UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Cablevision-request for renewal of franchise and rate increase. That is still under consideration by the Town Board.

Bull & Bear-application for an entertainment permit. A resolution calling the public hearing will be acted upon by the Board this evening.

William Miller-special permit to construct residence in Bus. "B" district. That will be acted upon by the Board in a resolution this evening.

Supervisor Janoski, "I will at this time recognize anyone wishing to be heard on any subject. Steve."

Steve Haizlip, Calverton, " I read in the paper every day when I get it at lunch. It seems like we're going to lose this County Seat out here. Every year it's coming up, it's going into Hauppauge. A County wide assessment a system similar to Nassau which would replace the often criticized town assessment of the town of Suffolk and would be the topic of a hearing in Hauppauge, 10 a.m. to 5 a.m. and nothing out here in Riverhead. So it looks that little by little it is going up there. Any comments?"

Supervisor Janoski, "The Town Board is very much aware of the slow migration of government to Hauppauge. We've even gone through, in 1982, a year long battle with the County, as where the courts would be. We walked away from that with what we think was a victory."

Steve Haizlip, "Yes."

Supervisor Janoski, "The other night, and I think I have to say this because it bothered me. We went to a fund raiser for the candidate for County Clerk for the Republican party, whos name escapes me which is very interesting.

Councilman Lombardi, "You had to remember."

Supervisor Janoski, "One of the things that Mrs. Kinsella said, and quite honestly I was a bit angry about it, was that she didn't know Hampton Bays was here and some of the other communities. She thought the world ended at Hauppauge."

Unidentified Lady, "You just lost the East End."

Supervisor Janoski, "Well I said something like that that wasn't really the right thing to say and quite honestly I didn't intend to stand there. The other thing that disturbed me greatly was, as they were leaving this fund raiser, some of her people, those who were working with her, were over heard by me, say; let's get out of this god forsaken Aquebogue and I walked over to them and told them they were doing a great job for their candidate. Now this is the kind

of thinking that we have in many fronts and I am not afraid to say that Ms. Kinsella will get a letter from me putting the question to her. Would you move the County Clerk's office or any part of it from the County Seat in Riverhead? That's a question that has to be put to her and she's got to give a definitive answer, as far as I'm concerned and I think the members of the Board agree. But we are constantly hearing things about this kind of thing."

Steve Haizlip, "Ok. One last comment. The Long Island Lighting public hearing. They forgot about coming out to Riverhead. So they said, we never send a commissioner out there. That's kind of far out. We just sort of send a representative out there to listen. So I don't think this is very nice either being the County Seat. They can go up into the populated areas and listen up there but they don't want to come out here. They'll take the money but they don't want to hear our gripes."

Supervisor Janoski, "They finally did have a hearing by the way out here."

Richard Ehlers, Town Attorney, "They're meeting here tonight."

Supervisor Janoski, "There's a hearing this evening also."

Steve Haizlip, "No commissioner though."

Supervisor Janoski, "There is no commissioner and quite honestly there weren't too many people from the East End either which was and I have been at P.S.C. hearings. Not with this particular rate increase question but with previous rate increase questions and I was the only person there."

Steve Haizlip, "I would have been there, Joe, but I had other commitments to be out of town."

Councilman Boschetti, "Mr. Chairman, I would like to address a couple of the comments Steve made. I'm on the watch dog committee Steve. We're painfully aware of what goes on in Hauppauge as opposed to what we'd like to go on in Riverhead. Unfortunately, a lot of those moves took place long before and it's been a process that has conceded many years. When it came to moving the courts is finally when the Town Board said enough is enough. Now, unfortunately, many of the agencies that the County controls, have their headquarters in Hauppauge and it's too late to really change that. But when we can, we do indeed step in and one of the most notable instances of that is where the tercentenary is actually

going to have its main even in Happaug and we were successful in getting that changed much to the shargin of the people who were planning the event. But again we can step in and remind Happaug that this is in fact the County Seat. We did and we actually tried but we have to be realistic. They do have the political clout. They have the population and we do what we can in your terms."

Steve Haizlip, "I understand."

Councilman Boschetti, "Thank you Steve."

Steve Pientek, "My name is Steven Pientek and I'm from Aquebogue Community Association and I would like to just find out a little pertaining to the flooding on Peconic Bay Boulevard, sir."

Councilman Prusinowski, "I believe we sent..."

