

Minutes of a Regular Board Meeting held by the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead held in the Riverhead Town Hall, Riverhead, New York, on Tuesday, May 18, 1993, at 7:00 p.m.

Supervisor Janoski called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. and the Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Supervisor Janoski: "Ladies and gentlemen, we have some very pleasant business to attend to first. We have some special guests in the audience who have been recognized by being made members of the Long Island Sports Hall of Fame and each of the members of the Board has a Resolution to offer recognizing each of the individuals. So we'll call to the microphone first, Harriet Gilliam for the purpose--"

Councilman Stark: "Are you going to do it for the years that they were put in?"

Supervisor Janoski: "Pardon me?"

Councilman Stark: "Do it for the years they were brought in?"

Supervisor Janoski: "You want to do it that way? Then who goes first?"

Councilman Stark: "This is not the state of the union. This is a very, very happy occasion not only for me as a member of this Town Board and a resident of the Town for many years, but one who has been associated in some way, shape or form with all of these recipients who have been recognized over the past three or four years."

I might make note that the Town of Riverhead now has five recipients in the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame. No other Town has equaled that. So therefore I think it is only fitting on our part, we as a Town government, we as a community, recognize each one of these individuals. I'm sorry I wasn't here a few years ago and I would have thought of this with the first recipient. But better late than never I always say. It is my great honor and privilege to read the Resolution of this Town Board that honors Greg Flippen, Charter Member of the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame. The first initial year that it was formed, Greg was inducted.

WHEREAS, the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame was established in 1988 to recognize and pay tribute to individuals who have made a major contribution to professional and/or amateur sports in Suffolk County, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead is proud to have one of its sons honored as one of the first members of the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame, and

WHEREAS, Greg Flippen is recognized for his contributions to amateur and professional sports for his numerous achievements as the only person to win four New York State long jump titles: Three years All-American Long Jumper; Second Best Jumper in the United States in 1971; Junior National Champion setting meet record of 25 feet, breaking a 35 year record held by S.T. Johnson; setting the New York State meet record as a southpaw at 24, 4 and 1/4 inches, which placed him fourth in the United States, in the Sports Illustrated All-American High School Track Team, and continuing his career by establishing the first Track and Field Club in the Riverhead Flippen's Flyers.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead wishes to pay tribute to its son, Greg Flippen, for the aforementioned accomplishments as well as continuing to hold the (inaudible) long jump record at 24, 3 inches. Long jump record at 25 feet, (inaudible) meet record at 27, 7 and 1/4 inches, and the Riverhead High School record at 24, 8 and 1/4 inches. For bringing his expertise to the youth of our community and to offer congratulations to Greg Flippen, belated as it may be, the one that I am very proud to do, and one of the first members inducted into the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame in April, 1990.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this Resolution be

presented to Greg Flippen and signed by the entire Board."

Supervisor Janoski: "Don't anybody leave. The press would like to take a group picture with (inaudible). I guess I go next."

I am honored to recognize the next recipient, Bob Burns. I guess it's proper because Bob Burns is the son of Supervisor Burns who, in my opinion, was one of the gutsiest supervisors this Town ever had. And I long admired the decisions that he made, regardless of the political impact that it had on him. But we're here tonight to recognize Bob Burns, a lifelong resident, Bob Burns attended Riverhead High School where he played football and basketball, in addition to being captain to a championship basketball team. He is a graduate of Hobart College where he was a starting end for three years and was elected captain of the basketball team. He was, however selected to the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame in his capacity as a sportswriter, having spent over four decades covering games throughout the entire east end area and writing about them for a succession of papers which included the Riverhead News, County Review, the News Review and, finally, the Long Island Traveler Watchman. Starting in 1946, every weekend, nearly 2,300 of them, found him pounding out copy about high school athletes and their adult counterparts until his retirement in 1990, a span that covered 44 years and involved roughly 58,000 typewritten pages. This despite working a full-time job in a local bank. In addition to many plaques of appreciation through various leagues, he has received the highest commendations from such diverse groups as the Basketball Coaches, the Wrestling Coaches, and the Eastern Board of Basketball Referee. On his 25th writing anniversary, the Town of Riverhead proclaimed a Bob Burns Day.

It might also be mentioned that he started Little League Baseball in Riverhead and was a force in keeping it alive in its early years. He also managed a team of youngsters in that league for 34 years, eventually managing the sons of some of his earliest players. All told, adding in tryouts and practices, it added up to about 2,700 hours of community service, perhaps making-- taking into consideration his claim to have eaten 680 peanut butter sandwiches en route to the ballpark.

We in the Town have named one diamond at Stosky Park Complex as Bob Burns Field. I am pleased to offer this Resolution and, you know what? We're supposed to vote on it.

