Irene J. Pendzick: "Mrs. Ottaviano called and requested that I read this in its entirety."

Supervisor Janoski: "Read it into the record."

Irene J. Pendzick:

"Dear members of the board: This letter is in reference to the recent appointment of John Chrabolowski as head of the Town Building Department. Many of us are unclear as to why and how this all transpired and would appreciate an explanation to the following questions.

1. Was a third Building Inspector really necessary? It seems that two inspectors function quite well up to now, assuming of course, that the work load was equally and fairly apportioned.
2. Why was a person with little or no qualifications or experience chosen not only to join the department, but also to head it?
3. Why was the civil service exam requirement waved for Mr. Chrabolowski and why wasn't someone from the civil service list chosen in the first place, as is the usual procedure?
4. Why were the two senior department members in good standing, demoted to create this new position? It appears that this entire matter has raised some serious questions and the feeling of skepticism among the public. Hopefully the board will be able to clarify and reassure us as to the validity of the appointment.

Irene J. Pendzick: "That concludes correspondence."

Supervisor Janoski: "May I have a copy of that? I would like to, the town Board has discussed this matter this afternoon and will correspond to it, but as the letter is read into the record I will respond right now.

The first point that was raised was: Was a third building inspector necessary? We had only one building inspector. The other individual is the Town Zoning and Planning Administrator. The reason that the Town Board moved to hire a third person because the three fire districts of the town of Riverhead, Jamesport, Riverhead, and Wading River, requested that the Town Board hire someone to do fire inspections. It was the recommendation that instead of hiring a fire inspector, that we seek out a highly qualified person for the Building Department and that brings us to the second point; which is; why a person with little or no qualifications or experience chosen not only to join, let me stop there; John Chrabolowski's qualifications are a matter of record and his application and resume are available to anyone who wishes to investigate. He has a great deal of education and training and experience in building and supervision.

Three: Why was the civil service exam requirement waved for Mr. Chrabolowski and why wasn't someone from the civil service list chosen in the first place, as is the usual procedure?

The civil service exam was not waved. Mr. Chrabolowski does in fact have to take the exam when it is offered by the department of civil service. The Town Board did call for a civil service list for the position of senior building inspector and interviewed everyone on that list. There was declinations of that position which reduced the number below the required number of three to constitute a list. Therefore, the town board did not have to use the list because of the declinations.

There are two point fours. Why were the two senior department members in good standing demoted to create this new position? I quite honestly would prefer not to comment on this particular point, but I think most people in the town of Riverhead realize that there were certain problems within the building department which in fact the Town Board was trying to address by hiring Mr. Chrabolowski. We still have five minutes."

Supervisor Janoski

" There are some four minutes remaining before the first public hearing. I would recognize anyone who wishes to be heard on any matter that might be contained in the resolutions. Bill."

Bill Nohejl, "Wading River; I wish to speak, but not to be cut off if I don't (inaudible)"

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill I will invite you to come back once the four minutes have elapsed"

Bill Nohejl, "Wading River, Communication from the Suffolk County on the U.S. Today. I've noticed those coin machines there for the last three weeks or so. Are they authorized by the town to be put there? What was the communication....? "

Supervisor Janoski: "Where have you seen them Bill? "

Bill Nohejl, "Wading River They're down in front of the Burger King and down in front of McDonalds. On the street and right in front, there's no stopping, no standing, no parking. They are there. They been there three weeks."

Supervisor Janoski: "I had understood that the County of Suffolk had quite honestly confiscated some of the machines. The one that I had seen at Burger King seemed to be on private property. Maybe I am confusing that there is one....."

Bill Nohejl: "No, no it is out on the road."

Supervisor Janoski: "I've seen the one that was right in there doorway."

Bill Nohejl: "This one is out on the road. It's on a post and the one down in front of McDonalds, this is on 58 there."

Supervisor Janoski: "On 58 there..... "

Bill Nohejl: "And this one is standing on the concrete with a flat base outside of their wall."

Supervisor Janoski: "Last week, I beleive it was last week. It could have been the week before. I received a call from someone in U.S. Today, who asked me where their machines were on route 58. That they had disappeared and someone told him that the town had taken them. I asked him of course the roadway and he did say Rte. 58 and I said that its a county road that most likely it was the County of Suffolk, department of public works that had taken the machines. But if your saying that.... "

Bill Nohejl: "But just a half hour or so they're there."

Supervisor Janoski: "It is a county roadway and I will tomorrow call the DPW and inform them that they're there and I'm sure that they will take action because it is Roger Meek from that department who has notified the town that they should not be there. "

Bill Nohejl: "I don't have enough time to go into my second question, so I will back off there."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you, Thank you. Let the record show that the hour of 7:45 p.m. has arrived. The town clerk will please read a notice of public hearing."

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 P.M.

The Town Ckerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held on Tuesday, May 3, 1983 at 7:45 P.M. at Riverhead Town Hall to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed amendments to Section 90-13 of the Town Code, "Shows and Exhibitions."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you, Mrs. Pendzick. Mr. Town Attorney."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Richard Ehlers, Town Attorney, This amendment addresses the liability insurance required by someone seeking a permit for a show and exhibition within the town. It's been customary, from what we have seen of the recent applicants, includes liability in the amount of one million dollars. This is set by the statute at no less than 50 thousand dollars, which seems too low in today's times and that's for the personal liability and that the property damage be moved up to 500 thousand dollars and that no distinction be made for the number of people who are covered at any one time. That is one million lump sum, 500 thousand dollars lump sum, and the other clerical correction we don't have a corporate council. We have a Town Attorney. That explains the other part."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mr. Town Attorney. I there any one who wishes to address the Town Board on this matter?  
That being the case I declare the hearing closed. The next public hearing is scheduled for 7:55. Mr. Nohejl, would you like to resume? "

