

Minutes of a Regular Town Board Meeting held by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, held in the Town Hall, Howell Avenue, Riverhead, New York, on Tuesday, June 4, 1996, at 7:00 p.m.

Supervisor Stark called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Supervisor Stark: "If the Board would join me down front. Chief, if you would-- .

One, we have four officers with us tonight, but as I look out into the audience, I see an old baseball friend of mine. I see some happy people out there because of these gentlemen. And I would ask that the Chief explain exactly what happened."

Chief Grattan: "Okay, folks. On May 2nd, about 1:30 in the afternoon, we received a call at headquarters reporting an aided case. An aided case is a routine case, most times where somebody needs oxygen or they have falled or some such thing. It was over on Pond View Drive in Riverhead. They arrived at the scene, four officers arrived.

Once they found out it was serious, what happened, it was a man, Mr. Appicello, was mowing a man's lawn. Mr. Appicello is in the landscaping business. He was mowing this man's lawn. Fortunately for Mr. Appicello the man was home. He heard the mower stop or the sound of it different and he looked out and Mr. Appicello was trapped underneath the riding lawnmower.

Our fellows got there and Mr. Appicello was in very extreme, sad condition at that point in time. They removed the mower. They administered CPR, and had him transported to Central Suffolk Hospital, and thank God, he is with us tonight.

I can talk with authority on this sort of in a completely opposite way as I had a young fellow die in my arms one time. So I can think of nothing that must please an officer more than when he does save a life and that he can join that person after giving aid to them and I really believe, ladies and gentlemen, that you have a very fine police department. I believe in them. They do a job every day for us. They do a dedicated job and they are all a lot younger than I am, and they are a group of young, professional, educated, young ladies and gentlemen. And I add my congratulations to what the Town Board is going to do for them this evening."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Chief. John, Jr., why don't you come on up? Why don't you bring your whole family up here? And you can help me and the Board present these resolutions-- proclamations to-- this young gentleman in the green shirt is the gentleman that these boys took care of. This old guy in the red shirt, him and I used to play a lot of softball together. So, I'm going to ask each Board member to read the proclamation so we all can get into the picture here, participants, and the first one, I'll ask Vic if you will do the first one."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Basically, the resolution says:

WHEREAS, on March 2, 1996, a 911 call was made to Riverhead Town police headquarters advising that an accident had occurred where a commercial lawnmower turned over on Meritt's Pond, trapping the operator underneath approximately four feet of water; and

WHEREAS, Thomas Lessard, police officer, with his fellow officers, jumped in the water to right the overturned lawnmower, pulled the victim to dry land where CPR was successfully administered saving the life of the victim, and in recognition of this brave act, Jimmy Stark, Supervisor of the Town of Riverhead, and the Town Board, declare Thomas Lessard Day, June 4, 1996, and thanks a lot for doing a great job."

Councilman Lull: "And I have one to present to a long time

friend who is also a-- I see him more comfortably stealing second base, I think, but

WHEREAS, Police Officer David Freeborn, together with fellow officers entered the water, righted the overturned lawnmower and pulled the victim to dry land where CPR was successfully administered thereby saving the life of the victim.

NOW, THEREFORE, in recognition of the bravery exhibited by Police Officer David Freeborn I, James R. Stark, Supervisor of the Town of Riverhead, do hereby proclaim May 6, 1996, to be Police Officer David Freeborn Day."

Supervisor Stark: "They don't get these days off, though."

Councilman Wittmeier: "I just picked this one up and it happens to be my cousin, Emil Brietenbach. Basically it says the same thing.

Therefore, in recognition of bravery exhibited by Police Officer Emil Breitenbach, James R. Stark, Supervisor of the Town of Riverhead does hereby proclaim June 5, 1996, to be Police Officer Emil Breitenbach Day."

Councilman Kwasna: "Last but not least.

Now, therefore, in recognition of bravery exhibited by Police Officer Robert Kall, I, James R. Stark, Supervisor of the Town of Riverhead, do hereby proclaim June 7, 1996, to be Police Officer Robert Kall Day."

