Supervisor Janoski: "Under unfinished business, a special permit application from Riverhead Airpark for a general aviation airport is presently before the Planning Board.

Riverhead Flagg Corp., change of zone and special permit for condominiums will be the subject of three resolutions this evening calling for public hearings.

Supervisor Janoski continues:

Ferdinand Gallo, Jr., special permit to operate fish market on East Main Street is before the Planning Board.

Peter Richard site plan for curb cut-out at retail store on Route 58, Riverhead will be approved by resolution tonight.

There are some eight minutes remaining until the first public hearing. I would recognize anyone who wishes to be heard on any matter. Cathy Casey."

Cathy Casey, Wading River; "First I would like to apologize to the Board for not coming forward two weeks ago at the public hearing with regards to — and please correct me if I'm wrong, the \$285,000 federal grant that is to be received, I believe in January of 1983. I would also like to take this opportunity to make a suggestion, however, I would first like to apologize to Mr. Kasperovich for not joining him two weeks ago in speaking out about our water problems particularly to my awareness in the Town of Wading River where those who are not aware of it. We have several homeowners who've been advised by the Health Department not to drink nor cook with their water from their wells because they have been contaminated by temik and nitrates.

Therefore, gentlemen, I would like to make my suggestion for investing the \$285,000 in correcting the water contamination problems in the Town of Riverhead, not strictly in the community of Wading River. I would also suggest, and please correct me, Mr. Janoski, if I'm wrong, that it also — any additional monies that may be necessary, also, be invested in correcting the contaminants that are leaching into our ground water from the Riverhead Town Dump. Is that not correct?"

Supervisor Janoski: "There is a leachaide into the ground from the dump. We have been testing, in cooperation with the County and putting in test wells. The "plume" as it's called, has not moved. As a matter of fact, we find that what was previously thought that the plume would probably move out towards the sound and underneath the sound and not contaminate the source of ground water. However, there are many moves on the part of State Government. As a matter of fact, this past year a bill was passed by both houses vetoed by the Governor which would require the closing of all land-fill sites on Long Island. I udnerstand the need for this kind of Legislation, however, the one piece that's missing really, it's two-fold. One, the State very often passes Legislation for which they bear no financial responsibility, nor do they provide the answer to the question, what do we then do with the solid waste otherwise known as garbage?"

Supervisor Janoski continues:

I attended a conference this past Saturday, and you probably read about it in the paper, with Senator Moynihan concerning just this topic of ground water. And a — what the bottom line of what I said was, it's fine. We understand the problems concerning water on Long Island but the Town of Riverhead or any eastern town that you wish to be your water shed — well, then you've got to find a way to finance our schools and our towns because of your not wanting us to develop economically. And that's what it comes down to. The Town of Riverhead is a small town with a budget right now of 6.5 million dollars, cannot consider expenditures of three or four million on top of what we already raise. And so that in cooperation with the State, and I hope they would recognize in the Federal Government their financial responsibility, as far as the Federal Revenue Sharing Funds in solving the problem. I don't know if I could put in a mile of pipe for \$285,000, of course, I think Zahn is here somewhere. He could probably tell us how much pipe we could put in for that much money. We're talking about a multi-million dollar expenditure to try to expand the water district. And every year, we are expanding it further and further as our finances will allow."

Cathy Casey: "Well, I think I sympathize with what you're saying. However, I think where we're losing our perspective, as we are talking about human life and health, therefore, in my opinion this should have priority number one and perhaps other items of improving the appearances of buildings as was suggested two weeks ago, perhaps fixing sidewalks that are not totally going to cause or likely to cause someone to be seriously injured. I think the revenues if we really search for it and we really decide which is our horse and which is our cart and I think our lives and our health, if we don't have that we don't need sidewalks. There will be no Town of Riverhead. It will die altogether. Therefore, in my opinion, this should have priority number one at this particular time and for all time for the children that also live here. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. There are about three minutes remaining until the first public — Mr. Nohejl."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "Are the policemen giving out tickets now or are they still on the educations program?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "No, they are giving out summonses in those areas which have been properly marked with No parking, stopping, standing, fire zone."

Bill Nohejl: "And they — it's been a remarkable difference since it has started. Still, some of them just ignore it. But just tonight I see a policeman putting something on a windshield and I was wondering if it was educational or actually a situation?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Well the education has taken a different form now."

Bill Nohejl: "Good. But it's very, very — it's going very well in Wading River."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill."

Councilman Lombardi: "That's one for us."

Supervisor Janoski: "There are two minutes remaining until the first scheduled public hearing. Would anybody wish to address the Town Board on any matter?"

No one else wished to be heard at this time.

Supervisor Janoski: "Let the record show that the hour of 7:45 P.M. has arrived. The Town Clerk will please read a notice of public hearing."

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, October 5, 1982 at 7:45 P.M. to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed change of zone on Sound Avenue, Riverhead, New York for Industrial A to Agriculture A.

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "The sequence of events which lead up to tonight's public hearing is first of all, the existence of an industrial zoned area on Sound Avenue which is a historical corridor which is about a mile in length and is about 500 feet in depth off the road on the north and south. This area is surrounded, of course, by agriculturally zoned land. It occurred to us and it occurred to me and the members of the Town Board, that perhaps we should investigate the situation and did call upon our consultants of Raymond, Pine, Parrish, and Weiner, to do a study of the situation and make recommendations to the Town Board, at the same time asking the Planning Board of the Town of Riverhead to do likewise. The report has been finished and the recommendation has been made and justification for an upzoning of that area from Industrial A to Agricultural A. The purpose of this hearing which is necessary in changes of zone is to allow for input by residents of the community regarding the proposed up-zoning from Industrial A to Agricultural A on that strip on Sound Avenue.

Does anybody wish to address the Town Board on this matter? That being the case, I declare the hearing closed."

No one wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 7:46 P.M.

MOTOR VEHICLE REPAIR SHOP - The business use of premises, the sole purpose of which is the repair or replacement of the mechanically functioning parts of motor vehicles.

Under Phase II, the County Legislature authorized ten million dollars to purchase an additional amount of acreage in this program. They're trying to buy property in Huntington, Smithtown, for political reasons because they needed eleven votes on the legislature to get the bond passed.

In addition, other properties were under consideration, the Southampton Town, the Southold and Riverhead. The Town Board authorized me last year to have the Town of Riverhead participate in Phase II for another nine hundred ninety six acres which represented more requests from farmers. Under Phase II, we have contracted four hundred fifty acres additional which will be included into this program, five hundred acres more are under negotiation. The Town of Riverhead will fulfill its commitment on Phase II.

What this resolution is all about is that in the Phase II over six million dollars of rejections have come from property owners on the east end, mainly from Southold Town and Southampton Town. The County Committee legislature and the County Executive is very anxious to purchase more property. I would say, the majority of additional requests over this thousand acres is from the Town of Riverhead. Now we have a lot of property off our tax rolls. We have most of the farmers in the ag district program, but on top of that with the type of growth that we have on our

tax base which is not as much as Southampton Town, we cannot take the chance, that if the Courts, any part of the Courts are moved out of Riverhead that we cannot take the chance to hurt the Town economically any more. So until the issue is resolved, we will not participate in any additional acreage to be purchased, which with there is over six million dollars available now. So they will have to look to the other Towns. But just so there's no misunderstanding, I know some of the reporters, we are seventy percent of the program right now. I vote Yes."

PROJECT SUMMARY:

The applicants, Frank Bianchini, J. Staton Pohl and Neil M. Rego, propose to construct a 300 unit condominium complex including access roads, parking areas and tennis courts.

The project site is located on the east side of Oakleigh Avenue, north of Sound Avenue, Baiting Hollow, Town of Riverhead, New York.

A feature of the project is that the usual amenities which accompany development of this sort such as tennis courts and swimming pool are already present as part of the existing Flagg Country Club. An 18 hole golf course is an added feature which will be retained (some modifications may be necessary).

While buildings must be designed for year-round occupancy, it is anticipated that use will be on a recreational or a second home basis. The greatest occupancy is expected during the summer season.

Approximately 600 parking spaces will be provided. The total area to be covered by impervious surfaces will be about 6 acres. The remaining open space will be 185 acres of 96.8±% of the total of 191±% acres.

The subject parcel includes 1620± l.f. of shoreline facing Long Island Sound. No alteration to the shoreline or bluffs behind it will occur.

It is planned to create four "clusters" of residential units each served by its own parking area. Individual units will range in size from 1400-1800 square feet.

Applicants conclude that the project will not have an adverse impact upon the environment as it satisfied local zoning, will allow most of the land to remain as is, has an adequate water supply and will not interfere with the bluffs facing Long Island Sound.

Richard Ehlers: "I do know of at least one property owner that called the Town Attorney's Office and requested an opinion as to the effect and we did give him an opinion, in writing, so that there has been some discussion in the neighborhood there, that I am aware of."

Clark McCombe: "Okay, I just was surprised that no one showed up to speak about it or say something in support of it. I have a little suggestion."

Supervisor Janoski: "I did have certain people notified up in that area. I can think of a number of names, but that's not necessary, but my office contacted three or four people who would be interested in the public hearing."

