Councilman Prusinowski, "Is also subject of a resolution pending Planning Board consideration. Seeing that the first public hearing is scheduled for 7:45, we'll open the meeting to anyone wishing to be heard on any subject. Hank."

Henry Fioto, 642 Northville Turnpike Riverhead, "A while back we had discussed this, a certain piece of property on Peconic Avenue, and last weeks Suffolk Life, an article appeared saying that the Town has negotiated a deal with the Bank, Riverhead Savings Bank, and that the Bank was purchasing the property and that the Town intended to tear the building down and blacktop it. At that time it is also to my understanding that over a past period of time, that the Town was also negotiating to lease the Riverhead Savings Bank parking lot. Now I would like a couple of things clarified.

1. It says the Bank is buying the property for \$80,000 or \$80,500. It's going to cost the people of Riverhead \$70,000 to tear it down and to blacktop 38 by 68 feet

and that's the only lease that we'd have with them is for 7 spaces for twenty years."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. First of all Hank, the people of Riverhead are not paying for this. The merchants in the parking district are paying for this. We have to understand that there are two different tax basis' in Riverhead. There's the General Town tax and there's the Parking District tax. The parking district tax is made up of those merchants and businesses that are in the parking district. So far as the 70 thousand demolition charge, I don't know anything about that because nothing has gone up to bid and I haven't seen anything and I am just speaking for myself. Maybe the Town Attorney can enlighten me."

Town Attorney, Richard Ehlers, "No bid."

Councilman Prusinowski, "There is no bid on the 70 thousand."

Henry Fioto, "Then Suffolk Life was wrong when it said 70 thousand?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "I believe they were wrong because I think what they were referring to was, the cost involving the over-all pavement improvement of the Parking District, which we have a low bid tonight of \$98,000 and I think we had some of the facts a little bit wrong. We would never go with a deal where we're going to pave something for 80 thousand and spend 70 thousand of anybody's money to tear down the building."

Henry Fioto, "Now just clarify one more thing."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Sure."

Henry Fioto, "Are we leasing seven parking spaces or are we leasing the whole parking lot?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Town Attorney."

Town Attorney, Richard Ehlers, "Vic, We're leasing seven parking spaces."

Henry Fioto, "Alright. Now, to straighten, the resolution that was passed, as far as my understanding was, was the Town of Riverhead, not the district."

Councilman Prusinowski, "well."

Henry Fioto, " If this is the situation, than what I said is correct. The Town of Riverhead is buying it and then negotiating a lease, that will re-lease it to the parking district which means then, that all the tax payers in the Town of Riverhead are

buying this. This was my understanding from the beginning. I read the original contract which was assigned to the bank and as far as I know, it hasn't been changed. If this is the situation, then it's not being leased by the parking district. It's being payed for by every citizen of the Town of Riverhead."

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "If you have a moment. The original negotiation was between the Parking District and the property owners represented by his attorney. As it developed, it was not so simple legally for the parking district to acquire the piece of property by direct purchase and it appears that the parking district should rather lease the property because of some of the constraints in the Town Law. At that time, my office approached the bank whether they would help the town out and buy the property and avoid the town expense. So what we've arranged and what we've proposed, is that the bank is going to foot the bill for the purchase of a piece of property which is then going to be leased to the parking district, at the parking district's expense for the sole cost of demolishing the building and putting the parking improvements to seven spaces. The seven spaces approximately equal the number of spaces being removed from the Peconic Avenue area as the result of the re-striping and the improved traffic flow, which has been negotiated with Suffolk County. So that the bottom line is, that instead of the parking district or Town of Riverhead paying the acquisition cost, neither of them are going to pay that. The Savings Bank is going to pay it out of some gesture of good will and good faith on their part and the town, for it's share, is going to demolish the building which procludes a good proper view of the river and will enhance the and open up the entrance to the river and also provide the additional seven parking spaces for a period of twenty years. That's the way it was negotiated."

Henry Fioto, "Alright. Now your saying the contract was changed. The original contract, I have a copy of the contract."

Henry Fioto and Councilman Prusinowski

Councilman Prusinowski, "The original contract between the Town and the purchase of the property by Mr. Lamendola."

Henry Fioto, "Now, the last resolution at the last Town Board meeting was that the town, that the town, the supervisor enter in a deal with the bank, negotiating as the Supervisor of the Town of Riverhead. Now has the contract been changed to read the Parking District or does it still say the Town of Riverhead?"

Town Attorney, Richard Ehlers, "The contract was always between the Town of Riverhead and Mr. Lamendola. It was never between the Parking District because early on we realized that the Parking District could not directly acquire it. So the original thinking in my mind and on the part of anyone else, was that a lease could be developed between the town and the Parking District to avoid the difficulty with the Town Law. That was unnecessary."

Henry Fioto, "Ok."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Excuse me Hank."

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "When the bank was willing to pay the full freight."

Councilman Prusinowski, " Hank you can come up and finish this. We have a 7:45 public hearing. Let the record show that it's now 7:47 and we'll have the reading of the first public hearing."

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, May 17, 1983 at 7:45 P.M. to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed amendments to Section 108-21B (3) of the Riverhead Town Code: 2 family dwelling on a minimum of 2 acres by special permit of the Town Board.