Supervisor Stark: "Because we felt this was so important, we gave each one of them their own day. I don't believe it's overtime or anything else but, gentlemen, on behalf of me, as Supervisor, and I believe I can express to the Board our appreciation for the continued good work that our police department does in this town every day. And now, maybe I'll ask Joe, Jr. to say something."

Joe Appicello: "I'd just like to take this opportunity just to say thanks to each and every one of you and I've been in the fire service for 10 years and I know that it's an important job to, you know, save lives and stuff. And I just want to say thanks."

Supervisor Stark: "He didn't have gray hair when I played ball with him."

John Appicello: "That's for sure. It's too bad I don't have the letter that I wrote to the Chief and Jim got a copy of it because it says how I feel. And basically what it says is that in this day and era where the police department takes a lot of bangs, okay, I'm here to say, thank God."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. There they are. Everybody on both sides and thank God we've got good people and good luck to you in the future. Okay."

We are going to do this other one. He could not attend tonight, so we'll do this at the next meeting.

It's nice to hear those kind of stories, isn't it?

Is there a motion to approve the minutes of the Regular Town Board meeting of May 21st and the Special Board meeting of May 30th?"

Councilman Lull: "Seconded."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Is there any discussion? All in favor?"

The Vote (Collective response): "Aye."

Supervisor Stark: "Opposed? Motion is carried."

Public Hearing opened: 7:15 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 7:15 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:05 p.m. on Tuesday, June 4, 1996, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the consideration of an amendment to Chapter 50 - Bingo - Section 50-6, maximum single prize and Section 50-7 total of prizes limited."

Supervisor Stark: "Bobby, you want to take this?"

Robert Kozakiewicz: "Yes. The Public Hearing it to change the ordinance so that the maximum amount for a single prize and the maximum amount for an aggregate prize is now increased in accordance with the amount that is set forth in New York State law under the General Municipal Law, so that our ordinance is in sync with the State legislative law."

Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody in the audience wishing to make comment on this particular Public Hearing? Yes, George. George, would you go to the podium if you want to be recognized, please?"

George Schmelzer: "I don't care if I be recognized-- I want to recognize the law."

Supervisor Stark: "George, would you state your name."

George Schmelzer: "I want to recognize the law."

Supervisor Stark: "George, would you state your name first."

George Schmelzer: "My name is George. You said it already."

Supervisor Stark: "George Schmelzer."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, that's what they tell me."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay."

George Schmelzer: "These numbers, it means nothing. Please explain."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "Presently our ordinance says for a single prize you are allowed \$250 maximum. General Municipal Law states you can have up to \$1,000. That's the one change. That's pretty simple to understand, I think."

The second one states that for an aggregate presently our statute provides for an aggregate of up to \$1,000. The General Municipal Law allows for up to \$3,000. Again, we are changing our Bingo ordinance to the sum of \$3,000. So in essence all we are doing is taking two prize awards under our current Bingo ordinance, increasing the singular from \$250 to \$1,000, and the aggregate from \$1,000 to \$3,000. I'm not sure there's any further explanation necessary."

George Schmelzer: "Is it a prize or a fine?"

Supervisor Stark: "Prize."

George Schmelzer: "Prize."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Did you ever go play Bingo at St. Isidore's?"

George Schmelzer: "I don't play Bingo at all. Duck farm was a bad enough gamble without-- "

Supervisor Stark: "George, are you in favor of this or against it?"

George Schmelzer: "I don't care what you do."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay, thank you. Is there anybody else in the audience who would like to make comment on this particular Public Hearing? If not, I will declare the Hearing closed."

Public Hearing closed: 7:20 p.m.

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Public Hearing opened: 7:20 p.m.

Supervisor Stark: "Let the record show that the time of 7:20 has arrived. Would the Clerk please read the notice of Public Hearing?"

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, at 7:10 p.m., on Tuesday, June 4, 1996, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding the consideration of an amendment to Chapter 48 Beaches and Recreation Centers, Article IV Town Board Ramp Areas, Section 48-27 Licensing of Vehicles Required."

Robert Kozakiewicz: "I'm cautious about wanting to say anything about this. Maybe I should wait for comments first. We are changing the beach ordinance to provide for a boat ramp fee, specifically with regards to South Jamesport boat ramp."

