them together. Is that okay with you, Dan? Dan McCormick is our town attorney for this meeting."

Dan McCormick: (Inaudible)

Supervisor Cardinale: "Rick, could you ask Trina— I left on my desk the hearings, she could bring them in? Thank you. Appreciate it."

All right, so the first hearing is scheduled for 2:05 for consideration of a local law amending Chapter 108 entitled zoning hamlet center, uses, Riverhead town code.

The second is for 2:15 the consideration of a local law amending Chapter 108 entitled zoning, 108-64.5 bed and breakfast facilities, Riverhead town code.

The third is 2:20 for consideration of a local law amending Chapter 108 section 108-3 entitled definitions of the Riverhead town code, all having to do with bed and breakfast and how they are defined and where they are permitted and I'm going to declare these hearings opened in about two minutes, because we will have reached 2:20.

Thank you. But I'd like— oh, yeah, and before I get into that, I forgot to let the clerk run through the announcements and the rest. So why don't you do that, why don't you run through the applications and the town hall reports and the correspondence?"

Diane Wilhelm: "And as a reminder, the next town board meeting will be September 15th at 7:00 at the Wading River Congregational Church in Wading River."

Councilwoman Blass: "I have a response to one of those letters with respect to Beacon Wireless that I would submit to you as part of the record that I copied everyone on- e-mailed. I don't know- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah, you should have it in the file."

Councilwoman Blass: "All right. Thank you. Is my mike on? Hello. Okay, thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "So did you get through all of your correspondence? Thank you."

Public hearings opened: 2:20 p.m.

Supervisor Cardinale: "We're down to 2:21 and we can start the first three hearings, 2:05, 15 and 20. The first hearing, all of which relate to bed and breakfast, the first hearing makes clear that in the hamlet center zone a permitted use will be, if it's approved, one family dwelling upon lots with a minimum area of 80,000 square feet.

It also makes clear that special permit use is permitted for bed and breakfast establishments as set forth in subject 2, chapter 108-64.5 and it also indicates that prohibited uses include residences on ground floors except one family dwellings and bed and breakfast facilities as an accessory use to a one family dwelling as set forth in 108-286B-1. That's the 2:05 hearing.

The 2:15 hearing is concerning a change in the supplementary use regulations on the same subject of bed and breakfast.

The bed and breakfast use shall be an accessory use to a one family dwelling and shall be located within a one family dwelling in residential, commercial or agricultural zoning use districts. We clarify that.

We also say an owner occupied one family dwelling shall mean a person's legal primary residence as defined in the federal and state

laws with proof of real estate ownership title of said premises and property.

We also delineate that the structure, a bed and breakfast, shall maintain the character of a one family dwelling. A dwelling which is converted to include bed and breakfast facility must maintain the appearance of a one family dwelling such that there will be no structural change in the exterior of the dwelling except as may be necessary for purposes of safety in accordance with the New York State building code.

We also make clear that the residence shall be the primary residence of the owner who is also the operator and we also state that all one family dwellings incorporating bed and breakfast as an accessory use shall be a minimum of 2,000 square feet of living area and that the maximum number of rented rooms permitted in a bed and breakfast shall be limited to five and the length of stay within a bed and breakfast to a maximum of 14 consecutive days. And that documentation of that will be kept such as a ledger.

That the only meal shall be breakfast and that shall be served only to guests in the bed and breakfast facility and that the use of amenities provided by the bed and breakfast such as outdoor areas and gardens, swimming pool, or tennis court shall be restricted in use to the overnight guests and permanent residents of the facility.

And that cooking facilities are prohibited in the guest bedrooms.

That's the 2:15 hearing.

And the 2:20 hearing simply- under the general provisions of bed and breakfast it is defined as a use accessory to and located within a one family dwelling where rooms are rented to guests for a maximum stay of two weeks and where breakfast produced on premises shall only be provided to those individuals staying at the bed and breakfast. The maximum number of rented rooms permitted to bed and breakfast shall be limited to five, which basically reiterates what I just said in the other one.

So those are the three hearings and those are the changes and if anyone would like to comment on them, please come forth."

Sal Diliberto: "Sal Diliberto, from Manor Lane in Jamesport.

I know that laws are necessary and I know that this board and the town would not propose a new law unless it was absolutely needed to either provide a solution to a problem or for some other reason that would benefit the public.