Councilman Prusinowski, "Mr. Town Attorney will you explain the public hearing to the public?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "The current Town Code provides that, if you go for a special permit to permit multiple two family dwellings in the Agriculture A District by special permit, you only need one (1) acre or whatever the pre-existing area of the lot size, if it is a pre-existing lot size. The suggestion is that since dealing with bigger projects we determined the density based on the one acre principle. If you go two residences on the one dwelling that for the symmetry it should be two acres and that's what's proposed to the Town Board."

Councilman Prusinowski, " Is there anyone present wishing to address the Town Board on this issue? All the way in the back. Bill Nohejl. Usually you sit two seats forward."

PUBLIC HEARING Cont.

Bill Nohejl, Wading River, "Town Attorney will you please go through that again? You lost me there."

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "If you want to go for a special permit to have a two family dwelling in the Agricultural A District right now, it seems that you only need one acre. When we were going through the Flagg application and some of the other cluster type applications, yield maps are developed to determine what the density should be on that property and it is always done by one acre per unit. So it would seem it should be two acres for a two family unit in the Agricultural A District. If you want to be consistent and we're also then avoiding problems of the developer saying, well gee you tell me it's one acre per unit but I could also come in and put density on it of two units per acre. So if I have 40 acres and I want to put up condominiums. You're telling me well forty units is all I could have but I could go out and get forty two-family units on that property and really yield eighty units and this would eliminate any flexibility that way."

Bill Nohejl, "If you had a 1-acre parcel and wanted to put a 2-family dwelling on it, it would be prohibited. Right?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "That would be if you had a."

Bill Nohejl, "A 1-acre separate parcel built and there is no way of getting a 2-acre parcel, make it a 2-acre parcel, what would be the outcome of that?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "I'd have to go back and re-read that. Is that what you're concerned about? The pre-existing person?"

Bill Nohejl, "Well if you wanted to make the development, I would more or less go along with you on this 2-acre but if your not making a development and you have a 1-acre plot and you wish to come in for a special permit for a 2-family dwelling, I say it's unfair, but if a builder come in or wanted to make a big sub-division, where you wanted like a condominium or something of that type, I agree with you, but not, it shouldn't be on total 2-acre basis."

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "Would you make a distinction between the people who already had a house on that smaller plot, or just anyone with a lot of that size, the 1-acre, whether you had a house on it or not?"

Bill Nohejl, "If you had a house on it and I came in for a special permit."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "Suppose you didn't have a house on the 1-acre parcel? What would be your position by then?"

Bill Nohejl, "I feel as though the person should have the privilege to be able to do it. Yes. Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank-you Bill. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Town Board? Yes, Fran."

Fran Vitollo, Wading River, "You're speaking of building homes on a 2-acre parcel. What about an existing house on a say, 80 by 100 piece of property and this person wishes to make her home into a 2-family. What would that be?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "In the current Agricultural A District, that's the only part we're addressing this. This is only aimed at the Agricultural A District."

Fran Vitollo, "That's it?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "That's the only one that's under discussion."

Fran Vitollo, "But aren't you doing that wrong for the simple reason, what about the other people? Suppose you live in that A and B. Is there, there is a B District right?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "You can't...."

Fran Vitollo, "A B & C right?"

Richard Ehlers Town Attorney, "You can't go for a 2-family in the residence A & B. I don't believe. I'd have to check."

Fran Vitollo, "What about a C area?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "Off the top of my head I couldn't tell you but I believe that you only find one section in the Hamlet. I think it might be business B. No it's not business B but it's a section that permits the multiple."

Fran Vitollo, "Well I'm business C. Ok?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "All right."

Fran Vitollo, "I want to add to my apartment. Would I be able to?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "This has nothing to do with that."

PUBLIC HEARING Continued.

Councilman Lombardi, "Dick, Dick, A."

Fran Vitollo, "You're just saying strictly A?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "We're only"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Business A."

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "We're only dealing with Agricultural A for this resolution."

Fran Vitollo, "It doesn't sound fair."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. Thank-you Fran. Is there anyone else wishing to address the Town Board on this particular topic? That being the case I declare the public hearing closed and we have two minutes. Hank, you want to finish that one question you had or wait until, ok. Anyone else wish to address the Town Board for two minutes? Bill."

Bill Nohejl, " Yes. It won't take me more than two minutes on this one. We had quite a conflict last time on resolutions between me and the Town Board, remember? Now the Town Clerk makes up resolutions for each one of you, makes up for the press. I suggest that anyone who's interested in resolutions, Mrs. Pendzick make up extra copies of each, pin it on the bulletin board over on the side there. Anyone interested in the resolution can see the contents of the resolution at their leisure without coming and disturbing the Town Board."

Councilman Prusinowski, "That way you only have to make one copy."

Bill Nohejl, "One copy of each."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Right. Of each resolution and put them up on the bulletin board."

Bill Nohejl, "Right. Then if I'm interested in such resolution, I know just what's in there. Thank-you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. Good suggestion Bill. Ok. Let the record show that it's 7:55 and the Town Clerk will read the notice of public hearing."

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:55 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday May 17, 1983 at 7:55 P.M. to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed granting of a franchise to Wehran Energy for the removal of methane gas from the Sanitary Landfill.

PUBLIC HEARING Continued

Councilman Prusinowski, "We have a representing from Wehran Energy here and Councilman Boschetti who is heading up the Solid Waste Committee, will explain the purpose of the public hearing."