Bill Nohejl, "Wading River, I will direct my remarks to you Mr. Supervisor, then ask you to ask questions so you will not call me down. This afternoon, I went Peconic Bay Boulevard. I was going to go down into Jamesport and I happen to notice on Washington Ave. the street cleaners cleaning up branches. Big heaps of branches. I stop. I ask the men I said: "are you supposed to pick them up?" He says: "no" Supposed to be no. He says, this is a disgrace and over there it had bags where the grass clippings and that was and the leaves. I said that's wonderful. They says yes. But I says how come your picking them up? We notify the people. They still throw them out and if we don't pick them up we catch hell. Wading River there's been two residents on Wading River/Remsen Rd. within the last months, they pull all the leaves out in the gutter. The Highway Department demand they clean up the area. They clean it up for the simple reason that it was going down into the pond. You know how steep it runs past the church. So alright, they had about two thirds of a truck load, a dump truck load of leaves and they were half in the gutter and half up on the curb. There is a cement curbing. So the next weekend they pull out Remsen Rd. The Highway Department with the garbage truck picks that up. The following week they cut the limbs down. Throw them out in the front. The garbage truck picks them up. The next week people across the street rake them down. Tonight I take a ride before I come here and I went down and rode around the area. It's beautiful where the people put them in bags. Go down Daly Rd. there, I bet there's about one house there that's got about 15 bags of grass clippings out there in a heap. The other people have it all in bags."

Bill Nohejl (cont)

"Now I think this is unfair. I think it's been too long. Either the Highway Department puts a foot down, or something's wrong. Now will you ask Mr. Ziemacki when this acquainting period is going to end, or is it going to end. Will you ask him the question? "

Supervisor Janoski; " Absolutely, Yes Bill!"

Bill Nohejl: "I don't want it from you. I want it now."

Supervisor Janoski: " Why don't you go sit down and I'll ask John to come up to the mike."

Bill Nohejl: "I have another question."

Supervisor Janoski: "Let's have the other question."

Bill Nohejl: "The other question is, alright, two weeks ago or so I said about the beer bottles down on Grumman Blvd. and I talked to John about it and he said yes he would send a truck down there. Two days men picked them up. Go down there now, it's the same thing again. I suggest some kind of signs be put up there. No dumping. Or signs to that effect, or there's going to be a fine. But you see you should see the mess there yesterday. Same thing as before. I think it's getting out of hand. Either Grumman should do something or something should be done. "

Supervisor Janoski: " The State of New York, that's the State Highway Department, would have to post no littering signs. But we would have a Regional Headquarters right here in Riverhead that we can be in touch with them."

Bill Nohejl: " Alright, Good. I will sit down and listen to the reply."

Supervisor Janoski: " Thank you Bill. John here?  
Yes he is."

John Ziemacki; " Super intendent of Highways, Manor Lane Jamesport. It seems to me it's damned if I do and damned if I don't. I'm on a spot. If I don't pick them up I hear about it and if I do pick them up I hear about it. Now I can not educate all the people in a short period of time. We are trying. We are talking. I stop at many house and I ask them to bag the leaves. Personally I stop. I stop at one house today where they had wood shingles out and told them we are not going to pick them up. We had leaflets made up and we're distributing leaflets to every house who did not bag their leaves. Now what else can I do? I have to clean the streets and I "

"think we should for safety purposes. Certain people will not comply. What are you going to do? Arrest them? Then somebody is going to have to follow us around and enforce the law."

Supervisor Janoski, " Thank you John."

John Ziemacki, "And as far as Grumman Boulevard, I approached Grumman. I went to them. I ask them for their co-operation and I didn't get any response, but I'm trying."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you John. Looks like about three minutes left before the 7:55 public hearing. Would anyone like to address the Board? Mr. Haizlip."

Steve Haizlip, Calverton, "Mr. Supervisor and the other members. When the Town Clerk read about lowering the speed limit on Schultz Rd., I believe it is. Which brings back to mind, two or three weeks ago a young fellow from River Rd. up in Calverton was asking about the same thing. To lower the speed limit. Am I wrong in assuming that all secondary roads in this township is automatically on 30mph speed limit and only the main thoroughfares is 55mph. Maybe I am wrong about that but I have looked at some of the signs on Grumman Blvd. and it's 30mph. But I can't find anything on River Rd. unless it's stuck back in the trees some where, but I've looked around for it. But I thought all secondary roads was 30mph."

Vincent Artale, Councilman, "If it's not posted it's automatically 55mph."

Steve Haizlip, "Is that right?"

Vincent Artale, Councilman, "That's right."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Steve. Mr. Kasperovich we only have one minute left and I am sure you need more than one minute."

William Kasperovich, "I wish you would confer with Cheif Palmer on that statement you make Mr. (inaudible) because I don't think the laws are enforced in this town by that statement."

Vincent Artale, "Ok."

Vincent Artale, "That's right."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you councilman."

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:55

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held on Tuesday May 3, 1983 at 7:55 p.m. at Riverhead Town Hall to hear all interested persons regarding the special permit application of Bernard Seneau, Michelle Seneau, Jeffrey Lown and Jovenico Meneses to operate and maintain a bakery and wholesale baking business on the west side of Edwards Ave., Calverton.

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Mrs. Pendzick. Is there anyone hear who represents the applicant?"

