James H. Pim, P. E., Chief, Enforcement Section, Suffolk County Department of Environmental Control, dated 9/22/71, thanking Town Board for successfully eliminating the problem created by Farmland Foods Corp. Filed.

Vera Lewandowski, dated September 29th, 1971, requesting improved street lighting in the area of 792 Harrison Avenue, Riverhead. Filed.

Central Suffolk Housing Committee advising the next scheduled meeting of the Committee will be held at the Perkins Inn on October 5, 1971 at 8 P. M. Urging Town Board to attend and participate at the meeting as they are anxious to have a broad-based coalition to oversee a survey of the housing needs for low and moderate income families in Riverhead, Flanders and Riverside and submitting a review of what the Committee has done to date. Filed.

East End Surf Fishing Club dated 9/18/71-outlining need for a police boat to be put on duty in Long Island Sound so that a more thorough coverage of the Riverhead shore line can be made with a radio equipped boat - this would eliminate littering on our beaches, also vehicles not having the proper permits and asking moneys be allocated in the budget to cover this need. Filed.

Supervisor Zaloga remarked that if the Town would police all of its water-ways and beaches it would require three boats, three persons and a jeep and another person - that it may consider a boat in the bay and/or the Sound.

COMMUNICATIONS continued:

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Schwartz, dated 9/20/71 - letters to Town Justice Thomas R. Costello and Supervisor Bruno Zaloga - stating they live diagonally across the street from the Bayview Hotel, South Jamesport - they read in News Day that there is an objection to the discharged veterans living there as paying guests - stating further that the hotel has never been quieter - they must go to bed early as after 7 P. M. they never see anyone around - these men are not disturbing anyone and the other guests in the hotel have no objection and asking that justice be done. Filed.

Town Justice Costello commented that the attorneys for the owners of this alleged hotel have gone into Supreme Court and have restrained him from acting on this until it is straightened out in court - the action was brought by the Building Dept. because of various complaints and this is the first time people in the area have said these people are rehabilitated.

Town Attorney John J. Munzel stated that he had appeared in Supreme Court in opposition on this particular matter - which is still pending for a decision before Judge Richie.

Supervisor Zaloga commented that the Town Board is not against the veterans right to be rehabilitated and is not trying to chase them away from the hotel - the Board is against the improper use of the facilities which is in violation of the Zoning Ordinance.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES

Mr. Frederick H. Meyer, Aquebogue, asked the Board if it had reached a solution on the Meeting House Creek matter.

Supervisor Zaloga informed Mr. Meyer that the Board is calling public hearing to amend Ordinance No. 3 - which should be the solution.

Mr. Brownie Bokina, owner and operator of a garage in Aquebogue, asked the Board if he has the privilege to speak to the Town Attorney in reference to a car he had towed in.

Town Attorney John J. Munzel stated he thinks Mr. Bokina is referring to a matter he had brought up about a year ago and for which a bill was sent to Mr. Bokina.

Mr. Munzel added that it was not town business.

Mr. Bokina stated there was no paper work - it was done through the telephone.

Supervisor Zaloga suggested that Mr. Munzel and Mr. Bokina meet and resolve the matter.

Mr. Munzel recollected that Mr. Bokina requested him to do some research on a matter and that he had forwarded an opinion to Mr. Bokina.

Mr. Munzel offered to make a report to the Town Board and asked Mr. Bokina if he has his permission to disclose whatever the situation was.

Mr. Bokina replied in the affirmative.

Dr. A. Smith called the Board's attention to the matter of having been asked to serve on the Narcotic Guidance Council and although he had agreed to serve and has been attending meetings of the Council, he has not been appointed by the Board.

Supervisor Zaloga informed Dr. Smith that the Board is waiting for a letter of resignation from a member of the Council and as soon as it is received and accepted - the Board will then make the appointment.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES continued:

Mr. Richard J. Carey appeared before the Board to answer request made by Town Board on September 21st to submit list of possible appointees to Industrial Commission.