Councilman Boschetti, "For those who regularly attend the Town Board meetings, I'm sure this public hearing is going to seem familiar because it is. We held one similar to this for Cambrian Energy. However, on further investigation by my committee, we found that it is extremely difficult to find any installations established by Cambrian. Wehran Energy, on even somewhat more investigation, by their making themselves very available, do have a facility which we did visit. A number of other towns have signed with Wehran. We looked at them very closely and we thought they were worthy of further consideration and hence the Solid Waste Committee recommended to the Board to enact this public hearing and perhaps change gears if you will and go from Cambrian to Wehran. Given the fact that they are close. They are a neighbor and they do have very close installations near by."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank-you Councilman. Would you like to say a few words to the Town Board?"

Douglas Neilsen, Wehran Energy, "I represent Wehran Energy of Middle Town New York. Wehran Energy as Mr. Boschetti said, is in the business of recovering the methane that is generated in sanitary land fills and turning it into useful energy. We have in the Town of Smithtown, on a closed landfill, two caterpillar gas engines right now, which are producing electricity from landfill gas. Probably tomorrow or the day after, we will start another one in Dover Township New Jersey and within another month we'll have at least one in Brookhaven and within another two months after that, we'll probably have another three or four in Brookhaven, generating electricity and we will also before the summer is over or before the year is out be producing electricity at the Huntington landfill with a couple of engines and what we have proposed to the Town of Riverhead, is that we be given the gas rights to their landfill so that we can go out and test the landfill to see if there's enough gas to run an engine and at our own expense and our total risk, we will build a system that will generate power that will be sold to L.I.L.C.O. and out of the revenues that we gather, 1/8 of those revenues will be given to the Town of Riverhead as their royalty payment, and that based upon the price of power that L.I.L.C.O. is paying can be anywhere from about 25 thousand to 30 thousand in royalties to the town."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank-you very much. I would just like to add for the record, is that methane gas disposal is a requirement set by the state that we eventually have to get or monitor or at least vent the methane gas that does accumulate in the landfill. So this is a way to do it at no expense to the tax payers and to make a small modest fund for the general town fund. Is there anyone present wishing to address the Town Board on this particular subject? Or have any questions. Mr. Haizlip."

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PUBLIC HEARING Continued.

Steve Haizlip, "I would like to ask the question to the gentleman, what was your name again?"

Doug Nielsen, "Doug Nielsen."

Steve Haizlip, "Mr. Nielsen. The mechanism of taking this gas when it comes out of ground. How does it get over to Long Island Lighting to make electricity? Secondly, if they do go to nuclear, which we are fighting, but if it don't go to nuclear than will this be useful to them?"

Doug Nielsen, "Ok. First, I'll answer the question of getting the gas out of the ground. First we drill wells with conventional soil testing equipment. Then we place wells into the ground. We connect them to a pipeline and than in this unit here...."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Mr. Nielsen, if you'd just speak closer to the microphone so that everybody can, that the record can pick it up."

Doug Nielsen, "And then in this unit here which has a pump which draws the gas, we have the gas engine which burns the gas and it drives the generator which produces the power and then we go through a transformer and then we go into L.I.L.C.O.'s lines. Now there's a federal law which states that any gas, any electric company has to buy power that is produced by a small power generator making energy from wastes. So regardless of whether or not Shoreham goes on the line they have to buy the power."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank-you very much. Is there anybody else, Hank."

Henry Fioto, "How long a lease is this for?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Lou."

Councilman Boschetti, "Perhaps Doug can answer this more appropriately but I can give you some generalities. Number one, they're going to be testing to make sure that it will be feasible for them to profitably install the equipment and make an enterprise out of it in Riverhead. If that proves successful, then of course, they will go ahead and build the facility. That may last, they say ten to fifteen years, sometimes longer. It depends on just what they find. What kind of accumulations are actually in the ground and that's really difficult to determine, but perhaps Doug could elaborate on that."

Doug Nielsen, "Well you pretty much answered it. The life, the gas producing life is that to be ten to twenty years. Nobody anywhere has operated one that long yet, we we don't really know. We generally ask for a lease of about twenty years and depending on the site in the town, that has varied in some cases."

PUBLIC HEARING Cont.

Doug Neilsen Cont.

We have leases as short as ten years. We prefer a fifteen or twenty year lease."

Councilman Prusinowski, "And I think the follow up on that, what Hank was saying, is basically, the L.I.L.C.O. is required to pay the going rate for electricity. Is that correct?"

Doug Neilsen, "They're required to pay a rate that is approved by the..."

Councilman Prusinowski, "By the Public Service, I'm sorry, by the Public Service Commission. Right."

Henry Fioto, " Now, my idea of asking this question is basically, as I understand they can run automobiles, that they're going to run gas and things on it. One car can be converted to run methane gas and if it becomes efficient, I can't see tying the town up for too many years, that the town itself can't use some methane gas to run our own vehicles. That's one of the main reasons I wanted, you know. I understand for one hundred some odd dollars, you can convert a regular car to run on methane gas."

