Councilman Prusinowski, "We have a few minutes before the first public hearing so I will recognize anyone wishing to comment on any matter."

Denis Warchola, Shadey Lane, Wading River, "My name is Denis Warchola and I am from Shadey Lane in Wading River. I would like to address the Town Board to see if something can be done for our road. They fixed a few roads past us last summer. They fixed maybe 5 or 6 roads and ours is by far the worst in the area. I would like to introduce a copy of letters from a couple of neighbors I have and another couple of addresses. If you want me to read the letters, I'll read them."

Councilman Prusinowski, "I'll tell you what you do. If you give them to the Town Clerk and we'll forward them to the Highway Superintendent and the Highway Committee for our consideration."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES, Continued

Denis Warchola, "Ok. I'd just like to explain the condition if I may."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Sure."

Denis Warchola, "I live on (like) a dirt road and we have, on my side of the road, there's 8 houses and it's (like) 2 separate roads side by side and they are both called the same, Shadey Lane. There's power lines coming up the middle. That's what seems to be a little bit of the problem. If it was one big road, but it's different heights anyway. So it would be very hard to make it one big road. But it's a dirt road and the town road which is Hulse Landing Road, with all the water that does drain in, drains down our road. There's a lot of mosquitoes. If you look at my arms, they are all knat bits from the stagnant water that lays there. It takes a couple of days to dry up. We all own our homes there. We pay good road taxes. We feel that something should be done if possible."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. Unfortunately our Highway Superintendent is going to be late tonight. He's down at another problem that we are having in town. He's trying to get a sump going and I wonder why with all the rain. If you just leave us the envelopes and we'll take a look at the problem for you."

Denis Warchola, "This is my neighbor here."

Dominic TaComa, Wema Road, Wading River, "I am in the same area."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Sir. Can we have your name?"

Dominic TaComa, "My name is Dominic TaComa. I live on Wema Road. There's 3 roads there which never been paved. This is a private 10 foot road, these are. There's 3 of them. Now, there's private roads upward like 15th Street, 16th Street, 20th Street. They've all been paved last year from a grant from the government. I've complained to your Highway Superintendent for the past 3 years and they've been giving me the same story. They get the grant from the federal government and this grant.... I've been going down there for 3 years. Whether they put my name down, as soon as I leave they throw it in the waste paper basket. I feel that's what they've been doing. Because I was down at the Highway Department yesterday and they said they haven't even got us on the agenda for any of these roads. One of my next door neighbors next to him went down there last week to the Highway Department. They gave him the story they can't do anything because it's a private road. I see Riverhead, when it's time for the taxes, they know where I live. As a matter of fact, these roads even listed on the Highway Department maps."

Councilman Prusinowski, "They are on the list?"

Dominic TaComa, "They're on the list because last year I

called up Janoski about the road and he's looked at the map and he tells me whereabouts am I? I had to explain to him. Also I called up the Highway Department last year. He tells me (Not the one that's in now. The one before him.) what do you want me to do with the road. He's a highway man. I've been in the construction. I know when there's a hole in the road you put dirt or asphalt into it. You don't just look at it and ask what do you do with the road. Now we're paying taxes like everybody else on a private road. Why can't we have ours fixed like theres?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. We do have a process that we do follow with private roads."

Dominic TaComa, "I know. Excuse me. I know you have a process. That's what they have been telling me down at the Highway Department for the past 3 years."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Well, the fact of the matter is, that we do have..... The reason we do have a process is because we only get so much money from the federal government and we have a lot of private roads and we have to locate the money to go the furthest. So if we didn't get to your road, probably we ran out of money."

Dominic TaComa, "I understand all this. But if you complain for 3 years and they tell you they are going to do something, they do something 10 blocks away with many people who haven't even complained because they belong to an association and we don't. Because our roads, years ago people used to cut right through to go up onto Hulse Avenue. Well we had children running in and out of driveways and everything else. We get those hot rods coming through thinking nothing of it. Almost killing these kids. That's why they blocked the roads up."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. We have the information here. We'll have the Highway Committee and the Highway Superintendent take a look at it."

Dominic TaComa, "When will we know about this?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "I don't know what to tell you. To be honest with you, we have so many drainage problems and road problems right now that we're taking a look at. It's going to take some time to get to it. I don't want to tell you something you want to hear. I've got to tell you the facts."

Dominic TaComa, "I know that. Now, you're telling me this. I could wait to be down here next year at this time for the same thing. And you can give me the same story what you're giving me now."

Councilman Lombardi, "Sir. Are you going to be there next week?"

Dominic TaComa, "I am there. I am living there."

Councilman Lombardi, "You are living there. Will you give me your phone number?"

Dominic TaComa, "929-4659."

Councilman Lombardi, "Now, what's the name again?"

Dominic TaComa, "TaComa. T-a-C-o-m-a."

Councilman Lombardi, "Ok. We'll take a ride down there next week. I'll call you before we come down."

Dominic TaComa, "Thank you."

Councilman Lombardi, "We'll see what we can do."

Denis Warchola, "Would you take my number too? Shadey Lane. My name is Denis Warchola. W-a-r-c-h-o-l-a."

Councilman Lombardi, "And what is your phone number sir?"

Denis Warchola, "929-8269. I won't be there next week. I am going away. But I'll be there the week after that. I live there to all year around."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We'll take a ride up there."

Denis Warchola, "Thank you very much."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Is there anyone else? We have one minute before the scheduled public hearing at 7:45. Yes sir. Right after the public hearing you'll have a chance to. Ok. Let the record show that the time of 7:45 p.m. has arisen and we'll have the clerk read the notice of the first public hearing."

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 p.m.

Councilman Prusinowski, "I will re-open the meeting to public comment. You said you needed 3 minutes. We normally have a 5 minute rule so that you make it by a couple of minutes. You have something long?"

Allen Daters, Middle Road, "Very short. First I did.... My name is Allen Daters and I live on Middle Road in Riverhead. I just want to read the wording of a petition. It's 2 sentences. "As residents and property owners in the area affected by the recent flooding of Middle Road and Roanoke Avenue, we the undersigned, strongly request that the Riverhead Town Board investigate the cause or causes of this flooding and act to eliminate or correct them. This situation, as in 1979, is causing a safety and environmental hazard as well as being a nuisance to the public and causing substantial damage to private and public properties. I was here in 1979."