Charles Cuddy, "Attorney for applicant, MR. Supervisor and members of the Town Board, my name is Charles Cuddy. ~~Essex~~ Hafter Cuddy and Angel, 108 East Main St. Riverhead, New York. We represent the petitioners. The petitioners seek tonight to have approval from the Town Board for a special permit application, which is a piece of property which is 10 acres in size, in the industrial A district. Mr. Seneau is here with me now, one of the petitioners. He proposes to place a bakery there. He will have a wholesale bakery. He'll manufacture and make bakery products and distribute those bakery products to shops west of Riverhead. Mr. Seneau is presently the operator of the Hampton Bakery. He has seven outlets which are west of Riverhead, Suffolk County, Nassau, New York City. Within the next two years he expects to have between 15 and 20 such outlets. The operation at this site will not be a retail outlet but souly a wholesale outlet. He'll have several trucks a day come in. He wants this particular site which is 2000 feet south of Rte.25 on Edwards Ave. the west side of Edwards Ave. because it's adjacent to the expressway. This is an application based on the fact that it's a non-nuisance industry. I can't think of one industry or a particular business that would be more non-nuisance than this. They're are no emissions. They're are no waste products that will inadversely effect in any way the surrounding area. It's going to employ 30 people."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Charles Cuddy (cont)

"Most of these employees will be from the Town of Riverhead. We will come back to the board at some future time that the Board designates, for site plan approval. We have approval from the Planning Board or at least recommendation of approval from the Planning Board for this particular application. If you have any questions, Mr. Seneau is here and he would be glad to answer them."

Vincent Artale, "Will there be a thrift shop type of a thing in the bakery, such as some of the other outlets?"

Charles Cuddy, "I don't anticipate that there would be. No. There is no retail outlet at this particular site."

Supervisor Janoski, "I will recognize anyone in the audience now who wishes to address the Town Board or ask any questions on this applications."

August Groeber, Central Islip, "I would just like to make the Board aware, I work for Entemann's Bakery at the present time, and we have a lot of problems with the EPA. I don't know if they're going to be hooking up to a sewer or maybe that can be answered as far as the water treatment for the purification of the water."

Supervisor Janoski, "There is no sewer in that area."

August Groeber, "There would be approximately how many gallons of water? Because we have a lot of problems with that."

Supervisor Janoski, "These are things that we will start to investigate as we consider the application. Are there any other questions? That being the case I declare the hearing closed. Thank you Mr. Cuddy. Once again I would open the meeting to anyone who wishes to comment on anything that is on the agenda, anything that comes to mind. Mr. Kasperovich you have exactly five minutes."

William Kasperovich, "Fine. It seems appropriate, that after your reply to this ladies letter regarding the building department, that a few added comments be tacked onto your reply. The Building Department has to deal with the elected officials regularly and it seems periodically by the history of this town, the Town Board changes hands, but these people remain in the same position. Now it seems that the Town Board has got to work with and within the Building Department. Any criticisms that is directed to the Building Department is equally directed to you five gentlemen. Particularly to you Supervisor. The Building Department attempting to, as the word is used, extends harmony, diplomacy, cordiality, have worked to solve many problems which have not been understood by the Towns people."

Kasperovich (cont)

"I hear people making comments of things they got away with 20 years ago and they still think they're right. This situation we have today is the price we're paying by trying to maintain a harmony. Now, sometime in the recent past I approached you gentlemen about the Town Board Building Department circumventing the Town Court and the board of appeals playing along with this circumventing of the court. Now you gentlemen have had full knowledge of this. You have permitted it to continue and still continue. Now if any review and correction has got to be made to the Building Department, it also has to focus on the Town Board, because they do what you say. That I think is enough on that one subject."

Vincent Artale, "You have that wrong Mr. Kasperovich."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. Hank would you like to take these last two minutes?"

Henry Fioto, 642 Northvill Tpke, Rhd.

"I would like to address the whole board. Recently we had a lot of crime in Riverhead especially Main Street. (inaudible) With this we had somebody decide to go through the front door. The door was closed at the time of course. A while back, I spoke to some of the members in regards to find out why we never got involved with the Auxillary Police Department and I understand that John is involved in the neighborhood watch and I was wondering if any way possible it could be, maybe expanded to the point where the Town Board could seek from the people in Riverhead. That ways everybody complains about crime and they complain about it but nobody wants to do anything about it and I feel that the Town Board should take the first step and look for volunteers who are willing to spend a couple of hours a night on the road with their own vehicles and so forth. Some how it can be worked out to patrol the town. Maybe to get some of this, because it says really that the criminals know more about the Police Department schedule than the police do themselves. It's amazing. They seem to boom. They go right through windows and alarms mean nothing. They do right through windows right to what they want to do and they get out and they seem to know. I don't know whether they have the scanners or they know where there's something else going on some other place, or they have it planned that way. You know we had the Main St., we had the Theatre last night. We had the Peconic Bank. It's getting worse and worse and it's going to wind up to change Main St. to called Fort Apache and I think the Town Board should really, if it's possible, I don't know. I would like to go on record at this time to say, we should look into it and see what can be done with this here. With volunteers. Or is anybody, can't anybody answer me. Tell me why there is nothing we can do with"

Supervisor Janoski, " Hank I will get an answer for you as soon as we open this next public hearing. Thank you Hank. Let the record show that the hour of 8:05 p.m. has arrived. The Town Clerk will please read a notice of public hearing."

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:03

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held on Tuesday, May 3, 1983 at 8:05 p.m. at Riverhead Town Hall to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed increase in the amount to be expended for the improvements in the construction of the Scavenger Waste Improvement Dist. No. 1.

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you, Mr. Dombek."