Clark McCombe: "Would it be possible in the News Review or where it has on the inside page there, the dates of the public hearings to list what the public hearings are. It would only take an extra two or three lines so if it says Town Board Meeting on Tuesday nights, that it could say change of zoning or whatever the public hearing may be on Flagg Condominiums or whatever. Or is that going to be too expensive to do that?"

Councilman Boschetti: "All of the public hearings are listed in the legal notices."

Clark McCombe: "I understand that, but I wonder how many people read the legal notices? It just would be an extra line like is on the Agenda here."

Councilman Artale: "Well it would be an extra seven lines. The last Board Meeting, seven public hearings."

Clark McCombe: "So it would be too difficult to do that. Because I know tonight is an exception. Tonight is an exception, with so many people here. But usually at the Town Board Meetings there are a lot of empty seats."

Supervisor Janoski: "Say something, say something."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Prusinowski: "Clark, I've lived in Riverhead all my life, okay, and I know that when there is an issue that effects a large amount of people, everybody knows about it, okay. Now you take this particular issue was well written in the newspapers and I know of a couple of the farmers up there. I think everybody knew about it because there was a story in Suffolk Life, there was a story in the News Review and the Traveler Watchman. It's been on the radio. The reason why some people don't come to the public hearings is: a) is because they're not opposed to it, so they don't think they have to go out and say, I'm for it. Most people who show up, say I'm against it. Or if it's a very hot issue, both sides will show up and try to outdo each other. But I think most of the times, most people do know what the issues are. I'll agree some of the public notices are on the sewer district are complicated. . ."

Clark McCombe: "The small cities grants, I mean how many people knew about that? And how many people go through the legal notices trying to find out when these hearings are."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well we took out display ads for that. You have — by the law, the Federal Government makes you take out displays ads. In fact, this resolution we passed tonight, Clark, there'll be display ads in the newspapers. Prominent displays. Not legal notices. Display ads outlining the appropriation for the federal monies. All the federal monies, the HUD monies, I'm sorry Federal Revenue Sharing HUD, you must take out display ads."

Clark McCombe: "Okay."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay?"

Clark McCombe: "I just had thought on that extra . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "The idea that's at work here, Clark, is that the Town does designate THE official newspaper of the Town, which in this case happens to be THE News Review and people that know that anything that's going on in town government does appear in legal notices."

Clark McCombe: "And people should read the legal notices. . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Absolutely."

Clark McCombe: "Right."

Dick Benedict, Fanning Blvd., Riverhead; "And that now we've been awarded a contract for \$55,000.00 to fix a sump which Holzmacher, McLendon and Murrell designed and built, which collapsed the first rainfall, I was just wondering what legal action is being taken and how far along we are?"

Dick Benedict: "They were not allowed to mitigate their expenses or their losses is what you're saying?"

Dick Benedict: "They didn't attempt to bid on it, because Doctor's Path will probably be higher."

That independent engineer did provide the design in specs and it did go out to bid which we awarded tonight. But H2M is not a construction company. They do not do the actual work."

Dick Benedict: "Okay. Have this Town Board or any Town Board ever considered hiring Civil Engineers for the Town of Riverhead?"

Supervisor Janoski: "It has come up in conversation from time to time."

Dick Benedict: "Some of the mistakes that we've had over the past years, it may pay us to look into that. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

Cathy Casey, Wading River; "One quick question. What — why is Mr. Sullivan going back to the Planning Board?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Because we have been directed. Go on."

Richard Ehlers, Town Attorney: "He took an Article 78 proceeding and the Justice has made a decision remanding the case back to the Town for further findings of fact. So that . . ."

Cathy Casey: "So what does that tell me?"

Richard Ehlers: "It tells you that he wants a more complete record before he can make a decision in the case so we're not done with the case yet. You may have to have more public hearings or not at your own opinion."

Cathy Casey: "At my own opinion or within the Law?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Richard Ehlers: "Well, I'll be discussing it with the Planning Board."

Cathy Casey: "With the Planning Board?"

Richard Ehlers: "Right."

Cathy Casey: "And either through their notices or your notices — I mean — I'm going to find out other than in the paper that you did or did not allow this man to take that mess and enlarge it."

Richard Ehlers: "Oh, very much so. You'll have the opportunity to speak. That's what the Justice wants. He wants more testimony by residents in the area as to what the adverse impact is on the area so that he can formulate a decision. He needs basis."

Cathy Casey: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Jim."

Jim Cooper, President of the Wading River Senior Citizens; "I came up here with my group of Senior Citizens and I primarily — because all we had heard through the past few months was rumors and rumors were flying from all directions. However, when I got here tonight, it has now proven that it is not a rumor. Although to your knowledge this thing was started on June the 24th and I have spoken to you, Mr. Janoski, I'm addressing. On many occasions, you didn't even show myself or the Senior Citizens Club the courtesy to say that this situation was going on.

Now, I think as President of the Club and with the members here who are, and as you can see, are no chickens — none of us are chickens, we had to bring these people out tonight to try and get something resolved. In the meantime, I have been handed a slip by someone in here, I got it, I requested it, and it says September 30, 1982, Town Board, Riverhead, New York, 11901.

Sirs: This is to formalize our oral request on June 24, 1982 for Riverhead Town Sponsorship of an additional Senior Citizens Association at Camp DeWolfe, Wading River. The new Association will be titled Tri-Town Senior Citizens Club. Since membership will be open primarily to Baiting Hollow, Calverton,

and Wading River residents, which is, by the way, the territory that was assigned to the Wading River Senior Citizens Club, who have reached the required minimum age of sixty years. We further request:

- 1) that you initiate the necessary procedures to secure (a) the Charter required for such club and (b) a certificate authorizing it tax free privilege, and
 - 2) that you reserve the Community Center Building at Camp DeWolfe for the use of this club on Tuesday from September 15th to June 15th, during the hours 9 AM to 5 PM;
- (a) that the members of this club be authorized participation in all other activities sponsored by the Town which are appropriated for Senior Citizens, and (b) that the customary pro-rate funding be authorized.

Please advise us as to when you can meet with representatives of this association to discuss pertinent matters.

I would like to get an explanation as to — I did get some information and you have down there that sponsorship by the Riverhead Town. I have been told at this point and I always felt that the Riverhead Town sponsored the Wading River Senior Citizens. However, I learned here tonight that they do not sponsor any club. Is that right?"

Supervisor Janoski: "They recognize the existence of Club through State Funds, funnel that — those monies to those Clubs which are recognized in the Town of Riverhead."

Jim Cooper: "But you are not sponsoring a club?"

Supervisor Janoski: "I don't know I guess to some extent one might say that we sponsor — it depends on what you mean. We don't regulate the clubs, we recognize . . ."

Jim Cooper: "Well, recognizing and sponsoring are two different things. You, as the Supervisor, should make up your mind as to whether you're recognizing a club or are you sponsoring a club?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Well to the extent that we funnel State monies to you, let us say that we sponsor you."

Jim Cooper: "All right. Well then, evidently the members of your Board are not aware of this fact, number one. Number two, and I quote State Law on this, if you belong to one club in a Town, you cannot belong to the second club. Now, do you know anything about that?"

Supervisor Janoski: "That was a discussion that was held today. There were a number of different points of view. We don't have a final — we don't have a final answer to that question, yet."

Jim Cooper: "Well, I can give you a final answer because I called LaValle's Office. So I got it from LaValle's Office that no Township in Suffolk County can sponsor two clubs — can fund two clubs or can, primarily, they cannot be members of both clubs. In other words, you have to join one club or the other. Plus the fact that how do you intend to follow this rule by letting me, as the President of the Club, which you felt that you wanted to completely ignore up until this point, knowing what was going on, and just take the whole group. In other words, we have a large group of people, they are a very substantial group of people in this Town, and I think as the Town Supervisor, that you should be creating harmony in a group like this instead of creating — instead of entertaining disharmony. If a person does not get elected to office, is that a reason for them to start another club, and be sponsored by the Town? Now you're saying it's sponsored and I'm holding you to that sponsorship. Do you think sitting in that chair, as the Supervisor of this Town, that you are being fair to the Senior Citizens of Wading River Senior Citizens Club, in doing what you did right here?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Ah, Mr. Cooper, my record and record of those people up here with regard to Senior Citizens in this Town is well known and I will stand on that record. If there's anyone in this room who is creating disharmony, Sir. I would suggest that perhaps you are doing your bit. This Town Board does not in any way regulate . . ."

Jim Cooper: "I'm not saying the Town Board."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Cooper, I listened to you, now you will listen to me, please."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedJim Cooper: "okay, all right."

Supervisor Janoski: "We do not regulate Senior Citizens Clubs. If you want to play a game with words, that's fine. I will say sponsor — Mr. Cooper, please. If a group of citizens of the Town of Riverhead wish to establish a club in this Town, we have no mechanism with which to deny them that right. If you will point out to me a mechanism by which we might do so, I will be happy to talk to you about it.

Secondly, the designated area which you claim for Wading River is, does not hold true because any citizen of the entire Town of Riverhead can become a member of the Wading River Senior Citizens Club."

Unidentified voices from the audience: "No, no."