Councilman Prusinowski, "So were we."

Allen Daters, "There weren't too many serious complaints (I don't think) then. Considering how long the water was there. And I think a lot of us hoped it wasn't going to come back. Since this seems to be a persistent problem, I am hoping that it can be looked into for a thought of a permanent fix. I know people are looking at it. We just want....Inaudible. A lot of us are looking at it. These are people in the area. They are not people from all over Riverhead. It's local."

Councilman Prusinowski, "I'd like to say the Town Board is investigating a permanent solution. We do have several options at our disposal now. They all involve a lot of money. In the resolutions tonight, you will hear a resolution requesting the State of New York to divert some monies that was given to the town for secondary road improvement, slated for the Baiting Hollow area in the amount of 1 million 165 thousand dollars or thereabouts, a million one. And we are going to request the state to divert half of that, approximately 500 thousand, down to the Middle Road area. We have several options. John Lombardi, myself, the Highway Superintendent, Charlie Bloss, with the Vector Control of Suffolk County, walked the area on Friday. We definitely know what the problem is. It's a question of getting the money together with the proper engineering to solve the problem. That's really what the decision is coming down to right now. We did try to renovate or improve the Mercy ponds hoping that some of the runoff would carry it. Unfortunately, the water table is high. We have a lot of rain. A lot of water. It's a mess down there. We have pumps down there now pumping out. We have some cooperation with one of your neighbors, Riverhead Cement Block, which was helping out. In fact, that's where Charlie Bloss is tonight. He's down there trying to relieve the area. We thank you for your petition. We are definitely on top of it."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Allen Daters, "I hope it can support you to try and get cooperation from the state."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We might even ask you to have that petition sent up to the state as soon as we find the information about it. Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich, 15th Street, Wading River, "I am sorry our esteem Supervisor isn't here. Because usually he runs a one-man show on many of these things. And to discuss them in his absence, is not quite fair. Something, of course, that he's asked....Inaudible. You're asking for money to be put on Middle Road, whose problem exists for as long as I can remember. You're taking that out of Sound Avenue who, if you put instead of 1 and a half million, you put in 8 million, you still couldn't do a complete job. And so, you once again, you're putting Sound Avenue on the shelf. Because what you need, 1 and half million dollars is hardly adequate. It will just make an initial start. So you're cheating Peter to pay Paul. Accomplishing very little. As far as the drainage in this township goes, the problems that exist, are all 20 and 30 years old. And every year, we don't have the kind of maintenance and improvement. We don't have any work on the ditches. We don't have any minor corrections to problems that would minimize the flooding. The fact that our ground is such that, in the 2 weeks time, everything goes dry and they can forget it until the next storm. So the attitude that has been going on in this township as (I don't know) far as I can remember, 30 or 40 years and is; when it rains, we got a problem. When it dries up, we all forget about it. We need this work on Sound Avenue. We need it badly. We have conditions on Sound Avenue that are more hazardous than Middle Avenue. (Middle Road) And so I don't quite go for that."

Councilman Lombardi, "Bill could I..... Excuse me for one minute Bill."

William Kasperovich, "Are you cutting into my 5 minutes?"

Councilman Lombardi, "No. I'll give you 2 more minutes. I just want to.... You're talking about Sound Avenue. This money here, is not to fix up the road per say. This was on another problem which they want to (the state) raise the road about 50 feet in the air and this is where the money would be coming from. I don't want to get involved in this because we don't want to put a problem here. I will explain it to you later where this money is coming from. Not for the road itself. Not to fix water or drainage or anything else. This was another problem Bill, where this was dedicated from the state."

William Kasperovich, "Why are you so secretive as to where this is?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

John Lombardi, "Well alright. You want to....."

William Kasperovich, "We only have one thing.... Inaudible."

Councilman Lombardi, "Bill. You know where the hill is?"

William Kasperovich, "Everybody that lives there knows where the hill is."

Councilman Lombardi, "Fresh pond hill. Now, the state wanted to raise that 60 feet in the air to level it off. Now, you got houses down there and what would happen to the homes that are in that area? That was just a project that the state wanted to do. And we felt, the Town Board felt, that it wasn't the right thing to do. If they were going to raise it 4 or 5 feet, 10 feet, but they wanted to go 60 feet in the air. So now we're asking for this money (part of it) to be dedicated to Middle Road. It has nothing to do with drainage or anything that would effect Sound Avenue roads or anything like that. This was the problem. Now, if you feel that the state should raise the road 60 feet in that area, then that is your opinion, Bill."

William Kasperovich, "My opinion. One day on the way from my house to the dump, (which I have to do periodically to get rid of my waste) as I came up from the deepest part of the road uphill, a fully loaded 20 ton trailer truck lost its power and its brakes and came down on me like a big monster. It took about 10 years of my life away. Because I had to drive backwards to escape from this thing careening down the hill. Now, to me, when you take 60 feet as compared to my life, 60 feet don't mean a d---. We have a serious problem there."

Councilman Lombardi, "What about the people in that area too. Bill. Do you think they should have their houses....."

William Kasperovich, "I don't think they would come to my wake if that trailer truck had rammed into my vehicle."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Excuse me gentlemen. Bill, I'll ask you to come back to the microphone and continue your 5 minutes. We have a public hearing scheduled for 7:55. So if you'll just excuse me for a few minutes, we will have the Town Clerk read a public notice calling for the public hearing."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank you very much Mrs. Pendzick. Is there anyone here representing the applicant or is the applicant here himself? Would you like to come up to the microphone and state your name and your case in front of the Town Board?"

Kenneth Schmidt, Wading River, "My name is Kenny Schmidt and I am here for the special permit application on the property for a home. That's all I have."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We have the documentation in front of us and the information. Is there anyone here in the public who would like to address any remarks concerning this applicant's proposal in front of the Town Board? That being the case, I declare the hearing closed. Thank you very much."

COUNCILMAN PRUSINOWSKI CLOSED THE 7:55 PUBLIC HEARING
AT 7:56.