WHEREAS, the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame was established in 1988 to recognize and pay tribute to individuals who have made a major contribution to professional and/or amateur sports in Suffolk County, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead is proud to have one of its sons honored as a member of the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame, and

WHEREAS, Bob Burns was a profound sportswriter having spent over four decades covering games throughout the east end area and writing about them for a succession of papers involving roughly 58,000 typewritten pages, Bob Burns was also well known as Coach Burns having established Little League in the Town of Riverhead and maintaining that League for 34 years, eventually managing the sons of some of his earlier players,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead wishes to pay tribute to its son, Bob Burns, for his tireless efforts, outstanding contribution and dedication to amateur sports in the Town of Riverhead and to offer its congratulations to Bob Burns on his induction into the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame in April of 1991."

Councilman Prusinowski: "It is my pleasure to offer this Resolution for my uncle, Big Ed Danowski, who ever since as a kid, I only had one choice in the family which was to root for the Giants. Fortunately, the last 10 years we had some things to root for, of course, being a Giants fan we're masochists. But for those of you who might not know, former Big Ed-- Big Ed was a former college and professional football legend who was Fordham University's first two time All American, and was the quarterback for the New York Giants from 1934 to 1941. He led the Giants to five championship games including titles in 1934 and 1938 and he received a big fat bonus for winning the championship, he told me that year of \$500. And in those days, if you didn't play in the game, you didn't get paid. You had to appear in the game to get paid. So, you know, everytime I see Uncle Ed he kind of chuckles at some of the contracts that they have today.

Known as Big Ed, he stands at six foot one and weighs 200 pounds. Returning to Fordham University after his tenure with the Giants, he coached a football team and earned so much respect from his players, they established the Danowski Award which is given to the Fordham

player who best exhibits what Fordham football is all about. He may be best remembered as leading the Giants in the famous Sneakers Game which they had to pay for themselves.

WHEREAS, the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame was established in 1988 to recognize and pay tribute to individuals who have made a major contribution to the professional and or amateur sports in Suffolk County, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead is proud to have one of its sons honored as a member of the Suffolk County Hall of Fame, and

WHEREAS, Ed Danowski has been recognized in the Sports Hall of Fame for his contribution to professional sports through his seven year position as a quarterback with the New York Giants beginning in 1934 and being completed in 1941. Affectionately known as Big Ed, he led the Giants to five championship games including titles in 1934 and 1938. He returned to Fordham University after his tenure with the Giants to coach the team to a 46 and 54 record. He was honored by his players who established the Danowski Award given to the Fordham player who best exhibits what Fordham football is all about.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead wishes to pay tribute to its son, Ed Danowski, for his accomplishments and his professional career with the New York Giants and on his induction in the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame in April of 1991.

Accepting for Uncle Ed who is in stable health but it's a little past his bedtime, being a little bit older then 80 years old, is another famous Riverhead Danowski, Peter Danowski."

Peter Danowski: "I'll accept it with the same humility my Uncle Ed has and that is saying very few words, we thank you very much."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "Our next recipient is Jim Gilhooley, and I'm particularly pleased and proud to be introducing this Resolution on Coach Gilhooley because he certainly has played a special part in the lives of my family, having coached my brother, Harry, as a member of the track and cross country team and my brother still speaks very fondly of you, Coach Gilhooley, and sends you greetings. And, also, for myself as a graduate of Riverhead High School, I can remember

Coach Gilhooley being a very important presence as part of the athletic staff there. And so I thank you for the many years of work that you gave to our school and for giving us all very pleasant memories.

Jim Gilhooley started at Riverhead High School after graduating from New York University in 1950. In 1951, Jim went into the United States Army and resumed PT and coaching at Riverhead High School in 1953. Jim coached basketball for five seasons and track and cross country for 25 seasons. Under Jim's training and guidance, the cross country team won 10 section championships and were New York State champions in 1958 and 1960. Again, with Jim's instruction, the Blue Wave track teams won 86 straight league dual meet and 16 sectional track meets. They also won 6 section championships.

Among many individual championships were four time New York State champion Greg Flippen and two time New York State champion Jerry Nelson. Jim became Athletic Director at Riverhead High School in 1979 and completed a 37 year coaching career with his retirement in 1989.

It is with pleasure that I now offer this Resolution.

WHEREAS, the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame was established in 1988 to recognize and pay tribute to individuals who have made a major contribution to professional and or amateur sports in Suffolk County, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead is proud to have one of its sons honored as a member of the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame, and

WHEREAS, Jim Gilhooley began coaching at Riverhead High School in 1950 and continued for an unprecedented 37 years. He coached basketball for five seasons, and track and cross country for 25 seasons, where under his guidance the cross country team won 10 section championships and were New York State champions in 1958 and 1960. As well, Coach Gilhooley's training of the Blue Wave track team resulted in wins in 86 straight league dual meets and 16 sectional track meets as well as six section championships and a profound influence on the thousands of young people who were his students.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead wishes to pay tribute to its son, James Gilhooley, for his

tireless efforts, outstanding contribution, and dedication to amateur sports in the Town of Riverhead, and to offer its congratulations to James Gilhooley on his induction into the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame in April of 1992, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that a copy of this Resolution be presented to Coach James Gilhooley."