Following are excerpts from prepared statement read by Mr. Carey:

"First, I want the Board to know that I was encouraged by the Riverhead First Committee to speak on this subject.

Secondly, I feel there are certain considerations which must be resolved if such a Commission is to be a success. The Town Board must provide leadership and must pledge its full cooperation and support to the Commission. There must be good communications and working arrangements established, not only with the Town Board but also with the Zoning and Planning Boards. Perhaps, to create a close working arrangement, the Supervisor and the Chairmen of the Zoning and Planning Boards should serve as members of this Industrial Commission.

Thirdly, some funds should be provided in the 1972 budget for this Commission for possible travel expenses, preparation of brochures and other promotional materials, part-time clerical assistance and other incidental expenses which might be incurred. I do not feel it necessary, for the present to hire any full time employee and recommend this not be considered until the Commission has been established, has had the opportunity to function, and then the Commission would be in a better position to evaluate the need and qualifications for such a person.

Furthermore, I am not recommending this large a Commission. I feel a group of 12 to 15, representing a cross section of the community, particularly the business sector, would be sufficient at the start. Later, perhaps others could be added or asked to provide assistance and guidance in certain areas. I feel it is most important for the Board when selecting candidates for this Commission, to stress that this is a community effort, that much work may be involved, and that recommendations, decisions, and programs initiated and developed by the Commission supercede personal interests, and political parties. Unquestionably the Commission will have to develop and establish arrangements with county officials and commissions, and even with New York State and federal agencies in the pursuit of their duties and obligations.

As I stated, I feel it is important that we bring new industries and businesses to Riverhead, not only to provide employment, but also to expand our tax bases." (End)

PERSONAL APPEARANCES continued:

Supervisor Zaloga remarked that moneys to defray expenses of the Industrial Commission can be transferred from the Contingent Account.

Mr. Carey asked if anything has been done with the Industry Development group.

Supervisor Zaloga replied, "No", and thanked Mr. Carey for his statement and list of names.

HIGHWAY DEPARTMENT

Alex E. Horton, Supt. of Highways informed the Board that many trucks and pickups are going to the Town Dump without coverings.

Mr. Horton also informed the Board that he has had no satisfaction from the Insurance Company on the Highway truck that was wrecked in February.

Town Justice Leonard spoke to Mr. Horton about a miserable piece of highway on Sound Avenue between Northville Turnpike and West Lane and asked if this portion could be repaired.

Mr. Horton replied: "Yes, we will have to use a heavier grit".

Supervisor Zaloga recessed the meeting to hold a Public Hearing.

PUBLIC HEARING - 11:15 A. M.

Town Clerk submitted affidavits of publishing and posting Notice of Public Hearing on proposed amendments to Waste Disposal Ordinance No. 15.

The affidavits were ordered filed.

Supervisor Zaloga thereupon declared the hearing open and asked if anyone wished to be heard.

Allen M. Smith, Esq., representing Peconic Excavators, Inc., appeared in opposition to the proposed amendment, stating he questioned the purpose of the amendment - not a clear indication given for the reasons why the dump must be closed to this type of fill - that he has been advised the reason may be because of public health officials taking exception to the burying of garbage and brush together.

Mr. Smith suggested that a study be made and such be made available to the public - Southampton's Town Ordinance reserves the dump for use of residents - fee of \$10.00 per load dump fee for an out-of-town-truck. If incinerator be a solution to the problem, a fee per load could be charged and this fee would in turn be paid by anyone wishing to clear their land.

Mr. Smith further suggested that a special exception could be written into the ordinance - to permit the filling of existing pits or holes with the type of debris under consideration.

Mr. Smith suggested that the Town Attorney change "Gasoline powered vehicles" to "Diesel powered" as that is the equipment that is mostly used. - That the number of loads permitted be increased as an average building lot cannot be cleared with one truck load. Also that the right as stated for the benefit of each resident be assignable to his excavator or contractor - as the proposed ordinance now reads - it could mean that the right is unassignable.