Councilman Prusinowski, "Bill."

William Kasperovich, "Now, I am not going to press this thing about getting state money and the roads. I don't think you gentlemen handled this properly as far as getting state money. I am going back as far as the days of H2M preparing the booklet for the work that was needed in the township outside of the town itself. The priorities and the type and manner of work is pretty much spelled out there. I happen to know this because I went around with the H2M engineer in being of some assistance in the westerly end of the township. So we have many places that we need the money and you people have decided to discard that entire service and apply it to an area which you feel you know what the priority should be. I don't agree with it. I don't think that's for the best interest of the township as a whole. Now, enough said on that. I came in here yesterday so I could prepare myself so I could stand up here and talk with some intelligence and fortunately the town agenda was prepared except for resolutions. I'd like to see what this is about increasing the improvement of the Water District facilities. In the Town Clerk's office, not one piece of paper to back this public hearing up. Now, this type of conduct, once again, I com-

plain about and I'll continue to complain about, as long as I have breath in me. This is not the way I want the town to be run. Number 2; in your resolutions, you're sending the Fire Inspector to a basic fire discussion course and you're giving him a carte blanche expense account. I thought we resolved, many years ago, that we would put a top limit dollar wise and would indicate to all, just about how much money this is and to what direction. We certainly can say an outside minimum figure. Now, many of these resolutions were cut and dry long before yesterday and yet the only way a person could tell what's going to be here, is to sit in on your work sessions or to come here before the meeting and rush through to see what you have planned. I think, for the more serious matters, the public should know in advance of the evening session, when the resolution is voted on, what indication of the Town Board is. Many years ago, we had complaints that we were in the old building. We didn't have a bulletin board. We didn't have an entry way. We didn't have a proper place. Now, we have a big bulletin board and we still don't put out to the public what should be the public's interest. Now, if the Supervisor chooses to play games with the newspaper reporters and give them information for articles and such, that is his choice in life. For the resident taxpayer and the citizens in this community, I say; we have the facility in this Town Hall. We should use them. In which case brings me to my concluding thing; is that I think that if we have come to a point in this township where we budgeted enough to carpet the floor and put in nice luxurious stuffed chairs, then we have come to a point where we have to look at the efficiency of the functioning bodies within the township. If we have got enough people, if we have got enough money, then we should see that the taxpayer gets the best out of that dollar. And right now, sorry to say; the indications are not in that direction."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank you very much Bill. Is there anyone else.... Do you want to say something Dick? I am sorry."

Richard Ehlers, "Excuse me. If I can just address Mr. Kasperovich's concerns regarding the Water District resolution. Since that is a bond resolution, if I may just interrupt for a second. The Town Clerk's file contained a full map and plan in the form of a bid specifications which had been the basis for the letting of the bids for the Reeves Park area which included all the information relative to the water pipes under the alternate which were the discussion in that bond resolution which called the public hearing tonight. So that information was all available to the Town Clerk and the Town Clerk properly had it all in her files. So it's unfortunate that you were not able to view it. However, it was all there at the time."

William Kasperovich, "If the clerk at the office can not respond to my request, there's nothing I can do to resolve it. I can't climb over the counter and go find it myself. I came to the office and I asked for the papers. If you want to get technical and legal about it, there wasn't even a notice put up on the bulletin board that the public hearing was for tonight."

Irene Pendzick, "Yes there was."

William Kasperovich, "Well, you check with your girl that...."

Irene Pendzick, "I have...."

William Kasperovich, ".....talked to me because we went up and down and it wasn't there."

Irene Pendzick, "Bill. Excuse me. I have to address the defense of my staff. You have come and asked for information from the office many many times and I think....."

William Kasperovich, "That's got nothing to do with the public hearing for tonight."

Irene Pendzick, "And I think you will say...."

William Kasperovich, "That's got nothing to do with the public hearing tonight."

Irene Pendzick, "Mr. Kasperovich please."

William Kasperovich, "What do you mean please? You're going to tell me....."

Councilman lArtale, "Bill you had your say. Let her have hers please."

Irene Pendzick, "You haven't let me finished. I just want to add, they have also been helpful and have tried to assist you. Is that true?"

William Kasperovich, "That's got nothing to do with the public hearing tonight."

Irene Pendzick, "You don't always make clear what you're asking for and they can't find it."

William Kasperovich, "That's right. Then when the girl says no, I say thank you. Sorry to have bothered you and walk out."

Irene Pendzick, "If you don't ask for it clearly, they can't find it."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Bill. I'm sorry. You've had your say on this matter. Your point is well taken. Let's move on to another matter. I'm sure there are other people in the audience who have other things to say to the Town Board."

Linda Stopnoski, Roanoke Avenue, "My name is Linda Stopnoski and I live on the corner of Middle Road and Roanoke Avenue and I felt I had to come here today to talk to you. I would like to show you these photographs while I am talking. And if you would please return them to my husband before you leave tonight. Thank you. I would just like to tell you about my inconvenience in living in the flood. Thank you. I can not get out of my driveway. My driveway is flooded. The road is flooded. The road is closed. Even if I could get out of my driveway, I would lose my brakes. Ok. I do not have a basement. I have a crawl space. My crawl space is filled with water. I am pumping constantly, as my neighbors along the road who may have basements. My children have to walk through a foot of water in order to catch the bus. I have 3 children in elementary school. Therefore, I have to take my children to school and bring them home. How do I do that? Well, I am parking in the neighbors yard and I have to go through a foot of water with my car in order to get out of their yard. I drive without brakes. And if you think that isn't taking 10 years off your life, (believe me) when you have 3 kids in a car without brakes..... What else? Well, I do not get mail because the mailman can't come through. For 2 days I do not have mail. What else? Well let's see. My neighbors have been complaining. I have been complaining. I have complained to everyone. I have complained to the Health Board. We have seen rats. I have mosquitos like you wouldn't believe. The barn swallows are having a ball out there. The neighbors and I have completely had it. We've complained to Mr. Lombardi. He's been very cooperative. He's telling us that we've been working on it. Mr. Bloss has been working on it. They temporarily, did pump some water into a sump by John Wesley Village. However, the pump broke and all the water came back."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We purchased a new pump today."