But I don't understand one portion of this law, 108-64.5C, where it talks about how there can be no structural change in the exterior of the dwelling. So if someone wanted to make an application to have a B&B and they wanted to put a nice porch around the house, this would seem to prohibit that.

If someone wanted to have a B&B and put a deck in the back of the house, this would prevent that.

If someone wanted to make an addition to their home to add on additional bedrooms, to be able to have bedrooms with bathrooms located right within them, this would prevent that.

This would seem to prevent every single possibility of modifying your home to accommodate a B&B. It makes absolutely no sense to me and I just wonder since all laws are usually solutions to problems, what's the problem that's trying to be addressed here?

And why to my knowledge from making phone calls today to people in the B&B industry, was nobody in that industry notified of these changes?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "That's- the- I'm going to refer that to the code revision committee because those are the ones that recommended it and the reasons for recommending it and the purpose of this hearing is to ask questions such as the ones you just asked. So, go ahead."

Councilwoman Blass: "You asked a great question and I don't have an answer and it does seem to be a point well taken that it doesn't serve a purpose that I can readily think of."

I don't know, John, if- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Well, who put it in?"

Councilman Dunleavy: "Well taken. I think- "

Councilwoman Blass: "It was offered through the committee and through the town attorney's office. I don't know, Dan, can you think of anything- any reason that it would preclude any alterations in a building to- "

Dan McCormick: "No. But there had to be some reason. I don't know who worked on it in our office, but there had to be some reason why that was included as a consideration."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Well, great, how about Ann Marie Prudenti. Would you ask Ann Marie to come in? Because we can take

care of this easily. Give her a call. She works here, doesn't she? Okay. Anything else?

We'll find out, these recommendations come from code revision and then they run through the hearing process for the obvious reasons to make sure that-- Ann Marie, how are you? Thank you.

A question has been raised which we needed to know if you knew an answer to.

In the provisions of the bed and breakfast clarifications that are being proposed, actually in response to making available a potential for a bed and breakfast for an Aquebogue area, hamlet center, there is Section C which you're reading.

This says the structure shall maintain the character of a one family dwelling. A dwelling which is converted to include a bed and breakfast must maintain the appearance of a one family dwelling such that there shall be no structural changes to the exterior of the dwelling.

Now, it's such that is the problem. We all know that we want it to look like a one family whatever that is, but why can't they make structural changes in the exterior except for safety? And why was that proposed and why is that being proposed?"

Ann Marie Prudenti: "Because when you look at the language of the master plan what was anticipated or contemplated was using existing farm structures and allowing those structures to be converted to bed and breakfast facilities.

Due to their size and location and proximity to the scenic views, those were quote recommended for conversion to bed and breakfast.

It was the intent that since bed and breakfasts are allowed in residential neighborhoods, that the character of the community be maintained."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah. But why-- if you can only make a structural change to the interior as necessary for the purposes of safety and in accordance with the building code, what does that mean?

I mean you're talking-- I can still put my-- if I put a bathroom on, I'm going to change the exterior if it bumps out my house, for example."

Ann Marie Prudenti: "Correct, but-- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Why can't I do that?"

Ann Marie Prudenti: "-- in order to satisfy the New York State building code, depending on the number of bedrooms, you may in fact be required to add an additional bathroom.

In addition, you may be required to change the entrance if you have to have a handicapped accessibility entrance."

Supervisor Cardinale: "How about if I want to just add four more bedrooms because I'm crazy, I like bedrooms. Why can't I do that?"

Ann Marie Prudenti: "Well, under the ordinance, you're allowed to have five bedrooms."

Supervisor Cardinale: "But I'm not- I'm also allowed to have nine. Aren't I?"

Ann Marie Prudenti: "Not for a bed and breakfast."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Why not? You mean- you can only use so many bedrooms for the bed and breakfast but you're telling me I can't have nine bedrooms if I don't use them all? Seriously. If I had nine kids, what am I going to do if I wanted a bed and breakfast."

Ann Marie Prudenti: "Well- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "I've got to get on this revision committee."

Ann Marie Prudenti: "I suppose you're correct, you could have that many bedrooms."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah. There's going to be a vacancy when Barbara retires from her Councilwoman and her deputy supervisor job but- "

Ann Marie Prudenti: "I'm sure that if you could demonstrate that your owner occupancy requires you to have 10 bedrooms plus an additional five for the bed and breakfast, you may be eligible for that."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Anything else you want to tell us? I'm a little concerned about the breadth of the language, Mr. Diliberto shares the same persuasion as an attorney. You are an attorney, aren't you?"

