CERTIFICATE APPROVING THE ISSUANCE OF CERTAIN BONDS BY THE TOWN OF RIVERHEAD INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT AGENCY

WHEREAS, pursuant to Title 1 of Article 18-A of the General Municipal law of the State of New York (the "State") and Chapter 624 of the Laws of 1980 of the State (collectively, the "Act"), the Town of Riverhead (the "Town") has heretofore duly caused to be appointed the Chairman and members of the Town of Riverhead Industrial Development Agency (the "Issuer") and has duly caused to be filed in the office of the Secretary of State of the State the certificates required by Section 856 of the General Municipal law; and

WHEREAS, the Town has been advised by the Issuer that the Issuer proposes to issue, contingent upon the execution of this certificate, its Industrial Development Revenue Bonds (George Malvese & Co., Inc., Facility) in an aggregate principal amount sufficient to pay the cost of acquiring, constructing and equipping the below described facility (the "Facility"), presently established to be approximately \$500,000, but not to exceed \$10,000,000 (the "Bonds"); and

WHEREAS, the Facility shall consist of the acquisition of approximately 4.98 acres of land located on Old Country Road (County Route 58) and Middle Road, Riverhead, and the construction thereon of a building of approximately 10,000 square feet for use by George Malvese & Co., Inc., or by Malvese Equipment Co., Inc. in the business of selling agricultural and light industrial equipment, including the acquisition and installation of equipment thereon; and

WHEREAS, it is the intent of the Issuer that interest on the Bonds qualify for exemption from federal income taxation pursuant to Section 103(b) (6) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1954, as amended (the "Code"); and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 103(k) of the Code, interest on the Bonds will not qualify for exemption from federal income taxation unless the issuance of the Bonds is approved by the Town after a public hearing to consider the issuance of the Bonds, the Facility owner and Facility occupant and the nature and location of the Facility has been conducted following reasonable public notice; and

WHEREAS, on February 18, 1983, the Issuer held such a public hearing, and a transcript or report of the public hearing has been made available to the Town Board and Supervisor of the Town; and

WHEREAS, the Town desires that the interest on the Bonds qualify for exemption from federal income taxation.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Joseph F. Janoski, the Supervisor of The Town of Riverhead, as the chief elected executive officer of the Town, for the sole purpose of qualifying the interest payable on the Bonds for exemption from federal income taxation pursuant to the provisions of Section 103(b) of the Code, do hereby approve the issuance by the Issuer of the Bonds, provided that the Bonds, and the premium (if any) and interest thereon, shall be special obligations of the Issuer and shall never be a debt of the State or any political subdivision thereof, including without limitation the Town, and neither the State nor any political subdivision thereof, including without limitation the Town, shall be liable thereon.

Bill Nohejl: "Two or three weeks? Four weeks? Not one day, two days?"

Irene J. Pendzick: "When you apply for a special permit."

Bill Nohejl: "Yes."

Irene J. Pendzick: "You submit the special permit application to the Town Clerk. It is then submitted to the Town Board and to the Planning Board. After the Planning Board's decision and recommendation, than a public hearing. So you've got a few weeks."

Bill Nohejl: "And it'll all be . . ."

If anyone is coming to the Planning Board for a subdivision, they have to post their property. If someone is coming to the Zoning Board of Appeals for a variance they have to post their property. But up to this point there has been no requirement that says posting

should be required for a special permit. We feel that it would correct that inconsistency.

To go a little bit further with what Mr. Nohejl's question was about, there is considerable time lag in any one of these special permit applications. It is filed with the Town Clerk, it comes up to you gentlemen, it is then referred to our Board and then at one of our meetings, we hold a hearing on it, prior to making any recommendation to your Board and then you call a public hearing and then the final decision is made. So it's a rather lengthy process. The one concern that our Board had, that because the Planning Board has to hold a hearing and you also have a called public hearing on this, that it not be required to have two postings. We feel this would be an undue hardship on the applicant. So that if the property were posted the time the application were made that it was subject of a special permit that anyone certainly who was at all interested in what might happen to that property near them would have plenty of time before any hearings occurred and any decision was being made. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Miles. Bill."

William Kasperovich, Wading River; "On 15th Street if you'd like to visit. I don't think we should be consistent with something that is inadequate as proposed or mentioned by the gentlemen speaking before me. In all cases, we are inadequate. We . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "Speak of yourself, Bill."

William Kasperovich: "Well naturally I don't have anybody else here with me."

Supervisor Janoski: "You say we are all inadequate. We just want you to speak for yourself. Go ahead, Bill, I was only kidding. I didn't mean to make you lose your train of thought."

William Kasperovich: "I have been after this at for at least ten years and I feel that here is an opportunity where we do not be, again, consistently inadequate. That the people physically bounding the request for the special permit or where the special permit is of a nature where specific individuals will be affected that these property owners and

PUBLIC HEARING - continued

these people be contacted directly. If a man chooses to live in Florida for half a year, you certainly can't expect them to drive by the road and see the sign. But it would be reasonable that mail would be forwarded to him to wherever he is at. And I feel both in the zoning appeals and the variances where people are directly affected they should be contacted directly that this is like putting up a no hunting sign, no trespassing sign. You can't go riding up and down the streets to look for the signs that are posted."

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill, if I could ask you who's responsibility in your comments would it be to notify the adjacent property owner."

William Kasperovich: "Well it's my feeling and, of course, there's an alternative. It could be the person making the application or it could be the Town itself. I'm not going to favor the pros and cons or points favoring one way or the other way. What I'm expounding on is that we should go one way or the other way. Just a sign itself, a physical sign at that point in the — on — geographically, it doesn't solve all our problems. And the cost whichever way it's borne to contact people directly.

Now the Health Department does it in many instances. The City does it in many instances. I feel, we took, should bring ourselves up to date and make this effort so that the people don't have to feel that they missed the sign because they weren't here or they didn't hear about it or didn't read the fine print in the paper. But a direct contact is little enough if it's a special permit is important enough to go through all the considerations of all the many people involved that certainly a little added mail to reach to the people which should be going out of the realm of practical governing."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill."

William Kaspervoich: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board on the matter of this public hearing? That being the case I declare the hearing closed."

No one else wishing to be heard and no further communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Janoski declared the hearing closed at 8:03 P.M.

The Agricultural A District, obviously, is one of very large lots, which means that you're asking people in the business and industrial districts to provide forty thousand square feet, and meet the front yard, rear yard and side yard set backs that you require in the farm district, that we require in the farm district. This has proven to be rather a burden on a number of people. There are small lots scattered all through the business districts. They rarely measure even a half an acre and certainly not an acre. The Residence C District which is primarily the downtown district, residential downtown district requires twenty thousand square feet. It would seem much less of a burden to ask people to provide twenty thousand square feet in that district, in the business and industrial districts then it is to ask them for forty thousand square feet and also the larger side yards."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mrs. Tormey. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the Town Board on this matter? Mr. Nohejl."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "May I ask Mrs. Tormey a question?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Absolutely."

Bill Nohejl: "Mrs. Tormey, supposing there was a lot in between other parcels that didn't meet what you're — the specifications, that you're requiring you twenty thousand. Suppose it is, you know, this was before — if it was before zoning. What, what are you going to do about it?"

Mrs. Robert Tormey: "If they're not — if the ordinance is changed and it's reduced to twenty thousand square feet and they don't meet, the lots don't conform, then, obviously, they would have to come to the Board of Appeals. What I think would happen if we can reduce this, it just eliminates a number of the people who currently are trucking into the Board of Appeals, they have lots of twenty thousand, twenty-five thousand, ten thousand square feet, they want to put a garage and they haven't got the side yards and they have to come in. If we lower the requirements we save at least some of the people, the expense and the time of having to come in. We can't hit them all. You know, there's no way we can hit them all, but they can come into see us. We'd be glad to see you any time, Bill."

Bill Nohejl: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill. Bill."

William Kasperovich, Wading River; "I somehow feel that this is just an expedient way to solve a current problem. I'll pause while you digest that Mr. Janoski."

Supervisor Janoski: "It's obviously an attempt to create some expediency — expeditiousness would be a good description also."