Steve Pientek, "I also have a copy."

Councilman Prusinowski, "Ok, well that explains it. The engineers came in. Made the report to us and the Town Board has authorized the engineering firm to commence on the project immediately. The next step is that they will be preparing the working drawings, the final engineering on the project and specifications that will go out for competitive bidding."

Steve Pientek, "So it sounds like that maybe a couple of possible obstacles such as the DEC and the Vector Control."

Councilman Prusinowski, "There might be. There probably is but they are confident that working together with the Vector Control and the engineering firm which has on staff some former DEC officials. They have been able to work in the past with DEC to get some of these obstacles covered. In addition they have come up with a final proposal. If you notice, there are three. The reason they selected that one, they thought, if you read the report. That was the least available resistant and it's the cheapest way of doing it. He feels that was the way that's going to work. That's the reason they want to have that retention. We're going to get the run off and have it settled and have it filtered out a little bit."

Steve Pientek, "Just one other item if you'd be good enough. Something about helping us to fix up the pot holes which were all damaged so that we can possible go ahead and then if we get the first matter cleared plus the second one then we can square away our roads which is what our intention is."

Councilman Lombardi, "Superintendent John Ziemacki and myself were up there and we did look at the roads. On some of the side streets there are some small pot holes which can be taken care of. Plus, there is an area that had quite a bit. That will all be taken care of."

Steve Pientek, "That was the danger part and the damaging part. The unsafe part."

Councilman Lombardi, "So they will be taken care of. If they're not then alright."

Steve Pientek, "Well they have not been taken care of yet, sir."

Supervisor Janoski, "Let the record show that the hour of 7:45 p.m. has arrived. The Town Clerk will please read a notice of public hearing."

Henry Saxstein, "Good evening ladies and gentlemen and members of the Board. My name is Henry Saxstein and I represent the applicant George and Mary Klatt. If there is no objection since most-----Inaudible."

Supervisor Janoski, Inaudible. "Mrs. Pendzick, would you read into the record the second notice of application?"

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:55 p.m.

I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a public notice for a public hearing to be held on Tuesday, August 16, 1983 at 7:55 p.m. at Riverhead Town Hall, to hear all interested persons regarding the special permit application of Geo. Klatt for a non-nuisance industry on the north side of Hubbard Avenue, to conduct a sheet metal business.

PUBLIC HEARING, Continued

Supervisor Janoski, "The combination of these two public hearings will last until 8:05 when we will start the next public hearing. But we will continue if there is a need to."

Henry Saxstein, "I do not anticipate being that lengthy. The applicants, George and Mary Klatt (Inaudible). According to the zoning ordinance, this parcel of property has the first 40 feet of the property zoned Industrial "B". Mr. Klatt would like to operate a business on this property in the Industrial "B" zone. Unfortunately, under the Town Code, the Industrial "B" zone calls for a 150 feet set back. Making it impossible to put any business on this property. We have, therefore, applied to the Town Board to change the zoning for a distance 400 feet back from Hubbard Avenue. The reason for this application is because, number one; the building that they intend to put up would be back from the road. Number 2. We would like some room for expansion. Number 3. The General Town Zoning Code at this area is Industrial for that area. South of this part is zoned, they have traditionally been zoned Industrial. On the parts of the property just east of this property, there is an auto body shop, which is an Industrial zoned. So a business like this would not be out of character. This is one part of this application and we ask that the 40 foot Industrial "B" zoning be curtailed 140 feet west of the applicants piece of property. It won't serve any purpose for either the Town or the property owners who feel that they have lent themselves to Industrial "B" zoned property 140 feet wide and 40 feet deep. That is the reason for our request to the chairman to permit this special permitted use. The special permitted use that we are applying for is to construct a metal building to house a metal fabrication business as a non-nuisance industry. Mr. Klatt has had a metal fabrication business for over 40 years in the Town of Riverhead and this business was probably located approximately 1500 feet from the Town Hall right in the middle of the residential area. They may have allowed this because there is no loud noise. There's no obnoxious fumes. There's never been any storage of materials that are offensive to the neighbors and we feel that the construction of this new business in this area, surrounded by other industrial uses would not be out of the ordinary. It would be inducive to the business in the Town and it would be(Inaudible). Mr. Klatt intends to construct a business building which is approximately 40 feet by 100 feet, or 4000 square feet. This will be used to house machinery that he uses for his sheet metal business, as well as the storage of materials coming from the housing of trucks. Perhaps, the small trucks that are going back and forth to the job and a few pieces of the metal that they have fabricated. We understand that this application would be separate from the site plan review. We feel that at the present time, Mr. Klatt has 6 employes and if permitted to expand and build a building, he would be adding new employes. Incidentally, all the people that he employes are residents of the Town of Riverhead and we feel that he would be good for the economy."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Henry. Let me just say, as far as the site plan and review. I don't know if you have spoken to any members of our staff concerning the metal building. Have you?"