Linda Stopnoski, "I understand that. One week ago yesterday, I had as much water as I have today. Not one inch has gone down. Now, what I want is; I want emergency help so I can get back into my yard. I want the water out now. I don't care where you put it. You can send it to California for all I care."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We have worked that out."

Linda Stopnoski, "Number 2: I want a long range plan. Three years ago you had developed a plan that would cost anywhere from 350 thousand to 400 thousand dollars. Well, if you think that is going to stay at that price, it's not. If you don't do something now, in 3 or 4 years it's going to go up and the problem is going to come back. Because we had the same problem in 1979 and it is worse now. Believe me. It is worse now. I would also like.... Well, I've talked to the assessor

about adjusting my taxes because I am paying almost 2 thousand dollars in taxes. I have shrubbery under water. I have my perennial garden under water, (as you can see from the photographs) and I have my grass under water. We take pride in our lawn and I don't think it's fair that we have to sit in this water and swamp area. By the way, my kindergartner, which is my smallest one, she does take the bus home and I take off my shoes and I walk barefoot to the bus in a foot of water to lift her off. She's the only one I can lift. The other 2, I have to go pick up. I don't know what else to say. I need help. So I figure I am going to come here. Mr. Lombardi has been very cooperative. I have spoken to him many times on the phone. Mr. Bloss even came to see me tonight before he started pumping. But I need help. So I am here. Please help me. Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We're trying to do the best we can. We know it's a tough situation. Yes. We did have that plan. Like I said, it came down to the finances and working and getting the proper engineering. We did do some work on the 2 ponds. We do have a plan up about a thousand feet up the intersection of Middle Road and Roanoke Avenue adjacent to the Riverhead Cement Block property. A small drainage project up there which will help alleviate some of the water coming down to the intersection and we're hopefully going to try to find the money to implement the permanent solution. And it is a difficult problem. The ground water is there. The reason why the water is going nowhere is because there is no way for the water to go because the ground water is up so high. John Wesley Village was very cooperative. John called them up and asked them if we could use their pump and they give us permission and Charlie has worked out a plan to remove some of the water off Middle Road to relieve some of the flooding and we did rent a pump that pumps 90 thousand gallons an hour and we are going to be utilizing that along with the new pump. So we are working on the problem. And like I said, Charlie is up there tonight and we hear you. We're going to do the best we can. Yes sir."

Bob Tressler, 1428 Roanoke Avenue, "Good evening. My name is Bob Tressler. I live at 1428 Roanoke Avenue. I am the neighbor whose driveway she happens to be using and I also have to drive through that foot of water to get out onto Roanoke and then ride with one foot on the brake and the other on the gas hoping I can dry them out before I hit that traffic circle and I hit somebody else. So far I've been successful. One thing I found out. I've only lived there a year. My wife had previously lived in that house. Her family owned it. It was build about 35 years ago. And a misconception that I have found, the people outside the area, they seem to think (as one gentleman stated earlier) that problem has been there for 30 years. Now, in circling that petition, I walked up and down Roanoke Avenue and parts of Middle Road and talked with people that have lived there for that length of time.

Including my father-in-law who built that house 35 years ago. Believe me, they didn't dig their cellars into water and...."

TAPE ENDED CONVERSATION WAS INTERRUPTED.

Bob Tressler, "...with the sumps, the pumps in their basement. For a while they would pump for a couple of weeks and the next year it was a month. Some people are pumping year around. We've been pumping since February with no end in sight. Now, you stated that you have a solution to this."

Councilman Prusinowski, "There is an engineering solution to the problem. As Mrs. Stopnoski has stated, in 1979 it was estimated at 350 thousand to 400 thousand dollars. We took that engineering solution on Friday and walked the area which was proposed for the solution with the Town Attorney, (also I forgot to mention that Dick was with us) to see if we could streamline that proposal and still accomplish the same thing."

Bob Tressler, "Excuse me Vic."

Councilman Prusinowski, "But apparently we can't. Now, the thing is that we have drainage bond money that was authorized in 1979. We have projects on the board. We're at the 3 million dollar ceiling now. I was talking to the town accountant tonight, their controller. We have to find the money to do this project and it really comes down to dollars. Now, we did spend 20 to 30 thousand dollars on the Mercy ponds. We tried to irrigate them. We tried to put the foliage on the side. We cleaned them up. We connected the 3 ponds to try to make a drainage system in there. What has happened is that the ground water has..... We have 2 different engineering groups looking at the Middle Road project. So we have... We really know what the problem is."

Bob Tressler, "Could you give us a brief synopsis of what that solution is?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "So I think basically, we all know what the problem is and we're just trying to find the money to get the thing accomplished. Now, in the mean time, the Highway Superintendent is doing the best he can with the highway committee. John is up there all the time with Charlie and we've arranged to get these pumps in and we're going to try to do the best we can to alleviate the water problem."

Bob Tressler, "We appreciate that. But I do want you to know (and I think all my neighbors would agree) you're pumping that water above us. So it's going to go from that road into the basement."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Councilman Prusinowski, "Unfortunately we have no other place to pump it. It's the only way we have to get rid of that water at the present time. I know it's not a good solution. It's the only solution we can think of. Even the pumps we have, you know it pumps a lot of water but it can't..... See, the pumps can only pump..... For us to run the hose a mile down the road, we can do. But the pumps don't work that way. It's costing us 8 to 9 hundred dollars a week to rent the other pump and we went out and spent 3 thousand dollars on the new pump. So we are trying to do the best we can. It's an area....."