Jim Cooper: "Oh no. Oh no. Oh no. We have a contract from the Recreation Department, Mr. Janoski, giving us the area of Calverton, Baiting Hollow and Wading River. . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "That is the area that you cover, but legally with the monies that are uses, you cannot deny participation. I don't even know why this is an issue. You cannot deny participation to any member."

Jim Cooper: "I'm not saying that. But you're saying you're sponsoring it, and one person says, no we don't sponsor a club, and somebody else — you're telling me you do. So what I want to get straightened out, are you sponsoring — are funds going to be taken away from us, and if it is, is it going to be done on a pro rata basis of how many is in the club? After all, we could have a hundred, we could have one hundred and fifty. We could have fifty, depending on how many is in the club. But by the same token, I can tell you the State Law does not allow any member here to be funded for two clubs."

Supervisor Janoski: "I tend to agree with your definition, or your understanding of the law. It is — it would be my understanding that any person who lives or resides within the boundaries of the Town of Riverhead can join any club that he or she desires to join."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedUnidentified voices from the audience: "Nooooo."

Supervisor Janoski: "But cannot belong. That would be my opinion."

Jim Cooper: "Okay, okay."

Stanley Grodski, Supt. of Recreation Dept.; "The States says now, and the clubs have been notified, for many reasons, that anyone living in the Town of Riverhead is eligible to join the Wading River Club. Anyone living in Calverton can join the Riverhead Club and we cannot deny areas. Anyone living in Riverhead is entitled to join any club whether it is the Wading River Club or the Riverhead Club. Now the people — the people are going by the by-laws that we set. But I'm telling you now, it's going to be changed. Not by me, it's the State Law people — by the State Law. I know that hasn't, I just told you it hasn't. Yes. All right. So the law says — the State — the Office of the Aging says that anyone is allowed to join."

Jim Cooper: "I'd like to ask you a question, Stan. Can they join more than one club?"

Stanley Grodski: "I only want one person in one club. That's my opinion."

Jim Cooper: "All right. Then we're straight on that. ."

Supervisor Janoski: "That's my opinion. I agree with you."

Jim Cooper: "So they'll be one person in one club and if you want to entertain . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Please, wait a minute. Ladies and gentlemen, please let's try and keep some order. I'm delighted that you're all here tonight, but let's try to keep some order so that we can get this properly recorded."

Jim Cooper: "All right."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "If one person speaks at a time."

Jim Cooper: "Right. I just want to go on record in saying, that as President of the Club for three years and going on to my fourth, and believe me, I had asked Nora Brewer if she wanted to take the Presidency, and she declined.

Now as you know, you sent a letter out in May to me — you sent a letter out to me in May to tell me, to live up to the rules of the club. The letter was addressed to my home. It was — inside it was addressed to the Wading River Senior Citizens Club.

Dear Senior Citizen Members — and I have the letter with me, if you want me to read the whole thing I will read it. And at that time I called you, and spoke to you and then you come along now — and the other day when I called you or you called me on Wednesday and said you were gonna call me back and make an appointment for me to come up before this meeting, I didn't receive the courtesy of a call to come to you."

Supervisor Janoski: "My recollection of that is that is that we set an appointment for Monday and I was waiting for you."

Jim Cooper: "No we didn't. So your recollection's wrong. So . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Now ladies and gentlemen — ladies and gentlemen, please. I believe myself to be an honest man and I resent being called a liar and . . ."

Jim Cooper: "I don't think anybody has called you a liar. I didn't call you a liar."

Supervisor Janoski: "I heard the word liar out there. But . . ."

Jim Cooper: "Well, I think that you will realize that by what you're doing is disrupting the club."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Cooper, what am I doing? Would you please tell me that?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Jim Cooper: "By even allowing somebody to do this."

Supervisor Janoski: "How is it, Mr. Cooper, that I can deny a group of taxpaying citizens in this Town the opportunity to form a club if they so wish it?"

Jim Cooper: "All right, you can't, you can't. But I think that I should of at least, or the club should of at lease had the — your courtesy to at least tell us what was going on."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Cooper."

Jim Cooper: "Not to have all hearsay. I came up here and I called the people, told the people last week at the meeting to come up because everything at that point was hearsay. It was only until yesterday afternoon that I knew that this was not hearsay. That this was fact."

Supervisor Janoski: "In what respect?"

Jim Cooper: "Well, the new club being formed. . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Welcome to the . . ."

Jim Cooper: "And this thing is dated June the 24th. What happened between June the 24th and October the 5th?"

Supervisor Janoski: "That was put on my desk today and I think it was delivered . . ."

Jim Cooper: "This was put . . ."

Unidentified voices from the audience was inaudible.

Supervisor Janoski: "What's stamped on there?"

Jim Cooper: "This is dated September 30th. The request is from June 24th and it's date stamped October 4th — October 1st at 4:00 P.M."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "All right, Mrs. Town Clerk, will you inform the people who don't believe us, when we got that letter, please?"

Irene J. Pendzick, Town Clerk: "Let me get the original. It was put on my desk yesterday afternoon."

Supervisor Janoski: "The Town Clerk has informed us that that letter was put on her desk yesterday afternoon. I understand it was hand delivered."

Jim Cooper: "But I'm saying that the whole idea of the club was started on June the 24th. And it shows it right here."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Mr. Cooper there was nothing in writing until today. I found it on my desk today."

Jim Cooper: "You found it, but the date was made — in other words Nora Brewer and Henry Pfeifer made the request on June the 24th. It's right here in plain english."

Supervisor Janoski: "Uh Mr. Brewer, uh Mr. Brewer — phew — Mr. Cooper, I am going to say to you and I hope that you will understand this. That the first — any member of the Town Board saw of that letter was today and that is not . . ."

Jim Cooper: "I'm not saying — I'm not saying you didn't, but how come the letter is dated June the 24th?"

Supervisor Janoski: "You would have to ask — and I really don't want to start a controversy, the author of that letter."

Irene J. Pendzick, Town Clerk: "I think there's some confusion. The letter is not dated June 24th. The letter is dated September 30. It refers to an oral request."

Jim Cooper: "It refers to an oral request of June 24th, and you certainly had to be aware of it, at that point."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "There have been discussions about Wading River."

Jim Cooper: "I know it dates back to May and I could go back further if you want me to."

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay."

Jim Cooper: "I could also read your letter that you wrote to me in May, if you want me to?"

Supervisor Janoski: "You seem to want to read the letter, and if you want to . . ."

Jim Cooper: "I think of it as my duty to read the letter to the people in the club and then I'd have you call me and tell me that I'm bad mouthing you. I'm not bad mouthing you, I am telling facts. And I have no doubts, or no qualms with the Board. I feel that the Board doing what they can only do and I want everybody on this Board, John, Vic, Vince, and Lou to know that I have no malice or anything against you. However, I do think that you, as the Town Supervisor, should have at least had something to say to me. To at least have my side of the story and have the side of the story of the majority of the Wading River Senior Citizen Club."

Unidentified speaker from the audience was inaudible.

Supervisor Janoski: "Good. Mr. Cooper, you have evidently done one hell of a job here. The letter that I wrote to you was with regard to the age requirements of a member of the Senior Citizens Club."

Jim Cooper: "That's right."

Supervisor Janoski: "I don't see anything wrong with my advising you as to what was . . ."

Jim Cooper: "Well I think you could have called me down to see what the story was. In other words, this was the beginning of the fermentation point."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "And also the last."

Jim Cooper: "And I think that you could have had the courtesy to call me down as President of the Club to get my side of the story. Don't take a one-sided thing. . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill?"

Jim Cooper: "If you had to get a divorce — I'm going to listen to your side and I'm going to listen to your wife's side."

Supervisor Janoski: "Are you going to listen to my side?"

Jim Cooper: "Yes."

Supervisor Janoski: "Good. Would you please. Mr. Cooper what I'll do in a situation like this . . ."

Jim Cooper: "I used to be Jim, but I guess I'm not Jim any more."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well, uh — is . . ."

Jim Cooper: "You can't even look up and talk to me."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Cooper . . ."

Unidentified voices from the audience were inaudible.

Jim Cooper: "Would you mind making it Jim, as you always did before this night?"

Supervisor Jansoki: "Sure, Jim."

Jim Cooper: "Even if you don't mean it, say it."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Are we finished playing games?"

Jim Cooper: "Sure. Well I'm not playing games. You're playing games, not me."

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay. When a question is raised concerning any question of legality, it is my usual course to consult with the Town Attorney. After such an answer is given to the question that's raised, I inform the necessary people of what the actual fact is. In your case, it happened to be a letter addressed to you. Now, no discussion that we would have could change the age of the person in question. I mean, you could tell me from now until . . ."

Jim Cooper: "I'm not talking about that. I'm talking about the fact that you knew since June the 24th that this was on the agenda. And I think, at that point, you should have at least given me the courtesy to call me down and say Jim, would you come down and discuss this with me before it becomes an issue?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Actually Jim, I told you in my last conversation with you which was last week that, I, and the Town Board of this Town, do not want to become embroiled in the internal . . ."

Jim Cooper: "I don't say you should. But you are through — you might not want to be, but you have gotten yourself into it. And maybe you don't think you have, but you certainly have gotten yourself into it. And that's why these people here, I would say, that the majority of the people in here are with me."