William Kasperovich: "Okay let's put it — try to shorten it and put it in short sharp words. To impose the lowest category of residence classification, in a general sense in the business area else where is not my way of doing things and I object to it. You have an overlapping of zoning and requirements and our business district is going to stay our business district, it's not going to move out to Route 112. I say that this type of change should be made, but it should be made and introduced a Residence D and then encompass most of the general problems that could be foreseen for these overlapping districts. This business of putting C into these other zones to take care of these little problems that have become a

WHEREAS, the top officials of County agencies which would be responsible for the implementation of an evacuation of residents in the event an accident--the Suffolk County Police Department, the Department of Health and the Department of Public Works--voiced grave doubts that evacuation would be possible, and

WHEREAS, the consensus of the concerned public in attendance at the evacuation hearings declared the same grave doubts and urged public officials to prevent the opening of Shoreham to protect the lives of their loved ones, and

WHEREAS, there is now considerable controversy about the financial implications should Shoreham not open,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead declares that the safety of our people is the primary consideration. Without the possibility of an optimum evacuation, the lives of our people would be placed in serious jeopardy if Shoreham is permitted to open without an outside, independent safety inspection by a reputable engineering firm, and a massive effort by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission to inspect every safety related item within the Shoreham facility, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that this Town Board takes the position that the Long Island Lighting Company should open the doors of Shoreham for such inspections, immediately, before further consideration should be given to the possibility of putting Shoreham on line. This Town Board wishes to deliver to the Long Island Lighting company this firm message: "Open the doors, or close the plant", and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, that a certified copy of this resolution shall be forwarded to the Suffolk County Executive, Peter F. Cohalan, and to the Long Island Lighting Company.

Councilman Boschetti offered the following resolution which was seconded by Councilman Artale.

WHEREAS, cost efficient and effective handling of refuse and solid waste is a serious concern to this Town Board, and

WHEREAS, this Board has created a Solid Waste Committee to investigate such concerns, and

WHEREAS, more stringent practices and requirements of the New York state Department of Environmental Conservation regarding the operation of municipal landfills are scheduled for implementation after 1984, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead desires to be in compliance with those anticipated Department of Environmental Conservation regulations, and

WHEREAS, expertise in the relatively new field of resource recovery as applied to solid waste is necessary,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, that the Supervisor be and is hereby authorized to send Requests for Proposals to competent engineering firms on behalf of the Town Board and its Solid Waste Committee to assist that committee in its research in order to properly advise this Board as to possible future actions regarding the landfill and solid waste questions.

The vote, Boschetti, Yes, Artale, Yes, Prusinowski, Yes, Lombardi, Yes, and Janoski, Yes.

The resolution was thereupon declared duly adopted.

Supervisor Janoski: "I would open the meeting to public comment at this time. Yes Sir. Please state your name and address for the record."

Bill Steiger: "I'm a resident of Wading River, Town of Riverhead. I'm normally not here at your meetings, so I don't know all your policies and procedures. I am a little concerned over the fact that you could pass a resolution as significant as the one you proposed in #128 without entertaining comment before taking your vote. I also don't understand how you could entertain comments before you take your vote . . . (tape ended) (new tape began with) . . . my concern for being here tonight rests at the fact that as a resident of the Town of Riverhead in Wading River, I feel it's important that as members of this Town as representatives of the people of this Town that you take an active role and not permit Mr. Cohalan with his political upmanship, if you want to call it, to try and tell all the people at the local level what they should do."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedBill Steiger continues:

In other words, what pressures may he be putting on local people to make decisions that they might necessarily choose to do otherwise. Along with that, I ask you to consider the economic implications to the people of the Town of Riverhead, particularly in the area of Wading River of not having the plant opening, one. And two, along with your resolution the costs associated with the inspection that you have just requested be made. Those inspections have already been done privately by an organization called Torrey Pines which was an organization recommended by Suffolk County. It was not one picked out of the hat by Long Island Lighting Company. By the way, maybe I should make this clear, for the record, I work for Lilco. If it wasn't obvious, we'll make it clear to start with. So, I am concerned as a taxpayer and as a resident of Riverhead and one, how we're spending our money. And two, the implications to us of what happens if that plant doesn't open. I called the Town Tax Receiver today, just to get the changes in the taxes on my own house for this past year. Some interesting numbers came up, that's why I bring this up to you. Right now on my house which is a typical house in the area, the taxes are \$830 which represent 8% being paid by the resident. Ninety-two percent of the taxes paid in that area are paid by the particular power plant in question. If all of a sudden the people in that district had to pay 100% of those taxes, for example, on my own house those taxes would be \$10,400 per year immediately, school taxes alone.

If all of a sudden that that particular School Board decided we will, regardless of the consequences to the School System, cut the budget in half, say whatever the budget is tomorrow it's 50%. The total taxes on my house would be \$6,300 a year. I ask you to consider exactly what might be left of the Town of Wading River if all of a sudden the people in Wading River had to pay those types of taxes. In the long range, just to get off the tax issue a little bit, I think it's also important to the people of Wading River to consider the economic future and the economic growth of our local community.

One of the things business people look at very clearly when they look at business whether or not they're going to locate in the area for business is what is the reliability of their electric supply. We have seen the cancellation of a Jamesport unit which in the future is going to effect our economic, our ability to supply electricity to the Long Island people and I say economics because it's a factor that businesses consider when they move here. I ask you to consider what the implications would be to people in business either here today or considering to locate here of not having a reliable electric supply.

Grumman is a prime defense contractor for the U.S. Government. One could reasonably anticipate some rather heavy contracts common in Grumman's direction. But Grumman has plants in other areas of the United States, seven or eight approximately. Why would they want to choose to bring business to Suffolk County and

Bill Steiger continues:

and, unfortunately, they're in the Town of Brookhaven, but a lot of the people work — who work there, live in the Town of Riverhead and bring money into this area where they're not assured of a reasonable supply of electricity to meet their contractual needs. These are some concerns I wish to bring up to your attention. I would ask you to consider very strongly having Governor Cuomo become more active in requiring Mr. Cohalan to talk rationally, to speak rationally and to open up his ears and not be shut in relative to emergency planning. I find it very insulting to me as a resident that he has the unmitigated gaul to insinuate that the people of Suffolk County are less intelligent, less capable of performing an evacuation than the 200,000 people who evacuated Missasagwa, Canada for the sake of their lives, 200,000 people moved not once, not twice, but three times in a twenty-four hour period to leave an area where there was a chlorine gas leak and chlorine can kill. It's situation on the side of a lake similar to we are to the sound. Yet he would want you to believe that the people of Riverhead or Brookhaven are totally incapable following the directions of the civil authorities, that they would be so terrified and frightened that they wouldn't do that. If that were the case, how could our volunteer Fire Departments possibly work. People don't run the other way when a fire siren goes off. It's the nature of people, not to say get lost, I'm going the other way.

So in summary, what I'm asking you to do since you chose to pass a resolution demanding a full inspection of the plant, I don't know where you get the money to do that cause it's pretty costly. I would certainly object to it as a guy in the Town of Riverhead cause that's going to cost a few bucks. One percent costs three million, so extropolate that out and you can take the other ninety-nine, it's another three hundred million. I don't know who's going to pay for that.

I ask you to prepare a resolution that you yourselves request Governor Cuomo to intervene to take some positive actions that Mr. Cohalan gets off his butt or you yourselves take within your own capabilities since we do have the Riverhead Police Department to prepare an emergency plan to the people of the Town of Riverhead and not to rely solely on Mr. Cohalan. I think we certainly have it within our capabilities in the Town of Riverhead to do that. Thank you."

Irene J. Pendzick: "Mr. Steiger, Mr. Steiger, how do you spell your last name, please?"

Bill Steiger: "S-T-E-I-G-E-R."

Irene J. Pendzick: "Thank you."

Councilman Artale: "Mr. Steiger, I'd just like to bring up a point. Grumman is in Riverhead, not in Brookhaven Town."

Bill Steiger: "You made my point better."

"If I might. My name is Jim Ravello, also an employee of Lilco. I live in the Town of Brookhaven right in the area of Shoreham. I also find myself rather distressed by the motion that just passed or whatever it is — I forget the terminology. I — being a nuclear engineer — a mechanical engineer, I find it incredible that you have not technical advice behind that particular motion. The relationship between an emergency plan and it's possibilities. And the quality and construction of the plant is just incredible. There is no relationship there. All the objections that have been dandied about, about why we can or cannot evacuate Shoreham, the area around Shoreham has never been addressed, the construction quality of the plant. It is a statistical analysis that they use regarding the potential frequencies of accidents, the impact of the consequences of it, the releases of it. It does not in any form or fashion relate to physical construction of plant. The reason I bang on the point is I was very pleased to hear the relationship made in the motion because it's my opinion and I have some negotiating experiences with the County that their call for an inspection has nothing whatever to do with assuring the public of a safely constructed plant. It is merely another ploy to get into the facility on a witch hunt. And I just find it very interesting that you've not chosen to get any technical advice. The resolution reads that there's a clear relationship between the two and there is absolutely none. And I just want to make it very clear and I find myself very disappointed in you people that you relate the two activities. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill."