Henry Saxstein, "Not recently, I understand that you would want us to blend into the local environment there."

Supervisor Janoski, "Does anyone have any questions concerning this special permit? Does any member of the Board have any question? That being the case, I declare the hearings closed."

RESOLVED, that the use will not prevent or substantially impair either the reasonable and orderly use or the reasonable and orderly development of other properties in the neighborhood;

The hazards or disadvantages to the neighborhood from the location of such use at the property are outweighed by the advantage to be gained either by the neighborhood or the Town;

The health, safety, welfare, comfort, convenience and order of the town will not be adversely affected by the authorized use; and be it further

William Kasperovich, Wading River, "It's heartening to see activity of this sort coming to light, after so many many years of concern. I do not feel that it's right to comment here without Mr. Fairley being present. But at the same time, I can't let this opportunity go by, since I have such a limited access to the Town Board. Some of the items in here are good and some of the items in here are just plain sick. If you will excuse me Mr. Town Attorney, but if I couldn't find a parcel of land, on the face of this earth in Riverhead township, I would resign from the Board I was a member on. I have experienced people going out there, not knowing which side was west or east, then ask, didn't you know what side the sun set on? The man didn't know. Well, this is the caliber of people we have had to contend with. What ever will be changed in the rules, by these papers, they will probably out live most of us. Certainly us who are concerned with good Town government in Riverhead. To pick over item by item in detail would be of no value here. But if it is written the way the addition and deletions are proposed here, we would be no better or further ahead than what exists. We are a small township and certainly a small town within the township and acting like we're Hauppauge isn't going to accomplish anything. In general, when we have things said here, one or more monuments in the sub-divisions indicates the dimension of the relation to an existing established point or monuments on a highway. Well, if your man does know which are the points and which are the highways because we have Town, County and State. We have had a big grid put over the County. This should save monuments. The fact that they happen to be on the side of the road is purely for convenience of locating and convenience of people seeing them. But to say they prefer to a monument on a highway, is as bad as the wordage that exists. So you're not really improving the rules the way they should

be improved. If you're goint to re-write this, let us re-write it with the practical sense to write the township rules that we live with in here. That we have to change and handle because that's what we have and we are not going to become a Hauppauge in our life time. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Mr. Kasperovich. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Town Board on this matter? That being the case I declare the hearing closed. I don't find that there is anything wrong about this but I'd like to be able to trace it down in a diagramatic form. Secondly, there's this business of the water being polluted. This has, for a great amount of time, disturbed quite a few people including myself. One of the areas that seems to me to be lacking is some control over the farmers who are putting these chemicals into the ground which seep into the water system. Seep into the bays, destroying the shellfish and so forth and so on. Is there any control that we might have over them so that before they induce chemicals that may be destructful or harmful to our ecological system, that we'd have some control over that."

Supervisor Janoski, "Ok. Let me start with the last question first. There are agencies in Federal and State government that receive these kinds of questions. Quite honestly with regards to the insecticide, which everyone is familiar with is temik, which is contained in the ground water."

They do the test on that. The government did conduct these tests. What happened here was, they failed to take into consideration the sandy consistency of the soil on Long Island. There are agencies in business that the Federal and State government charge the EPA and the DEC. The first question was one that interests us on the Town Board because we have gone through this issue of Reeves Park. It seemed clear in the beginning that they was an understanding between the workings of the Water District which is a separate District within the Town. Very much like the School District. Separate. That the Town Board was the governing Board of that Water District who make these decisions. In larger municipalities, there is a water commissioner and perhaps a Board of water commissioners separate from the municipal governments. In a small town like Riverhead, it seems a good idea to act in that capacity also. Whereas in the School District, it is a separate re-elected school board. The town is authorized to spend monies on the care of the Town for this kind of a study, to carry out investigations concerning problems that face the community. We have elected to do that because we recognize that there is a problem. We are trying to identify solutions to the problem in spite of some of our obstacles. Does that answer the question? Does anyone else wish to be heard? Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich, "Possibly clarify the picture. I assume Mr. Supervisor, Councilman were informed by Mr. Scheiner of meetings prior to this Friday in question. At the meeting before this Friday, Mr. Sam McLendon, senior member of H2M, made a statement. I would like to be told what policy to follow. Before and after that I can't give you word for word. You men have had this contract for a considerable time."