Councilman Creighton: "I have the pleasure of making a presentation tonight to Coach Mike McKillop. This is a proud moment for me because I had the pleasure of playing sports at Riverhead High School under the tutelage of Coach Mike McKillop, and most of the people I know here today have had quite a bit of life experience behind them and I know you realize that as you go through life, you run into many obstacles and challenges and you often have to look back and draw upon the values and lessons that you learned as young people. And I can tell you that many times during my life, I have looked back and my mind reflected on the values that I learned and the lessons that I learned on the playing field at Riverhead High School. And I have to attribute that to the quality of the man that's Mike McKillop, Coach Mike McKillop, and you deserve to be called Coach, gave to his people.

I'd like to now iterate some of the accomplishments of Coach McKillop over his illustrious athletic career. Coach McKillop received 12 varsity letters while attending Riverhead High School, four in football; four in basketball; four in track. I don't think he could have done any more. Mike not only was the shotput champion in Suffolk County, but also won the 440 medley relay championship as a high school student. He was captain of the football and basketball teams. Mike attended Ithica College where he attained 11 varsity letters, four in football; three for basketball; and four for track. As a college student, he again was the captain of the football and basketball teams. The possible highlight of his college career was when he broke his shotput and discus meet records during the Physical Education Conference Meet. These accomplishments placed him in the Ithica College Hall of Fame as a charter member in 1969. After achieving those accomplishments in college, Coach McKillop came back to Riverhead High School to bring the Riverhead Blue Wave football team to a record of 85 wins, 37 losses and 7 ties. In his 17 years as the coach, the football team won eight championships and I had the proud pleasure of playing for Mike on one of those championship teams. All this was accomplished while he was a full time staff

member of the Riverhead faculty for 27 years.

WHEREAS, the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame was established in 1988 to recognize and pay tribute to individuals who have made a major contribution to professional and or amateur sports in Suffolk County, and

WHEREAS, the Town of Riverhead is proud to have one of its sons honored as a member of the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame, and

WHEREAS, Michael McKillop is recognized for his contribution to amateur sports through his 27 years of service with the Department of Physical Education at Riverhead High School, his 17 years of service as a varsity football coach at Riverhead High School resulting in eight championship titles had a profound influence on the thousands of young people who were his students.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Town of Riverhead wishes to pay tribute to its son, Michael McKillop, for his tireless efforts, outstanding contribution, and dedication to amateur sports in the Town of Riverhead, and to offer its congratulations to Mike McKillop for his induction into the Suffolk County Sports Hall of Fame on April 21, 1993."

Supervisor Janoski: "May I have a motion on those five Resolutions?"

Councilman Stark: "Moved, Mr. Supervisor."

Barbara Grattan: "That concludes Correspondence."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Now before we take up the Public Hearings, I would open the meeting to comment on any subject. Sir?"

Donald King: "Mr. Supervisor, members of the Town Board. My name is Donald King, 75 East Main Street, Kings Park, New York. I represent Taco Bell in connection with their application on Route 58 and Harrison Avenue. It's my understanding that the Planning Board and the Planning Department have recommended approval of this application, and there was a question with respect to signaling, or a signal device at the intersection of Route 58 and Harrison Avenue."

To that end, I understand that Mike Caracciolo has sent a letter to the Department of Public Works, Mr. Hayduk, and if I may, I'd like to-- it's a brief letter-- read to you his response to Mr. Caracciolo.

The letter is dated April 27, 1993. It's to the Honorable Michael Caracciolo. Dear Mike: This is in response to your correspondence of April 2, 1993, concerning the proposed Taco Bell Restaurant on the north side of Route 58 west of Harrison Avenue.

With respect to Taco Bell, we are aware of this proposed development and have not required the developer to provide any new traffic control devices.

We have updated the historical accident experience at the Harrison Avenue intersection and reviewed the traffic volumes in the vicinity of the intersection.

Based on the evaluation of this data, we recommend the existing traffic control be retained.

Should you have any questions on this matter, please do not hesitate to contact this office.

I have a copy if you would like a copy for the record."

Supervisor Janoski: "We have it."

Donald King: "Now, I talked to my traffic man today and apparently if there's a warrant for signals, you have to find it under New York State Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices. If you don't meet the criteria under that, they can't put a device in here and I think that's what they're saying by this letter without me going on for three days about it. I respectfully request this Board, I don't want to throw down a gauntlet, but Taco Bell's ready to go. There is not going to be a traffic signal device at this location at this particular time and I, therefore, respectfully request that you grant the application for approval on this application in a timely manner. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall at 7:10 P.M. on Tuesday, May 18, 1993, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding amending Chapter 101 "Vehicles and Traffic" Article V Parking, Standing and Stopping at Section 101-18 "Seasonal Parking Prohibited."