Bill Nohejl, also of Wading River. "I was there before the power plant came. This is a direct rebuttal to Mr. Steiger. The people who came to Wading River was because there were encouraged by low taxes and they didn't care about the power plant."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedBill Nohejl continues:

They didn't care about the risk involved. But now being that this money is going to be taken away from their school district, their country club for kids, Wading River School District, everybody is up in arms. I feel — I have no sympathy, none whatsoever.

Now this resolution, I feel is not strong enough, definitely not strong enough. Did you, Mr. Janoski, invite this type of audience by your letter to Mr. Howard? You know it was by — I interpret it when I read that letter, I was very disappointed."

Supervisor Janoski: "Did you read the letter?"

Bill Nohejl: "Because whenever — whenever you represent Riverhead, you represent us."

Supervisor Janoski: "Did you read the letter?"

Bill Nohejl: "No, I didn't. I read the paper."

Supervisor Janoski: "A little bit of difference."

Bill Nohejl: "You and Acampora. So I feel as though you encouraged this here tonight. They feel as though you're an ally to them. You say you're against nuclear power, but I'm beginning to doubt that. With your remarks that were said that — let's get the show on the road, more or less, you were with Mr. Howard."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well after the meeting, Bill, I will show you the letter cause it's on my desk and then you can interpret from that."

Bill Nohejl: "Why not read it out in the audience?"

Supervisor Janoski: "I don't have it with me."

Bill Nohejl: "Couldn't someone get it? Now we recently — recently we had a snow storm."

Supervisor Janoski: "Pete you're going to have to know what you're looking for. Why don't you just come here. . ."

Bill Nohejl: "Recently we just had a snow storm and it wasn't the biggest snow storm and everyone was bottled up. Imagine if a catastrophe did happen or even a scare of a false alarm. What would cause — what would be the outcome of a, an evacuation plan that does not — is feasible? I strongly am with Mr. Cohalan for the simple reason he is thinking of our interest first, health and safety. Without health and safety you're not going to have business, you're not going to have a dollar in your pocket if you can't work for a dollar you're not going to have it. If you're going to be sick or not be capacitated what the hell good is a dollar. I say make that resolution doubly strong, that no power plant should ever open until a devised plan is really formulated right down with every 'i' and 't' dotted or nothing at all. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes Sir. Mr. Steiger we have — where are — we have a kind of a rule. Once you've spoken, we recognize anybody else who wants to speak and we'll come back to you. Before you go, I'd just like to read this letter. The letter's addressed to Lou Howard, Presiding Officer, Suffolk County Legislature.

'Dear Mr. Howard:

Recent events in Albany and Washington have raised the possibility of the Shoreham Nuclear Plant going on-line without an approved emergency response plan, or one approved without local consent.

As the Supervisor of the Town of Riverhead, with a responsibility of the health and welfare of its citizens, I urge the County to act expeditiously to develop the best possible plan for a radiological emergency which will protect the health and safety of our people.' Filed.

The opening sentence, Bill, I think is a very important thought."

Bill Nohejl: "No, what . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "And it was not carried in the paper that opening sentence."

Bill Nohejl: "I mean the way it was stated in the paper, Janoski and Acampora seems like hello Henrietta, let's send a letter."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedSupervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill."Bill Nohejl: "So it really, really didn't come across good."Councilman Prusinowski: "Could I say one thing?"Supervisor Janoski: "Absolutely Vic."Councilman Prusinowski: "Bill, I'm going to follow up on that."Bill Nohejl: "All right."

Unidentified speaker from the audience was inaudible.

Supervisor Janoski: "I know — Bill, we're breaking the rules."Councilman Prusinowski: "I'm not addressing Bill, I'm addressing a point that Bill made. Number one, you just heard this letter that our Supervisor read to you. But I say an official Lilco publication which stated something else. As far as I'm concerned Lilco had no authority nor any authorization whatsoever to misrepresent this Town Board's action and especially the Supervisor's letter. It's official public — Lilco publication that's distributed throughout Suffolk County and Nassau County.

And one other thing I just want to say is that even if you're in the restaurant business, the Health Department inspects facilities throughout Suffolk County on a yearly basis. Every year, you get inspected whether you facility's a million dollars or it's \$5,000. They protect the people from being fed substandard food and health conditions. If the Plant is safe, there should be no reason why Lilco should object to one last inspection. And unfortunately, the way I read it on the street, well I'll tell you the way the people are feeling on the street, what I get from the people talking to me. Whether Lilco is right or Peter is wrong, the fact is the public is very very upset about the safety of that plant. And they're the ones that count. The people of Suffolk County who, number one, pay the rates to Lilco, that subsidize their operation, which pay your salaries, which, which pay my salaries in taxes, everybody's a rate payer here and everybody a taxpayer and I think that's what's happened is that a cloud of

doubt in the minds of the people whether that plant is safe. And a project that went from 250 million to over three and a half billion and yes I'll agree a billion dollars is probably because of the new regulations from the NRC and the delays in courts and the anti-nuclear things, but there's been a lot of mismanagement on Lilco's part. And I think that is what's concerned with a lot of people that I'm reading, is not so much on the Nuclear Power Plants which they are concerned about the safety, but on how the management conducted the construction of that plant."

Supervisor Janoski: "You know, Vic reminds me, cause for the first time today, I have seen that Lilco publication and quite honestly, I was very distressed that misrepresentation of what I was doing and what I was doing and what I was saying is being distributed by Lilco absolutely repudiate that mailing. This letter in no way supports the evacuation plan that was before the legislature at that time as a matter of fact, I tried to word it very carefully to make it very clear that I was talking about my concern that it is possible under present Federal Regulations for that plan — plant to be loaded with nuclear fuel in June, I believe, and to go to 5% capacity in generating. And my concern that that could happen without an evacuation plan or really what has to be on this evacuation plan for the Lilco property. It's been kind of twisted and perhaps misrepresented not mis — perhaps it has been misrepresented and I just wanted to add that now."

Councilman Lombardi: "Well, Joe, I'd like to say something right now and everybody's getting into it. You know, if you didn't meet with Lilco in Brookhaven by yourselves, we wouldn't have had this problem today with this letter. And to me, this is no problem. We had to get something straightened out. And if you're going to make any commitments to Lilco without the Town Board of Riverhead knowing about it, well we're going to have problems. That's all I got to say."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well Johh, you've said it. I guess we're going to have a debate between you and I. This letter was written on February the 14th. As a matter of fact, the meeting with Lilco was last week. I don't know the date."

Unidentified Speaker from the audience: "Wednesday."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. And I made no commitments as a matter of fact, John, I went there to get information and the information I sought was two-fold. One, does Lilco, in fact,

intend to load nuclear fuel into that reactor in June. The answer to that question was indeed they do. Do they intend to go to 5% generating capacity, indeed they do.

My second question was can we develop an inspection of this plant to assure the safety of the plant and that's why I was there and that's what I did."

Councilman Lombardi: "Well Joe, you read the brochure that they're going to send out and it doesn't come out right."

Supervisor Janoski: "I said that John. It's a complete misrepresentation of what I was thinking and what I was doing. And I guess we have to leave it at that. And the first time today I've seen that publication.

Your name and address."

Craig Serafine: "Now that I've cooled a little bit, my name is Craig Serafine and I live in Wading River and I've resided in Wading River for twenty-six years. I was there before they started building the plant and I reside there now that they've almost completed with the plant, okay. Now we've been going on, we've been building for ten years, okay, putting it together. Now at the eleventh hour, the county comes and they want you to start taking it apart so they can inspect it, okay. Lilco did the best they could, they hired Torrey Pines to come in. An independent outfit approved by the County, approved by certain legislature throughout the County and they went and they inspected the plant and they said it was okay and all of a sudden these legislatures have said okay, Torrey Pines inspected it, all of a sudden they say now that Torrey Pines agrees with Lilco now that they say, it's no good, we don't believe Torrey Pines either. I don't know who they're going to believe. We can inspect it and inspect it and inspect it, the Federal Government inspects it. The people that know what they're inspecting are inspecting it. Its been inspected and reinspected. And now you people want to inspect it again, you know. But as far as well there's a lot of things you know we got to get the plant going, okay. You know it's almost done at everything now, right and people are talking about, okay, we want to reinspect, we want to drag it out more, , we want to drag it out more, you know. They're concerned about the radiation and everything else. There's a lot of educated people here that work in the plant and reside in the Town of Wading River and that's why they're here tonight and they have every right to be here tonight as any other resident in the Town of Riverhead does, okay. And I'm sure that if there was a problem at Shoreham, we would be the first ones to know about it and you wouldn't be seeing us here tonight okay. Those missiles in Nato pointing here at the Town of Riverhead that could be here in fourteen minutes, okay. We should have evacuation plans for floods, tornadoes."

