Supervisor Janoski: "I would, at this time, open up the meeting to anyone who wishes to be heard? Yes Sir. Please state your name and address."

Robert C. Luerssen, Riverhead Road, Calverton; "I'd like to make a statement here concerning the refinery. Again, I'm speaking on behalf of the First Congressional District Conservative Caucus. We favor the study. We ask you to disregard pressures of the organized emotional obstructionist and political bosses. They are not concerned with the growth of Riverhead, but have their own selfish interests. Again, we feel the Ayatollah wants to take Iran back to the 15th Century and we have some groups in this town that want the same for America. The Lord made man the ruler of his environment and today some people want nature to rule them. Without new industry, our stagnant economic condition might lead us to live like animals. Our environment consists of more than the birds and bees. We are children of God and should esteem the welfare of our fellow man above the animal and insect world. Let's use our minds, study the fact and do what's right. The facts are:

More people have notified the town that they are in favor of the study. In fact, I am told in the last two days the town has received over 500 post cards strongly supporting the study. Recently Congressman Bill Carney has just completed a survey and 79% favor the use of "dirty" fuels, such as coal, on Long Island to reduce imported oil. Sixty-six per cent favor it even if it means lowering air pollution standards.

Another private survey just released showed 55% favor an oil refinery in Riverhead.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedRobert C. Luerssen continues:

In conclusion, I'd just like to say I feel it's that obvious the majority of the people in the town favor the study. The study should be made. If it is defeated because of back-room loyalty to political parties, then the town has taken a step backwards. You can be sure anyone who plays that game with our town will never get our support or the support of our friends. Because it will be the case of cutting off our nose to spite our face. The right thing is to do the study and then decide. Killing it now will be a sign to industry everywhere to stay out. Then when taxes rise and the residents are forced, out of economic necessity to vote down the school budgets, the only ones who will lose will be our children and they will have this Town Board to blame for their inferior education. I urge, again that you vote in favor of this issue and have the study. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."Irene J. Pendzick: "Mr. Luerssen, could I get a copy of your statement for my secretary?"Councilman Lombardi: "Reverend, could you state who you work for, please?"Robert C. Luerssen: "Certainly. You called me Reverend. I am a minister. I'm a minister of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints here in Town, the Mormon Church. But that is not my full-time occupation. We have no paid ministry in the Church. I'm presently employed for Stone and Webster Engineering."Councilman Lombardi: "And who are they?"Councilman Prusinowski: "Which is affiliated with Grumman."Robert C. Luerssen: "Excuse me."Councilman Prusinowski: "It's affiliated with Grumman."Robert C. Luerssen: "No, Lilco."

Councilman Lombardi: "Thank you."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "In regard to the oil refinery, I have just two words, forget it. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill. Is there anyone else present wishing to be heard? Yes Sir, Joe?"

Joe Lopez, Riverhead; "I'm here on behalf of the Riverhead Chamber of Commerce. I believe you received a piece of correspondence from the Chamber requesting a donation of \$2,500 of promotional activities with regard to Long Island Tourism. I don't want to belabor the point, but I'd like to go on record and ask the Town to support the promotional activities of the LATC had done throughout the two or three years that they've been in activity.

As you know, \$2,500 on a township level is not much to ask to help promote Long Island. Two or three years ago, we asked the state for matching funds and I think the County came up with about \$15,000 and other townships — other counties I should say throughout New York State requested funds. Sullivan County, for instance, asked for \$80,000 and received matching funds for that amount. I think Long Island should be able to get its fair share of matching funds to promote Long Island. And we respectfully ask that you consider this request."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Joe. Is there anyone else present wishing to be heard?"

Mary Beth Andresen, Church Lane, Aquebogue; "I just have a couple of things to say. I really hope that the Town looks forward to giving \$2,500 to the tourism industry and if they do take into consideration what it's going to look like with the oil tanks in the backyard. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski; "Thank you. Cy?"