Patricia Moore: "Under 101-18 "Seasonal Parking Prohibited", it says that notwithstanding Section 101-12 and subject to 101-10, the parking of vehicles is hereby prohibited annually from May 15th through September 15th upon the following described streets or portions thereof except for vehicles of Riverhead residents displaying valid resident parking permit pursuant to 48-13. The proposed street is Corwell Street, both sides of it. The location would be beginning at the south side of the Riverside Drive intersection, and then southerly and parallel to the bank of the Peconic River, and thence along the easterly side of Corwell Street north to the intersection of Riverside Drive."

Supervisor Janoski: "If there anyone present wishing to address the Town Board on this proposal? That being the case-- "

Councilman Creighton: "Joe, excuse me. I had a request that the prohibition be extended from 1 March to 1 December on this and would like that to be considered. The reason being that the prohibition does not affect residents with permits that there's fishing that takes place off of that boat ramp at the end of that, and often boaters-- fisherman, commercial fishermen from outside of Riverhead Town come in there and quickly go in the water and put in eel traps and that sort of thing in Riverhead water bay bottoms, and harvest from there. And that this goes on actually from March to the first of December, and if there's no objection, I certainly would support that request from the baymen to go ahead and extend that period of time it's restricted to non-residents."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Any comment? Without objection

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall, at 7:15 P.M. on Tuesday, May 18, 1993, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding amending Chapter 101 "Vehicles and Traffic, Article III Traffic Regulations at Section 101-3, Stop and Yield Intersections, Railroad Crossings."

Patricia Moore: "The following affects the Bear Estate Sub-division. The homeowners there have requested that the signs be installed. These would be stop intersections. The following intersections are designated as stop intersections and stop signs shall be erected. The intersection of Old Farm Road. The stop sign would be on Arrowhead Avenue and the entrance is from the west. The intersection of Old Farm Road and Roan Lane, the entrance from the west, Arrowhead Avenue and Roan Lane, the entrance from the east, and finally Arrowhead Avenue and Old Farm Road, the entrance from the north."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is there anyone who wishes to comment on the installation of these traffic-- yes, Steve?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. Looking at this in the write up, it appears to me, I don't know if I'm clear on this -- this is why I'm up here, to ask. Does this mean that you come to a railroad crossing and there's no gate or lights there and you're going to put a stop sign, and you stop for a few minutes to make sure no train is coming, then you can take off?"

Patricia Moore: "No. I believe that that's the general section they've labeled it as stop intersections and railroad crossings and at some railroad crossings there are, in fact, stop signs. Most of the time there are some devices, I think that the railroad itself

puts up. But we're dealing with just stop signs in this subdivision. No railroad crossings."

Supervisor Janoski: "There is, in fact, no railroad line up there."

Steve Haizlip: "Oh, I get you now. That's the title of the law."

Patricia Moore: "Just the title of the law, right."

Steve Haizlip: "Oh, okay."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes, ma'am."

Ruth Market: "Hello, my name is Ruth Market and I reside at 122 Old Farm Road. And I want to respectfully request the Board to put stop signs at the corner of Old Farm Road and Roan. My daughter currently has a bus stop right there and in the morning I fear for her safety. She has to stand deep into our neighbor's driveway because the cars, the traffic just goes by too fast. Many buses go by too fast. In the future, my daughter may have to cross that intersection to go to the-- all the way down Roan, which is a tenth of a mile. It's not a great distance, but my great fear is that intersection. There is also an incline at that intersection and the cars gather speed. It's approximately two-tenths of a mile into the development-- gather speed and they cannot see any children, or anybody on the other side of the base of the incline."

And I also would hope that you seriously consider the playground whether we should put stops there. There's so many children in the neighborhood and we try to teach our children to respectfully be careful of the neighborhood, the traffic, and there's just a danger. There's too much fast traffic in the neighborhood."

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay. Our intention is to install the stop signs but before they can, in fact, be installed, we have to get them into the law book, which is the purpose of this Public Hearing. So it will be done in the very near future soon as we can act on these. But thank you for your support. Way over there."

Barry Birnstein: "Good evening. My name is Barry Birnstein, of the Bear Estates. We appreciate the stop signs. There is a

problem with the speed of the traffic going through the neighborhood. We'd like the Board to consider if it would be possible to put three-way stops at all intersections in order to slow the traffic down, because there's-- Old Farm Road and Arrowhead, both have quite a few curves to them. There also is the incline and we feel it might be a better idea to have three-way stops so that traffic going down Old Farm and Arrowhead has to stop similar to Levittown, just to slow the traffic down.

And, also with the yield intersections on the next Public Hearing so I don't have to come up again, we would also like the Board to consider whether they can take those yield signs and convert them to stop signs, also, instead of yield signs. It's been my experience that most people more or less will ignore a yield sign. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Way in the back."