Supervisor Janoski: "I hope that Nato doesn't have its missiles pointed at us. I think the Russkies might, I understand we're a secondary target. Nato's on our side, we're part of it."

Craig Serafine: "Well you know the _____ you know Lilco wants Shoreham to be safe also that's their biggest, biggest thing with the, okay. There's all kinds of people there to get paid and inspect it and reinspect it and reinspect it and reinspect it. All the h--- they do over there is inspect the d--- place."

Councilman Boschetti: "Excuse me, can I ask who paid for those inspections?"

Craig Serafine: "Long Island Lighting Company and the rate payers in general. See everybody as a rate payer everybody as a rate payer paid Lilco to build the place and paid Lilco to have it inspected and inspect it and inspect it. So in turn what it is, is that each rate payer individually hired an inspector to inspect the plant."

Councilman Boschetti: "Exactly our point. So why should Lilco object now if the rate payers are going to again pay for a complete and independent inspection?"

Craig Serafine: "Because you can have them dismantle ten years worth of work of putting things together to take them apart."

Councilman Boschetti: "Doesn't it appear to you that the public has considered that and is willing to take the risk and the expense?"

Unidentified voices from the audience saying NO.

Craig Serafine: "I don't really think that the public knows what they're getting into. I really don't think they know what they're getting into. No I don't think they do."

Councilman Boschetti: "Mr. Janoski"

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes Sir"

Councilman Boschetti: " I'd like to address a couple of points that were made by Mr. Steiger and I see that they're not being answered in any other form so I might as well bring them up. Number one, one point that was made was that there was no opportunity to speak on the resolution prior to its voting. As I recall you did ask 128"

Unidentified speaker from audience: "129. The one that you voted on that was not on the agenda."

Councilman Boschetti: " Oh he was referring to the solid waste. He wanted to comment on the solid waste."

Unidentified Speaker: "The fact that wasn't on the agenda and you passed a resolution."

Unidentified Speaker: "Excuse me Sir"

Supervisor Janoski: "All right just a minute. Councilman I'm sorry sir, the Councilman is speaking, let him continue. If you wish to be recognized I will certainly do that."

Councilman Boschetti: "Well if there was any input on the solid waste, okay; but certainly that's not the way it came across to me.

The second thing is as for the #128 is concerned which as I, again, interpreted his comments related to the Shoreham inspection resolution, which was on the agenda and which was given an opportunity to be heard. People were given and opportunity to be heard on that very topic prior to our voting and no one chose to speak. As far as people living in Wading River, this Town Board has an obligation not only to people in Wading River, but the entire twenty-one thousand people who reside within the confines of Riverhead Township. We have expressed in our resolution our sincere and very seriously felt obligation to provide the safety and well-being of every resident in Town. That's why we feel an evacuation plan for Riverhead residents if vital. But Riverhead does not exist in a vacuum. Therefore, we can't just have an evacuation plan for Riverhead residents because where are they going to go, to the borders of Southold, to the border of Brookhaven or to the borders of Southampton. That was a _____"

Unidentified Speaker: "If you have an inspection, who's to come with an inspection plan?"

Supervisor Janoski: " You're out of order Sir, please. The process is one that we strictly adhere to here and let the Councilman continue."

Councilman Boschetti: "The second thing _____ the fourth thing is Mr. Cohalan. It was implied that Mr. Cohalan may have brought pressure to bear on this Town Board to voting the way we did. I will say and emphasize the fact, that everly elected official has a right to make up his own mind and I believe that this Board acted in that way. It was an independently held vote; it was an independently held discussion. We all knew what we were voting for and I believe we all stand behind what we voted for.

Now as far as a reasonable supply of electricity goes, that is a good, good point. However, I've also hear the converse of that, what is going to happen when that plant goes on line. And as Vic pointed out earlier, some people have been telling us long before tonight that they are willing to bear the expense if just so long as Shoreham never goes on line.

Now I don't know what happened in Missa - Missasaqua or whatever the name of that place is in Canada, but I think that we

can all agree that we have a different geographical problem here on the island. We are surrounded on three sides by water. The way we people on the east end have to escape from this island is to head west and to head west means to run into that ten mile or is it fifteen mile now zone, in which people are trying to evacuate from.

Now as far as the construction quality goes, which was brought up by another speaker, I can only say this and re-iterate what I said at the very beginning. If the construction quality is of the quality that we're being told it is, Lilco should not object so strenuously. If they want to point out the pitfalls of an inspection, let them do it. God knows Charlie Pierce has spent enough money on the radio trying to convince people otherwise. Let him convince people of the expense. But if they want to do it then the people have a right to inspect that plant. A free and independent inspection completely separated from Lilco. Thank you Mr. Supervisor."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you, Mr. Artale."

Councilman Artale: "Yes, I would like to expound a little bit further on what Lou had to say. We all had input on that resolution. I think we all are concerned as to the residents of the Town of Riverhad. I don't know whether or not that plant will ever go on line, but it, it does, it's up to this Town Board to worry about the residents of the Town. Not just in Wading River, but all over the Town of Riverhead. And yes an evacuation plan is needed. And whether it comes from Mario Cuomo, whether it comes from Mr. Cohalan or whether it comes from Lilco, somebody better be able to get our people the h--- out of here. That's all."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Grasso."

Lou Grasso: "For those people in the front row or are wondering why _____ who I am, I'm managing editor of Suffolk Life Newspapers. I come from Brookhaven Town, and I wasn't going to talk but somebody else that came from Brookhaven Town did and I thought I just might add my voice. Heard a lot here about Torre Pines. What they didn't say was that they inspected one percent of that plant, found nineteen faults that are going to cost approximately one million dollars to fix. I'm sure Lilco's going to like that picture. This gentleman, by the way, is hired by Lilco to take pictures of the people here tonight. That's something important to realize. One percent of the plant revealed nineteen faults that will cost a million dollars to fix. What lies hidden on the ninety-nine percent of the plant that has not been inspected. Something that you people should realize. Somebody said where were we? Where was everybody eleven years ago, ten years ago whenever the plant started to come on Long Island. In 1970 Irving Like raised the issue of evacuation, the NRC said, at that time, what we're dealing here with now is the construction permit. Evacuation will come after the plant is built. The plant has been

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedLou Grasso continues

built. The problem is not of our making. There are a lot of people who raised their voices at that point in time, who warned about the dangers of the problems of evacuation but the evacuation but the NRC in its wisdom said let's not talk about it now let's wait until the plant is built and then we'll talk about evacuation. Well the time is now and it may well be that the idea can be said now well gee the plant is there so we might as well utilize it; but it doesn't work that way. That's putting the tail before the cart or whatever it is. And you can't do it that way. Evacuation is indeed the key. I applaud this Town Board for their action. They simply said open the doors or close the plant. If you've got nothing to hide, you'll open the doors. There may be a cost factor; but the only problem here is what we're coming down to on a Lilco issue is a matter of dollars versus lives. The matter of dollars versus health. The people out there who turned out in droves, the evacuation hearings held by the County weren't paid, they're not working for Lilco. There were no dollar signs in their eyes or in their pockets. They came down to plead for their lives, for their health, for the safety of their welfare and their children. And they came down and said don't let it go or at least make it one hundred percent pure and safe before it does. And I think that's exactly the step that this Town Board took in saying open the doors or close the plant. I think the ball is now in Lilco's court. And they can send everybody in the world down here to plead their case to wave placards and to come up with all kinds of cute sayings. And if you want to turn it into that kind of a Donnybrook, I suggest you schedule a public hearing so that we can get the public down here and hear the outcries of the people who are truly concerned about their health, about the safety of their loved ones; and let's find out how many people are going to be bordered on each side of that fence.

So let's really take a good look and let's take a look at the value of dollars and the value of lives. But I think the Town Board did that tonight and I applaud you for it."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes Sir"

Bob Brennan: "I live in Wading River six years. I work for Lilco. No one paid me to come here. Most likely the gentleman will wreak some benefits to the newspaper."

Unidentified Speaker: "I will not."

Supervisor Janoski: "Please address your _____."