Councilman Dunleavy: "What about- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "He's a little concerned about the breadth of the language, so we're going to have to work on that."

Councilman Dunleavy: "What if I wanted to add a porch to site out?"

Ann Marie Prudenti: "As long as it maintains the appearance of a one family dwelling."

Supervisor Cardinale: "No. That's the problem. It says no structural change in the exterior, except as necessary for safety. So a porch isn't necessary for safety, therefore, it's precluded, therefore, the language is way too broad.

All right. Let's talk about that. That's what it says."

Ann Marie Prudenti: "I respectfully disagree."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Tell me why."

Ann Marie Prudenti: "Because it says a bed and breakfast facility must maintain the appearance of a one family dwelling."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah. Such that there shall be no structural changes in the exterior of the dwelling except for public safety reasons. What does that mean? It means that I can't do anything- "

Ann Marie Prudenti: "As long as the quote construction maintains the appearance of the single family dwelling, you can undertake that construction."

Supervisor Cardinale: "That's not what- "

Ann Marie Prudenti: "But to the extent it does not but if it's related to safety, that you can do."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. That would be far more acceptable than what this says. As far as I know, this is what this says.

A dwelling- the structure shall maintain the character of a one family dwelling. I'm fine, that's good. A dwelling which is converted to include a bed and breakfast facility must maintain the appearance of a one family dwelling. That's fine.

Such that, meaning that, such- if you have to do it- but there shall be no structural change in the exterior of the dwelling except

as necessary for purposes of safety. That does not allow me to put a porch on or a bathroom.

So the language— your intention is good; the language is not. We'll fix it. It's no big deal. We didn't intent what it apparently could be interpreted to mean. Right?

Even you didn't."

Ann Marie Prudenti: "Correct. I think we could modify the such and do except."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. Except that there— well, I want to be able to make some exterior changes unrelated to safety. I want to put a porch on, maybe a back deck— "

Ann Marie Prudenti: "We could say except for structural changes in the exterior of the dwelling as may be necessary for purposes of safety."

Supervisor Cardinale: "I object to the limitation of for the purpose of safety. That's what I'm worried about. I don't think that you should be limited to— if you have a single family residence and you could use it for a couple of bed and breakfast, you should be able to do whatever you want to do but we could say you can't have any more than so many rooms rented.

I don't want to make this a hotel but I want him to be able to do whatever the hell he wants to do with his house."

Ann Marie Prudenti: "Correct."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. So we can fix that. But thank you for pointing it out. Thank you, Ann Marie, appreciate it.

Anybody else— anybody want to talk to us about this?"

Martin Sendlewski: "Yes. Martin Sendlewski, architect. I just reiterate basically what Sal said.

Also, in the same vein, when you look at item G and also the verbiage of the other public notice, the 2:20 hearing, it says that you'll only serve breakfast.

I think that the B&B, the bed and breakfast was a term that was just sort of put on particular types of rental housing units. I mean if somebody gets there at 10:00 at night and the owner is going to serve nachos and wine, why can't they do that? It says you can only serve them breakfast. Not— does not need to be legislated.

Also, and I'm very- Phil, I agree 100% with what you said in terms of objecting to it.

One of the things you said when it talks about the character and retaining the appearance, your quote was whatever that is. And the reason you say whatever that is- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Because nobody knows. Yeah.

Martin Sendlewski: "-- is because it's subjective, so you really don't want to codify something that's subjective.

As the legislators-- the attorney's office does a good job writing the legislation. You're the legislators, why don't you legislators just take out item C? Just get rid of it. There's no need for it to be in there. Just say we're not going to do this legislation. It's not good. We're the legislators. No. Take it out."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Right. And I think that's a reasonable suggestion.

What happens in these, is they come out of code revision directly to hearing so we can get some of this input and I agree with that.

I also agree with your point about the breakfast and I'm not trying to be agreeable necessarily. The- Ann Marie, I understand- I think that the public interest here on bed and breakfast is that we want them not to become hotels in disguise with 42 rooms and all services and restaurants.

And I understand there's legitimate public interest. But I understand his point that I'd like a bottle of champaign and nachos when I get there. Maybe even a bottle of bourbon. But the point is that I don't think we should restrict them necessarily except to what meals they serve.