Dean Terchunian: "Good evening. My name is Dean Terchunian. I live at Bear Estates. I've spoken to quite a few of our neighbors there and most of us have children and our main concern is at each of these intersections as the gentleman before me said, Barry, that we have three-way stop signs. And the reasons are-- is, because people go too fast. And the other thing which is the second part of the Public Hearing, is the yield signs. We'd also, the people that I've spoken to which is over a dozen, with children, would like to see stop signs there instead of yield signs for the same reason that most people don't understand the meaning of a yield sign, and just drive right through it. I believe three-way stops at Roan and Arrowhead, Roan and Old Farm Road, and the other intersections that need it would make the neighborhood safe for children and since this is a closed neighborhood, and the speed limit is 30, it seems appropriate to the neighbors there that those types of signs would work better. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Anyone else wish to offer any comments? There being none, I therefore declare the Hearing to be closed.."

Supervisor Janoski: "Let the record show that the hour of 7:47 P.M. has arrived. The Town Clerk will please read the notice of Public Hearing."

Barbara Grattan: "I have affidavits of publishing and posting of a Public Hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall at 7:20 P.M. on Tuesday, May 18, 1993, to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding amending Chapter 101 Vehicles and Traffic, Article III, Traffic Regulations at Section 101-3 "Stop and Yield Intersections, Railroad Crossing."

Patricia Moore: "The final Public Hearing is on yield intersections. The intersections are Arrowhead Avenue, the yield sign would be on Chestnut Court and the entrance is from the east. Arrowhead Avenue, yield sign on Calico Court and the entrance from the west. Old Farm Road, yield sign on (inaudible), the entrance would be from the east and Old Farm Road and Buckskin Lane, the entrance from the west."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the Town Board on the matter of the matter of these signs? That being the case, without objection, I declare the Hearing to be closed."

P U B L I C H E A R I N G C L O S E D : 7:49 P.M.

Supervisor Janoski: "I have just polled the members of the Board asking that we might take up in Resolution form the enactment of the subject of these three Public Hearings. There is certainly no reason to delay and to wait for two weeks to go by before the next Town Board meeting. The signs can, therefore, be installed more quickly. As far as the request that you have made, that will require further enactment, further publication, and further Public Hearings. So let's get this done, and then discuss what further action will be taken. But the Town Board after the Agenda is complete this evening, I will ask for Resolutions enacting the subject of these three Hearings this evening."

And speaking of Public Hearings and Resolutions, is there anyone

who wishes to be recognized on any subject before we take up the Resolutions? Mr. Kasperovich?"

William Kasperovich: "William Kasperovich of Wading River. I didn't want to get up at the three separate Public Hearings, but I would like to inject at this point that the concern of location and the lines of stopping, whether the lines are required or not required, and if they're required, a study of exactly where these stop lines should be. This not being spelled out, I thought I'd mention it so that it's not overlooked.

There's several items in the Resolutions coming up this evening that I decided to hold by them and come to the one point that I wish to bring to the attention of the Town Board. As I've said many times, I live on 15th Street; 15th Street is a one block long street, 1750 feet. Adding all the assessments, both sides of the road, the sum total is somewhat above half a million dollars; \$619,000 to be exact. And this sum is taken-- a percentage is taken of this sum for the roads or highways. Now, I don't want to raise all the details and concerns at this point, but I have presented it to Councilman Prusinowski and I do believe we have a condition here that is a lack of rectitude and although this year it might be difficult to make adjustments, I think it should be brought to light and the Board take a position on what the people are paying taxes for and what they are not getting. I have not had opportunity to speak with the Highway Superintendent this week, and I want to bring it up with him before I go into details, but for the taxes being paid, we're not getting our proper share. And I want this to be on record and placed on the agenda for the Town Board to concern themselves and come to some final understanding and conclusion. And so that is all the time I'm going to take, and I will pick it up in the future. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you, Bill. Sid?"

Sid Bail: "Good evening. Sid Bail, President of Wading River Civic Association. I'd like to briefly make some comments on three different subjects. First of all, last week, I wanted to say thank you to the members of the Town Board after you passed that Resolution on the Calverton Jetport, and you all said some very fine things. And today, for those of you who haven't seen Newsday, there's a little bit of vindication on their Editorial page for your position and basically what Newsday is saying is that this project really isn't practical, and ETA, estimate time of arrival, delayed. One

thing that was of concern was the last paragraph. It says: Calverton isn't an asset Long Island can afford to toss away. However, when the economy picks up, the industrial park idea might fly. If Congress presses the Navy to shut Calverton as an economy move, New York must move fast to make sure that the airport survives as a potential resource for Long Island. I just hope Riverhead Town moves faster than New York does on this.