Harold Dombek, Vice President of H2M, "Mr. Supervisor and members of the Town Board, I would just like to bring it to your attention this evening, just a few facts that concerns the Scavenger Waste Improvement District and the purpose of this hearing. On March 24, 1983, we received bids for the construction of the proposed improvements to construct the Scavenger Waste Treatment Plant. These bids exceeding our original estimates approximately by 14% which would require an increase in the construction cost of 600 thousand dollars. We have been in contact with the U.S. Department of Environmental Protection Agency and New York State Department of Environmental Conservation and they have advised us that they will upon receipt of a grant application increase, authorize this additional cost to the extent of an 87.5%, pardon me, and 85% federal grant and a 7.5% state grant, such that the local cost increase to be shared by the towns of Riverhead and Southampton will be 45 thousand dollars. I would like to point out to the Board that the Board has entered in to a Spedes permit with the State of New York and a consent order to eliminate the Scavenger Waste being presently placed at the landfill and if the consent order is not complied with that the state may take action in order to enforce compliance. Lastly, we would expect that if the Board does authorize this project that we will probably be able to have executed contracts sometime in June and commence construction in July. We anticipate the construction period will be about 14 to 18 months and a plant will operational about the end of 1984. Thank you. I will be happy to answer any questions."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Thankyou Harold. Would anyone in the audience wish to address the Town Board on the matter of scavenger waste improvement no. 1."

Steve Haizlip, Calverton, "As you know, I have had a little experience along that line, with the present situation it rose. Now, it sounded like to me, maybe I'm wrong, but it sounded like to me that this gentleman is talking about constructing a building and going into business, private business in this town and start to charge us for this operation and we have already had the facilities of the landfill which we pay by taxes. Now am I right in assuming this?"

Harold Dombeck, " No. "

Steve Haizlip, "Well I would like to get cleared up. I don't quite understand. "

Supervisor Janoski, " Is that the only question you have Steve? "

Steve Haizlip "Yes, that's the one I have."

Supervisor Janoski, "I'm tempted because it's such an easy question. It is a joint project of Riverhead and Southampton town governments. The question of scavenger waste and Harold it is called scavenger waste and that's what's called cess-pool waste. It is presently being dumped into the town landfill raw which of course is as far as the EPA is concerned and of course as any thinking person, recognizes is harmful to the environment, particularly the ground water. The state and federal governments are financing this project to 87.5% of it's construction cost. The town of Riverhead and Southampton are sharing the remainder between them so that this cost increase that they were talking about amounts to about 20 thousand to 22 thousand for each town. The town has been moving towards this facility for some years in the belief that it was the best course of action to protect the ground water and halt the depositing of raw sewage and that's what it is, in the town landfill, and thus contaminating the ground water. It is a town of Riverhead operation in agreement with the town of Southampton to bring in there scavenger waste. The maintenance and operation will be financed by the thing that you have addressed the Town Board on and that is the charge per gallon. Have I answered your question?"

Steve Haizlip, " I would like to find out what role this gentleman is playing..... I don't quite understand. "

Supervisor Janoski, "I am sorry Mr. Dombeck is Vice President of H2M and he is an engineer and they are responsible for the design and overseeing the construction of the facility and of course some of the applications that have"

Supervisor Janoski (cont)  
gone back and forth. I am sorry I gave you a big answer that was very simple. Thank you Steve. Is there anyone else who wishes to address.... Yes Hank."

Henry Fioto, "I just want to clarify something. In other words, the cost of the construction is being split between the two towns. "

Supervisor Janoski, "That percentage that does not fall into the 87.5% which is picked up by the state and federal governments."

Henry Fioto, "Now, the second part of the question, is the difference of the scavenger waste itself so being dumped will be payed, in other words., If Southampton dumps a million gallons a year into this thing it is payed by Southampton. "

Supervisor Janoski, "Yes."

Henry Fioto, "If we dump a  $\frac{1}{2}$  million we only pay for a  $\frac{1}{2}$  million. "

Supervisor Janoski, "Right. It's on a use basis charge."

Henry Fioto: "In other words, it shall be restricted. No other town can come into....."

Supervisor Janoski, "Although there is a possibility that we could contract with other towns. That is a possibility."

Henry Fioto, "In other words, the town can recoup the money out of the building for it."

Supervisor Janoski, " Yes, Yes. "

Henry Fioto, "How would it be controlled? I mean the idea is, will there have to a license that lets the operator from Southampton town, in other words you can't get a truck going into Brookhaven..... "

Supervisor Janoski, " We have coupons which are based on the gallonage capacity of the truck and that's how the fee is charged. "

Henry Fioto, " I don't mean that part. I'm saying, will it be like, let's say for arguement's sake. We have Nash of Riverhead who is a licensed cesspool dumper. Alright we know that he has permission from the town to use it. Southampton. Are they going to have the same thing, or to govern it or will it be open. Well let's say, A guy from(Brookhaven) a guy from Southampton can go into Brookhaven and pick up dump, and dump it to here because it will be, let's say cheaper."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Richard Ehlers Town Attorney, " Under the grant terms, we're required to adopt an ordinance on both Southampton towns and Riverhead that controls the dumping of scavenger waste and the collection of it which requires that no one generating scavenger waste within the town can dump it outside of the town and also if it is created in the town, it must be dumped at this facility. "

Henry Fioto, " In other words, the guy comes there, let's say with a truck and say I picked up from John Doe 605 Horton Ave..... "

Richard Ehlers, " He'll have to kepp track of the gallons he collects because we're going to try and solve Mr. Haizlip's problem at that time by having the double billing, by having the carter under the ordinance show what he's collected and where it's come from and that also will give us some idea what cess-pools might be deffective and might need to be repaired."

Henry Fioto, "Thank you, That's what I am interested in."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Hank. There is about one minute remaining before the next public hearing. Bill, I think I will recess this public hearing and wait for the 30 seconds or so to elapse and open the next public hearing and of course I will come back to this. Let the record show that the hour of 8:15 has arrived. The Town Clerk will please read a notice of public hearing."

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:15 p.m.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held on Tuesday, May 3, 1983 at 8:15 p.m. at Riverhead Town Hall to hear all interested persons regarding the propsed increase and improvement of the facilities of the Riverhead Public Parking District No. 1.

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Mrs. Pendzick. Mr. Town Attorney."