Donald Cy Walsh, Riverhead. "I just want to say a few things that have been on my mind and watching the reactions here tonight on one of the speakers, I feel if you have a thought either one way or the other, that you should express it. I'm going to

say a few words in regards to this oil refinery bit and what I say, I hope may not be taken as in favor or against. But I wish the people of Riverhead would be a little bit realistic, realistic to the fact of what's going on in the Town economically. You see these signs, it says 'Love Riverhead'. But where do we Love Riverhead from? Do we love it from our castle on the sound or chalet on the beach or a condominium in Woodcliff Park? Or do we love it from a little house on Second Street? If you are of the financial ability to send your children to fancy schools, nice schools and in turn send them on their way for a job, fine. But if you are the little guy that lives on Second Street, what do you do. His son wants to go to school, but he doesn't have the job so that he could get the money to send him to school.

You see, all these things that are going on within town government, they're taking property off the tax rolls, they're hiring extra people and this money has to come from somewhere. Your taxes are just to use a figure possibly or now \$1,700. Money has to be gotten for these different projects. There is a possibility that your taxes will go to \$2,400. Do you have that kind of money with no tax base to pay these kind of fees for taxes? Let's be a little bit realistic. The Supervisor has come forth with an idea. Everybody is jumping on the bandwagon and say 'it stinks'. A man just got up a little while ago and said 'it stinks'. Fine, you found fault with him. But do you have an alternate? Do you have an alternate to bring forth to the people of Riverhead to bring monies in here for the common ordinary people. You know going way back in history when Ben Franklin went out and flew this kite, they thought he was crazy. His wife probably thought he had too much beer.

When Henry Ford invented the Ford car, they thought he was an embecile completely. And you can go on down through history. But these men have ideas which they stayed with.

So Mr. Supervisor, you're in pretty good company along those lines.

I'd just like to leave you with this little story. It's about the traveling salesman who got caught out in the boondocks and had to stay at the farmer's house. So the farmer said yes you could stay with me. You could have supper with me, but you have to go to bed with my son, he's eight years old. So the traveling salesman agreed. So when they got up to be that night, the traveling salesman gets undressed, jumps into bed, covers up and happens to look over and he sees the little boy kneeling down on the other side of the bed with his head down. So the traveling salesman doesn't want to be embarrassed, so he jumps out of bed and puts his head down and starts doing the same thing, he thought. The little boy looks up at him and says hey mister, what are you doing over there? He says, well I'm doing the same thing over here that you're doing over there. He says you better not be, there's only one pot in this room, and it's on my side of the bed.

What I'm telling you is the fact that we want pee pots on both sides of the bed, we want a study, we want something in those pots."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Cy. Is there anyone else present that wishes to be heard at this time? Yes Sir, Joe?"

Joseph Ingegno, Linda Lane West, Riverhead: "I am not a major environmentalist or — I am probably more industrial minded than most people in this Town. I think this town tonight is holding the direction of the future of this Town on its vote tonight. I think the oil refinery is wrong for the Town. I think it's the wrong way to go. I think with a little hard work and a little effort that we could attract other businesses to this town. We don't need an oil refinery. This is the first thing. It's probably an easy way out for the town because you know someone wants to come here and dump this on us. You don't see them going to Sag Harbor or East Hampton, or Montauk or Westhampton with it, they dump in on Riverhead. I think with a little effort and a little research, we can find some much better things to do in this town. The man from the Chamber of Commerce was here just asking for some money for some tourist brochures. Sure when they print the brochures, they'll show the beautiful beaches and shops in Westhampton and Southampton. When they show the picture of Riverhead, they can show the oil refinery and the people will just drive right by. I think tonight is one of the most important votes you're going to make. And I hope it's not for the oil refinery. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Joe. Is there anyone else present wishing to be heard? Please state your name and address."

Bill Mashmann, Sound Shore Road, Riverhead: "I'm a neighbor of Northville Industries. I would like to ask everyone to think a minute, the three industries that are proposing this to our town. I'm a neighbor of Northville and I drive by Northville's tanks at least once a day and home again. Now maybe the handling of oil is a very complicated procedure and requires a high degree of technology. It must, because sometimes something must go wrong at Northville and it stinks. We read in the paper not too long ago about Northville letting some oil get into a sump. The answer to that was 'oops'.