Bob Tressler, "Perhaps if this had been addressed properly in 1979 when you first came up with this solution, you wouldn't have the problem now and be spending that money. So what do we have to look forward to in the mean time to get this fixed?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Well, the first thing we're going to do, is we're going to apply for this money. We're trying to ask the state. There has been money allocated for Riverhead Town for another secondary road project. We are going to try to get the state to re-allocate some of that money from Sound Avenue down to this project. I was talking to Jack tonight. He's going to get me an exact figure on where we are in the drainage bond. We'll probably meet with the engineers again with the Town Board to find out exactly what would be the best solution to the problem is. Then the discussion was put to the Town Board as a group to decide what we're going to do. How much money we're going to spend and when we're going to spend it. In the mean time, it's not going to be done within 6 months. So these drainage projects, once you make the commitment to do them, it takes time. You have to get the bid documents. You have to get the engineering done. The legal documents have to be written. If there are easements, property owners involved, that takes time. Public hearings have to be called. So it's a process. One of the reasons we did not do it in 1979 because it involves so many property owners and it got so complex. We thought that there might be a better way to do it. We tried the other way. The water table just came up faster than anybody could imagine. Even the engineers, when they did this maintenance on the Mercy ponds, did not anticipate this kind of flooding. Now, one of the problems we will solve definitely, it's going to be done short term is (like you said) a thousand feet north of the intersection of the road up Roanoke Avenue by Riverhead Cement Block. We're going to do a small project up there which will collect some of that water that's running down towards you. That involves Riverhead Cement Block and the Town of Riverhead. So that's going to be done. The Town Board has given the authorization for that. The engineering is done on that. That's going to proceed as soon as possible. In the mean time, we have to look at these other options."

Bob Tressler, "To relieve our frustration of the whole situation, who do we have to contact as to the progression of this?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Councilman Prusinowski, "You can either call John or myself. We are the highway committee. And Charlie Bloss. We are the 2 guys on the highway committee."

Councilman Lombardi, "We'll keep pushing as much as we can."

Bob Tressler, "Well, if you need the support of the neighborhood and signatures, whatever, petitions, pictures."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Well, what we might need if this project with the state follows through, we might need your support to get that appropriate state official and Department of Transportation. Put a little pressure on him to re-allocate this money from Sound Avenue down to you. So that's why that petition is important. Because this is state money. And that would be the fastest way to do it. If we can get that money from them. Because that money is there appropriated and they want to proceed with Sound Avenue and we are not that thrilled with that particular project."

Bob Tressler, "Neither are we."

Councilman Prusinowski, "This is where we are right now. That's the honest evaluation of the situation. It's tough. We have been up there every day. I drive by it all the time and it's a mess. What can I tell you? It's not a pleasant situation. In fact, it's very frustrating. Because as we were pumping the water the other day into the John Wesley sump, the water was filling up faster in the sump. I mean the water was coming down Middle Road faster then we could pump it into the sump. That's a very frustrating thing. We know what you are going through. Because I know my neighborhood in Jamesport during that flood, we completely got flooded out too. It's not a very nice situation to have over a foot of water in your basement."

Bob Tressler, "Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. Anybody else wishing to address the Board? Yes sir. You had your hand up a few times."

Albert Stopnoski, Middle Road and Roanoke Avenue, "My name is Albert Stopnoski and I live on the corner of Middle Road and Roanoke. You say this problem was there in 1979 and the board started to do something about it and apparently when the water went down the ball was dropped and that's the last we hear of it until now. Ok. You say that the water table here, that is not the water table. Why is Roanoke Avenue got the water up to 13 feet higher then the water at the duck pond? It can't be the water table. Why? Because under the whole area is 40 feet of clay. The water is not going through clay very fast. It's going to stay there. Houses were built in the area (like Bob says) with cellars with no water. That is a natural water drainage area through there. It use to go down all the way through the duck farm. Not every day when

it had to. Fine. I don't know. I just been there about 7 years myself. I don't like being in water this long. I didn't complain much in 1979. I figured somebody was going to do something to make it go away. It didn't. It's not going to. It's going to get worse. The only problem is it's got to get to the duck farm. No wheres else. I haven't lived there by people who have been there before me, have lived in the area, use to follow the water down through the duck farm. Why doesn't it go there now. Something has been changed. Until this problem is corrected, it's going to stay there."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We understand that and we know that."

Albert Stopnoski, "But pumping out and all that, that's fine for now."

Councilman Prusinowski, "It's temporary."

Albert Stopnoski, "Right. Unless it goes to the duck farm, that problem will never be solved with sumps or anything else. It's got to get all the way to the duck farm and then to the river."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We understand that."

Albert Stopnoski, "Ok. So you got to put it down to the duck farms and nobody wants to spend the money."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We know that."

Albert Stopnoski, "Why doesn't it go down there now?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "I'd rather not say right now."

Albert Stopnoski, "Ok. But you realize that it did go down there years ago. It did not stay where it is now. Mercy High was built on pilings. It was all filled. I realize that. But it's got to go down there. Any other solution is a waste of money in my opinion."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We know that. You're right on target."

Albert Stopnoski, "So I don't want to see anything else. Temporarily done now, yes. But eventually I want to see a drainage somehow get into that duck farm. Until then, I am not going to be very happy because I am tired of paying high taxes and living in water. I've heard....."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Councilman Prusinowski, "What I meant, (by the way) the water table is high. I meant that because of the water coming down....."

Albert Stopnoski, "Right. I want you to realize it's not the water table. Everybody thought that the water table was high."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Well, the water table was higher in 1979 all over town. You're right."

Albert Stopnoski, "But the reason I want you to know it's higher is because we live in a clay bowl there. It's got to drain off to a side. Not down. Not north. Nowhere. It has got to go south. The water flow goes from north to south. Ok? Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank you very much. Is there anyone else wishing to address the Town Board? Eddie."

Fred Terry, 1661 Old Country Road, "My name is Fred Terry I live at 1661 Old Country Road. I don't have no complaint to make. I'd just like to ask for a little information."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Sure."

Fred Terry, "About Iron Pier. Are we going to be able to put boats out there this year?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "I'll refer that question to our recreation chairman, Mr. Artale."

Councilman Artale, "Yes. As a matter of fact, we are working on Iron Pier now. We just received the Army Corp. of Engineers permit that we can go ahead and put the sand in there. Our engineering department is making a temporary ramp to go alongside of the ramp that has been devastated. That old ramp will be taken out."

Fred Terry, "Thank you very much."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank you sir. I think Eddie you had your hand up."