Richard Ehlers Town Attorney, " There are planned improvements in the parking district behind Swezey and in that general area. The original bond resolution authorized the expenditure of 65 thousand dollars of bond money. About 35 thousand of that money has been spent on the drainage which has been placed in the parking lot. A change from slurry-seal to asphalt which was mandated by poor surface conditions, existing at the parking lot requires that the bond be increased from 65 thousand dollars to 170 thousand dollars, to take care of the improvements back there involving curbing as well as striping of the pavement. "

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PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "It is also important to point out that this particular improvement. The cost of the bonds the repayment of the bonds is born by the members of the Riverhead parking District and is not a general town charge. Mr. Fioto."

Henry Fioto, "Town Attorney, you have mentioned we have paid for drainage in the parking lot. Was that bonded or guaranteed by the guy. This last rain we've had as much water sitting in the parking lot as we've had in the Peconic Bay."

Supervisor Janoski, "I think that was a result of the river overflow."

Henry Fioto, "Why don't they just go directly in the water. This higher water level, but half that parking lot past that part because half that parking lot was under water."

Supervisor Janoski, "High tide and the amount of rain will cause that condition. I don't know that we could afford the drainage system necessary to take care of it."

Henry Fioto, "Well I brought it up because like I say "

Victor Prusinowski, Councilman, "Also Henry, speaking of Howie Young, when he first drew up the plans for the new renovations. The parking lot has to be grated a little bit more in certain areas. They did the drainage first. It wasn't all that was in conjunction. I think that will help solve the problem a little bit. I think there are some drains that look like they are a little higher. That's because they anticipate the 1½" of asphalt and if you look at the parking lot it goes like this and they have to regrade it. Some parts of it."

Henry Fioto, "I look at the parking lot. I also look at the lights sticking up in the air, bending over."

Victor Prusinowski, Councilman, "No. That particular light will be replaced. The electrical contractor is waiting for a replacement pole."

Henry Fioto, "Well, is there any reason why it was done with cement than a pole on top of it?"

Victor Prusinowski Councilman, "Yes, because the reason why it was done, was ironically, to protect the lights from having a big truck like which hit that particular pole, and that thing was weighed for X amount of tons and unbelievably that it was a huge vehicle that backed up into that light and made it tip over like that. I don't want to say what"

"particular type of truck it was. No it wasn't a highway truck."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Hank. Is there anyone else that wishes to address the Town Board on the improvement to the public parking district. That being the case I declare the hearing closed and re-open the previous hearing on the improvement scavenger waste. Bill!"

William Kasperovich, " It seems that the scavenger waste program has been a thorn in my side for a long time and after analyzing it this weekend, I think it is mainly because we are reverting to something that was done in ancient Rome 3000 years ago. IN addition, it seems to be a continuence of a deception. Even after tonight, man statnds up here and tells us we agreed to stop dumping in the fill. We didn't agree to any such thing. It was jammed down our throats. We're all aware that the bigger and stronger agencies can take the little of Riverhead and do what they want, but they certainly can't keep us quiet and the certainly can't take our rights away. It's unfortunate that the many previous town boards did not have any foresight and so many people in the county and the state think of us as do nothing people. This is not entirely true. Whether the human waste goes into the ground cesspool by cesspool, or whether it is disposed, dispersed and drained in a particular locale such as the town dump. It still goes into the waste, the drinking water. I can't possibly think how my waste in Wading River can get into the Peconic Bay, but it seems that we want to spend 5½ million dollars on this type of deceptions. There's little point in going over the entire history of the scavenger waste program, but at the same time we can't continue in the same pattern of deception. Gentleman here from H2M, represents the company that designed a sewage treatment plant for us. That is the proper description. A sewage treatment plant. It's a highly sophisticated design. It will accomplish more and better treatment than the existing plant. Now, how this money is dispersed for payment, is one of our main concerns. We spent a lot of time concerning ourselves about the tax on a permit. The people who contribute a great deal more volume than the permit allows by the use of pipe instead of a tank on the back of a truck. They don't get taxed. Now the cost will go higher and higher and, but the people from where this sewage comes from don't improve iota and that's the imbalance of this project. Most of the people in this township will not profit by this project. All this potent, vile stuff that comes out of cesspools in the township is always introduced as if it was something horrible that we don't want to get near. We don't want to touch. To have anything to do with and yet the statistitcs for the last 18 months that I have looked into....."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill, I'm going to have to interrupt you. You have used up more than five minutes. If you could just summarize within 30 seconds, we can open the next public hearing and we'll re-open this again!"

William Kasperovich "Well, let me interrupt and come back!"

Supervisor Janoski, "Ok. Fine. The public hearing on the scavenger waste improvement is recessed. Let the record show that the hour of 8:25 p.m. has arrived. Will the Town Clerk please read the notice of public hearing?"

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:25p.m.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held on Tuesday, May 3, 1983 at 8:25 p.m. at Riverhead Town Hall to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed amendment to Chapter 97 of the Town Code.

Richard Ehlers, Town Attorney, "This proposed amendment would amend the trespassing ordinance in the town to permit a private property owner, either a non-town or Riverhead municipal property owner such as a school district, a shopping center owner, or an individual property owner, to place signs on his property that would consent that people to be on his property is revoked in the event the person possesses or consumes alcoholic beverages on that property. The theory being that if some one does not wish people to drink on their property or consume alcohol on their property which is commonly considered public, like a shopping center, this would be a mechanism that could utilize at their election to give the town the ability to enforce through it's ordinances their decision."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Mr. Attorney. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the Town Board. Mr. Nohejl."

Bill Nohejl, "The first word that the Town Attorney said, was possess. I can go into King Kullen or a deli, have beer in my hand, carry it in the car, I could get a ticket. That would be a violation. Possess."

Richard Ehlers, Attorney, "The sign could say possess and consume which would be the case, say on a school district property if they elected so and the shopping center owner could say consume."

Bill Nohejl, "Well I just said possess. First word."