Earlier in the year, we had a Public Hearing which eliminated or called for a proposal to eliminate that area from our present areas that are delineated as beach areas requiring a beach parking sticker which currently is \$5 for a resident at \$75 for a non-resident. This would establish a separate and distinct permit for this particular area which would be \$5 for a non-resident and that's the substance or the gist of this proposal."

Supervisor Stark: "Is there anybody in the audience who would like to be heard on this particular Public Hearing? Make comment? If not, I will declare the Hearing closed."

Public Hearing closed: 7:21 p.m.

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Supervisor Stark: "Since there are no other Public Hearings at this particular time, I will recognize anybody in the audience who would like to make comment on any particular subject. Steve?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. The May 28th blood drive was held at the Ramada Inn yielded 55 pints. We've never been up that far before. And Nancy Mitzman (phonetic), the Director, wants to thank the Town Board for their help and cooperation with this project.

I want to proceed on here now."

Supervisor Stark: "Congratulations on that increase. Again, as always, anything we can do to help sustain and increase the activity don't hesitate to call."

Steve Haizlip: "We are doing just fine with you, Jim, you know, like papers and video, and coordinating and what have you.

So, I learned that election time is here again and Mr. LaValle is up for election and he's come out with a piece of paper and he did a pretty good job of phraseology and he's (inaudible) about taxes and all them good words. The only trouble is he's not getting any help from the Assembly. So without being able to analyze this and get him help from the Board of Assessors over here and from Patricia Acampora, it doesn't seem that things are going to fly in that direction. So we'll be stuck with the same old tax system. We talked about it here this afternoon and how the good word will come out on paper and make themselves look good, but nothing of substance never comes from it.

I think we've all have heard about the hillbilly show back in the days when Buddy Ebsen played Jed Clampett and so one day he was told, says move away from there, Jed. Go to California where everything is bigger and better and more money. Well, that brings to mind after reading the paper this past week that I think Mr. Bob Holmes (phonetic) the present Superintendent of the school system (inaudible) got the same direction. Whoever went up there-- get away from there, Bob, let's go to New York where there's all kind of money and better

bigger and better things. (inaudible) So he's all of a sudden I learned that I think he's been here about a year and he's up to \$115,000 in salary and he come in here with about \$105 or seven, and now he's trying to sneak in to be the first Superintendent probably to go to \$200,000 and he's reaching \$158, and the minute he got called up with by the press, he tells the press, oh, you don't have the facts right. Oh, the facts is probably right, but the press just moved in on him and revealed it. So, that's the substance of my statements tonight. Thank you."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you. Is there anybody else who would like to be heard from at this particular time? If not, let us take up the resolutions. Bill. You guys have got to put your hands up."

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich from Wading River. It kind of irks me when I have to get up here and talk about the same thing that I talked about in years past and I can't seem to convince people of the different concerns that we should have. Last night we had a real downpour of storm water. About (inaudible) o'clock, I was headed for King Kullen, I couldn't see my headlights; I had to feel my way to the side of the road and stop. This doesn't happen too often; it happens occasionally with fog, not with that much water coming down. And I wondered why it comes to my attention and I have to come up here and talk about it. Six weeks ago, I went downstairs and brought to the attention of the Engineering Department that the corner streetlight, three streetlights west of (inaudible) non-functioning for a long time and nobody complained about it. And as of last night, it still is not functioning."

Now this is a piece of Sound Avenue, west of the intersection of Hulse Landing Road and Sound Avenue. This is an intersection controlled by a traffic light. We don't have any widening of the road; we have ample signs; we have road blocking, but you can't see it. It doesn't do any good.

Granted, streetlights don't do everything. But they sure help. Now this is a situation-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Bill, Bill, could I ask you a question? Are you talking about the traffic signal at Hule Landing Road and Sound Avenue?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "No. Streetlights."

Supervisor Stark: "Streetlights."

William Kasperovich: "I'm talking about streetlights-- "

Supervisor Stark: "I mean the traffic control light."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No. Streelights."

Supervisor Stark: "Oh, streetlights. I'm sorry."

William Kasperovich: "On Sound Avenue."