Supervisor Janoski: "Have you done anything yourself to try to rectify the split that has developed?"

Jim Cooper: "Yes I did."

Supervisor Janoski: "What have you done Mr. Cooper — Jim?"

Jim Cooper: "I, do you want this as a public discussion? I will . . ."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "This is a public discussion. You've got the members of the Press. You've got a couple of other people from . . ."

Jim Cooper: "All right. I will tell you that when the first discussion started and this was when I, in other words, we had appointed Trustees for four appointed Trustees. On my first term in office, I appointed four new Trustees. After two years, I felt that two of them should move and two of them should stay. So the first thing I did wrong, evidently was when I removed Henry Pfeifer from the Board. And this started a big fuss which was not necessary at all. Now after the fact, Henry Pfeifer and Nora Brewer and I sat down in Nora Brewer's house, discussed the situation and we all shook hands. There would be no more problems. However, they saw fit to continue it. Now I'll go a little further in telling you that when I ran for President for the fourth time, I asked Nora Brewer if she wanted to be the President, she said no I don't. I can also tell you that I had turned down two people to run for that office and I told Nora that I had down two people. However, when your letter came in and I read that letter, these people all saw red. And I don't think that this was, in other words, at this point, this was what made the whole thing go the way it did."

Supervisor Janoski: "Are you referring to the letter about the age requirement?"

Jim Cooper: "That's right. That's right."

Supervisor Janoski: "Would you read it because I don't see anything inflammatory about a letter that says you have to be sixty years old."

Jim Cooper: "Well, in other words, it's telling me to live up to the by-laws and I lived up to them. And Herman Ehlers called me at 9 o'clock that morning, originally when I called you, you told me — at first I couldn't get you on three or four occasions. One time, you were in the building and then all of a sudden you disappeared. Another time . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Just a minute Mr. Cooper. Look it — I'm not going to take any of this bull from you."

Jim Cooper: "This isn't . . ."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Now wait a minute. These little digs . . ."

Jim Cooper: "You're asking me . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Cooper I have listened to you, now you're going to listen to me. I perform my job in this Town and I don't want anybody saying — Mr. Cooper, please. I spend fourteen, fifteen hours a day in this job and don't you ever indicate that I am not doing it, Sir."

Jim Cooper: "I'm not . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Then stop with the bull and let's get to the point. What do you want? I am trying to do a job . . ."

Unidentified voices from the audience ohhhhhh.

Jim Cooper: "Oh come on. I mean you're using me as a whipping board up here."

Supervisor Janoski: "What are you doing to me, Mr. Cooper? I am trying . . ."

Jim Cooper: "I'm telling facts."

Unidentified voices from the audience "you asked for it."

Jim Cooper: "I'm telling facts. I'm telling facts."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Cooper, please continue. I'm sorry."

Jim Cooper: "Now we met and we decided that we would make peace. We, the three of us shook hands. However, this still continued on. Now as I told you, I turned down two people for running for office for Vice President and I told this

to Nora, and if she gets up and wants to admit it. . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "What does the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead have to do . . ."

Jim Cooper: "Well you're telling me to tell the story now."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Cooper. . ."

Jim Cooper: "Do you want it or don't you?"

Supervisor Janoski: "We don't want to be involved in the internal conflicts."

Jim Cooper: "Well you're just asking me to tell the story. So would you rather I sat down?"

Supervisor Janoski: "I would like to find out what's in that letter that is so inflamatory. I'd like to find out why we're all here today because really the Town Board is . . ."

Jim Cooper: "Well, I guess there's no sense in me talking any more because you have your mind made up."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Mr. Cooper."

Jim Cooper: "And I have mine."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Mr. Cooper, excuse me."

Jim Cooper: "Yes Vic."

Councilman Prusinowski: "We had a request — why don't you just read the letter? Okay. So we can all hear what's in it. Okay, obviously the letter. . ."

Jim Cooper: "Here is the letter dated May 18th. The outer envelope is addressed to Mr. James Cooper, President of the Wading River Senior Citizen Club, Ramblewood Park, G14 Calverton, New York 11933. The inside of the letter is dated May the 18th, 1982, Wading River Senior Citizen Club, Camp DeWolfe, Wading River, New York 11792.

Dear Members of the Wading River Senior Citizens Club. Now this is my duty as the President of the club to read this to the members. I read this to them and here it is.

As you know your Constitution and By-laws require that all members and office holders of your association be at least sixty years of age. While the enforcement of your Constitution and By-laws is primarily a matter of your concern, I must take this opportunity to elaborate on the necessity of the minimum age requirements for membership. Through State grants received by the Riverhead Recreation Department, Riverhead Town sponsors Arts and Crafts, Bingo, Movies, Guest Speakers, Wood carving and sewing classes, bus trips and other recreational programs for senior citizens of the Town of Riverhead. These funds are provided under the program and administrative regulations of the State of Recreation Program for the elderly. This program specifically provides that a Municipality open to all Town Residents of sixty years of age or over. I must stress that our ability to receive and pass State funds to your organization depends on your compliance with the Constitution and by-laws, particularly those provisions prohibiting membership or holding of office of any person less than sixty years of age. The Town of Riverhead wholeheartedly supports your organization.

Please help us to continue to obtain State funds by carefully following your Constitution.

And this was read to the people. Now, this was over the fact that there was a woman taken into the club, prior to my being the President of the club, dating back to probably 1957 or '56, '77 or '76, I don't know the exact date. In the meantime, we changed the By-laws in February of 1980, I believe, and we made the requirement sixty years of age or if one spouse is over sixty, the other spouse can be an Associate Member. And your Town Attorney called me on the day of the meeting and told me that I said — we took her name off the ballot, did everything legally after this letter, and because this woman had been on the Board and had been on the Board at the sanction of Henry Pfeifer and Nora Brewer before, as a person who was in the club and for one year she kept all the things — I don't know why you're shaking your head Joe because . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "I don't know."

Jim Cooper: "This is all fact."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Well I really don't know."

Jim Cooper: "If you don't think, in other words, if you're saying that I'm going around bad mouthing you and somebody said that I was bad mouthing the Town Board and I want you fellows up there to know that I am not bad mouthing you fellows."

Councilman Artale: "Mr. Cooper, can I ask you a question?"

Jim Cooper: "Yes."

Councilman Artale: "What do you find wrong with that letter?"

Jim Cooper: "What do I find wrong with it?"

Councilman Artale: "Absolutely."

Jim Cooper: "Well somebody had to come up here and get this started without, in other words, it's a trouble thing. That's what it is. There's no need for it in the first place. If Joe had called me, all he had to do was give me a call on the telephone. And he admitted that on the phone to me, too. I called him after and I said Joe, you didn't have to write this letter. All you had to do was call me. And Joe admitted it to me on the phone, if he remembers."

Supervisor Janoski: "I guess you got me that time, huh?"

Jim Cooper: "All right."

Councilman Artale: "I personally find that letter explanatory. Period."

Jim Cooper: "Explanatory, yes. But the whole thing could have been stopped, Vince. The whole thing could have been stopped. It didn't have to come to this point. That's what I'm at."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedSupervisor Janoski: "It wasn't . . ."

Councilman Boschetti: "Jim is this, correct me if I'm wrong, but I'm starting to get the implication that perhaps there's a personality conflict here."

Jim Cooper: "Yes, there is. That's definitely what it is. Yeah, definitely."

Councilman Boschetti: "Well, should a personality conflict really be the subject of discussion or consideration of the Town Board."

Jim Cooper: "Well, I don't think it should and I don't think it should be the reason for starting a new Club. Well that's what I'm at . . ."

Councilman Boschetti: "Yeah, but I . . ."

Jim Cooper: "If we are going to as a club that functions properly, if we are going to lose funds by another club starting up from the Town of Riverhead, I don't think it's fair."

Councilman Boschetti: "Jim, this is still the U.S. of A."

Jim Cooper: "I know that."

Councilman Boschetti: "We have no authority to tell any person that they cannot form a club of their own."

Jim Cooper: "I — in a group. Also if I had asked you before, you probably would have said no, we don't sponsor a club. Now, Joe is saying they sponsor. . ."

Councilman Boschetti: "Well, I think that's really a matter of simantics. If you say sponsor, you mean only to the extent — only to the extent that we channel State funds to clubs . . ."

Jim Cooper: "Right."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Boschetti: "To provide Senior Citizen activities. . ."

Jim Cooper: "Right Lou."

Councilman Boschetti: "That could be one club, that that could be ten clubs."

Jim Cooper: "That's right. That's right."

Councilman Boschetti: "Well, that's all we're trying to say."

Jim Cooper: "I'm not worried about that. But I am concerned with the fact that how are you going to keep track. In other words, by State law, there can only be a person in one club in the Baiting — in any — in our environment."

Councilman Boschetti: "That's right. That's right."

Jim Cooper: "Right."

Councilman Boschetti: "This is for funding, for funding purposes, that's correct."

Jim Cooper: "And this is why I want to get down to the plain facts of the funding. They say pro rata. I've heard — now what does pro rata mean? Does that mean by the number of people that we have in the club? We will get so much. In other words, the Town has \$1,000 to spend and I have three (the tape ended). . ."

(At this time the tape was changed and started with Councilman Boschetti)

Councilman Boschetti: ". . . let me just clarify something."