Doug Neilsen, "I can answer that question. I've been investigating this because we're interested in doing that. There are some towns, for instance, in Southampton, it's going to cost 70 thousand dollars just for L.I.L.C.O. to run their lines to the Southampton dump, for us to generate electricity there and that may make that project prohibited because we have to pay 70 thousand dollars. So we've been investigating the use of other things such as he just mentioned and it cost something like 15 hundred dollars to convert an automobile and then the gas, as it comes out of the landfill, has to be purified to a higher state which is another cost, then it has to be compressed to something like 2500 pounds and put in special cylinders that would go into the truck of the car, but I'm not ruling it out. We are looking very close at that. Hopefully some day we'll have such a thing."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. Thank-you Hank. Is there anyone else present wishing to address the Town Board. Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich, 15th St. Wading River, "I would like to make a point that the town does include in the negotiations, that in the event that the exploratory effort made by this contractor proves that this is not a feasible project, that all technical findings be duplicated and given to the township. As I understand it we are tying ourselves to them so that they can go ahead and make exploratory studies. Now what I'm saying, in the event that this fizzles out, that these studies are conveyed to the Town of Riverhead."

PUBLIC HEARING Cont.

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "That's a good point."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Good point, thank-you Bill. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Town Board on this particular subject? That being the case I declare, I'm sorry, Oh, I'm sorry. Did you have a question?"

Doug Neilsen, "I was just going to say, normally as part of the contract we turn over all our test data to the town."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. Thank-you very much. That being the case I declare this hearing closed and would anybody wish to address the Town Board for one minute? Ok. Let the record show that it's 8:05 P.M. and the Town Clerk will read a notice of public hearing."

PUBLIC HEARING - 8:05 P.M.

The Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, May 17, 1983, at 8:05 P.M. to hear all interested persons regarding the proposed water extension district no. 20, Hubbard Avenue.

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank-you, Mrs. Pendzick. This is a water extension that is funded by the Federal Government through our community development office. Basically it extends the Water District from Shade Tree Lane in Aquebogue, east down Hubbard Avenue, connecting the roads of, I'm sorry, offering service to the roads of Zion Street and the Hamlet known as, Bell Town and is there anyone present who wishes to address the Town Board on this particular issue? That being the case I declare the public hearing closed and now I will open up the meeting to anyone who wishes to address the Town Board on any subject. Hank you wanted to finish before what you."

Henry Fioto, "Want my name again Irene?"

Irene Pendzick, Town Clerk, "Just for my secretary."

Henry Fioto, " Alright. Now what I want to clarify on this right now, on the record, is this agreement was between the Riverhead Town Parking District and the bank. It is not going to cost the tax payers of the Town of Riverhead a dime."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Yes. The agreement your talking about the lease agreement?"

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "Which agreement are you talking about?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Henry Fioto, "The lease agreement, the tearing down agreement. It's not going to cost the tax payers. It's just going to cost the Riverhead Parking District. Will this money be assessed fully to the Riverhead Parking District?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Yes."

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "That's the current intent. Those agreements have not been signed yet. The resolution has been passed subject to the mandatory waiting period for the permissive referendum for the signing of those agreements. We're awaiting that time now. They've not been signed but the intent is that they be signed."

Henry Fioto, "That's why I want, we've still got two weeks on this referendum. That's why I want to clarify now."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Hank we have already floated the money authorizing the bond for the Parking District which is part of the money that will be, not the 98 thousand. Part of that is for the paving there but the demolition charges have been added on top of that and we've had a bond authorization strength. I think of like."

Henry Fioto, "The one for the 150 thousand dollars?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Right. You've got it and that's part of that job."

Henry Fioto, "And that bonding district that bond's going to be payed by the."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Right. By the Parking District."

Henry Fioto, "Riverhead Town Parking District?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "District right. As a matter of fact, we're coming in low already. We have the asphalt, I believe is 14 thousand dollars under what we anticipated."

Henry Fioto, "What is the bid going out for demolition?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "I don't know that. We haven't gone out to bid on that yet."

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "But the property transaction hasn't closed yet."

Henry Fioto, "But there will be a public."

Town Attorney Richard Ehlers, "You can't go out and bid and bid stuff out until you own the property."

Henry Fioto, "Like I say, according to the Suffolk Life it says this was done."

Councilman Lombardi, "Well they make a few mistakes once in a while."

Councilman Prusinowski, "No. no."

Henry Fioto, "Alright, there will be a regular public bid?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Sure."

Henry Fioto, "Given for the demolition of the building?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Absolutely. Ok. Anyone else wishing to address the Town Board on any subject? Cathy Casey. You have a list."

Cathy Casey Wading River, "Good evening gentlemen. It's been a long time. Glad to see you all."

Councilman Artale, "We've missed you."

Cathy Casey, "You know me and my ideas, I am sorry."

Councilman Prusinowski, "I presume you're here to praise us tonight?"

Cathy Casey, "First."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Since I haven't seen you in six months."

Cathy Casey, "First. That is the first thing I want to do is my little pet peeve, is commend you all for following through on your previous demonstrations to support, I guess also a lot of residents feel when you turned down Mr. Joseph Sullivan and his request to enlarge the old trailer park. Bravo gentlemen. Keep up the good work. As far as I'm concerned, I don't like him as a neighbor. If you hadn't already gathered that. Ok. Now I would like to."

Councilman Prusinowski, "That's it for now, but..."