A few years ago, I drove down Sound Shore Road, made a turn by Northville Industries as the road goes right into some

real heavy thick oil all over the road which was picked up and get all over my little white rabbit. I will say, a phone call to Northville Industries and they told me to come in and they cleaned my car and told me that the fault was that one of their vendors didn't have their tailgate or their valve on the back of the truck closed properly. And they apologized. I will say they're good neighbors, but things do happen. And this is only the storage and handling of oil. We're not doing anything to it chemically or mechanically.

Now we all know Long Island Lighting Company. I don't have to say much about them. All I can say is that give them a thirty-mile wind and they're licked. It puts them right out of business. Thirty miles an hour and they have trouble.

The third one of the triumphant, Grumman Industries, I would just as soon not say anything about them because I was employed at Grumman. I'm now retired and I'd like to let it go at that. I think as has been pointed out, if we go with the study now, the study is obviously going to show the merits of such a proposition. It's only going to require so much more money to perform another study to show the demerits of the proposition. So I think the idea of let's put the thing to bed right now and say we don't want that type of industry here in Riverhead."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

Greg Lessard, Jamesport; "Listening here tonight everyone thinks it's not the right thing for Riverhead. I went around with post cards in favor of the refinery and everybody said I don't think it's right. Everybody thinks or doesn't think it's right for Riverhead. Have the study, find out if it is or is not right."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Yes Sir."

Bill Costa, Dunlookin' Lane, South Jamesport; "Recently I moved out to the north fork and every day I commute into the city and I am in the area of Linden and Elizabeth, New Jersey and if you'd like to save a lot of money, anybody who really wants to know about oil refineries, I'd be more than happy to take them in. They could take a good whiff of Linden and Elizabeth, I do in every day, you save a lot of money. Anybody's who's interested, I'll give them a lift."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Yes Sir,"

Eli Lurie, Sound Shore Road, Riverhead; "One of the things that most people have forgotten about, is that this refinery doesn't stand alone. You got to have tanks for the gasoline. You got to have tanks for the crude oil. You got to have tanks for also what they crack out of it. So you're not only getting a refinery, you're getting a whole plant with it. And this is a terrible thing.

The other thing is, getting back to Linden, New Jersey, you get a terrible smell there. But don't forget that the E.P.A. is the one that makes these things right up to snuff. They said that these plants are forty years old. They are not forty years old, they're today's plants because the E.P.A. would not allow them to do anything except what comes under the government regulations so don't let anybody kid you and tell you these are old plants. They are not. Their smell is bad and you're going to get that same smell here.

The other thing is, too, if you get this plant located anywhere in Riverhead when the wind is right, you're going to smell it all over Riverhead. So just remember this please,"

Supervisor Janoski: "There are two minutes left if anybody would like to use those two minutes."

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:00 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held on Tuesday, July 15, 1980 at 8:00 p.m. to hear all interested persons regarding the special permit application of Brasby's Restaurant to use the adjoining lot for overflow parking, located on Route 25, Aquebogue, New York.

The affidavits were ordered to be placed on file.

COMMUNICATION

Environmental Quality Review Board, 5/29/80 - recommendation that application is a Type II action and will not have a significant impact on the environment. Filed.

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone present representing the applicant?"

Steve Tsontakis, representing Bill and Dot Brasby; "I believe — have you had a chance to look at the proposed parking. Just, I'd like to regress a little bit to fill you in on the reason for this application. In 1978 Dot and Bill Brasby requested and expanded the restaurant in Aquebogue which is on the Main Road. In doing so, one of the stipulations was that we were to remove the easterly access to the restaurant. This was a recommendation by the Regional Planning Board and we reluctantly complied with this request knowing full well that it would cause a little bit of an access problem to the restaurant. We've had a year of experience now with ingress and egress from this facility and we find that egress in an easterly direction is somewhat dangerous. In fact, we've had numerous complaints from patrons who had felt that it was risky leaving the restaurant and trying to travel east because of the curve in the road.

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Steve Tsontakis continues:

Now we didn't have that situation when the easterly exit and entrance existed prior to the expansion of the restaurant. And so — we also had an additional problem in peak periods. There tended to be overflowed parking on the street which causes a potential hazard with people walking across a main artery to get to and from their cars. So the Brasbys intended with intentions to do something about this, purchase adjoining property to the east.