Jim Cooper: "Yeah."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Boschetti: "You can start clubs every year. There's nothing preventing it."

Jim Cooper: "Okay."

Councilman Boschetti: "Maybe the members of your group are somewhat angry because there seems to be a personality conflict."

Jim Cooper: "There is. There's definitely."

Councilman Boschetti: "And maybe they're angry because a certain number of their own membership is going to form this new group. But certainly that's really . . ."

Jim Cooper: "I don't care."

Councilman Boschetti: "That's a matter for — you know . . ."

Jim Cooper: "It doesn't bother me."

Councilman Boschetti: "Yourself as President. . ."

Jim Cooper: "I'll be getting rid of a headache."

Councilman Boschetti: "Jim, Jim, may I finish please?"

Jim Cooper: "Yeah."

Councilman Boschetti: "That's really a matter for you, as President, to resolve and your club officers. You're asking the Town Board to get involved in an internal affair which really does not concern us. Other than the fact that we channel funds to clubs. We really don't say which club should come into existence, and which club should go out of existence. We only deal with what comes to pass on a day to day basis. And on that basis, we will try to channel funds that we get from the State. That is all the Town Board has to do with the Senior Citizens Club."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Jim Cooper: "I'm not asking the Town Board to get in on it. All I said is that this, all could have been avoided had the phones been picked up and this was originally when I called Joe, when I got this letter. Okay, he had admitted. . ."

Councilman Boschetti: "May I offer — may I offer this . . ."

Jim Cooper: "Yeah."

Councilman Boschetti: "I will offer an apology on the Town — on the part of the Town Board. . ."

Jim Cooper: "You don't have to Lou."

Councilman Boschetti: "You are not communicated with."

Jim Cooper: "All right."

Councilman Boschetti: "But I think that to belabor this point at a public forum is really not the proper procedure."

Jim Cooper: "No I don't think it is either, but I think that we should have been at least notified. And I didn't know, in other words, everything I got to the point yesterday, was hearsay. Until I finally found out that this thing had started on June the 24th. And I do think, I don't think it was the Town Board's responsibility because I don't think you fellows knew anything about it, to be very truthful."

Councilman Boschetti: "I know inquiries were made as to whether people can start clubs."

Jim Cooper: "All right."

Councilman Boschetti: "And that could have been on the 24th of June, it could have been on the 25th of May or April. I don't recall. But the fact is, when somebody asks a question of a Councilman we don't run to any existing club . . ."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedJim Cooper: "I am not . . ."Councilman Boschetti: "Jim, may I finish please?"Jim Cooper: "Yeah."Councilman Boschetti: "We don't run to any existing club to notify them that a question was asked about creation of another club."Jim Cooper: "Well, this was not the case of a question. It was the case of a letter being sent. And I think before a letter should be sent out, over the signature of the Supervisor, at least, he should show the President of that existing club the courtesy of saying, Jim you got time to come down and spend ten or fifteen minutes, or a half hour with me. Gladly, I'd come because I spend an awful lot of time and the seniors know out there, know how much time I spend with them. Believe me, they appreciate what I'm doing."Councilman Lombardi: "Jim."Councilman Boschetti: "I'm very glad to hear that, really."Jim Cooper: "Thank you, okay."Councilman Lombardi: "Jim."Jim Cooper: "I will now . . ."Councilman Lombardi: "Jim. I just would like to make it clear that as far as I know, this — we only found out last Thursday from Stanley that there was a problem. And we were listening to what the problem was."Jim Cooper: "I found out . . ."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Lombardi: "And I do feel that you should have been informed. That's my personal feeling. I brought that up this afternoon. As President of the Senior Citizens."

Jim Cooper: "That's right. That's what I say. And I think all of this could have been . . ."

Councilman Lombardi: "That's my feelings on it."

Jim Cooper: "I wouldn't have had to bring all these people out here tonight for something you — not you people, but was already cut and dry. It was already decided upon. And you fellows had no knowledge of it and I, of course, didn't come to any one of you on the Board, believe me, Vic asked me if I said that he heard I bad mouthed the Board. I did not and never will bad mouth the Board. But I will if I ever get a letter from the Supervisor of the Town. You can be sure that if it's addressed to the club, I'm going to read it to the club and let them make their decisions from that point on."

Councilman Boschetti: "Thank you Jim."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone else who wishes to address the members of the Town Board? Mr. Kasperovich. I recognize Mr. Kasperovich."

Unidentified speaker from the audience was inaudible.

Supervisor Janoski: "You're going to have to come up — Mr. Kasperovich is recognized. Mr. Sweeney. Oh, you going to pass. Mr. Sweeney."

Jim Cooper: "Also I left one point out. I'd like to be recognized again for just a moment. I left one point out when I — Nora Brewer kept the attendance records which we had the people sign in. When she was asked for the attendance records we were told they were thrown away. Now I don't — anybody should throw attendance records."

Councilman Boschetti: "Thank you Jim."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Unidentified Speaker: "Gentlemen, I'd like to ask you a question."

Irene J. Pendzick: "Mr. Sweeney, could you say your name and address for the record?"

"Sweeney."

Irene J. Pendzick: "Your first name, too."

"Francis."

Irene J. Pendzick: "Thank you."

Francis Sweeney, 104 7th Street, Calverton; "It was mentioned here tonight that you had no control over how many organizations that could be formed. Now my question is this. Everybody, if they're running for office, decided if they loose, they can go out and form their own organization. I also like to know is the Town Board or whoever supplies the money — all these organizations splinter out into another organization."

Supervisor Janoski: "As a result of what is going on here today, Mr. Sweeney, and what has been going on for a couple of weeks, the Town Board is going to develop a policy with regard to recognition of clubs within the Township. It becomes necessary because there is as I pointed out, no mechanism to deny the right of any group that wishes to form a club that we feel that it is necessary so that there is not a proliferation of clubs within the Township to develop a policy which would have to be adhered to."

Francis Sweeney: "But is the Town Board going to supply funds for all these clubs."

Supervisor Janoski: "We are probably and this has been a discussion legally required to disburse . . ."

Francis Sweeney: "In other words, it's not known."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "It would appear that the monies which we receive from the State would legally be required to be disbursed to those clubs which are in existence in the Town of Riverhead."

Herbert Geiser, Calverton; "I'm a member of this club for the past nine years. I think the whole discussion hinges on one or two questions. Why are they establishing a new club? I think we have ample facilities in Wading River to satisfy all our Senior Citizens in Wading River, Baiting Hollow and Calverton. And this is one subject I like to hear from the opposition, the people who are to establish this. I think the reason for all these people here tonight, Mr. Janoski, is to protest against this group trying to establish or split our club. I think you should give us an explanation maybe they can give us an explanation. Let us find out why is this going to happen if you approve of such a thing."

Supervisor Janoski: "I don't believe that a Town Board Meeting is the proper forum which, you know, members of a club should discuss with one another, some internal questions. I would be happy to answer any questions that you might have to the involvement of the Town Government of the Town of Riverhead."

Herbert Geiser: "But how do you feel, then personally, about another club trying to devise a club. That's well established the last ten or twelve years."

Supervisor Janoski: "You want the truth on this one."

Herbert Geiser: "Well I'm asking the question."

Supervisor Janoski: "Boy when I saw this coming, I knew it was going to be trouble and quite as — as John has said we had a discussion about it this past Thursday and that discussion revolved around — really our lack of ability to deny the right. It was agreed by the members of the Town Board in conjunction with the Department head of the Recreation Department, I believe, that's who was there. I don't know if the Town Attorney was there. The discussion can we not deny the opportunity to form a new club. The opinion was that no, we have no mechanism to do so. Did I recognize it was a problem? Absolutely."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Herbert Geiser: "Well as you see here, as a number of people here who are disapproving this request. Now if you cannot take any action, why is it on the agenda? Why should it even be discussed? Why should it be brought up before the Board if you cannot take any action? You say any club can be established without your approval."

Supervisor Janoski: "Are you talking about the letter."

Herbert Geiser: "No, I'm just talking about the establishment of another club."

Supervisor Janoski: "No on the agenda?"

Herbert Geiser: "On the agenda tonight."

Supervisor Janoski; "Are you talking about the letter that's on . . ."

Herbert Geiser: "That's right."

Councilman Artale: "That's correspondence."

Herbert Geiser: "On the agenda. It's on the ——— it's on your agenda."

Supervisor Janoski: "On correspondence."

Herbert Geiser: "That's right."

Supervisor Janoski: "That's because it's correspondence and all correspondence that is delivered to the Town Clerk's Office is put on the agenda."

Unidentified speaker from the audience was inaudible.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Herbert Geiser: "Somebody asked if they're all done by correspondence. We don't know that. So, therefore, you will approve of this group, establish themselves. I would like to hear what they have to say about it. Why do they . . ."

Councilman Artale: "We have no basis to stop them."

Herbert Geiser: "I understand that."

Councilman Artale: "That's what Mr. Janoski is trying to tell you. We have no basis what-so-ever to stop a group from forming."

Herbert Geiser: "Will the Town, itself, agree to this formation of a new club."

Councilman Boschetti: "Sir, Sir."

Herbert Geiser: "Yes Sir."

