Supervisor Janoski: "Under unfinished business we have Brush's Airpark for a general aviation airport.

We have from Cablevision a request for a rate increase. Cablevision is yet to respond to our latest offer.

Joseph and Linda Sullivan special permit for a permanent mobile home part, that is pending action by the Town Board.

I would, at this time, recognize anyone who wishes to be heard? Yes ma'am. You have to come up here please, and please state your name and address."

Ruth Regan, Jamesport; "Relative to the petition which Pendzick spoke about. I'm a member of the Riverhead Sound Avenue unit of Cooperative Extension. We use that building every week on September through May. We would like to know what the present status of the building whether it would be open during the winter months or not. We did receive a letter stating that the building may be closed during the winter months."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Who did you receive the letter from?"

Ruth Regan: "From the Department of Recreation."

Supervisor Janoski: "I'm glad that you asked that question. And perhaps we can save ourselves a lot of time and effort. You, I understand somebody has come in under the Freedom of Information and asked for the electrical bills for that center. If that was done and I'm sure that many of you have that information you will see that in 1981 for a period of January 30 to February 20, the Town received a bill for electricity for \$6,290.60 which is less than a month period. The building is heated with electric heat and when this bill came in, it was of such monumental proportions that quite honestly that somebody said I don't remember who — that perhaps we ought to consider closing down the center during those cold winter months. Beyond that, we have never had a discussion on it and never made a decision to close it down. If something was — that happened way back then.

We, right now, as a matter of fact, in the past week, have ordered some \$2,500 in work to be done on the mechanical, heating and air conditioning system there because there has been a problem there for some time. It is our belief that if it is working properly that that kind of a bill will be reduced. But I don't know whatever prompted Mr. Mayo to send off such a letter. Certainly the Town Board had reached no conclusion. As a matter of fact, after the winter months were over, we really never even talked about it again. It was something that was considered and broached as a possibility back then. You can understand our concern receiving such a bill for electricity. I'm sure that you'll appreciate that the Board Members are trying to look at ways to save taxpayers money and that such a usual bill causes great concern. But there is no proposal right now to close it down. It is something that was considered and we would have to see what the results of the work that we are having done at this center turn out to be."

Ruth Regan: "Pardon me, it's very encouraging, but we formally had met in this Town Hall. Actually the Jamesport building is the only building available to us in the Town of Riverhead and it would be a shame to close it down because there are many organizations who use that building and if you see, say there is no probability of it being closed, but if there is, I would like to know also what other buildings would be closed in the Town of Riverhead for the same reason."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "Well, you know I think, you're confusing the issue quite — I thought I explained it very well. This bill — it's an old schoolhouse, it loses heat. The heating system does not work properly. It has not worked properly. We feel that is the reason for excessive electric bills. When we got the bill — we have five people on the Board who go over this bill and when we saw almost \$7,000 in electrical bills for that one building, somebody I think realistically said maybe we should think about closing it down in the winter because of the high cost of keeping it open. Now if we were to spend that kind of money, you know it might be more reasonable for us perhaps to rent Brasby's for you to have your meetings."

Ruth Regan: "Well I agree the bill is astronomical, but it is an old building, but it was completely refurbished, wasn't it? There surely had to be some — the stuff they put in between the walls."

Supervisor Janoski: "Insulation."

Ruth Regan: "Insulation when it was rebuilt, I mean that whole building was pulled apart and . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "I think basically we're agreeing with one another."

Ruth Regan: "We are. I mean the need is vital for some place to meet. There is absolutely no place in the Town of Riverhead that we could afford. Oh, we're on record all right."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes okay. Thank you."

Ruth Regan: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone else that wishes to be heard at this time? Yes Sir."