Eddie Purcell, East Main Street, "My name is Eddie Purcell. I live on East Main Street in Riverhead. I think I can shed a little light on part of the reason why there is such a problem with drainage in town. Mr. Lombardi knows that the mosquito control that use to take care of all these duck farms and all the drainage ditches have lost a lot of men. So they don't go in and take care of the drainage ditches. And I, like people up on Middle Road, have water in the cellar. The house was built a hundred years ago. And up until 5 or 6 years ago, we never had water. And that's basically because they (mosquito control or vector control, whatever it is called now) doesn't come out and dig the ditches out like they use to do. And I had problems

and they say; well, they can't handle the work. Now, I know Mr. Lombardi. He's working hard on it. But I've had problems for 5 years with water and the basic problem is, (as you said) the water has to flow. Now, water from Middle Road flows down across 58. It also flows down across 25 down on East Main Street and it goes right past my house. I've lived there all my life and I (when I was a young kid) use to travel all the way up through there. So I know the area. And basically, a lot of sand that has come off the roads, have drained into these streams and built up the stream bed. And because of that, the water table around the stream has come up. With that coming up, then up a little further, you end up with water in your cellar. And basically, what has to be done is: is they have to go through the whole system all the way up from the other side of 58 and work their way down and it does cost a lot of money. It's a big job. And I've been trying to get mine down for 5 years and I've just been getting a run around from vector control. Basically because they are short on help. Originally they had (I think) about 300 men."

Councilman Lombardi, "165."

Eddie Purcell, "165 men. Right now they only have 55 men. 65 men. And they really can't do the job that they use to do. So pressure really has to be put on the county government because a lot of the trouble really is the county's problem. Because they are supposed to keep these duck farm areas cleaned. Now, when you go further on down from where I am, (on East Main Street) you have some abandoned duck farms. And when the duck farms were running, you never had any trouble. But as soon as they got closed up by the Environmental Protection Agency because they weren't clean enough, the water stopped flowing and it over grew with reeds. And right now, that's a big problem. The fact that some of these duck farms are closed up and where they use to be free flowing streams now all it is is a marsh area. And really (I know the Town Board) they don't know where to tell you to go and who to see and I've been working on it and trying to get it done because it's effected me for quite a while. My wife, she's getting on my back. She says go down and bug somebody. But really what has to be done is that, these drainage ditches have to be cleaned out and they can't be done just once. They have to have a regular system of cleaning them out. And the only way you're going to get anything done, the way I feel, pressure has to be put on by homeowners in the county government. Because a lot of the trouble is their area which are supposed to control all these streams. They're supposed to take care of it and keep the streams flowing free. And even in the summer time, you're going to end up with a lot of mosquitos when these stream beds are dry and you'll still have water in your backyard. That's because the water table just around the streams

are high. Even if it doesn't..... Like he said, there's a clay bottom and it has to flow. But it can't flow if there is water in the streams. That's about all I have to say."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank you Eddie. Is there anyone else wishing to address the Town Board? Steve."

Steve Haizlip, Calverton, "Mr. Lombardi. Sorry. Mr. alternate Supervisor. Mr. Lombardi. You say you've been monitoring this and you're the chairman and you've been watching it."

Councilman Lombardi, "What are you talking about? Mosquito control or....."

Steve Haizlip, "The Roanoke Avenue and Middle Road pond. I come by there a couple of times going to the dump on Sunday morning and come down by the cement place (Bucholz cement place) and I seen the the water coming down the stream of the side ditches then moving and crossing over. Where is that water coming from? That must be a contributing factor also."

Councilman Lombardi, "A lot of that water is coming off the farm on the corner. Anderson's farm and it's coming right down to the bottom of the hill there. And we have a drain that goes into the golf course. I guess that's been there 30 or 40 years. I really don't know. Some of that water goes into that area and it is flooding his golf course. He's got a problem in there. Now, if Ed Bucholz wanted to close up that drain on us, he could close it up and he's been good enough to let us drain our water into that or the water coming off the farm all off their property, into that area. So we are doing some work in that area to alleviate that problem. And we are going to try to do some work at Middle Road as much as we can. As I said, it's a problem there that's been there for a while now. The water table does go down and then it comes up. The water has got to go towards the river. Towards the duck farm. There's no getting away from it."

Steve Haizlip, "Thank you for the information John."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. Is there anyone else wishing to address the Town Board on any issue at all? Ok. That being the case, we'll take a 10 minute recess until 25 minutes until 9 o'clock."

CHAPTER 96
TRASH, RUBBISH, AND REFUSE REMOVAL

96-1. Accumulations on Occupied Premises, Prohibited.

Every person who is the owner of land lying and situated within the Town of Riverhead or who occupies, rents, or leases any such land and all appurtenances thereto shall keep such land and all appurtenances thereto free and clear from all trash, rubbish, garbage, weeds, grass, refuse or other objects.

96-1. Failure to Remove Refuse, Weeds and Trash.

A. Authority to remove. In the event the owner, occupant or tenant of such land shall fail to remove such weeds, trash, garbage, grass, refuse or other objects that cause such land to be a nuisance in the Town, the Town shall have the authority, as provided for herein, to enter onto such land and clean the same and to charge the cost expense of such action against the owner and establish a lien in the manner herein provided.

B. Town Board Action. Any person, corporation or association which is the owner of real property in the Town of Riverhead shall be required to remove the items set forth in Subsection A which may exist upon its land when directed to do so by resolution of the Town Board, pursuant to the authority provided under sections 64 and 130 of the Town Law.

C. Notice to be served. Whenever the Town Board shall adopt a resolution requiring the owners of land to remove rubbish or debris which exists thereon, the Town Board shall specify the time within which such work shall be completed. Such notice shall set forth with reasonable certainty the location at which the condition exists and the manner in which the removal work shall be performed. The owners shall be given at least ten (10) days from the date of mailing of the notice within which the work shall be performed, and in any event such notice shall grant a reasonable time, giving due consideration to the amount of accumulation of rubbish or debris and the location thereof. Notice of adoption of a resolution requiring the removal work may be served upon the owners of the property at which the condition exists by ordinary mail, addressed to the last known address of said owners.