Councilman Boschetti: "How would you suggest we go about stopping them from forming the club?"

Herbert Geiser: "Well, they'll be making a request to you people to approve of this."

Councilman Boschetti: "They're not making a request. They're simply telling us that they're going to do this."

Herbert Geiser: "You mean they could just tell . . ."

Councilman Boschetti: "That's it. We don't approve it or disapprove it. They are just going to do it."

Herbert Geiser: "Well you're going to appropriate money to them, I assume?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Boschetti: "That is public money that is given to the Town by the State for that purpose. We have absolutely no choice but to give any club in existence that kind of funding."

Herbert Geiser: "Well have the people got anything to say about establishing a second club?"

Supervisor Janoski: "What people?"

Herbert Geiser: "The people here that are sitting down here before us."

Councilman Boschetti: "That should have really been discussed at your own club meeting. You know the why's and wherefore's . . ."

Herbert Geiser: "The other club didn't even tell us that the people were trying to form this thing."

Councilman Boschetti: "Well you see that is really an internal problem."

Herbert Geiser: "Well, therefore, we are up against a wall. We probably can't go any further with this."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Lou."

Herbert Geiser: "Is that true?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Sir, I'd like to maybe since I haven't said too much and I'm only going to clarify a few points and I talked to Jim before the meeting and you can bear me out.

Number one, the Town of Riverhead, I remember being in college and sometimes I get criticized for going back. We had a student government that sponsored organizations. The Town Board doesn't really in the true sense sponsor an organization. We recognize a lot of the clubs. Like, for example,

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedCouncilman Prusinowski continues:

there's a soccer club in the Town of Riverhead. They come to the Recreation Department and say we are the soccer club we are recognized by a lot of groups. We want to apply for money. Sometimes they get funded, sometimes they don't, okay. Now with these clubs, for example, there is federal funding involved which we all know about. I think before the Town Board tonight can say we're going to give anybody money, there are some new facts that were brought up that need clarification.

Number one, a question we have, can you be a member of two clubs and still get funded, okay. That's a very legitimate question that has to be answered and I don't think anybody on the Town Board can say tonight yes or no. So that has to be looked into. And I think you'd rather have us look into it and find out what we're talking about before we say yes or no just to tell you what you want to hear. Cause that's not the way it should be done.

Number two, we cannot stop any group in the Town of Riverhead from organizing any club because we have no authority. We don't recognize, we don't sanction. There's not a procedure. In other words, if I want to have a rifle club, okay, I'll get a group of guys together and say we're going to have a rifle club, but we don't say we have to pass a Town Board resolution to authorize this in existence.

So on that one, I'm a member of the North Fork Community Theatre. I was on the Board of Directors. We had a very similar situation. We had a group that disagreed in the way the club was run. They went out and formed another theatre group in Southold, rented out the Mattituck High School and did their thing. And as soon as the President retired or resigned, they came back to the North Fork Theatre. So it's a problem that you have in a social organization. But I think some of the questions have to be resolved and we have to do a little more homework on it."

Herbert Geiser: "Especially the funding, I think."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I think the funding question has to be answered and I don't think any of us here tonight can say, yes we're going to do it this way, no we're not and what proportion. As far as their right — as far as their right to start another club, there is, the Town Board will not get involved in that because it can't. They have a constitutional right to form a club."

Herbert Geiser: "Okay, thank you."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Prusinowski: "No, whether or not they should or not, that's a discussion for within the group, I think. Okay."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Kasperovich."

Irene J. Pendzick: "Bill you better raise that mike."

William Kasperovich, 15th Street, Wading River; "I come representing a much larger group, a much larger club and that is the club of drinkers outside the Riverhead Water District and the Riverhead Sewer District. Geographically is the largest part of the Riverhead Township. I distributed a document of attention and notice because I feel that had the Board our best interest at heart, they would have started some mechanism to date. Not seeing any such mechanism, I make notice to the elected officials. We have brought up tonight the News Review informing the people. I would like very much to have this this Town conduct — Town Board conduct themselves as does the President of the United States and other officials in having their press conference in the open. I do not feel that I have to read the News Review to find out what's going on in this Town."

Supervisor Janoski: "How do you feel about that Eric?"

Richard Ehlers: "The State law requires that public hearings be advertised in that official . . ."

William Kasperovich: "I'm not speaking of public hearings."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Kasperovich, could I ask a question? Up until this point, I don't know what the subject is that you're talking about? I don't know what mechanism it is that you're talking about. If you would just please specify the problem? Tell us what mechanism you feel will resolve the problem, then we could react to it."

William Kasperovich: "All right the problem is that there exists enough established data that many neighborhoods and communities in the Township outside of the Water District have contaminated water and have been advised by the Department of Health Services of Suffolk County do as I quote recommend the water not be used for drinking or cooking purposes."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Jansoki: "Okay, Mr. Kasperovich. Now what is the mechanism by which we can correct this problem?"

William Kasperovich: "By designating the — a group, one or a group of people that will have the legal right and privilege to assemble this information such that what exists . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "What information Mr. Kasperovich?"

William Kasperovich: "The extent and area and severity of the contaminated water."

Supervisor Janoski: "We have a group established. It is called the Health Department of the County of Suffolk."

William Kasperovich: "They are not elected by the residents of Riverhead Township."

Supervisor Janoski: "Nor does the Township — Mr. Kasperovich. . ."

William Kasperovich: "The life and well being of the people in this Township are the concern of the elected officials. If you are trying to tell me that it is not, I'm afraid you're out of order."

Supervisor Janoski: "No I'm not trying to tell you that. What I'm saying is that the Town of Riverhead has no jurisdiction with regard to health matters. That has been taken away from us by the County of Suffolk."

William Kasperovich: "The jurisdiction to do what? Jurisdiction is a big word. You can define it anyway you want. But what are you telling me?"

Supervisor Janoski: "What I'm telling you is that the Town of Riverhead has no authority over matters of Health in Suffolk County."

Councilman Artale: "Or in Riverhead."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "I'm sorry, in Riverhead, yes."

William Kasperovich: "You mean to say that it's the Suffolk County that controls the water district and not the Town?"

Supervisor Janoski: "No it is the County of Suffolk that has authority over matters of health. That is why you get letters from the Department of Health of Suffolk County concerning the temik in the water."

William Kasperovich: "And what — and who do we go to for relief, not with the Health Services?"

Supervisor Janoski: "That's the question that I have been raising for some time. The County of Suffolk sends out these letters telling people not to drink their water, but doesn't supply an alternative or any relief to the problem."

William Kasperovich: "Alternative or relief should come from you, not from them. And this attitude of yours that it is not your problem . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "I didnt' say . . ."

William Kasperovich: "Is just out of order."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Kasperovich, you have changed what I said. I said that we did not have the authority, don't say — put words in my mouth and say it's not my concern. Because I did not say it's not my concern. I said I do not have the authority in this matter of health . . ."

William Kasperovich: "To do what?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Kasperovich to do what?"

William Kasperovich: "Authority to do what? So far you've done nothing."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Kasperovich, do you want to — this is a bad night Mr. Kasperovich."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Can I ask, Mr. Kasperovich, can I ask you a question? We got your letter this week. The Town of Riverhead is concerned about the drinking water problem. That's why we applied, Town Board's ago, not just our Town Board, applied for the Scavenger Waste Plant which, by the way, the purpose is to protect our ground water supply."

William Kasperovich: "Just a moment, pause right there."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Sure."

William Kasperovich: "The ground water you're talking about, we will all be dead and buried before the will affect us. What we're talking about now is the drinking water we have to drink today. The Scavenger Waste System is what it may possibly effect the water fifty or one hundred years from now. Let us talk about what we have to drink."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Fine, let's talk about it."

William Kasperovich: "Not fifty years from now."

Councilman Prusinowski: "All right. Let's talk about it. The solution that you're advocating, obviously, is an extension of the public water district."

William Kasperovich: "No Sir."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Oh, it's not okay, I don't know any other."

William Kasperovich: "No Sir. Whatever gave you that idea."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well I don't know any other way to solve the ground water . . ."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

William Kasperovich: "All right. If you don't know the solution, maybe somebody else does."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Do you know the solution? What's the solution? You know I've been sitting here for three years. What's the solution? You tell me. If you can tell me what the solution is, and put it on a piece of paper that it makes sense and we'll listen to it."

William Kasperovich: "You have no authority to . . ."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I have no authority . . ."

William Kasperovich: "So Mr. Janoski says . . ."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No I'm a citizen and a taxpayer and I live in this Town and I've lived in this Town for fifty years."

William Kasperovich: "Inside the Water District."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Not fifty . . ."

William Kasperovich was speaking while Councilman Prusinowski was speaking and was incomprehensible.

Councilman Prusinowski: "I'm getting excited like Joe. I don't even want to talk to you. Sit down, really, because you come in the Town Hall, you waste taxpayers money and time on these wild goose chases and if you have something constructive . . ."

William Kasperovich: "No, no. Now let's not get under the area of bad mouthing."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No I'm sorry."

William Kasperovich: "You're on the fringes of the area."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay, I'm on the fringes. I apologize. Mr. Kasperovich, if you could give us something concrete, a solution, we'll follow it up. We need help. We need help, I agree with you. What's the answer, you tell me?"