PUBLIC HEARING - 11:15 A. M. - continued:

Mr. Smith continued saying that we have several old pits in our community and it might be possible to draft into this ordinance the zoning ordinance also, a special exception provision for this type of clean fill which in a period of time will degrade into a top soil like substance - to use that material to fill "Zdunko's" or the old pit on Riverside Drive.

Mr. Smith stressed that the Board give consideration to providing in the ordinance the means of enforcement and concluded saying he and his client stand ready to give further testimony or advice to the Board if it is desired.

Town Justice Costello asked Mr. Stephano if he was aware that he can dig a hole on the premises he is excavating and apply to Albany and get a burning permit and it would save everybody a lot of money.

Mr. Smith: We have done this for our larger firms - such as Rolling Woods - but in certain times of the year it would create a large fire hazard.

Judge Costello: Well, the local fire department would have to go in and inspect.

Mr. Smith: My immediate reaction to this is that you are making firemen out of excavators and in reference to burying - they would be very reluctant to bury anything that would decompose any where near the foundation.

Supervisor Zaloga: Mr. Horton will tell you we can't bury garbage and wood.

Alex E. Horton, Supt. of Highways: This is where it started, the Inspector came out and he saw all this wood and the garbage on top and he got on our necks.

Mr. Smith: So it is essentially a health problem?

Supervisor Zaloga: It's a combination - if somebody wanted to clear 20 acres - we couldn't dig holes deep enough to take up valuable sanitary land fill for this purpose.

Edward Bucholz: Why can't the Town itself apply for the burning permit from Albany - not the individual burn on each lot - which is out of the question.

Supervisor Zaloga: Who is going to pay the \$60,000 involved?

Mr. Bucholz: It doesn't have to be \$60,000.

Judge Costello: The reason for this present dump is because we burn all sorts of things and the health department has ordered us to go into this land fill operation.

Mr. Bucholz: It is very simple - what is to stop you from separating the brush from the garbage?

Judge Costello: Money.

PUBLIC HEARING - 11:15 A. M. - continued:

Mr. Bucholz: You people are proposing an ordinance and have not done any research on it - you haven't asked anyone that is knowledgeable and are trying to put something over on us that is impracticable.

Supervisor Zaloga: This is a public hearing and no one has any intention to push anything anywhere.

Dr. Alfred Smith: This is quite a problem and Mr. Smith gave some good points which should be studied - we have a big sand pit at Levons - we could take our garbage there for the next ten years.

Judge Costello: Dr. Smith that is private property and maybe they don't want that hole filled in.

Mr. Bucholz: Take Southold and Southampton - they sell their sand and are doing a good business. I don't know why Riverhead stopped it.

Supervisor Zaloga: Taxpayer's dough - 25¢ per cubic yard - we were losing money at that rate.

Mr. Bucholz: Raise your price, Southold is getting 75¢ and Southampton 50¢.

Eugene Warner: This is a complex problem and should be looked into further - the Board has an obligation to find an alternate plan.

Mr. Smith asked if the Board would like Mr. Stephano or Mr. Bucholz to put on record what they feel it takes to clear an average lot.

Mr. Stephano: An average house lot depending on - well take 1/2 acre or so - it would take six or eight loads to clear this - if we are held to dumping only one load we will be put out of business - you must give this more study.

Judge Costello: What is the capacity of each truck?

Mr. Stephano: Between 12 or 14 yards.

Judge Costello: 72 cubic yards for 1/2 acre lot - will all this be dirt or trees?

Mr. Stephano: Five loads would be trees the rest would be mulch.

Judge Leonard: If you had a burning permit how much would be left over to dump?

Mr. Stephano: I imagine you would have a load of ashes left over. You can't wait for a permit that long - when somebody wants to build - they want to start tomorrow not wait around a month or so.

Councilman Grodski: I think the intent of the ordinance was pointed at land clearings of large areas - not at individual lots or buildings.