Mike Velys, Peconic Bay Blvd.: "I've been a resident here for about twenty-five years. I belong to two groups. As a matter of fact, I use the Jamesport Center. We use it every Tuesday evening and we use it on alternate Fridays also. My

taxes were increased by about \$700 this past year. I ask myself what am I getting for the \$700. I'm getting fewer services. I don't have water at that end. My water was contaminated by union carbide and more recently it was contaminated by some other outfit putting items on the farmland out there. I'm very disgusted for thought that the community center might be closed. You know, being a taxpayer, I'm concerned with seeing that the bills are kept at a reasonable amount. But in using that hall, I don't know if you're aware but there's a thermostat in there that people yo-yo up and down constantly. We have to open that door because it's always so hot in there. I think that an effort has to be made to economize. I don't keep my house at 70°. I can't afford to — you don't need to keep that place at 70°. I'd gladly occupy to use that building at 68° or whatever is comfortable. I think that an effort has to be made to reduce the bill. There's no question about that. Six thousand dollars is absurd. That's an amount that doesn't seem to make sense anyhow. I see the rest of the bills by the month are considerably less so there's something wrong there obviously.

It's my understanding that when that building was constructed, it was constructed with federal funds or re-constructed with federal funds with the understanding that it was to be made extremely energy efficient, and I can't see how our bills are riding as high as they are. We've spent from what I understand in excess of \$40,000 for that heating system. I should think for \$40,000, we should have gotten a pretty good heating system, whether it's efficient or not, I don't know. I'm not an engineer and I don't know. And I'm glad to see that you're doing something about checking this system out. The point I'm making is that building cost us a lot of money. It's off the tax rolls right now. It's the only thing we have available in the area for our use. And to make it available for fewer than twelve months out of the year, I think would be a big mistake to use that building for two thirds of the year or three fourths of the year. I don't know what your thoughts are. I can appreciate your position. You can do something about cutting cost down. What I urge you to do, is to make every effort to see that the people that maintain that building keep the heat up to whatever it ought to be while it's being occupied and keep it down to a minimum when it's not being occupied. And let's see how we go from there."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mike. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Town Board? Yes ma'am."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Mrs. Seth Hubbard: "I'm another one of those interested people who is using the Jamesport Recreation Center. I think Riverhead has a great deal to be proud of. Our riverside park, our lights, the flower boxes and I think the Recreation Center has been a great asset to Riverhead, it has been to us. We have duplicate bridge games there every Thursday afternoon and I agree that occasionally the heat is much too high and certainly ought to be cut down. I think we can wear our winter underwear and our heavy coats and enjoy it, just as well if not better. The bridge game has been in existence for twenty-one years now. And I must say that we thank the Town of Riverhead for the opportunity of using it in the last year. It's been the very best place that we have—we've ever been in. The light is splendid. The personnel down there has been wonderful to us. It's immaculate and we couldn't ask for a better place.

And I agree that a building without capital expenditure shouldn't be closed one-third of the year. It's really a waste of money when you consider how much has been put into it. We hope you'll give every consideration to keeping our bridge game going. Our bridge game isn't as quite as frivolous as it sounds. I think that we contribute to a need for elderly people, where most of us senior citizens, and most of our players are. No one has paid in the group and every cent that we have left over, we contribute to the hospital. In the last five years, we've contributed about \$15,000. And although that doesn't sound like very much now, it might be a factor of you keeping it open. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. I don't see anymore hands up here. Is that you Mary Beth Andresen?"

Mary Beth Andresen, Church Lane, Aquebogue; "I know you want to get home to the ball game. . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "I haven't seen you in quite some time Mary Beth."

Mary Beth Andresen: "I know, I know. I noticed your face when I walked in.

Well the reason I'm here this evening is because I helped to get some of these people down here when we were notified of the proposal to possibly close the Jamesport Community Center. And I do attend two groups that meet there and I also am a taxpayer in the Town of Riverhead. And I have a few things to say, some of which I don't understand, like the Lilco Bills. The Lilco bills for the year previous to this — well let me start with this year, I'm sorry. I'm not really well together tonight.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedMary Beth Andresen continues:

November 19, to December 18, 1980 we had a bill of \$1,697.00, approximately."