Cathy Casey, "I'm slowly building, building, you know walk softly and carry a big stick. Isn't that how the saying goes? I would like to tentatively, if you would relay to Mr. Janoski, and to anyone you'd like to and I say tentatively because we are trying to invite some other people to the June 10th Wading River Civic Association meeting and we don't know yet. We are trying

to invite Mr. Ken LaValle and if we can tie this all in we'd like to have Mr. Janoski and as I said the rest of you, if you care to join us. We will communicate again. So again I emphasize, it is a tentative invitation but maybe if you would mark your calendars about a week before and if you haven't heard from us, give us a call or something. You know, just bear in mind."

Councilman Prusinowski, "What time and where is it going to be held?"

Cathy Casey. "It's usually held at the Wading River school and it's usually about 8:00 o'clock on a Friday evening which is June 10th. Ok. Now I have to tell you that you can almost walk on water in the Wading River ponds. We have a sand bar like you wouldn't believe. I mean even the little fish, as strange as this may sound, we are, we have so much sand that they are walking on their little fins. We need the pond dredged very badly."

Councilman Lombardi, "Cathy, we are working on that. We have our engineers on it."

Cathy Casey. "Oh. When do you think you'll be."

Councilman Lombardi, "We're waiting for a report now."

Cathy Casey, "Is it possible to, well, match or something to get the ball rolling?"

Councilman Lombardi, "Well we'll see what we can match it. I'll put them in a garbage dump if it don't work out."

Cathy Casey, "A little firecracker or something. We really."

Councilman Lombardi, "We are, I was down there about a month ago. We did see the problem down there and I have spoken to Joe and we did hire an engineer to go down there to look at the problem. John Ziemacki is there and we know what we have to do. Plus we have to work with Brookhaven on this too because Brookhaven owns quite a bit of that water pond."

Cathy Casey, "Well, which side, obviously they own the north, right? The south would be Riverhead."

Councilman Lombardi, "No. Well yes. They got quite a bit."

Cathy Casey, "Are we getting anywhere with."

Councilman Lombardi, "As there is something being done on that part too."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Cathy Casey, "Ok. So again you still have no idea when this is going to be? Any kind of a time span?"

Councilman Lombardi, "I will try to find out tomorrow for you. Alright?"

Cathy Casey, "Ok. Fair enough. I can be reached after."

Councilman Lombardi, "I got your phone number."

Cathy Casey, "Ok, but after 3:30, after 3:30, busy girl. Also I just wanted to let you know, we did go around and clean up some and I would like some suggestions. I pruned the trees and some bushes by the Post Office, rather I should say, I murdered them. They really need replacing. I would like some advice from somebody who in the town, which maybe none of you can, but maybe somebody from the Highway Department to advise me or look at it and give me some advice as to what kind of shrubbery would do well in that enclosed planter there, because it's you know, it's restricted, is just."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Cathy, I think I can give you, I think of you contact Pat Stark of the Townscape Committee in Riverhead. They do this all the time and they have volunteers who work in this type of field who consult Townscape and the Town Board for this type of project all over town."

Cathy Casey, "Ok."

Councilman Prusinowski, "She's listed in the phone book. Pat Stark."

Cathy Casey, "Under Townscape?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "No. Under James Stark."

Cathy Casey, "James Stark?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Right."

Cathy Casey, "Ok. That's fair enough. Is that with an S?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Right."

Cathy Casey, "I'm only kidding. Also I would like to make a request to the Board that a sign on Red Fox Path, stating; caution children. Actually, I think Red Fox Path should be nicknamed U-turn Street, because cars come in there and we now have an additional family that has moved in and we now have several more young children playing in the street and I think it might be wise to do, as you did with Woodchuck, is put up a sign advising that they are children and caution and perhaps even dead end."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Councilman Prusinowski, "I would ask you that after the meeting that you talk to Superintendent Ziemacki. They're in charge of making these signs up and I'm sure he'll take care of you."

Cathy Casey, "Very good. Thank you very much."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. Thank-you. Anyone else, anybody else wishing to address the Town Board on any topic what so ever? Anybody else besides you two? I'll get you. Ok Steve your next then Bill your on. Go ahead Steve."

Steve Haizlip, "On the 23rd of April, one of the Town Hall meetings, I had told Mr. Janoski and the rest of the Board members that I'd wrote a letter to Mr. Carey. That was a mistake. It was Mr. Cuomo. We got that squared away. So I put a letter into the Town Clerk for public record. I would like to inform you now, that I have an answer to that letter which I would like to put into public record and I find that a lot of things that I was complaining about in there about the convicts in jail not paying it, has been included and I would like to have a copy for public record and one for the Attorney and one for the Justice Office for informative information purposes. Thank-you."

Mr. Haizlip submitted a letter dated 5/4/83 from Governor Cuomo's office re: the recently enacted \$10 mandatory surcharge on those convicted of violating the Vehicle and Traffic Law, which was filed in the Town Clerk's office.

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok, Steve. Bill Kasperovich."

Bill Kasperovich, "You got to be efficient here to get everything in in five minutes."

Councilman Artale, "I thought you were taking the mike home."

Bill Kasperovich, "I should, to practice with it."

Councilman Prusinowski, "The Supervisor's not here. Maybe we'll give you six minutes."

Bill Kasperovich, "Oh thank-you, thank-you. Maybe after you hear what I've got to say, you'll cut it down to four. Two items I have. One is the under way study by the H2M of the municipal water supply to the Wading River area. I assume or I have been told that there has been no interim meeting with the engineers before their final report is completed."