The second topic is the proposed high speed ferry. If you watch TV, today's Cablevision, there's an editorial that surprised the heck out of me, pleasantly, but what it says is that this may not be a very good idea and a lot of folks are rushing and not looking at the consequences not only from our little community, but also the existing ferry franchise. The net result is we may have less ferry service to Connecticut rather than more. On Saturday, a group of us have formed a new group called Coalition for a Sound Ferry Policy and there are three members of the Town Board who have taken a position in opposition to the high speed ferry. And what we want is not necessarily opposition, but we'd like a critical look at this proposal and it's been all smoke and mirrors so far and very, very low keyed, pushing ahead with RFP's, Request for Proposals, which are due on Friday. So that's why we have our little press conference on Saturday and I invite every member of the Town Board, including you, Mr. Supervisor, to join us at 11:00, rain or shine. Please, shine. At the Town beach opposite-- by the boat ramp. And I'd like to see you all there.

Third thing. There was a question about the Hulse Landing parking lot, whether some plans had been defined for it."

Councilman Stark: "Yes, they have."

Sid Bail: "They have."

Councilman Stark: "Yes, they have."

Sid Bail: "Okay. Will something be done shortly?"

Councilman Stark: "Monique is not here, but she has found the money in the budget and it will probably be done as soon as Charlie has the ability, timewise."

Sid Bail: "Right, okay. Thank you very much."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you, Sid. Alice?"

Alice Graff: "Alice Graff, Riverhead. An acquaintance told me of a story that kind of upset me a bit. His car had been stolen and, of course, it was by the Timothy Hill people, but that's neither here nor there. But his car was stolen. He had no-- he did not cause the problem, and yet in order to get his car out of I don't know what you call it-- "

Supervisor Janoski: "Impound."

Alice Graff: "I call it the pound. He had to pay \$100 and, you know, he's a taxpayer. It seems to me that paying \$100 to get a car out of the pound after it had been stolen, kind of acts to me like a little bit of-- "

Supervisor Janoski: "Have him give my office a call. We'll see what we can do about that."

Alice Graff: "Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes, Sid, did you forget something?"

Sid Bail: "I'd like to correct one misstatement I think I mis-spoke. The press conference will be at the ramp by the creek, not by the public beach. All right. I'm sorry."

Supervisor Janoski: "Steve?"

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. This afternoon at the Holiday Inn, Nancy Mitchman and Irene Schofield which you have met here before, and they're in charge of this aged and blood drive, Golden Blood Drive. The-- she's asked me to make the announcement here tonight that it's coming on June 1st, 9:30 in the morning 'til 2:30 in the afternoon at the Holiday Inn. And we're requesting everybody show up that's possible and wish to donate.

Vic, may I ask you, is there a reporter here from Suffolk Life? She asked me if I could give these press releases to the-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "The News-Review is here, too, and the Traveler-Watchman."

Steve Haizlip: "That's been taken care of. I see that in your Resolutions, you've come up with Resolution #374. That's declaring the month of May for senior citizens in the Town of Riverhead. There is no doubt in my mind that you are very sincere about it. And you mean it. But unfortunately we have got other agencies and institutions that don't mean it. Now, for an example, the-- it's going to be pretty hard to think and phrase this as I go along, but as Bill Kasperovich once said, I don't have as much time in front of me as I've had in the back of me. So I'm going to say to the best of my ability. Now, the company and Travelers Insurance which is supposed to be our coverage, as we become a senior citizen on Medicare, went in cahoots to put a line on the medical claim rejection notice. It appears that the only time that any company or institution can perjure themselves is in court, when they're under oath. Otherwise, they can tell lies all day long, they can swindle, they can deny and what have you. Now, as one company official once told me, he said he wanted me to stop bashing about the problem that my wife had in 1991 on August 25th and she had to be put in the emergency room at the hospital. And, by the way, I'm not up here to get television exposure. I'm up here because people get frustrated and they have to let their anger out at some place and it's our elected officials, and hope that television can pick and carry it to someone that maybe will act on it. Otherwise. Now, I hope I don't run over the five minutes, Joe. Well, you know, I see you look at the clock."

Supervisor Janoski: "I didn't look at the clock."

Steve Haizlip: "Oh, all right. You're just resting your neck that way. Okay. Now, so the whole thing, she gets into the emergency room, stays there 'til midnight, finally get out, come home, and then I get a Medicare statement. So I take the Medicare statement, now I send it to my coverage, company coverage, which I'm entitled to and paying \$78 a month for it. When the claim came back, the rejection read that the hospital has taken Medicare assignment approved amount as total charge. So therefore you can go to where the devil works. So, I have contacted Mr. Joe Turner and Mr. (inaudible). I have talked to them and I have said, why is it if you accepted this, why is it that I got bills from you? And if you accepted it as total charge, then I shouldn't be getting bills from you. So he says, verbally, they own up to it, and say, well, they told a lie about it. We don't accept what Medicare pays. You got to pay us something if they don't. I said, but they're making an accusation saying that you do so give it to me in writing that you don't. Well, they'll

tell you verbally but they won't tell you in writing.