William Kasperovich: "What's the question?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "I want to know what the answer is?"

William Kasperovich: "All right."

Councilman Prusinowski: "If you can give us. . ."

William Kasperovich: "All right. I'll give you a answer right here tonight. You people are in power to make a resolution. Make a resolution tonight authorizing me as a representative of this Township to acquire the data within the Health Department Services of Suffolk County."

Supervisor Janoski: "You know, I'm very tempted to do it. Anybody want to make that motion?"

Councilman Boschetti: "Providing all reports are in writing."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I'll make that motion — no. Okay we have — I'll tell you what we're going to do. We're going to discuss your motion at the next work session as per Mr. — Councilman Lombardi's request and we'll have and it will be under serious consideration."

William Kasperovich: "Well I . . ."

Councilman Prusinowski: "And I'll tell you personally . . ."

William Kasperovich: "May I suggest — may I suggest that you stand behind your words and put it on the agenda at the next meeting which will not be in the closed room back in the corner, but in this room where anybody can listen."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Artale: "Mr. Kasperovich — Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "And then discuss the problem openly and offering your own personal and individual attitude."

Councilman Artale: "Mr. Kasperovich, excuse me. All work sessions are open to the public. All work sessions are open to the public. The press is there."

William Kasperovich: "I tried talking to you people. . ."

Councilman Artale: "The Press is there."

William Kasperovich: "At a work session."

Councilman Artale: "And you are welcome to sit there."

William Kasperovich: "And it came to nothing."

Councilman Artale: "You are welcome to sit there."

William Kasperovich: "I tried to talk to you people at a work session and it came to nothing. So I'm not talking to you people unless it is an official Town Board Meeting."

Councilman Artale: "I didn't say you could come in and talk. You could come in and listen."

William Kasperovich: "And if you don't like what I got (the next few words were incomprehensible) by putting it on an agenda and talking about it publicly, then you don't really want to stand behind your own thoughts."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Kasperovich."

Councilman Lombardi: "Bill."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "You are accusing this Board of meeting behind closed doors. Now there is a difference. There is a difference between asking to come and address the Town Board or what you are alluding to that we are back there behind closed doors doing things that we're not letting people know about. You can come in anytime and listen. The press comes in any time and listens, except in certain cases which by law we can exclude people, and that happens to be discussions of personnel matters. Matters that may be . . ."

William Kasperovich: "Very true. I'm very well aware of . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Come on Bill. I've been listening to you for three years. How about listening to me for a minute?"

William Kasperovich: "Hold your meetings in this room where people can hear what — where you stand on what matters."

Supervisor Janoski: "Nobody tells — if people — if there are enough people come in the afternoon to a work session, we would be forced to come out here, certainly."

Councilman Prusinowski: "We would be glad."

William Kasperovich: "Speaking of work sessions, I'm speaking of your special meetings, your special Town Board Meetings."

Councilman Artale: "Which are held here."

William Kasperovich: "Your Special Town Board Meetings are held in the room in the corner and the doors are closed."

Supervisor Janoski: "The doors are open, they're not locked and the members of the press are present which and they represent the public."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Bill I've been advised by my minority member of the Town Board that we best discuss this thing on Thursday because passage of your motion is critical on having a discussion first. And I'm leaning towards it."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

William Kasperovich: "I'm thankful for any little thing that I can get from this Board."

Councilman Lombardi: "Bill, and I would like it all in writing, what you want."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I second that motion."

Councilman Lombardi: "What you ideas are."

William Kasperovich: "Then make a resolution and let the Town Board pass on it tonight to cover my costs of doing this."

Councilman Lombardi: "First — well Bill . . ."

William Kasperovich: "If you want me to work for you. . ."

Councilman Lombardi: "No I don't want you to work for us . . ."

William Kasperovich: "Then we work for it my way, not your way."

Councilman Lombardi: "I'm not asking you — hell no. I'm just — I want to know what you want to do before I make a decision to vote on it. If you want to put it in writing what you want to do, I'll look at it. Otherwise, this is no place to vote on it."

William Kasperovich: "I have stood here on many occasions and said that I am available to you people any time, any place. I have yet to get a call from you people."

Supervisor Janoski: "You know Bill . . ."

William Kasperovich: "If you don't want to talk to me that's perfectly all right. I got other people to talk to. Thank you very much."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedSupervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill. Yes Sir."

Bob Gartner, Vice President of the Wading River Senior Citizens; "I'd like to know when a decision is made on the two points we're talking about before without the club being notified. One relating to the proportions of money sent to each individual club and secondly with respect to a person belonging to more than one club. I'd like to know whether we will be notified when these decisions are made."

Supervisor Janoski: "Certainly. I take it that you request . . ."

Bob Gartner: "Okay, that's all I ask."

Councilman Prusinowski: "And if you'd like, we'd come out to Wading River to talk to you about it personally."

Bob Gartner: "Well that would be great."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay."

Bob Gartner: "We'd appreciate that. Thank you very much."

Councilman Prusinowski: "So you don't have to come down here."

Supervisor Janoski: "Anybody else wishing to be recognized."

Councilman Boschetti: "There's one in the corner."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes Ma'am."

Councilman Boschetti: "Sir."

Supervisor Janoski: "Sir."

Michael McCombe, Sound Avenue; "I'd like to know when the Special Town Board Meetings are held and I put in request that they be listed in the News Review."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well very often because the News Review publishes but once a week and Special Town Board Meetings is held, we can't do that. Because there's no way — it publishes on a Thursday. So that if there's a necessity for a meeting on Monday, can't get it in the paper."

Michael McCombe: "How is a necessity for a meeting established?"

Supervisor Janoski: "How is the necessity for a meeting established? If something that comes up that should be resolved requiring a resolution, the Supervisor has the authority to call a special meeting of the Town Board. The press is notified and it is posted. The press, of course, has the function of representing the people."

Michael McCombe: "And these all are — the special sessions are open to the public?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Absolutely."

Michael McCombe: "But there's no way for the public to find out about them."

Supervisor Janoski: "There is no mechanism to publish in the paper. But the newspapers are notified as I said so that they may be present representing the people and to report whatever action took place at the Town Board Meeting."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Joe, also, as a working policy around here, work sessions are Tuesday afternoons and Thursday afternoons and they're open to the public and what happens at a work session is we discuss business — Town business that most of the time ends up on the agenda. Sometimes I would say the majority of times, the Special Board Meetings are called for those times because that's when all the Board Members, hopefully, and I include myself on that, are available at that time. So we try and we make an effort. I know way back about three years ago or we started the work sessions, there was a — somebody from the back said there's no such thing as an executive session."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedCouncilman Prusinowski continues:

They are correct because work sessions are open to the general public."

Supervisor Janoski: "Except in those instances . . ."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Personnel matters."

Michael McCombe: "All right. I understand all that. From listening to what went on here tonight, I think part of the problem that everybody's having is the lack of communication between the Town Board and the general public from lack of notification (the tape ended) . . ."

(the tape began with Supervisor Janoski stating:)

Supervisor Janoski: " . . . I'm not going to say what I had in my mind."

Michael McCombe: "I think Mr. Kasperovich makes many good points and even though he . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Could you explain to me what Mr. Kasperovich just said?"

Michael McCombe: "Yes. I thought it was very clear. He's concerned about the drinking water outside . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "I understand that."

Michael McCombe: "And he's trying to come up with some answers to the problem and if the answer is the Town Board finding funds to get a water tanker to bring water to these different people that might be one solution. He wants to look into these different answers."

Councilman Artale: "Water tanker?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Councilman Prusinowski: "Well, you know, I just remembered something we did last year in conjunction with the Suffolk County. There was a survey taken of the ground water problem on Eastern Long Island. Specifically the North Fork, and the County funded this project with the input of our Community Development Office and there is a report available with recommendation showing the magnitude of the problem, the type of drinking water we have in Riverhead and the presentation was made right in this room cause I remember it was a slide presentation, it took two or three hours. And I think John you were — the two other members weren't elected on the Board yet. This was last year and what it stated was that down the road they gave some specific recommendations on what the course of the Town should be taking. And we are aware of that.

Second of all, they said that on the whole, Riverhead's drinking water supply is in pretty good shape compared to other areas on the North Fork, okay. There are problems and the Town Board is always working to solve these problems. Extending the public water district is expensive. They worked out a deal with Union Carbide on the temik problem. That's a real problem. There's no question about it. These things are being discussed. There is some money available through funds and we're doing the best we can. But the problem is under discussion, in fact, there is a water quality seminar at Stony Brook that I know some of our officials attend on a regular basis to be updated on data. So it's not a question that we're talking off the top of our heads.