Supervisor Janoski: "Mary Beth, would you repeat the period you were just talking about?"

Mary Beth Andresen: "November 19 to December 1980, okay. Because we have Freedom for Information Act, you all have them there. We have the bill of \$1,697, okay. In December 18th through January 30th, 1981 the meter was removed. The new meter from January 30 to February 20, 1981 which also was a very cold year was \$6,000, okay. The following month from February 20 to March 20th which was equally as cold, was \$1,900. Why the discrepancy for one month being so ultra ultra high? Is that a three-month billing? Even if it was a three-month billing, and the bills were averaging \$1,600 to \$1,900, don't you think it would be more like \$4,000, for a three-month billing? I don't know. I'm not an electrician. I don't profess to be one. I don't read bills too often. I don't particularly like them.

The other thing is according to what Mike said and according to the information we received, it cost \$44,000 to put that heating unit in. It was supposedly at that time one of the most efficient electrical heating systems on the market for building of that type. Usually when you go all electric in a building of that sort, Lilco gives you an estimate about what it's going to run you on electrical and wattage usage per month. Those figures were not available. I know right now that there's \$50,000 in small cities for solar. Has anybody even thought of it, to apply for that for the solar grant? That might be a perfect spot to put it in. That might be money that's coming out of our pockets indirectly, through federal taxes, but it's there already. I know we've used small cities grants before in this Town, and that's something that should be investigated. The heating system is high. The electric lights are on all the time. Now I don't know if they're separate zones, but I know every room in that place, when you go in it, if you're only using one room, it's excessively hot."

Supervisor Janoski: "I have to disagree with you because I've been told that there are areas in that building that are very cold."

Mary Beth Andresen: "Well I had a meeting in the back building in the back room about a month ago, the heat was blasting, the windows were sealed shut. We have no way touching the thermostat nor did I want to. I was going to open a window that was in the back of the building.

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continuedMary Beth Andresen continues:

Last month Cooperative Extension or least week, Cooperative Extension met in the front of the building, or actually it's the north side of the building that room was set at 75° under the little plastic cap. There were three window open. The room was filled with a lot of women, and it was excessively hot."

Supervisor Janoski: "Who opened the windows?"

Mary Beth Andresen: "We did because we couldn't stand the heat and we didn't want to touch the panel. Now either there's some abuse going on or somebody's not setting it correctly, or you know something could be done. I think much more to conserve and as for as these bills being so obscure, I mean maybe something could be answered on that point. That's all I have to say."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Mary Beth. Rosemary."

Rosemary Lambert, Ostrander Avenue, Riverhead; "I represent two groups that meet at the Jamesport Community Center. First group is Boces Consumer homemaking staff which holds classes at the center. Right now we have a series of ten classes in there on consumer education, various levels.

I also am a member of the Women's Exchange Group which meets there on Thursday mornings and we provide an outlet for young mothers to get out, socialize, learn something, do community services and we offer babysitting. I think they're both well-needed services and we have no place else to meet and we'd like to see the place kept open. I would like to agree with everything else that has been said tonight whole heartedly. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Rosemary."

Connie Gevinski, South Jamesport; "I was on the committee there originally worked on getting the South Jamesport Center. And we at that time, we were very concerned having senior citizens there and having children there all age ranges. And this is happening and we're happy to see it's happening. And I'm active right now with 4-H Groups that wish to use the building. And we just wanted to put another vote in for us saying that we wish to have the building open and to be able to use it. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Helen Scofield, President of Riverhead Senior Citizens; "We, too, meet at the Jamesport Center once a week, every Wednesday afternoon. We have dancing classes there. We also at times, once a week meet there for sewing class, which is on a Tuesday morning. Now this is the only place that we can really meet. We do have our meetings, our official meetings at the Moose. However, we cannot use the Moose for dancing and we can't use it for sewing classes or arts and crafts. Previous to the past two years, we have had an arts and crafts teacher. We have not had one these past two years and many of our members are asking when are we going to have arts and crafts? So I'm just putting myself on record as telling you that we too use the center. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Would it be safe to say that the people who are here tonight would like the Jamesport Center kept open?"