PUBLIC HEARING - 11:15 A. M. - continued:

Mr. Stephano: You have a hole here - something like this can go on for years and years before you have the hole filled up - if you were burning and just putting ashes in it.

Mr. Horton: We were told we could get a burning permit until January first and after that the law changes.

Supervisor Zaloga: This is why Brookhaven is trying out this new pit like thing - very little smoke - it is rather expensive - fans and forced air.

Judge Leonard: The cheapest incinerator is a million dollars.

Mr. Smith: I appreciate the amount of money that you are talking about - we can "nickel-dime" this thing for the next twenty years, but we may need this incinerator.

Judge Leonard: It has been recommended to the five eastern townships now.

Supervisor Zaloga: We had two students who made a three month study on this land fill - we are waiting for the feasibility study. Brookhaven is trying this new thing and Southold's type of burning will be out like ours.

Mr. Bucholz: I have been stopped from dumping and cannot understand why.

Mr. Horton: Yes, I did tell them to stop and Mr. Stephano was stopped because he had concrete flying all over the road - a lady ruined a tire - and the truck never did stop to pick up the stuff - our problem is that we don't have the room.

Mr. Smith: I take exception to what was said about my client - there are two sides to that story - if there is no authority from the Board to stop us and Mr. Bucholz-----

Supervisor Zaloga: I don't think anyone has authority when there is an ordinance.

Mr. Bucholz asked if anyone has made a survey of the dump with a group of people to see how much room we had there.

Supervisor Zaloga answered "Yes. "

Mr. Bucholz asked if any of the contractors (local) were invited.

Supervisor Zaloga answered "No".

Mr. Bucholz asked if it would be possible to have a survey with the local men.

Supervisor Zaloga: Certainly, we are waiting for a feasibility study right now.

Mr. Bucholz: I would like to be one of them. You say there's no room - I think there is lots of room.

Mr. Stephano asked why the \$20,000 bulldozer is just sitting there.

PUBLIC HEARING - 11:15 A. M. -continued:

Supervisor Zaloga asked Mr. Smith for further reports.

Judge Costello suggested that anybody be it contractor or bulldozer operator - anyone that can shed some light on this - is invited to do so.

Mr. Bucholz asked if a survey of the dump can be obtained.

Edward Gadzinski (employee of the Town Dump): There is a survey on file in the Supervisor's Office and Bob Kart's - the big problem is in enforcing the ordinance we have now - you can go in there and dump twenty-four hours a day. The area should be fenced off - and supervised as to where to dump - we can't control it when we are in one end and people come in and dump at the other end - we try to operate both machines - there are only two of us - we need extra help - we need fencing - we need policing - we need help - we are losing area because we can't dig it up.

Mr. Bucholz: Is it possible for the highway department to furnish some help there?

Supervisor Zaloga: Mr. Horton is in charge of it.

No one else wishing to be heard and no communications having been received thereto, Supervisor Zaloga adjourned the Hearing to November 3rd at 11:00 A. M. and re-opened the meeting.

The vote, Councilman Young, Yes, Councilman Grodski, Yes, Town Justice Leonard, Yes, Town Justice Costello, Yes, and Supervisor Zaloga, Yes.

The resolution was thereupon declared duly adopted.

Councilman Grodski offered the following resolution which was seconded by Councilman Young.

RESOLVED, that Antone F. Densieski, Thomas Lyons, and Jessie Hughes, be and are hereby appointed Police Patrolmen on a probationary period of twelve (12) months from the Suffolk County Civil Service Certification of Eligibles #10-126, dated September 15, 1971, effective October 17, 1971, to be compensated at the rate of \$8,100.00 per annum, payable bi-weekly.

The vote, Councilman Young, Yes, Councilman Grodski, Yes, Town Justice Leonard, Yes, Town Justice Costello, Yes, and Supervisor Zaloga, Yes.

The resolution was thereupon declared duly adopted.

RESOLUTIONS

Town Justice Leonard offered the following resolution which was seconded by Town Justice Costello.