Bob Brennan: "I take some offense, but a gentleman I refer to as Bill, I'm sorry I don't like know your last name."

Supervisor Janoski: "Please address the Town Board Sir."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Bob Brennan: "I don't know the gentleman's last name, maybe they can get it from the record. I only know him as Bill. For referring to this type of audience, Sir."

Supervisor Janoski: "Please address your comments to the Town Board."

Bob Brennan: "I'm sorry. In your resolution, I assume right now, I asked before, I'd like to know something about a point of order. Maybe you can enlighten me. You gentlemen were aware of what the issue was here tonight, you make mention of the fact that we did not address you, prior. Obviously, we were unaware. As far as I'm concerned, Sir, you pushed that through. You knew and you Sir knew cause I saw you in the hall why we, we were here. You knew that if we did not get our chance to speak up our peace that we had missed the resolution, became apparent to us very late. In your resolution you said I think and I'm taking it out of context concerning the opinion of something of those present. Is that right? Is it worded that way?"

Supervisor Janoski: "The people present refer to the public hearings held by the Suffolk County Legislature."

Bob Brennan: "That was my question cause certainly you did not poll the people here. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

Bob Brennan: "Oh, by the way twenty years in Suffolk I'm proud of it. I moved out of Nassau. Six years in Wading River, and as I said no one paid me to be here."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Joe, I just have a question."

Supervisor Janoski: "Sure."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I want to ask, Sir, could I ask you one question. How did you know that this resolution was going to be on the agenda tonight?"

Bob Brennan: "I heard it from people, yes, co-workers who live in the Township."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay, in other words they knew?"

Bob Brennan: "I'll ask you a question. When you talk to other people of Riverhead, how many or what is the density of the population living west?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "No, I just want to ask one question."

Bob Brennan: " I heard it from co-workers."

Councilman Prusinowski: "You heard it from co-workers that we would have a resolution just about the plant but you didn't know what the resolution was."

Bob Brennan: " No, I heard about the resolution."

Councilman Prusinowski: " You heard about the resolution."

Bob Brennan: "Pardon me, I heard _____ I heard you were going to try and support Mr. Cohalan."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay, thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Henry"

Henry Pfeiffer, Wading River: "There are a couple of random thoughts that have occurred to me too, as these people have spoken the Board and the various representatives here. Number one, was the initial point made that little opportunity has been made or afforded these people to present the picture of those who are proponents of the nuclear plant. I attended meetings at the legislature they had eight days of speeches, one offer, another after another. And Lilco had professional people here to speak in its favor. They have had people to speak in the favor of this plant opening, professionals, public relation people at all levels of government through the papers, through the publications of various sizes, radio, television, etc. So every opportunity has been afforded both sides of the issue to present their particular cases. Now one of the things that occurs to me here this evening we speak of lack of risk here. Can anybody tell me that the plant going on line poses no risk at all. I don't think anybody would take that position. Less risk certainly not. It has to present a certain amount of risk which should in turn give a compensatory or compensating game. I live at ground zero in Wading River. I am, as some of you know, a retired Colonel in the Army who has studied at one time or another the employment of nuclear weapons. And, of course, the effect of the one of the risks there simply, the radiation is a question or a factor of the degree of radiation multiplied by the time of exposure. Those of us who are close to it will get it right away. Now if this happens at night is an hour - going to take care of me. Possibly. How am I going to get _____ if it happens during the day. And my grandchildren are at school, how am I going to collect those people. I think Mr. Rizzo, who is a Legislator, County Legislator of District #9 circulated edition and factory actions of the Police Department, of the Highway Department, of the Fire Department and so forth. And the general reaction was of the authorities in each of these cases, they could not depend upon their people to respond by going into a radio active area to take care of you and I when their own families might be in jeopardy. Now again, let me refer back to the Army.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedHenry Pfeiffer continues

And this is a question of every Army in the world. I see requests up here and the signs let's have a plan, let's have a plan, excavation plan."

Supervisor Janoski: "Henry, you've supposed to be addressing your comments to the Town Board, not to the audience."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Okay, I'm sorry if you don't hear. If the Army were to schedule an attack for a division we have a chart SOP, standing operating procedures, which specify how many people are going to become casualties. These are an acceptable risk of expendables. And the defense of an area we have a similar thing. An acceptable level and acceptable level of expendables. I'll hear any evacuation plan that is provided here and let me tell you I don't believe that there is one that will take care of us one hundred percent, visualize and acceptable level of expendables. I'm, probably one of the, maybe some of you are, so forth. And I was quite concerned about that. Charles Darwin has propounded a theory, oh some while back that the function the reason we're here is to propagate the species or to continue the species. And I was quite worried about that tonight until I saw some of these lovely youngsters here who I hope will be amount the survivors in the event of an oops and will continue our species. And I hope you're relieved as well. Thank you."

Charlie Christiansen, Wading River: "I'd just thought I'd speak to you for a minute and let you know where I stand on this resolution #128 that you passed on tonight. I'm certainly not in favor of this resolution. I am for the nuclear power plant being at Shoreham. I guess you based a lot of the decisions on the misinformed minorities that you chose to listen to. The gentleman who spoke prior to me is a prime example of what I consider a misinformed person. I think that comparing a nuclear power plant to nuclear weapons is pretty ridiculous. I think the odds on any kind of an accident happening at Shoreham roughly equate the odds of a large meteor falling some place on the east end of the island and killing a number of people. And I don't think we have an evacuation plan for that. I can just speak for myself in saying that once again I don't approve of this resolution. I could urge you to rescind it, but I don't think you would. I guess that's about all I have to say. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. The gentleman with the mustache in the back there. You're next."

Charlie Ward, Brookhaven: "I just want to ask the Board a couple of questions. Has the Board since 1945 ever asked the federal government for a civil defense evacuation plan of any sort. I mean I think is also in their interest since nuclear major nuclear retaliation is one of the key points of our defense as we reduced the level of Army spending and all. And also, I wanted to make Riverhead Town Board is ever advised when the nuclear submarines from New London pull down the Sound and come

over around the point are they advised of any of this? I mean it seems to me if there's a lot of intangibles here and they're not being analyzed. It's my own view point. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. I assume that they were rhetorical questions. Donna's next and then you."

"Supervisor Janoski and the Town Board, I'd like to applaud your resolution on Shoreham, and as a private citizen, I'd just like to say that."

Supervisor Janoski: "You have to tell us who you are Donna. I know who you are but for the record."

Donna Sievers, Resident of the Town of Riverhead: "I'd just like to say as a resident of the Town as someone who lives in Calverton close to the Shoreham power plant, I just feel that there is no safe way. Anyone that is east of the plant, we've got to go right through that area if there's any kind of evacuation plan. I don't feel that there's any plans that will work and I also feel that if you look at water conditions because we are an island, we are suffering from wells that have chemicals in it that farmer's use maybe twenty five years ago. They didn't realize it was going to hurt us. How honest is Lilco, who will be making money off Shoreham going to be it there are any kind of leaks if there is any kind of a problem. I personally don't believe that they will tell us. I don't believe that even if there is a workable plan, they will give us adequate time for evacuation. You're talking about fathers with families. You're talking about kinds, you're talking about parent's that are not going to willingly and without a fight start to protect their children. You're talking about schools that are very close to that area. And I just feel that as individual people we _____ there's not much we can do, but we can place our trust in our politicians and hope that you will be responsive to what the majority of people want. I see that in Riverhead and I'd like to see that with the rest of the politicians that represent us. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. You're next."

Mel Schuster, Resident of Town of Southampton: "I'm a former resident of the Town of Riverhead. I submit that the Town Board and the leaders of our County are like an ostrich with their heads in the sand. Nuclear _____ not nuclear power, but nuclear reactors, have been operating on Long Island since 1950, the Brookhaven National Laboratory, without an evacuation plan, without loss of life and without incident. And I submit that this has not been a problem prior to this

Now live in Southampton, formerly lived in Brookhaven. Stated that nuclear plants have been in operation since 1970. Millstone, in Connecticut, is directly across Long Island Sound, and Brookhaven has been in operation for over ten years. Both could be construed as a potential threat, but have posed no problems. He has worked in nuclear energy since 1956 and he knows that it is safe. He stated that politicians have their "heads in the sand", react to people's fears and add to fears for political expediency.

Councilman Prusinowski: Responded, he doesn't think this Town Board has their heads in the sand. They are not experts, but the safety and welfare of the citizens of this Town are their first concern. As representative, they must address that concern. He observed that the Brookhaven reactor is not like a power plant and that Millstone had a problem a couple of years ago and never notified the Southold Town Board, even though they had an agreement regarding notification.