At this time there was a lot of applauding from the audience.

Supervisor Janoski: "Now it's unfortunate and this is an interesting town for stories and rumors, and of course the things that you don't want to get around travel the fastest. As I said before, there has been no solid proposal to close the facility down. It was a comment made upon looking at this large bill. There has been no discussion of it since then. It's not going to be a serious consideration that I can understand especially in the view of the position taken by you people that even if it does cost that much, you want it kept open. As I've said, attempts are being made now to repair the system and that we have contracted for some \$2,500 in work. It is our hope that the system will work correctly. And that the electrical bills will come down as a result of that.

Mary Beth, you cannot speak again until we have exhausted everybody who wishes to speak. Bill?"

Bill Nohejl, Wading River; "I'm alarmed at some of the figures that have just been quoted. You know you're anticipating signing a lease with Camp DeWolfe. Are we going to have another same incident with an old building? Heat? A terrific amount. Are we?"

Supervisor Janoski: "No because we have history as to what it has cost up to now and I don't know the figures, but there has never been anything outlandish about it."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Bill Nohejl: "All right. When do you anticipate passing the budget?"

Supervisor Janoski: "We will be having a hearing on the preliminary budget on November 4th. And the budget has got to be completed by November 20th."

Bill Nohejl: "Is there any — I ask you prior to this about any new equipment and you told me no. Any new positions?"

Supervisor Janoski: "In the Town budget new positions, no."

Bill Nohejl: "I mean like next March, April or May, a new position is created. I want to know if there's going to be anything like that? I have a suggestion."

Supervisor Janoski: "What is it?"

Bill Nohejl: "Let me see how can I put this. How about a Deputy Supervisor position?"

Supervisor Janoski: "What about it?"

Bill Nohejl: "Putting that into the budget. You know that — put some pizzazz into this Town. You know Brookhaven, Smithtown, other towns have it. I think a lot of things can be done. Go ahead now think."

Supervisor Janoski: "You are Bill Nohejl?"

Bill Nohejl: "All right, I'm on the other side of the fence now."

Supervisor Janoski: "Bill I think that would be a decision for the next Supervisor of the Town of Riverhead. I will tell you that when asked the question in Suffolk Life, you know they have that questionnaire yes or no, the way that they put it was would you consider it? And I said yes I would consider it."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Bill Nohejl: "I was just wondering because it could be."

Councilman Lombardi: "You have to ask the rest of the Board Bill."

Bill Nohejl: "Oh yes definitely. Even you fellows could put your resumés in."

Councilman Lombardi: "No thank you. I'm happy where I am."

Bill Nohejl: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Bill. Could you come back up here please? I wanted you to know that I've invited some people here tonight because I projected that you would ask a question tonight. Don't you want to ask anything else?"

Bill Nohejl: "Give me a hint."

Supervisor Janoski: "No I can't. I just bet that you were going to ask a question concerning something on the agenda and you didn't do it."

Bill Nohejl: "Yes."

Supervisor Janoski: "Are you planning on coming on back again?"

Bill Nohejl: "I might after Bill Kasperovich gets up."

Supervisor Janoski: "Well I had also predicted that this would be the meeting on record and we've already gone beyond the record. Is there anyone else who wishes to be heard? Yes Sir."

George Schmelzer, River Road, Calverton; "Last winter Councilman Regula called me up about if I knew anything about the bay bottoms. So I said I'd look into it. The more I looked into it, the worse mess I got. I wrote him a letter a month ago, he got the letter, I tried to copy my copy out here, I got a

short copy, so I don't know what's wrong with the machine, maybe it only copies short copies for a dime. I don't know.