I would rather say that they can only serve meals to the bed and breakfast people which can only be- how much rooms do we allow bed and breakfast to rent out?"

Ann Marie Prudenti: "Five."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah. He's got five guys and he wants to have dinner for five couples in his moonlit dining room and even wants to make some money, I don't have a problem with that if the health department doesn't have any problem.

So I think we should approach it that way, that there's only five bedrooms, therefore, there's only five bedrooms of people that can come to dinner and you can feed them whatever you want, I don't care if it's breakfast or lunch or dinner or nachos, you know. That makes sense. So why don't we do that? Yes?"

Councilwoman Blass: "But you would agree that it would have to be served only to people who- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Absolutely. We don't want it outside. We don't want to make it a restaurant. I get it. Yes?"

Sal Mastropaolo: "Sal Mastropaolo, Calverton. One point is if you offer him a bottle of wine, you better have a liquor license."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Really? That's terrible. I mean, you have to have a liquor license to offer- "

Sal Mastropaolo: "You don't?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "Is it not true, true? Well, either way, that's interesting."

Sal Mastropaolo: "Another point is let's say for argument sake the neighborhood has all 1800 square foot houses. I can understand the need to change the footprint of the house, but there should be some limitation as to how big the refurbished house is compared to the original. Let's say it's 1800 square feet. They shouldn't be able to bring it up to 5400 square feet."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Well, that's an interesting point. I would agree with you in principle, but what difference does it make if the guy made a 5400 square foot because he's rich or because he has 10 kids or because he has five people coming to a bed and breakfast. It's still the maximum is the maximum."

Sal Mastropaolo: "Well, you said you don't want to change the character of the neighborhood. And if the whole neighborhood is all 1800 square foot homes- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah. But you can- in your neighborhood which might have 1800 square foot homes like mine does, I can still tear down my house and build a 6000 square foot house if I have, you know, the necessary footprint available."

So I don't think we should penalize people by not letting them build big houses for their five bedrooms. I think we've already designated five bedrooms is the maximum for bed and breakfast and if you build it- you can't build anymore for bed and breakfast, but if you want to have a 6000 or 8000 square foot house and it's permitted

by the zoning, what difference does it make if you're building it for your family just because you've got a big ego, or because you want to feed people at a bed and breakfast or house them.

Same big house. So I don't really think that's necessary. But-- that's why I want-- this should be fun on this committee if I ever get on it. Yes."

Jim Slezak: "Jim Slezak, my wife and I own Red Barn B&B."

Supervisor Cardinale: "It's a very nice place. It really is."

Jim Slezak: "My one concern is the item about meals being served. Please don't regulate what food and beverage are for my guests."

Supervisor Cardinale: "And who's going-- how are we going to get-- you are conservative Ann Marie. How are-- we get the food police in there? Stop with that nacho, out of your mouth, now! All right, thank you.

That is true, enforceability is itself an issue.

Anybody else want to make a comment? To think we're doing this off of Danowski, who is asleep back there because his client wants a bed and breakfast in the hamlet center and what, they've bothered us for years on his, now we're trying to do something nice and you've got anything you want to say, Pete?"

Peter Danowski: (Inaudible)

Supervisor Cardinale: "You know, because of all these people, we're going to have to do this again, you realize that. When we do the amendment, that will be another month.

Okay, we'll talk about it. We'll change what needs to be changed. Does anybody want to say anything else? Okay. We will do that, we will re-hear it and we will pass something that's better and we will take 10 days from today, no, yeah, 10 days from today which is a week from Friday which is, let's see, today is the 1st, 2nd, 3rd, that would be the 11th. Friday, September 11th. How do you like that? To make comment of anything you would like to put in writing to the town clerk on these three hearings.

And if there is no further comment, I'll conclude the hearings. I will hold them open for written comment through the 11th, 4:30, to the town clerk."

Public hearing opened: 2:40 p.m.

Supervisor Cardinale: "At 2:30 p.m., and it's 2:40, we have proposed a hearing for the consideration of a proposed local law to amend Chapter 101 entitled Vehicles and Traffic, Section 101-10 entitled parking prohibited of the Riverhead town code.

And I would propose— this would prohibit parking of vehicles in locations as follows:

Middle Road on the south side beginning at its intersection of Manor Road in an easterly direction in its entirety to its intersection with Doctors Path.

Is that the whole road?"