Nora Brewer: Stated that she thought Mr. Cohalan is listening to the people of Suffolk County. She lives near the Shoreham plant and is fearful that it is not safe. She said that she is no longer young, but when it came time for her to sing "Nearer my Lord to Thee" she didn't want it to be because she'd been blown up.

Eric Berger: Stated that editors have an obligation to report the news and are conscientious; that perhaps some publishers are more interested in "selling papers", as mentioned by a previous speaker, but that he didn't think that this was true of the Suffolk Life publisher, who had a sincere concern regarding the Shoreham plant. He remarked that such an allegation could not be applied to Suffolk Life in any event since Suffolk Life gave their paper away, not sell it. He observed that it was unusual for him to be defending competitive publication, but such were the facts. He observed that the comparisons made between Brookhaven and Shoreham were misleading. The evacuation zone established for Brookhaven was only one mile and the reactors are for research and medical purposes.

Howard Sheppard, Riverhead: "We've heard from plenty of people from Wading River. I'd just like to get up and say I live in Riverhead and I worked for Lilco for eighteen years. I'm proud of it. I don't necessarily work at Shoreham all the time. I've been there the last two or three years off and on. Part of the inspection, it's just _____ I wish that somebody would get off their butt and get something going here so we can get it on the line before it rusts. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes Sir -- the gentleman in the back with the blue sweater. You're going to have to wait until everybody's finished."

"I don't live on Long Island, I'm here temporarily as a consultant. I'm a retired college professor, with twenty-five years in the Nuclear business. I deplore...."

Irene J. Pendzick, Town Clerk: "May I have your name and address please?"

Andrew Robason: "I live in Bellport. I came up here to assist Lilco in the start up of their unit. I've never seen such an attempt to frighten people. I've dealt with students for a number of years and encouraged them to enter the nuclear field and here I find that the newspaper which is sent to the folks on Pearl Street in Bellport. I get it free has a headline. Do something, before you die. Please don't overlook the statistical. Everybody speaks as if an evacuation is going to take place. The chance of such --- the need for such an evacuation is infinitesimally small. Please don't overlook this. The thing that's concerned me on my delightful stay on Long Island, it's a wonderful place has been your lack of overpasses for the railroad. If I were here with children, I would be worried about being struck by trains on these overpasses. If you consider the problem of putting and overpass over every road in this area, you're looking somewhat at the simplistic notion that you can just walk in and inspect this plant. It's inspected continuously. I wish there was some way that you could be reassured that nobody is trying to do anything half way on this system. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Jeff."

Jeff Sievers: "Thank you Mr. Janoski, members of the Town Board. My name is Jeff Sievers. I live on Main Road in Calverton. I do not work for Lilco. I don't even work for Suffolk Life. I'm very disturbed tonight. I attend an awful lot of Town Board meetings and I see more people here this evening than I think I've seen in the last year at a Riverhead Town Board Meeting. More people that are unfamiliar with the workings of the Board, unfamiliar with the way meetings are held. I'm disturbed at some of the comments that I'm hearing from the audience. People who have already stated that they work for Lilco, the comments under their breath. The comments directed at some of the people who have spoken in opposition to the Shoreham Plant. The people that were here tonight speaking in opposition to the Shoreham Plant are not prepared. We're not prepared to come down here and debate this issue this evening. The people who are speaking in favor of Lilco and the Shoreham Plant are very obviously prepared. I have a couple of comments though, that I'd like to make, some responses to some of the arguments that these pro-Lilco, pro-Shoreham people are making. I find their arguments to extremely specious. They say, for example, that Shoreham has been inspected many times over, that maybe true, but the fact is that when the County is asked for a full and independent inspection and design review, they were refused. You can't tell me that Torrey Pines is

an independent firm, because they were hired by Lilco. You can't tell me they were approved by Suffolk County because when Suffolk County considered Torrey Pines they were considering Torrey Pines as an independent company. Not a company that was working at the behest of Lilco. You speak of the difference between Brookhaven National Labs and its safety records and I applaud its safety record. But Brookhaven National Labs is not mismanaged by Lilco. It is not run by Ira Froelicher and it is not, it was not, built by Lilco.

The big _____ the one single question, that you fail to _____ the single biggest question that I would ask the people who support Shoreham when they say the Lilco Plant must go on line, is why? What is the reason for it? It's been Shoreham and Lilco admits and I have heard Ira Froelicher say in testimony before the State Senate that when Lilco _____ when the Shoreham Plant goes on line, there will be an immediate thirty-eight to fifty percent increase in the cost of electrical rate in Suffolk County. There is no need for that. We don't need Shoreham, we don't need the electricity that it may supply. Perhaps in 1968, do I need to get away from this a little bit perhaps in 1968 when the Shoreham Plant was originally designed we could believe that there was a need for it. Times have changed, Electrical use is down. There were other communities on the island that do not _____ are not supplied electricity by Lilco. The Village of Greenport, for example, its electric rates are half those of what Lilco charges its ratepayers. What Lilco needs to do is consider the lives and safety of the people of the east end and the responsibility that Lilco has to the ratepayer. And don't tell me that the prime, single biggest concern of Lilco's management is the safety and safe evacuation plan. It's not, it's dollars. Everybody knows it's the bottom line and they'll never change that, no matter what.

There's no way, there's absolutely no way, any one can design an evacuation for the east end. To evacuate, it means you head west or you stay in your home. The people in the eastern portion of Riverhead Town and the people of the South fork and throughout the North fork will be advised and are advised under Shoreham's evacuation plan that if the Plant goes on line and if there is an accident or an incident at the plant they should stay at _____ in their homes. That means they sit in their homes and wait for the clouds of radiation to be pushed over them by the prevailing winds.

I'd like to also puncture one other argument made by the performance of Shoreham and that is they speak of other argument made by the performance of Shoreham and that is they speak of other dangers. They speak of dangers from millstone, they speak of dangers from chlorine gas and they speak of dangers from the Long Island Railroad tracks. We here in Suffolk County, we here in New York State have no control over millstone. It is true that they do _____ are supposed to advise us of a problem and in some cases they have not. But we cannot legislate, we cannot direct

our representative to legislate against millstone. We can direct our legislators, we can direct our representative to legislate against Shoreham to take action against Shoreham and you gentlemen have done that tonight and I can only add my strong support and applause to your actions."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Town Board? You've already spoken. I'll have to ___ have you spoken Sir."

Unidentified Speaker: "No."

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay, you're next."

Wayne Keelty: "I live in Lake Grove in Brookhaven, but I work at the Plant in Shoreham since other people from not in Riverhead have spoken I feel I should be able to....."

Irene J. Pendzick, Town Clerk: "May I have that name again, please."

Wayne Keelty: "Wayne Keelty."

Irene J. Pendzick, Town Clerk: "Want to spell that."

Wayne Keelty: " K-E-E-L-T-Y."

Irene J. Pendzick, Town Clerk: "Thank you."

Wayne Keelty: "Everyone is talking about the evacuation of the entire east end. They're talking about having to go through Nassau County, the Long Island Expressway. What people are not saying and what none of our worst critics are saying is that nobody says the east, east end has to be evacuated. Nobody has postulated the accident in any of the hearings that require the evacuation of all of Long Island. We are talking about moving some people. We're talking about moving some of these people not to any area that has been affected by radiation. I think there's a lot of misconceptions, for lack of a better word, The misconceptions are due to the political expedience of being anti-nuclear.

Now someone mentioned about being prepared to come and speak. We found out about this through our co-workers at work at approximately nine o'clock this morning. Now all of us had to put in a full days work, go home and have dinner. I don't know when we had time for this preparation. If we appear to be prepared, it's simply because we strongly believe in what we do. I would hope that you gentlemen when you consider these resolutions you also consider some of the facts that are not brought to light. Again, the amount of people being evacuated, the probability of it being ___ an accident occurring. A man talked before about the electric rates going up. Gentleman on everyone's

approval, initially the lighting company invested three and a half billion dollars. Does this man expect that somehow no one's going to have to pay for that. Does this man expect that the Lighting Company is just going to say, okay guys we'll pay back the mortgage forget about paying the bills. I mean no matter what resolution should come up, yes it's a money thing it was brought up. It has to be paid for. The question is are we going to reap some benefits for paying it. I would hope so. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "That looks like a new arm."