Anyhow, I know that there was some oyster lands that were assessed in the Town of Riverhead. There's thousands of bakers in the eastern towns, that's a peculiar title. The so-called rights of the title to the private hovers gave them the exclusive right to farm or harvest or control exclusively that went in under water which is assessed to under that most of it has been abandoned in Riverhead Town except of these sixty odd acres owned by a White family. There's over five hundred acres which has been taken over by the County through tax sale. If the County would quite claim that over five hundred acres which the County has for the Town, the Town could control five hundred acres of under water land exclusively for the harvesting of shellfish."

Councilman Regula: "George, does it show me on this map? I don't see . . ."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah, Map 150 shows the — the County land, the White's property over here. I don't — sometimes these maps made by the County are doubtful accuracies. It could serve as a guideline. You have to search out the history of the individual titles. Go back in the tax hall records and find out how accurate it is. It might be possible for the County — for the Town to ask the County to just to quit claim to the Riverhead Town why not. Not this — you're from the County. You're talking about the quite claim deed from Southold Town. This is different. This has got nothing to do with — so that's — we all know it's a square mile anyway. So it might be good to start off with. And you could take it from there."

Councilman Regula: "Very good. We'll expect it to — we'll check it out. Seven . . ."

Supervisor Janoski: "It's a little bit irregular, but it's interesting."

George Schmelzer: "If the so-called oyster land deeds went into this, I do not know. You have to look into it further. Well there it is."

Councilman Regula: "Well very good. Thank you George."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued
Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

George Schmelzer: "Okay you take it from there."

Councilman Regula: "Very good."

George Schmelzer: "Good enough."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you George. I thought I saw some more hands over this side. Mr. Kasperovich you're going to out flank me tonight."

William Kasperovich, 15th Street, Wading River; "I was surprised to hear Mr. Nohejl refer to an added person upon the podium there."

Supervisor Janoski: "No more than I was."

William Kasperovich: "Well to the contrary, over the years since we changed from two Councilman and two Judges, I have been trying to convince as many people as would listen to me, that one of these men should undertake the public duties as is commonly referred to as a public works commission, as we have commissioners of various other departments assigned to people on the podium that we should have assigned publicly, not just via arrangements or via the Supervisor. But so that the voters would know that segment that is allotted to one man to another man who was specially responsible to delve in depth into those areas than they could vote with some intelligence. I have over the years, felt that the Councilmen never supported the Supervisor fully, be he Democrat or Republican. They have sat on their big dufts and let the Supervisor take all the guff and not initiate any work of their own. And one more man up there, probably two too many.

Last meeting under communications, there was an error made in the typing where I had written a complaint to the Town, William Kasperovich, 9/24/81, complaint regarding work done 19th and 20th Street and Hulse Avenue. The only thing that was right there was my name and address, or date and date. My complaint was not regarding work done. But four other items. And I think the minutes should be amended to so read. To my knowledge they have not been read. The communications have been left the way they were typed. Am I wrong or am I correct?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "The copy of the full communication is part of the record. What the Town Clerk attempts to do is to compact it to fit into the little space that we allot to a general description of the communications. But your entire communication is part of the record and each member of the Council and, of course, a copy of it is on record in the Town Clerk's Office, isn't it? It is on file in the Town Clerk's Office?"

Irene J. Pendzick: "Absolutely."

Supervisor Janoski: "Absolutely."

William Kasperovich: "May I ask the Town Supervisor and the Councilmen that are here whether it is their intent to respond to this complaint?"

Supervisor Janoski: "It is my understanding that the legal department in the Town of Riverhead has responded. I have forwarded a copy of your complaint to the Police Department and we will await their response."