Councilman Dunleavy: "That's the whole road."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. You can't park on the south side of Middle Road we're saying, and furthermore on Ostrander Avenue on both sides beginning at its intersection with East Second Street for a distance of 50 feet in all directions, you can't park.

Who thinks that's a bad idea?"

Councilman Dunleavy: "Can I ask the chief? Where do these come from, chief?"

Chief Hegermiller: (Inaudible)

Supervisor Cardinale: "Middle Road and Ostrander."

Councilman Dunleavy: "No parking on the entire length of Middle Road. Well, who brought it up? No, I didn't bring it up. I wasn't at that meeting then. Nobody parks on Middle Road. I never see one car parked on Middle Road. There's no houses on the south side of Middle Road."

(Inaudible comment)

Supervisor Cardinale: "Was this a majority vote? All right."

Councilman Dunleavy: "I asked George Bartunek because I thought it was the bicycle riders and he said he didn't even mention it."

Supervisor Cardinale: "So- (inaudible) to say no parking on the length of Middle Road but nobody ever parks there anyway."

Councilman Dunleavy: "Nobody parks there anyway."

Supervisor Cardinale: "This is what I call solving the problem that needs solving."

Yes, come on up, please. We have a comment from Warren."

Councilman Dunleavy: "We have a comment. There you go."

Warren McKnight: "Yes, I live on Middle Road and I go down there- "

Diane Wilhelm: "Can you state your name for the record?"

Warren McKnight: "Warren McKnight. I reside on Middle Road between Roanoke and Harrison and there's always one car on Middle Road. As you go down where Depot Road and Middle Road meet, you'll see a white car on the south side."

Councilman Dunleavy: "That's parked off the road."

Warren McKnight: "It's off the road."

Councilman Dunleavy: "Off the road, it's parked off the road."

Warren McKnight: "Yeah, it's on the shoulder."

Councilman Dunleavy: "It's- well, it's on the grass."

Warren McKnight: "It's on the shoulder. Yeah, exactly. Whatever you call it, it's the shoulder."

Councilman Dunleavy: "No, no. That's not where bicyclists would be riding."

Warren McKnight: "I hope not."

Councilman Dunleavy: "That's the only car that ever parks there, yes."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Whose car is that? That's not Antoinette's, is it?"

Warren McKnight: "I don't know. But no matter what time I, all hours of night and day, I always see that car there and, you know, I guess people— you can still park on the grass there."

Councilman Dunleavy: "Yes. Even with no parking, you can park on the grass."

Warren McKnight: "Yeah, well, yeah, I can see— well, where else can you park if you don't park on the grass? There's no sidewalks. I don't even know why you brought this up."

Supervisor Cardinale: "I think this is a power play by the highway safety committee. They want to do something."

Warren McKnight: "Really, I was just concerned, that's why I asked this because I live on Middle Road."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Chief, did you have a comment? Oh, traffic safety, I'm sorry."

Chief Hegermiller: (Inaudible comment)

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. Let me get— let me get serious for a moment (inaudible) as that is."

Is there anybody in this audience, town or otherwise, that can tell me why it is necessary to have— to ban parking on the entire length of Middle Road on the south side, not the north and the south but the south only? There's two members of the committee here. Do you want to say anything further? Well, why don't you come on up and say it because I haven't heard a justification as to why we want this to happen.

And I'm going to ask you, chief, to please as a member of the committee or John, to ask Antoinette to submit something in writing as to why she believes it's a good idea because we're not going to pass it unless it's justified by something."

Chief Hegermiller: "Well, I think Geo, highway superintendent also agreed with it that at certain times there's events or something, especially on the east end of Middle Road, where parking is both on the north and south side, therefore, making the road too narrow for emergency vehicles."

Supervisor Cardinale: "That makes a little sense. Events?"

Councilwoman Blass: "Like a yard sale? Is that what you're talking about?"

(Some inaudible comment)

9/01/2009

Councilman Dunleavy: "He said the east. Well, then it could be. I would think that that portion of the road, that portion of the road we could have no parking and east of Doctor's Path because there are houses and cars do park east of Doctor's Path on the highway."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay."

Councilwoman Blass: "If it were a situation where there was an event say at Timothy Hill which would be in this area, wouldn't it be subject to a Chapter 90 in which case we could address the parking at that time in connection with the event? No. I'm talking about Timothy Hill major events that could- "

Chief Hegermiller: "I- you could probably address it but I don't think that would prohibit it. I think it can be stipulated in Chapter 90 but I don't think we can change town code."