Tom Carrier: "My name is Tom Carrier. I live in Wading River. I work for Lilco at the plant. One of the things that I'd like to address is the public concern for their safety and the reasons for that. One of the things that, you, Mr. Janoski, expressed a concern for, is there are a lot of people that are expressing their concern for their safety. A lot of people are scared as evidenced by some of the people that spoke tonight about what a release of radioactivity in an accident at Shoreham could possibly do to them. What I'd like to point out is that none of the people that are working with me are scared. Now I'm sure that somebody's going to say that's because my livelihood and that's true. But I don't make all that much money working for Lilco, that this is the only thing that I could do. I have a Masters Degree in electrical engineering. I'm sure I could find another job in another industry, but I have to believe that nuclear power is safe and it is a good thing for this country. I'm dedicated to operating a safe plant at Shoreham and I believe that all our colleagues feel the same way and you'll see that none of us are scared of the accident that could possibly happen at Shoreham because we feel that it's very miniscule chance that this could happen enlighten it to some of the other natural disasters that could possibly happen in Long Island and we're not going to run around being scared about that all our lives because it's very small. But why is it that those of us that work in the nuclear power plant work in the nuclear industry are not as scared as the rest of the public. I think that it's been shown by a lot of people that the amount that you know about something like this has a lot to do with the risk that you perceive that it's ___ that you're going to be subjected to. And I wish that you would consider the fact that a lot of people that are speaking out saying that they're concerned with the welfare of their families and the risk and the harm that could come to them, do not really have good understanding of what we're dealing with here. That's all I want to say."

Supervisor Janoski: " Thank you. Jessie, you're first."

Jessie Tomlinson, Wading River: "I think in a way we have to do things in a proper perspective. Unfortunately, we are in the horns of a dilemma because the NRC says there must be an evacuation plan before the license can be granted Lilco and it

seems as though there are many people who feel there cannot be an effective evacuation plan. Now it's simple to talk about evacuation, an abstract sort of way, but I'd like to tell you about an experience that I had. I went to a meeting concerning evacuation plans in, I believe it was the Civic Association that sponsored it, and there was a gentleman explaining what he thought could be done to evacuate the area. And I was particularly interested because he said that anyone living east of the William Floyd Parkway onto William Floyd excuse me, you could not go down 25A and into Shoreham, Rocky Point because that would be closed. Well it just so happens that my parents live in Shoreham and in no way could I possibly leave the island no less Suffolk and not know what to do with them. So the point is that no matter how many plans we make, the fact is that human nature being what it is I don't think there could ever be an effective, workable evacuation plan because we are not going to leave our loved ones and we'll have to hope that if the plant does open and I certainly hope that it doesn't and I was an opponent of nuclear power when it wasn't the popular side of the issue to be on and I think that there is almost no workable solution to this problem and we have really gotten ourselves into a bind because it was not addressed originally the way it should have been. And I applaud you for your resolution although I wish it were even stronger. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mr. Nohejl, I'm sorry oh my God. I'm sorry Bill, please accept my apology. Bill Kasperovich. I'm getting tired."

William Kasperovich, Wading River: "Mr. Supervisor, I appreciate that you're tired, but I would appreciate a little attention because I think the aspect that I'm going to present....."

Supervisor Janoski: "You probably get more attention from this Town Board than any other citizen in this Town Bill Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich: "I have been alert and pro and con to this Shoreham power plant since I came to the Town Hall when Mr. Vojvoda was the Supervisor. Mr. Vovjoda and I differed more violently than I differ with you. Now I think these fellows that come here whose employer is Lilco or have been hired by Lilco should appreciate the fact that they can't get up here and talk against their employer, no matter how they feel, if they want to continue working there. And I think these fellows might be interested to what I say to you people since I cannot address them. But the Long Island Lighting Company has been pressuring, shafting and screwing the officials in this Township for so many years that we have lost face in the Long Island Lighting Company. And no matter what the h--- they tell us I can't believe it. Now I've got to say that these fellows should appreciate that we in large number have lost face in the Long Island Lighting Company by their conduct by their acts and now by their publication.

And for you gentlemen to take hold of this sticky problem the way you have, I got to stand up here and say thank God we have you on the Board. I'm for you a hundred percent and I'm proud that you've the guts to stand up on such an issue. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "I would recognize anyone else who wishes to be heard at this time. I guess we're back to you _____ oh. I know you like to go last Bill."

Bill Steiger, Wading River: "I'd like to clarify a few things that people said I did say or I didn't say. First off I would be here whether I worked for Lilco or I worked for some place else. I feel that we have been severely let down by our County Executive. As I said before, I also find it insulting. He feels the people of Long Island couldn't behave the same as people in other areas of the country.

The gentleman from Suffolk Life said I never mentioned what percentage of the Plant was inspected by Torrey Pines, I did, I said it was one percent, I told them what it costs. You Mr. Boschetti, questioned my resolution #128, versus 129. I was trying to bring up to you the fact that if you could put on and bring a resolution up, 129 which was not on your agenda, then why could you not permit comment on something which was on the agenda. That's all I way bringing out."

Councilman Boschetti: "Okay. That's exactly the point I addressed. The fact of the matter is the Supervisor asked if anyone had a comment on any subject prior to our reading of resolutions and there was no comment on any resolution prior to our voting."

Bill Steiger: "I made the request of your secretary, the Town Clerk here before you reconvened for a copy of that resolution. So that before you discussed it, I could raise the question. I didn't get a copy of that."

Irene J. Pendzick, Town Clerk: "I'll have to clarify that. You made that request at the end of the recess, not at the beginning."

Bill Steiger: "You were busy in Mr. Janoski's office so there was not way I could get hold of you cause you were talking with him. I generally do not interrupt someone when they're speaking with someone. I do give them my courtesy. Another point was made up that I consider dollars verses health, quite erroneous. I did move into the Shoreham-Wading River School District in 1977. I did not move into that District soley for its tax pruposes. I very seriously considered moving into Cutchogue. The sole reason I went to Shoreham-Wading River was it happened to be a lot closer to work and at the time of 1977 gas cost, I think it was around \$1.39 a gallon. So if you don't have to drive to Cutchogue, it's cheaper to live in Wading River. It has nothing

to do with the school system cause Cutchogue has a very good school system too. So to say I am now concerned over dollars is a very severe mistake. I also knew the risk associated with nuclear power when I moved in that area. I find the risks associated with both living there and working at the place far less than driving home on a Friday or a Saturday night from Riverhead to Wading River. I can assure you of that. I also take the fact, take exception to the fact that I'm not a member of the public. The fellow from Suffolk Life stood up here and said we weren't members of the public. My family certainly is.

And two other things I'd like to bring up. A gentleman made the reference to a questionnaire that was sent out to it was the firemen, the policemen, the highway people. I don't remember the exact context of that questionnaire. But I remember reading it when it went out. It really didn't have too many ways you could answer the question. It was specifically designed to come back one way. It certainly wasn't a very fair question. The concern I had to at least go back and find out what it was. It was certainly biased. Relative to Prus - Prusinowski there is a very big difference, yes between Brookhaven Laboratory and SNPS, but there's an extreme similarity. They both use uranium fuel, they both have the same fission products. I've been a licensed in nuclear plants since 1976. I am aware of how they operate, including the high flux beam reactor and the medical research reactor that's over there. There are similarities and there are differences. Yes, the exposure to the public which you should be concerned is the same. It's a radioactive release from the Plant. Regardless of the Plant or its origin, it's the same radio activity. I think that's the point that you should be concerned with.

I asked in the beginning when I first came up here that you consider a resolution to Mr. Cuomo to become involved and asked that for a very simple reason. I try to look at things objectively. Yeah, Suffolk County goes out and they hire more hundred consultants who say you can't evacuate Long Island. Evacuation is impossible. Now Lilco goes out and we hire another hundred and say sure you can. And the two of them can't agree on a hill of beans. That's obvious. We wouldn't be on the situation we're in today. But the State has implemented plans for other reactors within New York State. So obviously, there are people outside of Suffolk County and outside of Lilco who feel that an evacuation may be possible. That's why I ask you to consider a resolution requesting Mr. Cuomo become involved and to help mediate the situation we're in right now. I think we owe that to the people of the Town of Riverhead. The question was asked along this line that I didn't hear an answer to."

Supervisor Janoski: "I just want to say something. We have a five minute rule. Because of the different circumstances of this particular meeting, I would ask you to make your remarks brief because Bill Kasperovich is here on a very regular basis and make him speak only five minutes and he will try to get me to let him speak more if I allow you to speak more too."