Richard Ehlers, Town Attorney, "The election is with the owner. This is not an effort on the part of the town to enforce the ban on any private property as it's written. It's with the owner. Obviously if a person owned a shopping center and had liquor stores on that premises, or other stores selling"

PUBLIC HEARING ContinuedRichard Ehlers (cont)

alcoholic beverages, he would be foolish to elect to prohibit the mere possession on his property."

Bill Nohejl, "May I ask you a question? Does the Jamesport Marina sell beer?"

Richard Ehlers, "There's another section. Are you talking about the municipal marina, the Town owned property? There's a section of Town Law dealing with Town Code, dealing with marinas and dealing with the possession of alcohol on a boat which is completely separate from this. This is souly directed at private property and it is saying, that if the owner of that private property posts a no trespassing sign that says either possess or possess and consume, or just consume, then that would revoke the permission. When you prosecute somebody for trespassing you have to prove two things. They're on the property and they don't have consent of the owner. This delivers the second half of that. The lack of consent."

Bill Nohejl, "The first word confused me when you said possess because if I possess and I'm coming out of a shopping center and I get a ticket for it. That's ridiculous."

Richard Ehlers, "But there would be places where both would apply."

Bill Nohejl, "OK."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. Paul."

Paul Mckee, Principal of Rhd. H.S., "Good evening. Speaking on behalf of the Board of Education, which could not be here this evening, because of their own budgetary meeting at the High School, and the District Administration and High School Administration, I would strongly like to urge the support of this bill. I feel that this will enhance our programs at the High School and also provide for a better decorum at all public events. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Paul. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Board on the matter of the trespassing. Steve."

Steve Haizlip, "Since you brought this private property into it, I am a little bit confused and I want to get something cleared up. Now if a robber comes into my yard and I've got to have a sign there that tells him he can't trespass and come into my yard. Isn't it automatic? Well right now I have no sign so he'd be trespassing if he's come on there. Wouldn't he? Now but if I had the sign posted, then I could prosecute him. If I caught him, say hey you are trespassing. This is something I ask to get cleared up."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Richard Ehlers, Town Attorney, "Under the Environmental Conservation, if you have open lands, and there's categories of them, you can post them for no trespassing. You are home unless you have a sign that says trespassers keep out or whatever. In a society it's been ruled that there is a certain freedom of people to come to your door and ring your doorbell and say, would you like to buy an encyclopedia? If you tell the man to get off your property and you point to the boundary line so he knows where the end of your property is, he must do that and if he doesn't go, then you can call the police and you can prosecute an action for trespassing. What this section would do, is it would eliminate someone standing there saying to anyone possessing alcoholic beverages, "you have alcoholic beverages. We don't permit it. Get off our property." It eliminates the first step. Signs. So then all that would have to happen is that a police officer or if the School District is enforcing their own position and asking people to leave. They say, look it says no alcohol on the property, get off and your off and your in violation at that moment."

Supervisor Janoski "Ok. Thank you. Mr. Attorney. Thank you Steve. Is there anyone else who wishes.....Hank."

Henry Fioto, "You state, back to the private property, you're saying, I can see the schools, the Towns, the rest of the stuff. Now you turn around and tell me, if I have a party in my yard I am giving you the authority right now by what's this here. Why you saying private property? In other words."

Richard Ehlers, "The Town currently enforces an alcoholic beverage law which on the town streets and highways, sidewalks, the parks, the other recreation facilities, the marina. We have that jurisdiction because the Town Law gives jurisdiction over our property. We don't have jurisdiction over your private property or the School District property for that matter. That's their separate private property even though they're another municipality. What this does, is it's a backwards way of letting you put up signs for no consumption of alcohol on your property and make it enforceable by saying no one shall be on your property and that there is permission to be there. There assume permission to be there is revoked if they do possess or consume. Depending on how it is worked. So, if you owned a marina, a private marina, and you didn't believe in the consumption or possession of alcohol at your marina, you could post signs and at that point the person would not be permitted to possess or consume alcohol on your property."

Henry Fioto, "If your saying private property, that's a broad term. Private property is my home, my yard and everything else."

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PUBLIC HEARING Continued

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Supervisor Janoski, "You have to make the decision. You have to request it, Henry. "

Richard Ehlers, "You have to put the signs up and you have to put them up in the form....."

Hank Fioto, "Without the signs up, it still stands. In other words, you have no right to come on my property."

Richard Ehlers, "Your not inviting anybody to come on your property by either putting up these signs or not."

Hank Fioto, "I'll go a little further, being that I mention some night to the Supervisor, with this other one you have and I would look a little further into your laws. I don't beleive....."

Supervisor Janoski, "Hank, I don't know that you have to publicize something we are trying to attack in this town by letting people know that there might be some little loop hole. I would appreciate it if we could talk about this privately. "

Henry Fioto, "Ok."

Supervisor Janoski, "Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Town Board on the matter of trespassing signs. Henry."

Henry Pfeiffer, Wading River, "I just want to ask, Who would be responsible for inforcing this? Whether these needs would necessitate a complaint being made by the property owner and inforcement by the Police Department, or would this be an automatic thing by the government leader?"

Richard Ehlers, "It's a town ordinance and its enforceable by the town Police Department enforcing the town ordinances whether or not a person in the school district could be deputized in some way. That would be something we would have to look into."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Is there anyone else present who wishes to adress the town board on the matter of trespassing? That being the case, I declare this hearing closed and reopen the previous hearing on scavenger waste improvement. I would recognize anyone who has not yet addressed the Town Board. Henry."

Henry Pfeiffer, "Yesterday's Newsday published a report of a bill introduced by Senator Moynihan, and a collateral bill by Congressman Carney relating to the government providing large sums of money for the preservation of the single act or something like that. Would funds be available from this program do you suppose, to pick up the tab on that 45 thousand dollars that the town's want? Ok, that's question 1. Secondly "

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "Let me put that answer on record. No. The tape player doesn't pick up me shaking my head."