Councilman Prusinowski, "The two principles that are involved from Town Government with the engineering firm, is not here tonight Bill. We'd have to get you that information. Rick Hanley meets with H2M on a regular basis concerning water in the Town of Riverhead and I can't say for sure whether they've met with them or not."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Bill Kasperovich, "All right. I feel that it is important to the area that an interim meeting be held so that we know what direction the engineers are going in so we don't get surprised by something after they're all finished. The amount of money they're getting is no big fund to back track on. In fact, there isn't, probably isn't any money to back track on. So I bring that to light at this point."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We will check it out first thing tomorrow morning."

Bill Kasperovich, "Ok. The second item started at the last meeting and when our learned Councilman said unmarked roads, town roads. I'm talking about town roads not county, not state. Riverhead Town roads, are 55mph and I said no. It's thirty. Alright. Since that day, in fact, since that evening, because the first patrolman I canvassed that evening, was down by that 7-11 place having coffee. I was having the coffee. He was on duty."

Councilman Artale, "Sure?"

Bill Kasperovich, "Yes, yes. I have canvassed the justices, the Town Attorney, Captain Grattan and a number of men on duty. I went to Mrs. Pendzick's office, the Town Clerk, to see what was on file and record for speed limits and only one item I found which was hardly the coverage for the township. Now will leftists in advance, pending the Town Attorney's receipt from a request to the New York State Department of Transportation on what we have on file with the State on so far as legal speed restrictions on town roads are as of now and since this is last week, Thursday, I feel that some response should be obtained by the coming meeting and that a look should be taken on the existing conditions of our Motor Vehicle control warning, restrictions and signs. It's a disturbing and unsettling situation that I walked into. If I get a speeding ticket on an unmarked road I should be (tape changed) Right now there is nothing. It's also disturbing to me that the justices, both Justice Manning and Justice Leonard do not have a compiled reference that they go to in this building. Now I went as far back as the Study by Anderson and Pierson in 1969. I started and hoped to get into the more recent study of 1977. So a lot of work has been done in this area, but all this work hasn't brought us up to the minute. We got to get on this thing and bring it up to the minute so that we can be the modern town that we want in Riverhead and it's not going to be done overnight. There's a lot of paperwork there. I mean canvass just about everybody that I could think of that would have got into this. We're not where we should be and I think it's important that we bring it to this point in time such that we are designating the roads and we are enforcing the law we feel as necessary to be enforced to make this town the good township that it is. Thank-you."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Councilman Artale, "Bill you do understand that it is the State that designates the highway speed not the Town of Riverhead. Not any other town for that matter."

Bill Kasperovich, "Well you have resolution 269 on the books tonight."

Councilman Artale, "Requesting the State to change the speed limit."

Councilman Prusinowski, "A request to the State."

Bill Kasperovich, "True."

Councilman Artale, "Requesting the State to change the speed limit."

Bill Kasperovich, "True, but we have."

Councilman Artale, "I find it unbelievable that you spent two weeks researching what you and I discussed here and out in the hall and that you find it that it's that important to you but I wish you luck. If that's what you want to do. That's fine, but again, I tell you what I told you two weeks ago. It's the State that mandates the speed limit. Not the Town of Riverhead."

Bill Kasperovich, "Well let's review 269 that you're going to work on tonight. The Community petitions for a change of speed limit from 55 to 40. The Town Board and the Suffolk County Commissions of Public Works refer to the New York State Department of Transportation. When they approve and if they approve you then come to a resolution like you are tonight, to make this piece of road 40 miles speed limit."

Councilman Prusinowski, "No. No."

Councilman Artale, "No Bill. They do it. We don't. They do it. We are requesting they do it because we have had a request of that nature. The Town Attorney can explain it to you."

Bill Kasperovich, "As far as I understand it, the Town roads are designated by signs and markings by the Highway Department. The Highway Department is informed by you people on what to do."

Councilman Prusinowski, "True. No. The State of New York informs the Town of Riverhead and we just pass the information off to the Highway Department who just physically makes the signs. The State of New York makes all the laws regarding moving violations for your license. You get a license from the New York State Department of Transportation not from the Town of Riverhead."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Bill Kasperovich, "Alright. Where are all these licenses for the last thirty years?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "I'm talking about driver's licenses and that moving violations, speed limit, traffic safeties are set by the State of New York."

Bill Kasperovich, "Upon our request?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "No. We can request that certain areas be designated certain speed limits, like school crossing zones, because the localities know that there's a school going up or it's a heavy residential neighborhood. We'll request the State Department of Transportation to lower the speed limit and that's all we're doing here. They have the final say. In fact, what they'll do."

Bill Kasperovich, "When they say yes, 40 miles per hour."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Then we ask the Highway Department to make the signs and the put the signs up and our Police Department enforces the new State law."

Bill Kasperovich, "And where is this designated to the citizen tax payer?"

Councilman Artale, "Bill."

Bill Kasperovich, "If I go on this road and over 40mph and I get a ticket, where do I find out that this is the law? Assuming there are no signs there."

Councilman Artale, "We went through this two weeks ago. I'm not going through this again. It's probably on the road."

Bill Kasperovich, "There is a file in the Police Department about yea thick, of resolutions passed by the Town Board."

Councilman Prusinowski, "I'm sure there is Bill."

Bill Kasperovich, "Of speed limits."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Of requests, requests."