Supervisor Janoski, "Policy with regards to what, Mr. Kasperovich?"

William Kasperovich, "I haven't the vaguest. All I can do is assume that the man needs some direction."

Supervisor Janoski, "Let me assure you that the Town Board does give..."

William Kasperovich, "He asked for this meeting on Friday. Mr. Scheiner gets up there and you indicate that there are other reasons. Not to me."

Supervisor Janoski, "Were you at the meeting Mr. Kasperovich?"

William Kasperovich, "Absolutely."

Supervisor Janoski, "Were there any policy decision made? Were there any policy decisions made at that meeting? Was there any policy discussed at that meeting?"

William Kasperovich, "Yes there was policy discussed."

Supervisor Janoski, "Why don't you tell us what they were."

William Kasperovich, "How much money we could force upon the individual to be able to come up with a solution within the price. Which was typical of Mr. McLendon who has publicly made the statement many times; We can do anything for money. When it comes to life and how much money, takes second place in my sense of values. He is trying to come up with a solution and needs guidance in the term of the word; policy. I feel that is sufficient ground to ask that an elected official to be present. That is the basis for why I stand up here and ask for one of you gentleman to attend. I think that is a point to be taken into consideration."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bob. Are you agitated back there to come up here again?"

Councilman Boschetti, "Before Bob addressse this, I'm not sure I follow that answer Bill. Are you stating that Mr. McLendon is not happy with what he is being paid? Where does this money come from? I did not follow that at all."

William Kasperovich, "I gave you the man's direct words. Word for word and that's what made me concerned. I felt that since you people gave the main the contract, that this being the last meeting before his report comes out, whether it comes out in a vast form or a final form. Before his reports come out, this was the last meeting. If there is any guidance or policy or direction that the man is looking for because certainly he wouldn't ask for something of that magnitude. I quote to you, quite accurately word for word. I believe that that's sufficient reason to make the request."

Supervisor Janoski, "Mr. Kasperovich. Can I ask you a question? Do you feel that our staff is incompetent?"

William Kasperovich, "Maybe I have my doubts about your compentency Mr. Janoski. I certainly have comments about final conclusions in my mind about the man sitting to the left of you. Tonight I'm addressing four people and make believe he doesn't exist in that chair."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Mr. Kasperovich. Mr. Scheiner."

Bob Scheiner, "Just to clarify a little bit. It seems like Mr. Sam McLendon was asking direction from our office. I think that the frustrations that Bill Kasperovich may be explaining is that he has in his mind what he'd like the solution to be, in the Wading River study. It is my job to make sure the engineer explores all the alternatives and that all alternatives be presented to the Town Board. So therefore, in our over all discussions, we have discussed how much it would cost for people to hook up water in various different alternatives. That has been discussed. There's no doubt about that. We can not and will not and we are not slanting the report in any way. We are trying our best to let the consultants, who were hired to do this project, to explore alternatives according to ways he sees fit. He is the expert. He did not ask for policy direction. That is not the way it came out. Not the way I saw it. The meeting was specifically held at the request of Sam McLendon to pick out the zoning and planning trends in that Wading River quadrant. We discussed some of the things that he has found in his findings which will be reported in the report. Our staff, no way, restricted or constricted his movements in his discussion of alternatives and we will not. We can't. I think that is where the problem lies. Bill has in his mind what he would like to see. That's fine with me but we can't do that."

Councilman Artale, "Excuse me Bob. At any time was there any policy discussed?"

Bob Scheiner, "No. Not at all. Absolutely not. That was the direction of the Town Board. The Town Board asked the consultants not to do that."

Councilman Artale, "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bob. Is there anyone who wishes to address the Board on any subject? Without object, adjourned."

There being no further business on motion or vote the meeting adjourned at 8:53 p.m.