We applied for a preliminary approval for a minor subdivision of four lots. Subsequent to that and in conjunction with this subdivision, we applied for a special permit to use one of these lots for some overflow parking and also to re-establish the easterly entrance to the restaurant.

I'm an engineer and I made a traffic study which we submitted with the petition and that traffic study indicates that in fact there is a potential hazard when leaving the restaurant and traveling east because of the curve in the road and another entrance on the easterly side of the restaurant would eliminate this hazard. It also would improve the circulation of traffic around the restaurant in and out of it and the additional parking, of course, will obviate (tape ended)."

(Tape Began):

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the Board or to ask any questions regarding this issue?"

No one else wishing to be heard and no further communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 8:05 P.M.

Sanford Siegel, 67 Wintercress Lane, East Northport; Ladies and gentlemen, Board Members, this is an application for a special permit to operate a non-nuisance industry on the premises located on Edwards Avenue. The business that will be conducted is the overhauling of automobile parts. The premises were purchased and at the time of the purchase, it was zoned for light industrial use. And the applicant was not aware that a special permit would be necessary because what he was doing fit within his own use. However, thereafter he was informed that it would need a special permit. So upon that information, we prepared the necessary application for the permit and went before the Planning Board on the third, at which time we were questioned and then they made their recommendation for the granting of the permit.

If you have any questions of me, I'd be glad to answer them?"

Supervisor Janoski: "The one question that has arisen is one concerning the disposal of the cleaning agents."

Sanford Siegel: "There is a contract for the disposal of the cleaning agents with one of the local members of Riverhead, one of the businesses. The cleaning agents are picked up, I believe, on a regular scheduled basis by this firm and

## RESOLUTIONS

#367 OPPOSES FEASIBILITY STUDY FOR OIL REFINERY IN RIVERHEAD  
Councilman Lombardi offered the following resolution which was seconded by Councilman Menendez.

WHEREAS, certain members of this Town Board have been approached by concerned citizens regarding the reports of a study for the establishment of an oil refinery within the boundaries of the Town of Riverhead, and

WHEREAS, this Town Board recognizes the need for light industry and an expanded tax base to alleviate the tax burden on the taxpayers of the Township, and

WHEREAS, events, referendums and expressions of majority public opinion in the past years have indicated the public's desire for light, clean industry, and

WHEREAS, this Town Board respects the public's opinions and desires,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that this Town Board go on record as being in opposition to a feasibility study for the establishment of an oil refinery plant within the boundaries of the Town of Riverhead.

The vote, Prusinowski: "Six months and we're finally to this point. Okay, since April. First of all, going through a three hour or four hour public hearing, listening to a lot of wild statements on both sides, I think it's time that we really get the facts straight.

Number one, I agree with the "Big Three" on energy independence. Everybody wants energy independence. We're too dependent on foreign oil period. That's a national problem. Building an oil refinery in Riverhead, I believe, will not solve that problem. Let's look at some of the facts.

The Department of Energy has recommended to the President as far as their energy program to decontrol the price of oil. They estimated that the oil production would increase 9.1 million barrels per day. What has actually happened is that oil production has been dropping, decreasing 2% a year is down now to 7.1 million barrels per day. I doubt that finding domestic oil to refine in Riverhead's going to be very very difficult.

Let's take a look at the environment. Everybody says about

St. Croix, the Bahamas, Louisiana. I've been in St. Croix, the Bahamas, and I've seen the refineries. True they are environmentally sound and they're clean. They're there for a couple of reasons. They're there because they're close to Venezulean oil, the Panama Canal and the Middle East. They're there because they have different environmental factors. The refinery itself down in St. Croix, I noticed did not pollute the air. What the problem was, when I went jogging on the beach every morning, I came back and my feet were black. One of the guys on the island told me that it's the tankers that leave their oil refinery and wash out their tanks with salt water to cut the oil out of the tanks and just dump it in the ocean. You find all over the beach, little droplets of black oil.