William Kasperovich: "I see. All right. I'll be patient until after the election because it might be an after the fact affair. However, when a man's complaining that his civil rights have been violated, when man complains that public property has been damaged or was damaged. When man complains that work is done on public area without proper authorization or insurance coverage, this should bear serious attention. And I feel that the — this type of description on communications is misleading to the public. Now the public should know that there is a citizen in this Town that feels his civil rights were violated or ignored, that when public property is being damaged and people that have become — it has been brought to the attention of people do not take specific action quickly that this is not good government. I'm not going to mention any names, individuals, but five of your men sit there and know about this and I felt that by this time, some action would have been taken. However, I'll be patient to a further day. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone else who wishes to be heard at this time? Wyckham?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Wyckham Tyte, 992 East Main Street, Riverhead; "When we started the meeting, we took the Pledge of Allegiance of the Flag at which time we mentioned with Liberty and Justice to all. I have something I feel is unjust. I want to bring to the governing body of the Town assuming it's a mistake and can be rectified. If not then, of course, the court would have to rectify it. But I happen to be among other things the senior elder at the Christian Gospel Chapel in Riverhead and I went and paid some back taxes on that a month ago and for instance, this last year except the current one was \$34.38. I would have paid the next one, but I found out that they had jumped the taxes on a piece of property belonging to a religious \$284.94 which is not income producing and is legally in the name of the Christian Gospel Chapel Inc.

I noticed in this Town we have Jehovah's Witnesses, and we have Mormons and we have seven-day Adventists, Catholics and Protestants, in Black and White Churches. And it's traditional that no church is taxed other than apparently in this case on your sewer levy. But for some reason, the taxes jump we'll say from actually the thirty some dollars, isn't that right? It was \$19.40 to \$298.94. Now this is a case of discrimination that cannot be tolerated. I might be willing to be overcharged on certain things and put up with it because I might growl a little. But when it comes to a case that our assessors who in a sense are in the Town of Riverhead and you are the governing body when they do something like this, I claim it is unjust. We just took a Pledge that we want Liberty and Justice for All. I bring it to you to iron it out at this stage of the game, but I resent the fact that this thing happened. But I leave it in your hands to rectify."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you Wyckahm. Is there anyone else who wishes to be heard at this time? That being the case, I guess it's your turn Mary Beth."

Mary Beth Andresen, Church Lane, Aquebogue; "One question. If the Jamesport Community Center was possibly going to be re-evaluated at a later time with the possibility of A) maybe we'll close it, maybe we'll do something. Does that, because it's a town building, have to come up on an agenda at a Town Meeting?"

Supervisor Janoski: "I don't believe so."

Mary Beth Andresen: "Okay. So that means we have no way of being informed except to go there and find the doors locked."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Janoski: "How about if I promise you faithfully . . ."

Mary Beth Andresen: "How about if you put it in writing."

Supervisor Janoski: "You know it's been a long time since you've done that to me Mary Beth."

Mary Beth Andresen: "If we could get it in writing on a public notice that it would be on the agenda, then people would be informed. That's why it was so scatter brained this time."

Supervisor Janoski: "What I'm going to do Mary Beth, I'm going to give you my word if it should come under consideration again, I will let you know."

Mary Beth Andresen: "Okay. The other thing is I see because I didn't have a chance to read the agenda before I got up before, Article 522 authorizing action for protection of the historical and cultural areas. Doesn't the Jamesport Community Center i.e. come under a historical and cultural area."

Supervisor Janoski: "I'm not aware that it's ever been designated a historical site. It may be."

Mary Beth Andresen: "Well it certainly is cultural."

Supervisor Janoski: "If you say so Mary Beth. I'm not going to argue with it."

Mary Beth Andresen: "Come down and see it. It's really nice."

Supervisor Janoski: "I was there jsut the other day."

Mary Beth Andresen: "Also the East End Arts were, are a little bit worried about the fire, about temperatures in their heating units for the winter months. Possibility of maybe somebody thinking about closing the temperatures off. "

Mary Beth Andresen: "Closing the heat down or possibility of closing the buildings during the winter months because of their excessive heat bills."