Bill Kasperovich, "Of resolutions passed. Now whether they are approved by the New York State Department or not. There's nobody that seems to be able to know."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok Bill. Why don't. We're going to work on it. Dick says he's going to get a response back from the Department of Transportation and we'll, let's have some answers by next Town Board meeting because I think we're all talking in circles and I think there's other people in the audience that want to address us on other topics. We will certainly get back to you on it."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Bill Kasperovich, "Ok. Alright. Now the thing that disturbs me is that, I have been put into such a circle, I feel that if there is a speed limit on a Town road and it is not designated by a sign specifically, I should be able to go to the Town Board and see the documentation of the limit of that road."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Bill, I don't have that answer for you, but let's see if we can get it. All right?"

Bill Kasperovich, "Alright, Thank-you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank-you very much for your time. Is there anyone wishing to address the Town Board on any subject?" Oh Jeff, you wanted to speak on the, ok."

Jeff Seivers, 29 Main Rd. Calv., "I'm speaking, I'd like to address the Town Board tonight, speaking as the Senior Executive Assistant to the Assemblyman, the First Assembly District, Joe Sawicki and speak about your resolution to, let me get away from, speak about your resolution #300. First of all, members of this board and the Town Attorney have contacted the Assemblyman's office about this measure and I'd like to reiterate, speak for him. That he stands solidly behind the board on this matter. That he has already taken your concerns to members of the Judiciary Committee and I'd like to remind you and point out that besides the Senate Bill #1, there's also Assembly Bill #5901 which is concurrent with Senate Bill #1. Says the same thing and would necessarily also have to be ammended. The Assembly and the Senate being two different bodies. I'd like to offer Mr. Sawicki's assistance in getting that measure corrected also and certainly if we could convey any other message to the board on your behalf to the Assembly or the Senate side. He stands willing and ready to do so."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank-you very much Jeff. We appreciate the Assemblyman's."

Irene Pendzick, "What was that Assembly Bill number?"

Jeff Seivers, "Assembly Bill number 5901."

Irene Pendzick, "thank-you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "We appreciate the Assemblyman's support and basically what we're talking about is a proposed legislation that would move the Law Library Association with the court system out of the Town of Riverhead to the western part of Suffolk County and thank you for your support. Is there anyone else wishing to address the Town Board on any issue? Mr. Conroy."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

John Conroy, Riverhead, "Gentlemen of the board and the Supervisor who is not here, I have to commend you on the stand you have taken on various subjects. I'm also interested, and this may be the wrong time to bring it up, I have a proposal or a request by one of the local gas suppliers to increase the capacity of his tanks. Is that ok to bring up now?"

Councilman Prusinowski, "Sure."

John Conroy, "Ok. Thank-you. Well, I'm not a chemical engineer. I do feel that there are things that must be spelled out very, very definitely. When you sit down and talk and I know the Town Commission is also in conference with this. Now relative to this permission to increase this supply, liquified petroleum is generally a mixture of butane and propane. The density of propane is 1.52 as butane is 2.07, giving us a combined approximately of 1.8 which is much heavier than air which is 1. Gasoline is approximately 1.5 and from that we know now that we're going to have quite a problem if we do not protect ourselves. All (I left my glasses home, I shouldn't do this) gasoline, of course, as you do know gasoline has an explosive range of 87 pounds per square inches, while the propane gas is much heavier, much greater than that and therefore, I think more protection should be taken out. I do not have any figures relative to the date from 1979 to now. However, I'd like to submit the following for your consideration. Of all L.P.G. fires from 1943 to 1978, there are a total of 264 persons that died due to these fires. 1715 have been injured. True, some of the injuries were minor. Nonetheless, they are the result of L.P.G. fires. Gentlemen here recently said we have been here for "X" number of years and nothing has happened. It's quite an irresponsible statement. You have to liken that to the person, the lady who's been married some 15 years and suddenly becomes pregnant. It says it can't happen. It never happened before, but it did and I think this is why we have to think about an adequate system alarms and blanketing of the vapors is a must, along with a dike capable of 125% capacity. 100% is not enough. 125% is not enough but this is about the maximum you will get. This is a protection which must be pursued and has to be made and brought about by you gentlemen. At the previous meeting someone else said we are sitting on a mini Shoreham. No to cause a confrontation on this, which is quite prevalent around town right now. The figures from 1943 to 1978 certainly relay that. If you realize that 264 have died in L.P.G. fires, once again weigh carefully you decision. You too may be in that vicinity when one of the tanks do spring a leak and well, I don't like to be facetious. It may result in a vacancy in your position. Thank you gentlemen for your time."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok Mr. Conroy. You'll be happy to know that the Fire Commissioner shares your concern and that they have scheduled a meeting with the company to discuss the various safety problems associated with this additional tank and they're supposed to get back to the Town Board and give us their recommendations."

John Conroy, "Thank you very much."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. Is there anyone else wishing to address the Town Board on any subject?"

Bill Roberts, Baiting Hollow, "I don't know what jurisdiction the town may have on this situation. It covers the King Kullen - Firestone parking lot, shopping center complex. Do you have jurisdiction or is that a responsibility..."

Councilman Prusinowski, "What type of jurisdiction?"