Henry Pfeiffer, "The second question, Where would this plant be located specifically? Thirdly, what type of operation is it and what would the by-products be and how would they be disposed of?"

Supervisor Janoski, "The first question I can very easily answer. The second I can ask Harold. It is in the vicinity of the present sewage treatment plant. Harold would you give us a disertation and how it works?"

Harold Dombek, "I'll try to make it very brief. The proposed plans will except the waste from the scavenger waste vehicles. It would be dumped into a trough that will remove the sand and rags and stones. It will be pumped into a tank that will equalize the flow, mix the various loads and feed it uniformly during the course of the day and during the weekend when there's no flow to the treatment plant at which point chemicals will be added that will remove the very heavily suspended matter. The liquid will then flow on to a biological treatment that will remove the dissolved matter and then lastly, the liquid will move on to a tertiary process which will remove the nitrogen products or the nitrates and then finally, the liquid will be choloinated in order to remove the pathinogenic organisms and then disposed of in the Peconic River. The products from the plant are essentially the solid matter that is removed from the chemical process and the solid matter that is produced in the biological process from the bacterial growth. These two solid products are further treated in a process called digestion which renders the majority of the organic compounds in them, innocuous. The solid matter is then dried and it is brought to the landfill for final disposal in a dried matter."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Is there anyone who also wishes to address the Town Board on this matter? Yes."

August Groeber, Central Islip, "I would just like to ask you this, gentleman here. What would be the final biological oxygen demand of the water going in? What would be the EPA's requirement? Will you meet or exceed the requirement?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Mr. Groeber, would you address your question to the chair please?"

August Groeber, "I would like to know the biological oxygen demand or the B.O.D. of the water would be going after the treatment process and what the EPA agency requires. Will this meet their requirement or will it exceed it or will it be below it?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you August. Harold."

Harold Dombek, "The final effluent from this plant will meet the state permit which is the SPEDES permit which has a biological oxygen demand of 30 milligrams per liter. It also has a total nitrogen requirement of under 10 milligrams per liter which it will meet."

Supervisor Janoski, "Is there anyone else who wishes to address the board on the matter of scavenger waste? That being the case I declare the hearing closed. I am sorry Bill, I really did forget you. Bill it is your turn again."

William Kasperovich, "Believe me Mr. Supervisor, it's just as distasteful for me to speak as it is for you to listen. This is a difficult matter. For the record, are we still on the tape?"

Supervisor Janoski, "Absolutely."

William Kasperovich, "As late as last Friday, I went to the Town Clerk's office to see what Public information was available for this public hearing. After a diligent search by Mrs. Pendzick, and her clerks which was very much a disturbing and consuming time from their activity, but there was no public information. Once again I have to remind the Town Board that when we have a public hearing, the information has to be available to the public. Otherwise, the public hearing becomes just a stage play."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill, we had a conversation in my office and you knew full well what this public hearing was about. We spent some 15-20 minutes talking about the bids being received by the Town that the bids be in excess of the first bond. Authorization for the bonding and that there was a need to have this public hearing on the authorization for the needed capital. At that time you knew full well what the public hearing was about. I don't understand how you can say that you don't."

William Kasperovich, "Let me elaborate for if I may."

Irene Pendzick, "Town Clerk, Mr. Supervisor, if I may interceed, Mr. Kasperovich came asking for specific information, in fact specific correspondence which we didn't have. My files are extensive on the scavenger waste program."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill, why don't you go ahead. I am sorry to interrupt you."

William Kasperovich, "Well obviously, when I talk, I expect people that I talk to understand what I am talking about. With an engineering background, have lived in the engineering world. In all varied construction work including one sewage disposal unit much larger than the one we're building here. We are asking for an additional 1/2 million dollars. I think the public should know what for. The answer that to take into account the higher bids that were submitted March 24 is not an adequate answer. Now the public has not seen the estimate"

William Kasperovich Continued

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"as it stands in order to relate it or compare it to the cost. So that just saying we need another ½million dollars because the bids came into high explains nothing. I believe the first step that should have been taken, and I see no indication that it was, that when the bids came in too high, that the bids should have been reviewed in order to trim out what we could trim out so that we didn't have to ask for another ½million dollars. There are a number of things that could be reduced or omitted or put into operating cost such that we would not have to ask for another ½million dollars. The second that which should be part of the sewage treatment plant that exists in the Riverhead sewage district, should be trimmed out such that the public will know what the sewage district will carry and what the scavenger waste project will carry. There is no current public information. We built a 24' wide 600' long road."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill I am giving you a 30 sec. warning."

William Kasperovich, "Well you can cut me off and apparently you can, the same way you can close doors, but I say when you work on a secondary treatment tank inside the Riverhead sewer district, which is a part of it's function to date and don't take that cost out of the scavenger waste system you will then be joining the deception of this project. Now if you don't understand enough about the sewage treatment plant, its chemistry or its construction, there are many people on the island of Long Island that would assist you and you have a pocket with which to buy assistance. H2M was not on the Ballot when we voted for the Town Board in Riverhead and yet you have given them exclusive soul authority. This means one of two things, either you don't want to know what's going on or you just don't give a damn and that's 30 seconds worth."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. Mr. Dombeck."