D. Failure to comply. Whenever a notice or notices referred to in Subsection C of this section has been served and the owners shall neglect or fail to comply with such notice within the time provided therein, the Town Board shall authorize the work to be done and shall provide for the cost thereof to be paid from general town funds as directed by resolution.

E. Manner of Assessment of cost upon real property. In any case where it shall be necessary for the Town Board to have the work performed due to the failure of the owner to comply with the Town Board's resolution, the Town shall be reimbursed for the cost of the work performed or the services rendered at its direction, by assessment or levy upon the lots or parcels of land where such work was performed or such services rendered. So much of the actual cost as was actually incurred upon each lot or parcel and the charge therefor shall be assessed and collected in the same manner and in the same time as other ad valorem Town charges.

(1) -- Such motor vehicle is the inventory or part of the inventory of a new or used motor vehicle dealer located in compliance with the ordinances and local laws of the Town of Riverhead.

(2) -- Such motor vehicle has been converted to and is actually used as a permanent building or structure for carrying on purposes in such manner and circumstances as authorized by the local laws and ordinances of the Town of Riverhead.

CHAPTER 100
VEHICLES, JUNKED AND ABANDONED

Section 100-1. Purpose

The Town Board of the Town of Riverhead recognizing that the uncontrolled placing or keeping of junked, abandoned, or discarded motor vehicles constitutes an unsanitary, unsafe, unsightly and dangerous condition, and recognizing that in order to protect and promote the public safety, health, and general welfare of the people of the Town of Riverhead, it is necessary to provide for the removal of such junked vehicles, hereby declared such junked vehicles to be a public nuisance.

RESOLUTIONS ContinuedSection 100-2. Definitions.A. Terms defined.

JUNKED VEHICLE - Any motor vehicle, including a trailer (motorized or not) which is without a currently valid license plate or plates and is in such a rusted, wrecked, discarded, dismantled, partly dismantled, inoperative or abandoned condition so as to be no longer intended or in condition for legal use on the public highways.

MOTOR VEHICLE - Every vehicle originally designed or intended to be operated, drawn or driven, or capable of being operated, drawn or driven, upon a public highway by any power other than muscular power. For the purposes of this chapter, the term "motor vehicle" shall include but shall not be limited to automobiles, trucks, buses, motorcycles and trailers.

OWNER OF MOTOR VEHICLE - A person, firm or corporation having the property in or title to a motor vehicle, including a person entitled to the use and possession of a vehicle subject to a security interest in another person and also including any lessee or bailee of a motor vehicle having the use thereof under lease or otherwise.

OWNER OF PRIVATE PROPERTY - A person, firm or corporation who is the owner, contract purchaser, tenant, lessee, occupant, undertenant, receiver or assignee of private premises or private property located within the Town of Riverhead.

PREMISES OR PROPERTY - Included all parcels of real property which are situated in the Town of Riverhead, whether occupied or vacant.

B. The enforcement officer shall make the determination as to whether any particular vehicle shall be classified as a junk vehicle and shall consider the following in making this determination: The physical condition of the vehicle, any statements as to its abandonment by the person in legal control thereof, the length of time it was last used on the public highways, whether the vehicle is currently licensed, whether or not the owner thereof intends to recover the vehicle or whether or not the owner can be found after due and reasonable inquiry and any other relevant facts.

Section 100-3. Outdoor storage prohibited.

It shall be unlawful for any person, firm or corporation to store or place, or cause, or permit to be stored or placed a junked motor vehicle, or part or piece thereof, on any property within the Town of Riverhead, unless:

(A) Such motor vehicle is stored or placed on a premises legally used, operated, and located for a junkyard; or

(B) Such motor vehicle is stored or placed in a completely enclosed building; or

(C) Such motor vehicle is the inventory or part of the inventory of a new or used motor vehicle dealer located in compliance with the ordinances and laws of the Town of Riverhead; or

(D) Such motor vehicle has been converted to and is actually used as a permanent building or structure for carrying on purposes in such manner and circumstances as authorized by the ordinances and laws of the Town of Riverhead; or

(E) Such motor vehicle is a camping house or boat trailer otherwise stored and used in compliance with the ordinances and laws of the Town of Riverhead.

Section 100-4. Notice of Violation; Service of Notice.

A. Whenever the enforcement officer shall determine that a vehicle at any location within the Town of Riverhead shall be classified as a junked vehicle, he shall serve an appearance ticket as hereinafter provided upon the owner, occupant or person having charge of such private property, and upon the owner of, or responsible agent for said junked vehicle, to comply with the requirements of this chapter.

B. It shall be sufficient service of the appearance ticket if it is served personally upon the owner or person having charge of said junked vehicle or upon the owner or person having charge of such private property on which the junked vehicle is located. It shall also be deemed sufficient service of the appearance ticket if it is posted in a conspicuous manner upon the premises and upon the vehicle affected and a copy thereof mailed by certified or registered mail, return receipt requested, on the same day as such posting to the last known address of the owner of the junked vehicle and of the owner of the real property on which said junked vehicle is located as the same shall appear in the current assessment rolls.

Section 100-5. Enforcement and Compliance.

In the event that an owner, occupant or person having charge of private property or other person responsible for such junked vehicle is found guilty of a violation of this chapter, such person shall be given a reasonable period of time to either remove the vehicle or bring it into compliance with this chapter. If such vehicle is not either removed or brought into compliance with this chapter within a reasonable time, the Justice of the Peace may issue an order directing the removal of said motor vehicle by the Riverhead Town Police or by a person engaged in the towing business within the Town of Riverhead.

RESOLUTIONS ContinuedSection 100-6. Costs and Fees.

A. If the Town of Riverhead proceeds with the removal of a junked vehicle, the Town may let contracts therefor. The cost of such removal may be met from appropriations made therefor. The enforcement officer shall keep a record of such notices together with the procedures involved and the items of cost incurred in their execution. An impoundment form shall be used by police for each removal.

B. The person having charge of the private property on which said junked vehicle is located and the owner of such junked vehicle shall be required to reimburse the Town for all costs and expenses incurred by the Town in connection with the proceeding to remove junked vehicles pursuant to this ordinance, including a reasonable storage charge for every day after such removal, and also including a reasonable charge for administration and handling expenses; said costs and expenses shall also be assessed against the land on which said junked vehicle was located and from which it was removed, and shall be and become a lien on said land as of the date of such assessment if reimbursement is not forthcoming from the above described responsible persons.