Bill Roberts, "Let me explain what the problem is. There are two entrances into the complex off 58 other than where the stop sign is. There is one west of the Firestone building and there is one directly east of the Firestone building. The one west of the Firestone building does not get that much play because that brings you down toward the end of the buildings than you either have to make a turn to the left or to the right and there are stop signs at that intersection. The entrance and exit into the shopping center which is east of the Firestone building, however, sometimes becomes a raceway for cars coming off 58 to drive through into the King Kullen shopping center and further into the center. I am envisioning it to get worse as Caldor opens it's doors and we get more traffic. I had somewhat of a hairy incident with my wife in the car. The other day, somebody came barreling through off 58. Did not bother to slow down alongside the street that goes parallel to 58 on the north side of the King Kullen building and cut directly in front of us and I had to slam on the brakes and stand the car up on end, but at many times going in and out of that shopping center, I'd seen where people have not observed caution coming in and out of approaching the King Kullen center. My point is, what can be done to slow down the cars, because they'll cut directly behind the parked cars and leave no room for anybody to make a right turn or anybody to pass in front of them. It is a hazzard that should be investigated."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. We don't have an answer for you right now because it is a private parking lot. There are some town ordinances and restrictions that do come under the jurisdiction of the Police Department. They're in agreement of the landlord, the Town Attorney. We have to look into that because what your speaking of, is traffic safety flow and actually stopping them from racing. I'm very familiar. I go there every week."

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PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Bill Roberts, "There are no painted signs. There is no place to put a stop sign because you have a ."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Well I think even more than that like speed bumps would help. I know as you come in from Ostrander Avenue there's a speed bump that slows you right down. There's a few speed bumps in there but I'm very familiar with the exact location that your talking about. The Town Attorney is going to make a note and he's going to check it out for us."

Bill Roberts, "Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank you. Steve I think Cathy Casey wanted to say something."

Cathy Casey, "I'm afraid I'm out of practice so I wasn't really into, I didn't read my notes properly. I'm also here to re-enforce previous statements that have been made to the board about the citizens of Wading River concerns for our water and we would like to know what plans the board has or perhaps what they are presently doing to protect our water and perhaps I guess I should bring up H2M. I believe you have in some form, fashion you have involved in some sort of a service or engineering project with it, whatever and naturally we would like to know what you where we stand with this and of course, what your doing with other things. If there's any thoughts about pesticides or you know, fertilizers. This type of thing."

Councilman Prusinowski, "What we'll do is, we'll have a report for you at the Civic Association meeting that you've invited us to. The two town officials, to reiterate what I told Mr. Kasperovich, we do have H2M studying the whole problem. The whole picture of the water quality in Wading River and other parts of the town. The two town officials who on a day to day basis, work with the engineering firm, especially Rick Hanley, who is very familiar on this particular problem, we'll have him give us a capsulized report and we'll have it for you at that meeting."

Cathy Casey, "Ok. With regards to speeds on roads, not to beat a dead horse, but I don't honestly think that south of 25A, does Wading River/Manor Road have any kind of a speed sign. At least not from 25A to the trailer park. I don't even know. I'm not so sure I should even ask this question because maybe I don't even what to know but I really don't even know what the speed limit is on the south side, I mean the northern side. I believe is 35, 30 on Wading River/Manor Road but I don't think we have anything on the south side. Would somebody get around to it. If you could put up signs we'd appreciate it. Thank you very much."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES Continued

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok. Is there anyone else wishing to address the Town Board on any subject? Steve you had one last thing you wanted to say."

Steve Haizlip, "Yes."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok."

Steve Haizlip, "I'd like to elaborate just a little on what this lady said and Mr. I'm always stuck to try to pronounce your name, Kachinovich."

Councilman Artale, "Close enough."

Steve Haizlip, "Now getting back to the road. Like the lady said, we don't want to beat a dead horse, but if the Riverhead Town tax payers have got to pay the bill for these roads and we've got to pay the bill for snow removal, I think that our public safety department which is under Mr. Roscoe Palmer and Town Superintendent, should be able to dictate and post safety for the town citizens. I would like to see 55 mph on Youngs Avenue where the S curve is or down Baiting Hollow and the guy'll end up in the swamp over there somewhere, but since we are dictated by big brother I guess we have to sit back and wait. Thank you."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Thank you Steve. Is there anyone else wishing to address the Town Board on any subject? Would anyone like to make a prediction on the Islander Game tonight? Ok. That being the case we're going to have a five minute smoke break since there's only one councilman up here who smokes cigarettes and I won't say who he is."

Steve Haizlip, "Lou you better stop smoking."

Councilman Prusinowski recessed the meeting at 8:35p.m.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that this Town Board requests that the Senate Judiciary Committee cause the deletion of Sections 816-b and c which read as follows:

c. Law libraries of the unified court system.

Supreme Court law libraries in operation of the effective date of this section are hereby continued as law libraries of the unified court system; provided however, notwithstanding any other provision of law, the Chief administrator of the courts may:

1. establish additional law libraries from funds appropriated to the administrative office for the courts for such purpose; and
2. discontinue operation of any such law library upon a determination that the services of such library no longer are necessary.

C. Management of law libraries. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, the chief administrator of the courts in accordance with such standards and administrative policies as may be promulgated pursuant to section twenty-eight of article six of the constitution, shall supervise the administration and operation of the law libraries of the unified court system and may promulgate such rules as the chief administrator deems necessary to effectuate the purposes of this article. and be it further,