Bill Steiger: "I hear you very clearly. Quickly, you didn't answer the question relative, was there a civil defense plan for evacuation. If you've ever been to the New York State Office of Emergency Preparedness in Albany. There are target areas in this state for a nuclear attack from Russia. Riverhead has a few of them. So I would be surprised if you didn't have a good plan to evacuate Riverhead. If you haven't, I suggest you look at those charts.

The other thing I've offered to you, I am a member of the management in the Plant. To each and every one of you, individually or as a group, to help to enhance your education about the plant, I extend to you a invitation to come to that plant. Give me enough advance notice and I will arrange what ever tour you might like to see of the facility that you could become familiar with that facility. I will leave my phone number and a card where you can contact me with the Town Clerk. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Yes Sir."

Bob Brennan: "I would like to address a problem or something I feel is slightly off the issue. You Mr. Prusinowski you saw fit to ask me how I knew about the meeting. I didn't see fit to ask you, the opponents are entitled to their opinions. I respect him, you didn't ask them how they found out about the meeting. Aside from what we've discussed here tonight, I would like you to take one thing back. Granted everybody here allowed the, have said they're from Lilco. The opponents have not said where they're from. Fifty percent of them, I think, if I counted right, happened to say they were from Wading River. So they got a good representation also. Please do not discount the fact that we are taxpayers that I came here tonight as I said unemployed. What ever reason I did to further my benefit I did through my employment as these people feel they should through their safety. And I certainly believe not at the expense of my safety, would like to be Sir, I address you, considered a taxpayer. When I go home at night, I do not sit there considering whether you think of where I came from or do I think of where you came from. I think you're out there doing a job for me. Possibly maybe not because at that time I was in the majority, but I don't think you consider my background when you make a decision on my behalf and that's all I ask. I live here, I'm a taxpayer, all I want to be is treated as such. Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Joe, I agree with you Sir. Everybody's a taxpayer and I'll give you direct response on where I came from in the Board on this resolution. Throughout this whole debate."

Bob Brennan from audience is inaudible.

Councilman Prusinowski: "No I'm going to offer it to you because it's a fair question you put to me and I think you have a right to know. I'm your representative and I'll tell you that's

your right to know. Throughout all these proceedings never once has Lilco officials met with the Town Board to come and put it on the table and say would you please help us and support an evacuation plan or not an evacuation plan. It's always been a County matter because of the regulations, the NRC regulations, blah, blah, blah, well I'm not going to go through the whole proceedings. What upset me, personally, was that I got the impression that they were assuming that the Riverhead Town Board they were assuming a position without coming in and discussing it with us and it's an issued that very serious. Mainly because their support on the County I'm just stating facts and I'm not trying to claim the argument. I'm just saying the facts of the matter is only one legislator in the County voted for any evacuation plan. The County executive is against any evacuation plan. These are facts. This is just not something I'm making up. And all we address ourselves on the Riverhead Town Board is what do we perceive to be the best interest of the people of the Town of Riverhead. And when I saw that Lilco newsletter published and I saw it Friday morning, I was very upset that they had made an assumption without talking to us directly. That's wrong. And I tell you that when we had the problem with the oil refinery proposal and it was not Lilco so much in that the same situation happened. We represent the people and God help us if we ever go and make decisions without the public knowing about it, that's wrong and I _____ and no elected official has the right to do any type of business through the back door. If you want a cover put on the table say hey this is what _____ and by the way, I will take advantage of your invitation up about going up to the Plant. I think the whole Town Board would. But that is basically where this resolution came from. Also in my mind, and I'm a salesman and I deal with a lot of people. Here's the question people pose to me and this is the only thing this resolution addresses tonight. if we've already spent three and a half billion dollars, if we've already spent three and a half billion dollars and whether the plant goes on line or off line, somebody has to pay for that plant. Number one will be the shareholders cause they're going to take a bath in Lilco, okay. Number two, I'll be the rate-payers and three most likely the taxpayers. So if we've already and this is regular people at Vilella Shoe Store today, a person, a lady, buying shoes, she said if we have spent that much money already on this plant, what's another couple of hundred million dollars to have one final independent inspection, independent of Lilco, independent of Suffolk County and the Governor's thing might be a way to make sure in the people's mind who are going to ultimately pay for it that the plant is safe. Now I don't think that's an _____ I don't think that's an insane proposal. I think that's a very rational proposal, and that came from a person like myself _____ Town Board members and really when you spend three and half billion, what's a couple hundred million more. I mean _____ I hate _____ I'm not squandering of taxpayers dollars. Well let's face it because let's look at it this way, if the plant doesn't go on line, it's going to cost more than three and a half billion. And the longer, that this delay

continues, it's going to continue to cost more money. And the other statement is that originally the proposal remember is the ratepayers and most people, like I say, originally the proposal was a lot less than three and a half billion; but that's a question that a lot of people are asking now is we spend all this money to get this point, what's to make sure that for the next thirty years, is a piece of mind in the people's mind is the plant because you're absolutely right. I am not an expert, and I don't pretend to know your job. You're educated in your job. You obviously do well because Lilco hired you and nobody's an expert up here. What we want to know is what the people have a right to know, whether or not that plant is safe."

Bob Brennan: "I think if you put that much thought into it, you wouldn't have a problem. But my guess was directed at you, apparently you're questioning my credentials."

Councilman Prusinowski: "No, I wasn't questioning your credentials I was....."

Bob Brennan from audience is inaudible

Supervisor Janoski: "All right, if you're going to continue addressing the Town Board, you're going to have to come up here so that it can be on the record. I hope that Mr. Nohejl is going to be the last speaker."

Bob Brennan: "As far as the stockholder, for what it's worth, I'm a stockholder; and I hope they don't try to get it out of me because....."

Supervisor Janoski: "Come on let's not get into that. All right, Uncle Bill. He's not really my uncle folks."

Bill Nohejl, Wading River: "Joe, I suggest that you stop talking to newspapers."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well if you do that, then you get your name in the paper for not returning calls to newspapers. So it's....."

Bill Nohejl: "I blame you partially for this here tonight because of the newspaper. Cause I was ready to give it to you last week, two weeks ago, when you weren't here. When I read that paper, I said that S.O.B. Yeah, you. But I figured I'd do it to you personally. Now that letter _____ that letter clarified in my mind and a lot of peoples minds as to what you did write to Lou Howard."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yeah there is a big difference if you leave out the first sentence, absolutely."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedBill Nohejl: "Yes."

Supervisor Janoski: "And you know the newspapers newspaper reporters are newspaper reporters and there's a lot of information and I don't know what all goes into putting out a story. But I do know what I'm very concerned and upset about the Lilco publication which absolutely misrepresents the position that I have. It is one that is very concerned about the plant going on line without any preparedness in Riverhead."

Bill Nohejl: "Also, I congratulate the Board on passing this resolution. Only think, as I said before I wish it was much more strict than what it is. And don't give one iota, one iota cause I'll be here to tell. I'll be here."

Supervisor Janoski: "We can bank on that."

Bill Nohejl: "Yes and the people of Wading River, or the rest of Riverhead, are not aware of what's going on here tonight. If they were aware of what's going on you wouldn't have a place big enough to hold them all. This is what caught everyone off guard here with the plaquards and what not and just a certain group. And you notice the photographer maybe sure that each one of the Lilco men and he has a picture showing that go back to Froelicker say well, the boys were here give them a promotion."

Councilman Artale: "Is that how it works Bill?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay Bill, thank you very much. Okay, I hope that Bill was the last. You're not the last speaker Bill. Are you going to talk about something different maybe?"

Unidentified Speaker: "Yes, I am."

Supervisor Janoski: "Good. I just recognized who you were."

Irene J. Pendzick, Town Clerk: "I bet she's from Wading River."

Marge Acevido, Wading River: "Yes, I'm from Wading River, I must point that out. I had no idea that. Marge Acivido from Wading River. I had not idea that this was going to be here tonight and I don't think anybody in Wading River did ever because I really think that they would have been here in full force, pro or con. Pro or Con, not just Lilco employees' on their feeling about it. They're very local people and I'm sure that they would have been here."

Needless to say, I'm here about Frank's Auto Body. I live on Dogwood Drive in Wading River and they have repeatedly been breaking the variance rules that have been imposed on them. Nothing has been done about it."

Supervisor Janoski: "Zoning Board od Appeals."

Marge Acevido: "Board of Appeals. However I just _____ I don't think that anything is going to be done now. Now this man has been operating on Sundays and I was _____ I'm under the impression that he should be operating within normal business hours is"

Supervisor Janoski: "That impression isn't good enough."

Marge Acevido: "Even in normal business hours?"