Councilwoman Blass: "I'm just suggesting in the context of- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Incidentally this is from Manor Road- where is Manor Road? Manor Road is in Calverton, so how do you justify taking the whole road for one thing way west or way east?"

Chief Hegermiller: "I think they felt it could happen on the entire length of Middle Road is what they came up with."

Supervisor Cardinale: "You mean some people could park. But what we're more interested in and I'd like Antoinette Carbone to give us some kind of, you know, a written note to the file."

Anything could happen, but I would like to restrict my legislating to things that are happening. What problem, as someone just asked, are we solving by this legislation."

Chief Hegermiller: "I think it's on the east end. I think there's events on a regular basis where people park on both sides of the road."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Great. Now I've got the news- I was hoping to get a good quote in a complimentary article in Newsday and I got his asleep now so would you move- I got News Review and Newsday sleeping. This is not an exciting hearing. Nobody knows why we're having it. What is the purpose of this hearing? Why are we proposing this law?"

Chief Hegermiller: "It was to keep the roadway open for emergency vehicles basically, that we would never have to face that issue."

Supervisor Cardinale: "And on that theory, you wouldn't have parking on any roads in town."

Chief Hegermiller: "On some roads that definitely is a problem. Some roads are wide enough to handle that but there's other roads that are not."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Are you standing for the proposal that on the south side of Middle Road from its beginning to its end, there should be no parking? Are you prepared to recommend that?"

Chief Hegermiller: "Yes."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Well, as the police chief, I take that seriously. Do you have any reasoning or do you just have a feeling?"

Chief Hegermiller: "I think Middle Road is a narrow road and I think if people park on both sides, it's also windy, I think it presents a problem."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay, thank you, that was the most coherent defense of it I've heard. Thank you."

Councilwoman Blass: "And, chief, can I ask you to stay a second? What about the second aspect of this, the Ostrander Avenue beginning at the intersection of East Second Street for a distance of 50 feet in all directions?"

Chief Hegermiller: "Yes. That's a fire department issue. With the trucks coming out of there, they have to turn and that limits their turning ability onto- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you. The highlight of this meeting was Harriet so far."

Chief Hegermiller: "Would you like me to sing?"

Councilman Dunleavy: "Yeah. But I think that was- I think they were complaining about that when they came out of Second Street. They no longer come out of Second Street so that was their turning to get- "

Chief Hegermiller: "Well, I think the fire chief still thought there was an issue getting from Second Street like onto Ostrander or something. They recently had a house fire there on Ostrander."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. So you feel that that is justified."

Chief Hegermiller: "It does become very congested there and does limit site, site line distance."

Supervisor Cardinale: "And the fire department apparently made a request to the traffic- is it the traffic safety committee."

Chief Hegermiller: (Inaudible)

Supervisor Cardinale: "Were they on it? He was on it. Oh, Geo was in the highway department and- one request from- two requests from Highway and from Fire but from one person.

I wonder how you count that. Is that two votes or one vote? Same person."

Chief Hegermiller: "It's like me being chair and also police chief."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah, that's right. I don't know. All right. So there is some justification for each. If anyone would like to comment, please come up. Warren- anybody else who has a strong feeling about either of these proposals."

Warren McKnight: "Well, I'm glad I came today besides being able to hear Harriet sing but you know since I live on Middle Road every time I go to the mail box and go across the street and back again, and I'm not going to complain about having police enforce this and have the speed limit and all that stuff, what I found is one time where Middle Road is, there's a lot of wildlife crossing and I asked Barbara, she said to write a letter and I did. She posted a sign, beware of wildlife crossing.

But if we could have- and you have a great thing around the circle, you have that thing where pedestrians crossing, if you could have, remind certain people they don't care about speeding, they'll speed but at least have a sign yield to pedestrians or pedestrian traffic or have the- some people can't even read. If you have these signs, like these crazy people- yeah, crossing. Because, you know, when I do go to the mailbox or if I do cross the street to visit a neighbor, it is sometime, you know, I don't walk fast enough or something, you know, they think it's a speeding road."

Supervisor Cardinale: "That's a problem, I understand that. That road is a problem for traffic enforcement.

Did you say something about wildlife is endangered?"

Warren McKnight: "Well, yeah- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "From the condos or real wildlife?"