Supervisor Stark: "I'm sorry. I thought you were talking about the traffic light. I came through there yesterday; they were working."

William Kasperovich: "Okay."

Supervisor Stark: "All right. My mistake. You're talking about streetlights. Do you have a pole number on it, Bill?"

William Kasperovich: "No. I don't have a pole number."

Supervisor Stark: "I just thought maybe you had a pole number."

William Kasperovich: "Night time, we don't have many town officials going about town except for the police. What I have asked in the past several times is that Riverhead police report traffic lights that are out in a normal length of time or in an unusually dangerous or hazardous situation and I don't see that this is done."

Supervisor Stark: "It actually is done, Bill. I would like to correct you on that. When it is recognized that a streetlight is out, that sector car will write that pole number down so it can be readily identified and it is reported to the lighting district which is the town engineer who is in charge of the lighting district. What I will ask if the Chief will have a sector car in Wading River tonight, this is at-- west of Hulse Landing between that and Lewin Farms?"

William Kasperovich: "Going west."

Supervisor Stark: "Going west."

William Kasperovich: "These are-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Between Hulse Landing-- would you ask the sector car to make note of that tonight, Chief, if you would, please? But that does happen on a regular basis. Sometimes we may miss it because of other thoughts on their mind, going from one location to another for emergency."

William Kasperovich: "I am well aware of that."

Supervisor Stark: "But I will have the sector car check it tonight, get the pole numbers so it can be turned in tomorrow."

William Kasperovich: "But I do know that there are times when the cars are just patrolling around."

Supervisor Stark: "Yes, that could happen, Bill. I'm not arguing with you on that point. You have brought it to our attention. I will have the Chief, and I just directed him to have the sector car specifically tonight check west of Hulse Landing and Sound Avenue traffic signal-- for streetlights that are out."

William Kasperovich: "Before I brought this to the attention of the engineering department, I asked whether anybody had turned this in, whether anybody else had made this complaint."

Supervisor Stark: "You mean the general public?"

William Kasperovich: "Anybody."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, did anybody-- had anybody?"

William Kasperovich: "Nobody."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, thank you for bringing it to our attention."

William Kasperovich: "The point of my being here and saying is that the people-- official people that are out during the night happen to be the police. And they are the only ones that see the

streetlights. In the daytime, you can't tell. And abnormal length of time that the lights are out, particularly like here we have three consecutive lights from the intersection-- a total-- this is noticeable. This is something-- "

Supervisor Stark: "All right. Bill, evidently, it hasn't been noticed."

William Kasperovich: "All right. But what I'm trying to see-- "

Supervisor Stark: "What I'm trying to do is cure that situation tonight. The Chief has assured me by a nod of his head that that will happen. And let's move on to the next subject. We can't pound this one to death all night."

William Kasperovich: "Well, I'm not getting my point across. Apparently-- "

Supervisor Stark: "I think you've made your point and I-- "

William Kasperovich: "No, I'm not making my point."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, I've gotten your point."

William Kasperovich: "-- I've become aware that people don't hear what I'm trying to say, they get off onto something else. I am trying to instigate a procedure that in the future this does not-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Chief, I'll take care of it."

Chief Grattan: "I've got a procedure."

Supervisor Stark: "All right. Bill, if you'll just step back for a second, I'll let the Chief give you that procedure that is in place right now and then you can make comment on it. If you would for a one second, please."

Chief Grattan: "Gentlemen, our men are instructed-- our ladies on patrol-- men on patrol, are instructed to report streetlights that they see out. Naturally, they are not infallible; I'm sure they miss some at times. However, every two months, all sector cars on a certain midnight tour-- midnights in a row, on the first one the

sector operator is given forms, they check the streetlights. We just completed it. We turned in a list to engineering of 68 streetlights that were malfunctioned in the Town of Riverhead. So, in fact, we do have a procedure."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, Chief."

William Kasperovich: "What more can I say?"

Supervisor Stark: "Is there another subject you would like to discuss before us tonight? If not, I think George wants to speak."

William Kasperovich: "Yes, I'll get-- I'll leave it go for another time."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay. George."

George Schmelzer: "Do you want me to give my name again?"

Supervisor Stark: "You have to for the purpose of the transcriber of the minutes."