C. Notwithstanding the foregoing, and in addition to any other remedy, the Town of Riverhead may maintain an action against the owner of said junked vehicle and/or against the owner of the property on which the junked vehicle is located to recover the cost of the removal of such junked vehicle including a reasonable storage charge for every day after such removal, and also including a reasonable charge for administration and handling expenses.

D. The fees and charges referred to in this chapter shall be the same as established pursuant to Section 101-22A of this Code.

Section 100-7. Recovery by owner.

A. Prior to authorizing the release or surrender of such removed vehicle, the enforcement officer shall require the vehicle owner to produce proper identification of ownership.

B. No vehicle shall be released from the pound by a desk officer until all removal and storage charges have been paid.

Section 100-8. Penalties for offenses.

Dick Benedict, Fanning Boulevard, "As long as we are going to be (possibly, just possibly) getting back 500 thousand dollars to work on a drainage problem on Middle Road and Roanoke Avenue, there is a permanent drainage problem just east on Middle Road also which the Highway Department put up a sign up there which says flood area. Now I travel Roanoke to Middle Road every morning and every evening. It's been flooded maybe 3 times since 1979. Middle Road to the east by Fanning Boulevard, has been flooded maybe 30 times. And Mr. Bloss tells me that the reason is, that the pipe is too small by the road and he has no funds. I think he could probably cure that problem with 10 or 20 thousand dollars if you do get the 500 thousand. Thank you. You don't even have to amend your resolution. It's still Middle Road."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank you Dick. Steve Haizlip had his hand up."

Steve Haizlip, Calverton, "Mr. alternate Supervisor and the other members of the Board."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Alternate?"

Steve Haizlip, "You're acting tonight right? Shall I say actor?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "I am certainly acting."

Steve Haizlip, "In January, I wrote to Mr. Roscoe Edgar of the Internal Revenue. In turn it got to Mr. Carney's hand. And so it went back to the Internal Revenue man and what the subject is about is; that the people in the town of Riverhead and the metropolitan transportation authority area is getting swindled. Both are owned by the state and the federal government. Here's what's happening. We have an industry tax imposed upon our telephone and gas and to Long Island Lighting and lights. This MTA tax comes in on your bill and we pay it to Long Island Lighting and to the telephone. They get the option of deducting it and it don't cost them a dime. And so we have to pay it without the benefit, as it says in this letter, caption of taxes..... Now the letter has many laws and sections in it from this Internal Revenue gentleman Mr..... They write this so scratchy. Now, what the problem is here is this: it says state and local general sales tax. And in the

captioned paragraph of the letter, they state the same thing. So it comes down in short, that the metropolitan one quarter cent sales tax, any industry tax, is not a general sales tax of the State of New York. It is designated by section 1109 of the tax law and consolidated laws of New York state and so forth, all entitled sale and caption use tax for the metropolitan area. I was hoping that I might be able to see Mr. Seivers here tonight which he is our state representative aide to Sawicki. And maybe go about and let's get this word general out of this New York state law. The federal government won't allow us to take this MTA tax being put on our telephone and gas pipe bill and they won't allow us to take this quarter cent that is being levied against us for the use of the metropolitan. So right now, I have letters before Mr. "Ruskowski" and Bob Dolan. Getting them to allow this MTA tax, and they give a code 164 of the Internal law. The Internal Revenue law. Now, until I maybe can enlist your help and all these people's help, start writing letters. And let's get this word general sales tax out of the state. Out of the law. And let's call it state and local. Because in item 4 here, they say state and local. Then they got the word general sales tax. Now, Mr. Ehlers, I'll be glad to let you reproduce this and have it for your benefit. Because I believe, it will help these fellows in composing this. If I do get any help from you which I believe you will be instrumental in helping."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Steve, we will also forward a copy of that letter for you to Mr. Seivers if you'd like."

Steve Haizlip, "Alright, good. Now, another thing that I've seen today in the paper, that this swindle sewer system back up on the west end. I am sorry. But that's the way I feel sometimes and I have to express it that way. They want to go out and get another quarter percent tax and make the tax 7½ percent. Now, like I stated once before, like this judge rules about the use of that thing up there. Now, even Mr. Blass, who is our local legislative district representative. I hope he is not in a position to sell us out on this and vote for it. Because I don't think we should be doing this."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Mr. Blass, in the past, has voted consistently against an increase in the sales tax and probably he will vote..... I believe they were voting today or something. I don't know how he voted. Or tomorrow. I believe, he'll probably vote the same way. In the past, he's always voted against it."

Steve Haizlip, "Alright good."

Councilman Prusinowski, "I know that. That's a record. Now, what he does tomorrow is up to him. Thank you Steve. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Town Board on any matter?"


Councilman Boschetti, "I have a comment I would like to make."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Sure."

Councilman Boschetti, "Regarding everyone who has been up here tonight relative to the Middle Road and Roanoke Avenue flooding, I'd just like to say; I can certainly understand the frustration that everyone feels about such an item. I too, have about a foot of water on my property as of yesterday. So I can share and emphathize what they're going through. I would like to point out that having been here every day and seeing John Lombardi and Vic out there, I know that they are trying to stay on top of the problem. But one thing that people should be very clear about is; there is no way that the Town Board can even remotely guarantee that there is a quick fix to these kind of problems. Unfortunately, where I am, I don't think the town can help in my particular situation. But we are in a position to try to help those in the Middle Road/Roanoke Avenue area and we will certainly do so. I'd just like to reiterate what's been said. The town is striving to do so. And certainly anybody that has any ideas or comments as to how we will expedite this problem and resolving it, certainly I am more than willing to listen to what they have to say. But again, there are no quick fix solutions and I hope everyone understands that. We will do everything we can do to get it resolved as quickly as possible. But it's certainly not going to be done tomorrow. Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank you Lou. Anyone else like to talk to us about anything? Thank you for coming tonight. I declare the meeting adjourned."

There being no further business on motion or vote, the meeting adjourned at 9:25 p.m.