Warren McKnight: "Well there's quite a bit of wildlife between that road there because there's Anderson's corn field, there's a 27 acre meadow that they've been trying to develop but it's never going to happen until things change, and you have Tuccio's corn field. So the deer and all the animals are running across behind Target back and forth and guinea hens and everything else. But, you know, any everything is always being run over but since the sign there it's improved.

But with people, it's very hard because some of these people think it's a speeding road and they don't think pedestrians live there even though they see the houses. If you can get some sort of things that, you know, would say, hey, there's people that cross the road, pedestrian crossing, or yield to pedestrians on different areas there like you have around the circle."

Councilman Dunleavy: "There are a lot of guinea hens that cross there."

Warren McKnight: "Because of Anderson's farm."

Councilman Dunleavy: "There are, yes."

Warren McKnight: "But that's it. But with people, you know, neighbors cross the street, you know."

Supervisor Cardinale: "So if I understand this correctly, we have a wildlife sign up and we're doing good with the wildlife but people are getting run over."

Warren McKnight: "Well, people have to move very quickly because the cars, they go around the bend and they go very quickly and, you know, if you could just remind people that— drivers, that people walk across the street there. It's a residential area."

Councilman Dunleavy: "And we could also put a pedestrian crossing— pedestrian crossing sign up, like wildlife."

Warren McKnight: "Yeah. Besides that, yeah, and the signs you've got there it might, you know, I wouldn't have to walk as fast."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. Good, good. If you were as fast as a guinea hen, we would have no problem."

Warren McKnight: "Thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Thank you. Is there any other comment? If not, fascinating as it has been, I'm going to close

If you're the third car in the turn lane to make a left to go east on 58, and there's a car going north on Doctor's Path and the first car has to wait for that car to clear the intersection to make the left, two cars can't get through the light, that's how fast it is."

Supervisor Cardinale: "So the Doctor's Path/Route 58 light, the turn lane coming from where again?"

Sal Mastropaolo: "Going southbound, going towards Edward's Sporting Goods- "

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay."

Councilman Dunleavy: "It's the same as going northbound, too. Same difference."

Sal Mastropaolo: "Extremely fast."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Can you check that? The chief is here. I appreciate it, chief, thank you. The chief is here and he will check that that is a timing issue that we can fix if it needs to be fixed."

Sal Mastropaolo: "Thank you. The other thing is we used to have a timer for people that speak, okay, and at the last meeting I realize the issue on Riverside Drive is a hot issue, but I mean they beat it to death, okay, and it's probably going to cost the town a fortune to transcribe the multiple speakers that said the same thing over and over again.

I think we need to re-institute the timer, okay. I mean let the person make his point and then sit down.

Thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Right. Thank you. Any other comments, please come up."

Patricia Holland: "Patricia Holland, Riverhead. I know we have an ordinance that you can't be hammering and banging and building early in the morning or late at night."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Right."

Patricia Holland: "But we don't have anything about people who have parties going on until 3:00 a.m. in the morning. We don't have anything like that, or do we, and I just don't know about it."

Councilman Dunleavy: "Noise ordinance."

Supervisor Cardinale: "We have a noise ordinance and usually the way it's implemented is you call the police and they send somebody out there and they usually quiet it down pretty effectively by their very presence. And if that doesn't work and they want to issue a summons other than disorderly and drunk, they can get the guy out with the noise ordinance. So, yes, you should not tolerate that if it's really intolerable."

Patricia Holland: "Well, a neighbor of mine had that situation and was told he had to go to code enforcement. He went into town hall and he was told he had to go to code enforcement."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Yeah. That could happen. That's why I suggest the police first because is code enforcement always available on the weekend? They're not. I bet this was a weekend and in order to get them to come out and check the noise, so, chief, what happens if there's a lot of noise but no other violations they can issue for, they're not capable of checking for a noise violation?"

Supervisor Cardinale: "Okay. So the police department is your best recourse because they'll tell them quiet down or we're going to shut you down and if they don't do that, they'll do that, and if they don't do that, they'll bring out a noise meter and summons them for that and anything else."

Patricia Holland: "Thank you."

Supervisor Cardinale: "Anything else? Well, that was fun. We will be back here on Thursday, probably the Lone Rangers here, the Three Musketeers or whatever we're calling ourselves because Jim is still going to be at the funeral but we'll have a work session and who knows, we might actually accomplish something of significance."