George Schmelzer: "My name is George Schmelzer."

Supervisor Stark: "I don't believe she can recognize your voice. I don't think this young lady-- "

George Schmelzer: "She can't? (inaudible) somebody call me by name, without me saying it, so anyway."

Supervisor Stark: "Thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "Talking about these environmentalists. About 1950 or before that, they started picking on the duck farmers, saying they were polluting the water, hurting the fish, the clams, the lobsters, crabs. The biggest crabs are the environmentalists themselves. So, I noticed next to the duck farm in Calverton the fishermen say they got the best fish, the biggest bass, biggest (inaudible). So finally they got rid of the duck farms; the duck farms are gone forever because of these nuts. Now, I think Vic knows what I'm talking about."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Oh yeah, right."

George Schmelzer: "I mentioned this before."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Right. I have to say that your theory on the nitrates apparently have been picked up recently in the newspapers. I guess they did a 10 year study and now they say the bays might not have enough nitrates because of brown tide, so sometimes you have something that you might be on target a little bit on."

George Schmelzer: "Sometimes. (inaudible). Of course, these environmental nuts wouldn't admit that. Right now you can't blame the brown tide on the duck farms because there is no ducks. Maybe they tried to blame it on Corwin (phonetic) but there's no brown tide there, so finally there's no fish, no clams, no lobsters, no crabs, nothing. (inaudible) what Peconic River produced before. Peconic Bay I should say. So, these overeducated idiots, environmentalists, they didn't know what to say. Finally, they kept their mouth shut, now they crawl into a hole somewhere-- responsible people have to admit the trouble is there's not enough nitrogen. They got rid of the duck farms which is natural food for fish. You don't plant a garden in white sand, it doesn't work. So we need more nitrogen. As Vic said, we'll save the Town money now don't have to spend millions of dollars (inaudible). So, if you can't bring any more duck farms in, you can tell Corwin to open the gates, don't purify anything, you will have more crabs there and lobsters. So Riverhead could continue as they are. Of course, these environmentalists won't admit anything. They are trying their best.

We've got an example of one."

Supervisor Stark: "Go ahead, George."

George Schmelzer: "I though there was something hanging on me or something the way you were motioning there. Might put a sign on me, Kick me. So, you've got an extreme environmentalist-- "

Supervisor Stark: "Don't you dare do that, Ruth."

George Schmelzer: "In a shack in Montana, he had to be turned in by his brother. It's an overeducated idiot. I think his name is

Muchinsky (phonetic) or something. Some professor he was, but took his brother to turn him in. You never heard one word about anybody in the Sierra Club, all these other clubs, criticizing him, they are completely mum. They are just sorry one of their buddies got caught. I forget how many people he killed with his mail bombs. So we should be very careful of those people from now on. It's a shame you have to (inaudible) fishing and crabbing and lobster got ruined by some nuts. Vic knows completely what it is. Right now in Calverton, the Peconic River there is very few fish. No ducks, no fish."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay, thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "Wait a minute."

Supervisor Stark: "Well, we don't want to go on with a total history."

George Schmelzer: "Something else. I've been reading about the public nuisance the Town is concerned with. So I'll say many times-- "

Supervisor Stark: "It doesn't cover you though."

George Schmelzer: "The source of the biggest public nuisance very often is the Town Hall itself. That's where all the nuisances start. And they don't leave people alone. Come up with some nonsense, like the (inaudible) zoning in Calverton, same time talk about putting the sewer pipe on the Main Road. If you did that, see what happens. Small industrial lots. Couldn't say a word. Think about it."

Supervisor Stark: "Okay."

George Schmelzer: "I probably forgot something, but I can't remember it now."

Supervisor Stark: "All right. Let us take up the resolutions."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Authorize the Town Clerk to publish and post a public notice of a change of meeting. This will be June 18th at 2:00 p.m. It's one of our quarterly meetings that we meet

Councilman Lull: "Seconded."

Supervisor Stark: "Moved and seconded. Any discussion? Henry, make note of that so they find out about it across the street for us. They always like to come to that meeting. Any other discussion? All in favor?"

Supervisor Stark: "Opposed? Motion carried."