Northville has been a good neighbor. They've done a lot of good for the Town. They're our number one taxpayer. I think as good friends, they're times that we can disagree. As far as taxes, jobs in the economy, there is no one more than I and everybody else on this Town Board, especially the Supervisor, who wants to bring jobs and prosperity to Riverhead, this Town Board is taking stands. We were the first Town Board to vote gainst an estuary sanctuary, because we thought it would take tax money off the payroll — off the taxrolls. We took a stand because we didn't want any more federal intervention. We passed a resolution supporting the coal plants because we needed tax rates. We passed a resolution telling the County Legislature that we don't want anymore park land. So I think this Town Board has taken stands and we're being clouded with facts.

Another thing I strongly disagree with is the political threatening that we're getting from groups. The bosses are telling us what to do. We're getting political pressure. They're back room deals. Like Gerald Ford said last night, that's a lot of baloney.

The point is, in my campaign I wrote an ad, you always have to keep listening to the public. It's my opinion, the majority of the people in the Town just don't want an oil refinery period. You can study things to death. You can take surveys. Lilco conducted a survey and not suprising to me, I majored in communications and the survey came out 68% according to that survey wanted an oil refinery. The support has come on both sides. There are a lot of people for it, there are a lot of people against it.

It leads me to my next personal choice. Being an elected official, there are times that you can reflect your own views, I have lived in this town all my life. I went to St. Johns University in Queens. The environment there I did not particularly like. I choose to come back to Riverhead to live here and make my living. I ran for Town Board because I really want to do something positive for the Town. Times are tough. Money is tight. I think everybody knows that in this room. Will an oil refinery solve the economic problems of Riverhead today? No!

RESOLUTIONS - continuedCouncilman Prusinowski continues:

We need to do things now. We have. We passed an industrial development agency. We're trying to lure business into Town. It's not that easy. This refinery if it was even approved, it would be ten to fifteen years away because of the environmental controls and the public hearings and lawsuits that would surround it. What I say is let's concentrate on getting economic relief that's realistic and compatible to Riverhead now.

My personal view is, I don't want the oil refinery in Riverhead and that's why I'm voting Yes for this resolution."

Councilman Regula: "I honestly feel that I know what the majority of the people of Riverhead want, the quality of life and the direction of development that is desired. I respect the opinion of those many people who signed post cards supporting the study. I sympathize with the desire of people working for the industries involved to protect their jobs. But I honestly wonder if they have thought the entire proposal out. What the long range effect would be on a township only seventy-five square miles big.

A newly formed industrial development agency is in the process of being formed. I would like to suggest that the three industries display their good faith and support their public statements that they are primarily interested in the welfare of Riverhead by donating some of the \$300,000 that the oil refinery study would have cost, to the new industrial development agency. They were willing to spend that amount on a study, this way the money would be put to work for the immediate benefit of the Town and its taxpayers. I hope they consider this proposal seriously. And I vote Yes."

Councilman Lombardi: "I'd like to make a little statement before I vote. It's a little one. First of all, I would like to thank all the people who have taken their time to call me or write me a note voicing their opinion on the oil refinery study. I appreciate their interest and I want to thank Mr. Wilmott for putting my number in the paper. And I really mean that."

Supervisor Janoski: "Can I interrupt John for just a minute. I want to thank you for putting somebody else's phone number in the paper."

Councilman Lombardi: "Many times myself and the other members of the Town Board have many decisions to make. We talk to the people and their difference may be evenly divided which makes our job harder. We have to make our decisions based on our own common sense in hopes that we are doing the best for the people of Riverhead. This resolution has been made easier because the people have made it known that they are opposed to an oil refinery and a study, a study that was being pushed by companies

RESOLUTIONS - continuedCouncilman Lombardi contineus;

who would realize big profits and benefits to themselves. A study that the outcome was already known before it started. And Mr. Janoski, our Supervisor, did not even consult the Town Board, must less the people of Riverhead when he went ahead and approached the "Big Three" on making the study. Remember, Mr. Janoski, no matter what our political affilitations we are service of all the people of Riverhead. We must work together, not as individuals, but as a team to benefit our Town. No study — no refinery. So in accordance with the wishes of the people of Riverhead, I must vote Yes."