Now, one other point about the senior citizen. The Older Americans Act which came out in 1965 which was titled 102.375 is becoming, I don't know if it's proper English the way I'm saying it, but it is becoming almost not worth the paper that it's wrote on. They are taking. Sen. Moynihan, the high spirited Senator just voted against us seniors to take away Social Security from us for the Clinton and 85% on taxation which violates the Constitution of this country. So it gets me-- she's the lawyer, she'll tell you. So it gets me that Clinton, they can violate the Constitution, but I can't. So, now the latest thing is you better be aware and hold on and have about \$2,000 extra when it comes April 15, 1994. Right now, all the rates are being contemplated on income tax, they're going to change the rates, and it's going to be retroactive to January 1st, and nobody, no corporation or nobody is taking any money out now and when it comes law, when it be up in October and so forth, they want that whole entire tax bill to the rate that they enacted as law. And they're making it retroactive so there's the Constitution broken right there. You cannot make a law retroactive. So, we're just being taken over. Us seniors. So, Joe, I think you and the Town Board at least consider this for the Town."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you. Well, I've read the Constitution a number of times and ex post facto is what you're talking about. Henry, did you wish to spread some light on this?"

Henry Pfeiffer: "Yes, indeed."

Supervisor Janoski: "Oh, thank you."

Henry Pfeiffer: "Henry Pfeiffer, Wading River. I'm going to again refer to Resolution 374 which declares the month of May Senior Citizen month in the Town of Riverhead. On Friday last, I chaired the All About Aging conference for the County of Suffolk in Hauppauge, and I pointed out to the assembled people there representing the other nine towns, the fact that Riverhead is the first Town to issue such a proclamation at length and, indeed, to add to it, augment it, by a series of special events during the month of May. Now, I appreciate the intent and the thrust of this proclamation. This proclamation enhances the visibility of the older American for the month of May, 1993. It's very good. But may I emphasize that implicit within its context is a recognition that our older citizens

are an integral, intrinsic, inseparable, and invaluable segment of our fine community for all 12 months of every year. I think that we all appreciate that. I indicated to them and I showed them a copy of Lifestyles which had been issued by the Senior Citizens Advisory Board of Riverhead and I indicated and I defer to-- very briefly to Steve, a declaration of objectives for older Americans which appears on the reverse side. It lists some 10 objectives which insure that senior citizens, those over the age of 60, will enjoy a life of social dignity and economic security. And the 10th of the objectives which normally reads according to law: Freedom, independence and the free exercise of individual initiative and planning and managing their own lives has through a series, I think of wisdom on the part of the people who printed this, now reads: Freedom, independence and the free exercise of individual initiative and planning and managing their own loves. And I think this is a substantial improvement and I think this ought to be passed along to the Congress."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you, Henry. The Town Board is very pleased to sponsor the events that are taking place this month. Some mighty fine breakfasts being had also. But any number of events taking place throughout the month of May, paying special recognition to our senior citizens."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "While we're talking about senior citizens month, I'd just like to make an announcement that next Friday, I will be hosting Assemblyman Paul Harriburg, who is the Chair of the Assembly Committee for the Aging of New York State, and certainly Assemblyman Harriburg has been a very active advocate on behalf of our older Americans and I know Mr. Pfeiffer has been in Mr. Harriburg's company on many occasions, but this will be an opportunity for him to be out here on the east end, and certainly I encourage our senior citizens and those who are interested in the issues affecting our older Americans to come out at 11:30 next Friday, May 28th at Town Hall to meet with Assemblyman Harriburg. Mr. Haizlip we'll see you there."

Supervisor Janoski: "George, are you indicating that you would like to say something?"

George Schmelzer: "Yes."

Supervisor Janoski: "Uh-huh. Well, I was just about to take up the Resolutions, but certainly I recognize that little--"

George Schmelzer: "I can't help but many times I look upon the Town Board as the Board of Directors of the Riverhead Human Animal Farm. That's about what it is. I read in the paper there was some disgust and anguish about the problem with the (inaudible) garbage. Why couldn't you get ahold of the FBI to help, let it go at that."

Supervisor Janoski: "The FBI was, in fact, contacted as part of the-- "

George Schmelzer: "Oh. You can print what they say, it leaves a bad impression, the public, the way that appeared in the local paper."

Supervisor Janoski: "I don't read the local papers for that particular reason."

George Schmelzer: "You don't? You read the New York papers, huh? You should read the local paper. I'm surprised. Maybe you might find out something about yourself sometime. That's just a joke."

Supervisor Janoski: "A very good one, too."

George Schmelzer: "Yes, it was. You set yourself up for it."

Supervisor Janoski: "We have this evening a young lady who is here as part of a study program to observe Town government in action and in talking with her, I told her that this is the best show in Town on a Tuesday night, and you are proving me exactly right."