WHEREAS it has been determined by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead that the comprehensive community plan for the Town of Riverhead should be updated and modernized in view of additional ecological information and concepts of community planning obtained since the last comprehensive community plan of 1964, and

WHEREAS the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead has conferred with the firm of McCrosky and Reuter for the purpose of ascertaining the feasibility of updating said plan, and

WHEREAS Supervisor Bruno Zaloga has received a letter dated September 30, 1971 from the firm of McCrosky and Reuter outlining the scope of services to be performed by said firm, and

WHEREAS the scope of services anticipates a 16 month program commencing January 1, 1972 and ending April 30, 1973 with meetings with the Town Board and Planning Board to be held at approximately 2 month intervals with a total of 8 such regular meetings and two additional public information meetings, and

WHEREAS the fee for the services would be \$27,000.00 payable in 15 regular monthly installments of \$1,500.00 each with a final payment of \$4,500.00 thereby covering two fiscal years, and

WHEREAS the Town Board has sufficient funds in its contingent account for a major portion of the costs,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED that Supervisor Zaloga execute an approval to the letter of September 30, 1971 pending a more formal contract so that work on the new comprehensive plan for the Town of Riverhead will commence on January 1, 1972 and end April 30, 1973.

Town Justice Leonard offered the following resolution which was seconded by Town Justice Costello.

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead is the co-owner of certain parcels of land at the "Forge" Calverton, in the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, hereinafter described and

WHEREAS, Norman Phillips, Executor of the Estate of Morris R. Phillips, of Quogue, New York, has requested the Town to exchange its interest in two of the said parcels for the Estate's interest in a third parcel hereinafter described,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead, Suffolk County, New York, as follows:

THE TOWN OF RIVERHEAD shall convey to the Estate of Morris R. Phillips, its interest in the following described parcels of land:

RESOLUTION continued:

ALL that certain piece or parcel of land, situate, lying and being at Calverton, Town of Riverhead, County of Suffolk and State of New York, bounded and described as follows:

COMMENCING at a point on the southerly side of River Road, marked by a monument, which monument is located North $68^{\circ} 26' 40''$ West 303.53 feet from a monument at the southwesterly intersection of River Road and Forge Road;
 RUNNING THENCE North $60^{\circ} 34' 50''$ West 100 feet to a monument, said monument being the point or place of Beginning;
 RUNNING THENCE along the southerly side of River Road North $60^{\circ} 34' 50''$ West 232.86 feet to a point;
 RUNNING THENCE North $43^{\circ} 52'$ West 460.82 feet to a point on the southerly side of the right of way of the Long Island Railroad;

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that a Public Hearing will be held by the Town Board, Town of Riverhead, on the 19th day of October, 1971, at 11:00 A. M., at the Town Hall, 220 Roanoke Avenue, Riverhead, New York, to hear all persons interested in an amendment to Town Ordinance No. 18, Regulating the Use of Recreation Centers and Public Beaches, Section 2, to read as follows:

Section 2. a. Vehicles entering any public bathing beach or recreation center shall enter only at designated entrances and leave only through designated exits. Parking of all vehicles is permitted only in spaces indicated therefor. Only vehicles displaying a parking permit, obtained as hereinafter provided, shall be permitted to park in the spaces provided at any public bathing beach or recreation center.



b. The Town Clerk, or any other person authorized by her, is hereby authorized to issue a parking permit for use at any public bathing beach or recreation center to any of the following persons; residents, inhabitants, tenants or taxpayers of the Town of Riverhead upon due application of such person and upon payment of an annual fee of \$2.00. Excepted from payment of said annual fee shall be all residents, inhabitants, tenants or taxpayers of the Town of Riverhead who can furnish proof of being 60 years of age or over or proof of receiving a disability allowance from the Social Security Administration.

c. Such permits shall be evidenced by a printed sticker which shall be prominently displayed on the vehicle for which it was issued. Lost or defaced stickers may be re-issued. All parking permits shall expire on the last day of December of each year and may be renewed on or after the first day of January.