Councilman Menendez; "Let me get into this act a little bit. I'll keep this short, though, and to the point.

We all agree, Riverhead must expand its tax base. That is the whole crux of the matter. Light, clean industry would be ideal, or anything that is compatible with our way of life and our environment. An oil refinery, and all that goes with it, is about as bad as you can get and the very bottom of the barrell.

We live here by choice, because it's rural, because it's clean, and because we love it for what it is.

If the proponents of this idea really understood the people of Riverhead, and if they really wanted to enhance the area, rather than make a fast buck, this proposal would never have come up.

The whole concept of a refinery is one whose time has not come, one that is in the wrong place and at the wrong time. Riverhead is one of the smallest towns of Suffolk County, geographically. A refinery would service the entire northeast. So why Riverhead? Why not stick it in Southampton? Why not stick it in Smithtown, in John Klein's home town.

We have listened to both sides. The people have spoken out loud and clear. And being responsive to the will of the majority, and being true to my own conscience, I am against the study. I have to vote Yes."

Supervisor Janoski: "I guess I have to ad lib here. There are a number of things that have passed through my mind since April when this subject first came up. I like to think that I made the move that I made in the best interest of the Town of Riverhead. I like to think that I did it in a very honest and open fashion. Certainly there are a number of things in the resolution that I can whole heartily endorse the idea that we need industry, the idea that we — if I can use the word, use some light industry. When the idea arose, certainly it was probably one of the furthest things from my mind at the time. But I took the view that perhaps it was something that should be looked at.

I have, at no time in these past few months, endorsed or come out in favor of an oil refinery. I have on many occasions said that I think that a study to determine the feasibility is a good idea. I have on many occasion expressed reasons why I

thought it should be looked at. It is easy for me to see as I read the papers and I see a study conducted by the federal government which indicates that in the next few years, there's a three and four chance that we will cut off from mideast oil and I understand as I look at our energy generation compacity, 100% dependent on Opeck oil. I understand that when I look at reports, that our tax base is declining. I understand that when I look at the highest rate is Suffolk County and indeed above the national average why I took the view that I took, that we indeed owe it to ourselves to investigate a possibility and that's all that I have done. I have been the target of some editorial comment, and I am willing to endure that. I believe what I did was right. I believe it's right now and I vote No."

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE PURCHASE AND INSTALLATION OF GASOLINE STORAGE TANKS AND PUMPING FACILITY AT THE MUNICIPAL GARAGE ON ROUTE 58 IN AND FOR THE TOWN OF RIVERHEAD, SUFFOLK COUNTY, NEW YORK, AT A MAXIMUM ESTIMATED COST OF \$85,000 AND AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$85,000 SERIAL BONDS OF SAID TOWN TO PAY THE COST THEREOF.

BE IT RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The purchase and installation of gasoline storage tanks and pumping facility at the Municipal Garage on Route 58, at a maximum estimated cost of \$85,000, is hereby authorized.

Section 2. The maximum estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is \$85,000, and the plan for the financing thereof is by the issuance of \$85,000 serial bonds of said Town, hereby authorized to be issued pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Further details concerning said bonds will be prescribed in a further resolution or resolutions of this Town Board.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probably usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is five years, pursuant to subdivision 35 of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will not exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond

anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance and sale of the serial bonds herein authorizes, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year. There shall annually be levied on all the taxable real property in said Town a tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same become due and payable.

Section 6. The validity of such bonds and bond anticipation notes may be contested only if:

- 1) Such obligations are authorized for an object or purpose for which said Town is not authorized to expend money, or
- 2) The provisions of law which should be complied with at the date of publication of this resolution are not substantially complied with,

and an action, suit or proceeding contesting such validity is commenced within twenty days after the date of such publication, or

- 3) Such obligations are authorized in violation of the provisions of the Constitution.

Section 7. This resolution, which shall take effect immediately shall be published in full in the News-Review, the official newspaper, together with a notice of the Town Clerk in substantially the form provided in Section 81.00 of the Local Finance Law.


Bill Nohejl: "All right. May I ask you another question? Is there any other skeletons in the closet that need airing out?"