Basically my only question to Mr. Kasperovich was, instead of coming up here all the time and criticizing us, I, as a Councilman, as a citizen, a voter, would like to know if somebody has an idea that were not doing. I'd like to hear it constructively. Hey Vic, instead of doing it this way, why don't you do it this way. Of I have an idea that maybe we should run the pipe over here, or I have a book you should read about it. Instead of coming up here all the time and criticizing us for the sake of criticizing it. That's not constructive. I'd like to hear, hey up in Sound Avenue, you know years ago they used to do it this way. Maybe some of these things we can take back to our Consultants, who we pay a lot of money to, and take these ideas which we do on a regular basis on some projects. We take the citizen input give them to our Consultants and they come back with some data. And that's the way you solve problems. Not talking off the top of your head by putting your thinking cap on, because the taxpayers pay us money to assemble the facts and do the best we can for the most people. And that's our job because we don't have the answers. I'll agree with you. It's very — just the Town dump along is a technical problem that, hey, I'm not an engineer. That's why you have to hire Consultants. That's the smart way of doing it, I believe."

Michael McCombe: "Yes, I understand that, but part of the problem is that at all of these Town Board Meetings when Mr. Kasperovich comes up here to make a suggestion, it seems

that his suggestions aren't respected, and I know that from, I think his name is Jim Cooper, the President of the Senior Citizen Association said that there are a few instances that he tried to talk to Mr. Janoski and that Mr. Janoski wasn't available or he knew that Mr. Janoski was in the Town Hall but he wouldn't answer the telephone. Now . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is this right Jim? Pardon me Jim, is that right?"

Jim Cooper from the audience was inaudible.

Supervisor Janoski: "Oh, okay."

Michael McCombe: "Well that's what I heard in the back."

Supervisor Janoski: "That sounds like bad mouthing to me. I just wanted to see if . . ."

Michael McCombe: "Well that's what I heard in the back. But anyway. . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Kasperovich is very much often in Town Hall and quite honestly, Mr. McCombe, I would — I don't know what you do, but if you have a couple days, come down and spend them with me. This Town Board and myself have been involved in perhaps in something very interesting like the budget for 1983. We have been negotiating contracts with the PBA and the CSEA. We have been involved in a five million dollar project called the Scavenger Waste Plant, which by the way is meant to protect ground water. We have been involved in many things and boy we've been busy. Mr. Kasperovich comes up to the microphone and says hey, any time you got two hours to sit down with me, let me know. I haven't had two hours to sit down and talk with Mr. Kasperovich. Yeah, John I think you're right."

Michael McCombe: "Well it just seems like you haven't had much time for any other residents in Riverhead Town."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. — Sir, wait a minute. Mr. McCombe I can demonstrate because I keep a record of every call that I get, of every call that I return, every person that comes in to see me and any time you want to take a look at it, let me know about it. This past Saturday, while you were possibly enjoying the day off . . ."

Michael McCombe: "I wasn't . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Excuse me Sir. I left my home at 12:00 o'clock, drove to the State University of New York at Farmingdale to attend a conference on ground water to work with other leaders of Government and other people concerned with this problem which Mr. Kasperovich talks about. I got home sometime that night on a Saturday. Sir, I would much rather have been home. So please don't say that I don't devote time or energy to this job because I keep documentation in that office for that purpose. Everything I do on this job is written down, every telephone call I get is recorded. Not mechanically by a recording device, but in writing. Who calls, who I call back and any time that you, Sir, would like to match your interest in this Town with mine, I would be glad to challenge you to that test, Sir."

Michael McCombe: "Fine, I agree to that."

Supervisor Janoski: "Fine."

Michael McCombe: "I would just like to say, though, that I do know of a few instances that you've made some residents of this Town upset by your lack of receptiveness."

Supervisor Janoski: "Would you specify those instances, Sir."

Michael McCombe: "One instance was when my mother made a phone call to your office complaining of planes flying over the house, and one a near crash. I believe she said to me, she was very upset by the way the phone call was handled to your office."

Supervisor Janoski: "Concerning what Sir?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Michael McCombe: "Planes buzzing the area over where she was resting."

Supervisor Janoski: "Did she talk with me?"

Michael McCombe: "Yes she did."

Supervisor Janoski: "And what was the problem?"

Michael McCombe: "The problem was that you slammed down the phone on her saying that you had no authority to do anything about it?"

Supervisor Janoski: "I would like to have your mother come in and tell me that Sir. Are you high?"

Michael McCombe: "Am I high? No, I'm not."

Supervisor Janoski: "Are you on some artificial substance?"

Michael McCombe: "What are you trying to imply by that?"

Supervisor Janoski: "If you will have your mother come into this room and tell me I slammed the phone down on her, I would be happy to have her come down."

Michael McCombe: "Okay. I'll have her do that. She's still very upset about the incident."

Supervisor Janoski: "That's it. You know ladies and gentlemen, I have worked very hard in this job"

At this time, Supervisor Janoski left the meeting room.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Cathy Casey: "And I am not going to stand here and tell you — I don't know the man that long or that well. I'm sure he's made mistakes. He's going to make more, okay. But I think what we're sitting here and we're — I feel like I'm in the middle of a political conference here instead of a Town Board Meeting where we are supposed to be concerned about what is going on whether our lives are going to be a good way of living in the Town of Riverhead. When your grandchildren or your children and I'm — I don't mean that disrespectfully, my mother has twenty-four of them. I don't understand why lately I feel at times I'm coming in here and I'm not saying your points aren't well taken at all, but this isn't a political game. I mean this is the Town Board Meeting instead of — and I agree, instead of criticism I think we should try and be more — communicate better by being more constructive. We're not going to get anywhere and I don't think in fairness to the man, he is working along. For those, perhaps who are not aware of it, the other four gentlemen on the Board who work very hard. Also, I'm sure they are in essence part-time.

Mr. Janoski works by himself with one secretary, okay. I don't think in fairness that to take one man and single him out as often as I have seen or listened to this evening is totally fair. And I agree with him, if that's really what we feel, then why don't more of us give up our personal time, whether we are retired or we are working as most of us do and come down and sit for a few weeks and spend time and see what he's doing. Instead we've just taken one or two little facts, the fact that, although I agree with Mr. Kasperovich about our water, for some reason the Town Board and Mr. Kasperovich raise one another's blood pressure. It's called personality conflict or something. It's not really communicating. I mean, and again, I think the most important thing here is criticism of one man. I don't think any of us could do the job better and if we really think we can, then for crying out loud, give up your lives the way they are now and go spend your time and run for election. And if you get elected, then tell me how easy the job is. I mean in fairness to the man, he works hard. And I think he deserves that much credit from this Town. Thank you."

Councilman Artale: "Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski: "That's good."

Unidentified speaker: "I think the criticism is not only of Mr. Janoski, but of the whole system the way the Town works here that communication isn't there."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Irene J. Pendzick: "Clark, I know it's you, but my secretary won't know it's you."

Clark McCombe, 77 Sound Avenue; "We come to Town Board Meetings and we get an agenda with a set of resolutions and usually it's five to nothing this, and five to nothing that, right down the line. Now why can't there be an aggressive press conference in the evenings where questions on Scavenger Waste and Water problems and temik and all these problems before the Town are brought up and it's more informal and the press gets involved in it like they do with other government officials and people are aware of it."

Councilman Prusinowski: "But they do Clark."

Clark McCombe: "But can't it be done at 7:30 at night."

Councilman Prusinowski: "But they do. I'm in the press and I can tell you that the reporting in the Town of Riverhead is one of the best that I've seen anywhere in Suffolk County. Unfortunately, unfortunately, you have like, for example, I think that a lot of people kind of gloss over news items that don't effect them personally and I think that basically you have a good discussion here and I've gone to Town Board Meetings all my life — I really do, I agree with you. If you could have more people have a discussion on the issues that would be fine."

Clark McCombe: "Well, just as a matter of public education on these questions to have more of a discussion among Town Board Members and among the public, rather than the formal resolutions always coming down . . ."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay."

Clark McCombe: "That's what I'm asking for or suggesting."

Supervisor Janoski: "What would you like? What was that suggestion you made?"

Clark McCombe: "After — I noticed that after the public hearings the press goes into your office and asks questions."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "And I'm going to tell you something else, Clark. In the afternoon just about every member of the press calls me to find out what's going on that afternoon. And that's one of the many things I have to do is tell each and everyone of those guys what's going on and I go through it with them gladly because that's my job."

Clark McCombe: "I'm not criticizing that."

Supervisor Janoski: "I don't know what it is that you want. I really don't."

Clark McCombe: "I'm asking that instead of having a press conference in your office, couldn't we have it here? Couldn't the public be allowed . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "You know after the meeting's over I sometimes like to have a cigarette, sit down and relax. Clark, I've been in this building since 9:00 o'clock this morning. What have you done today for this Town? No, your only concern happens to be an airport."

Clark McCombe: "That's not my only concern. That's why I'm down here."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well what is it that you want? Do you want to come into the press conference with me? You've witnessed what I'm going to tell them about. You've sat here and witnessed it. They're going to ask me some questions."

Clark McCombe: "This is becoming, I mean it's becoming an issue and it doesn't have to be. I'm just making a suggestion like earlier with the . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "You, Clark, have my personal invitation to join the press and I — in my office after this meeting."

Clark McCombe: "Okay, thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Cause I want to have a cigarette.
I haven't had one of those since 7:30 P.M.
Does anybody care if I adjourn this meeting?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Bill wants to have the
last word."

Supervisor Janoski: "Ah God, Bill."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "Let's all go home,
please."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

Bill Nohejl: "Good night."

There being no further business on motion and
vote, Supervisor Janoski declared the meeting closed at
9:47 P.M.