Harold Dombeck, "Mr. Supervisor, When the bids received, we did review the bids. We varified the cost. We reviewed the bids with the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation who was the agent for the EPA. We discussed with them other alternatives for reducing the cost, perhaps even rebidding the project. It was felt by all parties, that the areas in which cost reduction could be accomplished, would impare the ability of the plant to produce it's effluent and on that basis we have made our recommendation that the board should consider this additional authorization. This project has been reviewed by the Suffolk County Department of Health Services. It has been reviewed by the New York State Department of Conservation, United States EPA, United States Army Corp of Engineers for technical review. The original process I would remind Mr. Kasperovich, was recommended to the Suffolk County Department of Health as one that was a lot less expensive. The Suffolk County Department of Health was assistant on this particular process and not the "

"original process recommended. We believe that the process is and will produce the effluent to meet the permit and so does the U.S. EPA in that they have granted this project what has been called the Innovative and Alternative Status giving it an additional 10% aid to the project, cutting the local cost down to 7.5 cents on the dollar. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Harold. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Board on the scavenger waste matter? That being the case I declare the hearing closed. The Town Board will now take a short recess before we come back and do the resolutions. We will reconvene at 9:05."

Supervisor Janoski recessed the meeting.

Supervisor reconvened the meeting at 9:05.

Supervisor Janoski, "We will return to order. The chair recognizes for the purpose of a comment, Mr. Nohejl."

Bill Nohejl, "I had time to diagnose Mr Ziemacki's comments and I feel as though he's right in a lot of respects. Reasons he says he's damned if he do and damned if he doesn't, he has to keep the highways clean. Now gentlemen, I believe it's your responsibility and I think it's the policemen's responsibility to assume the people dumping in the streets you have an ordinance which prohibits it. Enforce it. I think the burden is on your shoulders too as well as Mr. Ziemacki's. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. We will now move onto the resolutions. As the hour is late and having some experience in the Senate of the State of New York, there is a procedure which is used there in which the Clerk reads the title of the bill and I'll ask that the entire resolution be read. We will make a motion on the title of the bill and of course there are some here that the person offering would like to read the entire bill. I'm sorry, not bill, resolution. If there is a request from the floor to have the entire resolution read we will certainly honor that. Let us proceed."

#232 AUTHORIZES OVERTIME COMPENSATION-WATER DISTRICT.

#264 INCREASE OF \$105,000 FOR PUBLIC PARKING DISTRICT IMPROVEMENTS  
ADOPTED May 3, 1983

Councilman Artale offered the following resolution which was seconded by Councilman Boschetti.

WHEREAS, pursuant to a bond resolution adopted October 6, 1981 the Town Board of said Town has authorized the issuance of \$65,000 serial bonds to increase and improve the facilities of the Town of Riverhead Public Parking District No. 1, consisting of the repaving and resurfacing of various parking lots; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, has duly caused to be prepared an estimate of cost, pursuant to Section 202-b of the Town Law, relating to the increase and improvement of the facilities of the Town of Riverhead Public Parking District No. 1, consisting of the repaving and resurfacing of various parking lots in said District with asphalt paving in substitution for the slurry-seal coating previously authorized, at a total cost of \$170,000; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, duly adopted an order on April 19, 1983, calling a public hearing in relation to said increase and improvement; and

WHEREAS, notice of said public hearing was duly published and posted in the manner and within the time provided by law, and

WHEREAS, said public hearing was duly held at the Town Hall, 200 Howell Avenue, in Riverhead, New York, in said Town, on May 3, 1983, at 8:15 p.m., Prevailing Time, at which time and place of said Town Board heard all persons interested in the subject matter thereof; and

WHEREAS, it is now desired to authorize such increase and improvement of facilities and to provide for the financing of the costs to be incurred thereby; and

WHEREAS, said Town Board has duly considered the evidence given at said public hearing;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, as follows:

WHEREAS, it is now desired to authorized such increase and improvement of facilities and to provide for the additional financing thereof; NOW THEREFORE, BE IT

RESOLVED, by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, as follows:

Section 1. The specific object or purpose to be financed, in part, pursuant to this resolution is the increase and improvement of the facilities of the Town of Riverhead Public Parking District No. 2 in the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, consisting of the repaving and resurfacing of various parking lots in said District with asphalt paving in substitution for the slurry seal coating previously authorized.

Section 2. The total estimated cost of such specific object or purpose is now determined to be \$170,000 and the plan for the financing thereof is as follows:

- a). By the issuance of the \$65,000 serial bonds heretofore authorized to be issued pursuant to a bond resolution dated October 6, 1981; and
- b). By the issuance of an additional \$105,000 serial bonds of said Town hereby authorized to be issued therefore pursuant to the Local Finance Law. Further details pertaining to said bonds will be prescribed in a further resolution or resolutions of this Town Board.

Section 3. It is hereby determined that the period of probable usefulness of the aforesaid specific object or purpose is ten years, pursuant to subdivision 20(f) of paragraph a of Section 11.00 of the Local Finance Law, to be computed from September 1, 1982, the date of the first bond anticipation note issued an anticipation of the sale of the aforesaid \$65,000 serial bonds. It is hereby further determined that the maximum maturity of the serial bonds herein authorized will exceed five years.

Section 4. Subject to the provisions of the Local Finance Law, the power to authorize the issuance of and to sell bond anticipation notes in anticipation of the issuance of and sale of the serial bonds herein authorized, including renewals of such notes, is hereby delegated to the Supervisor, the chief fiscal officer. Such notes shall be of such terms, form and contents, and shall be sold in such manner, as may be prescribed by said Supervisor, consistent with the provisions of the Local Finance Law.

Section 5. The faith and credit of said Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, are hereby irrevocably pledged to the payment of the principal of and interest on such obligations as the same respectively become due and payable. An annual appropriation shall be made in each year sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on such obligations becoming due and payable in such year.

Section 1. Upon the evidence given at the aforesaid public hearing, it is hereby found and determined that it is in the public interest to increase and improve the facilities of the Town of Riverhead, Public Parking District No. 1 of the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, consisting of the repaving and resurfacing of various parking lots in said District with asphalt paving, in substitution for the slurry-seal coating previously authorized at a total cost of \$170,000.

Section 2. This resolution shall take effect immediately