George Schmelzer: "With your help."

Supervisor Janoski: "Yes, indeed."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah. Okay. You don't have a name for the junior citizens? They're left out in the cold. Only to pay the taxes, huh. No answer."

Supervisor Janoski: "Is that it?"

Councilman Stark: "Thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "I thought you were going to say something."

Supervisor Janoski: "No, I'm not going to say anything."

George Schmelzer: "Oh. What have you thought about the dangerous situation at the crossroads of Edwards Avenue and River Road. Nothing? In Calverton."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I discussed it with the Highway Superintendent. We're reviewing the situation."

George Schmelzer: "Oh. I think it should be reviewed fast before there's an accident there. I look it over, I think the best thing would be to have a traffic light there. Because you really can't see what's just about to come down the hill. Really."

Councilman Prusinowski: "We have to determine which part is in Brookhaven and which part is in Riverhead, which part is in Southampton."

George Schmelzer: "It's all in Riverhead Town right there."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I know and we have a Superintendent of Highways and I talked to him about it. Also, traffic lights are not easy to achieve. Unfortunately, the State wants high accidents and death to occur at an intersection before they'll consider a traffic light."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah. That's the, gee, you should put that in writing so if people can hear it, maybe they would wake up a little bit. So that's too bad. I'm not going to create an accident for you, just for them. At least get the signs straightened out."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Okay. We know about it, George, and-- "

George Schmelzer: "Well, it's been done nothing for months."

Councilman Prusinowski: "You know what?"

George Schmelzer: "What?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "I'm a Councilman. I talk to the Highway Superintendent. Among other matters that we have to work on within the Town, we'll get to it. Okay?"

George Schmelzer: "Okay. Thanks."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Thanks."

George Schmelzer: "I hope you do because it's-- "

Councilman Prusinowski: "We repaved the entire road last year and it's a nice job, so."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah. It looks all right. But it still isn't any safer."

Supervisor Janoski: "George, have you discussed this matter with the Highway Superintendent."

George Schmelzer: "No."

Supervisor Janoski: "Why don't you try that because-- "

George Schmelzer: "Well, you're the boss of the Town."

Supervisor Janoski: "See that's where you're wrong. This Town Board nor I as Supervisor have any authority over the Highway Superintendent. None. He's the king of the road."

George Schmelzer: "So from now on I'll go to him then."

Supervisor Janoski: "I would suggest that because it is under his authority, the condition of the-- "

George Schmelzer: "He's in control of all roads, huh?"

Supervisor Janoski: "He has control of all the highways in the Town of Riverhead. Yes, indeed."

George Schmelzer: "Then when it comes to approving a road, it's up to him, not to you?"

Supervisor Janoski: "That's exactly right."

George Schmelzer: "It's good to know. You're not as powerful as I thought you were."

Supervisor Janoski: "Riverhead is not one of the few Towns that have a Department of Public Works. We have a Highway Superintendent who is elected and answerable only to the people."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah. Well, Riverhead is unique. It has no Incorporated Village within its boundary."

Supervisor Janoski: "That's true, too."

George Schmelzer: "Which is good. I suggest Wading River go off by themselves."

Supervisor Janoski: "I don't think so."

George Schmelzer: "They don't want the airport there to be used because they might hear somethings sometime, but a billion dollar airfield can be wasted just on their pleasure."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you, George."

George Schmelzer: "Yeah."

Supervisor Janoski: "Thank you very much."

George Schmelzer: "Well, you're very welcome, sir. If you really mean it."

Supervisor Janoski: "I do."

George Schmelzer: "Okay. But you get paid for it."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Excuse me, George. I just want to make a-- I want to acknowledge, speaking of Wading River. On behalf of the Town Board and I want to acknowledge the fine work that our Sanitation Department did in conjunction with Buildings and Grounds and with some assistance from the Highway Department in doing some special work up at the Wading River-- I said with I think one piece of equipment. But primarily the Sanitation Department did a wonderful job in correcting a very serious situation up at Creek Road in Wading River. And I would acknowledge they did a very professional job, including a DEC inspector showed up and said it was excellent work. I just want to acknowledge that on the record."

George Schmelzer: "Oh, you mean-- "

Supervisor Janoski: "George, that's not a cue for you to say more. We said thank you very much and-- "

George Schmelzer: "Well, I think-- what does he mean that Wading River has the worst sanitary problem in town that was just corrected?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "No."

Supervisor Janoski: "George, thank you very much. Steve, do you wish to be recognized? I see you waving your hand."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip of Calverton. I want to inform George. I have to look at you while I'm talking. It's not proper to turn around and talk like this to him."

Supervisor Janoski: "You're absolutely right."

Steve Haizlip: "I want to inform George. There is nobody-- "

Councilman Stark: "Steve, would you state your name for the record."

Steve Haizlip: "Steve Haizlip, again. From Calverton. I want to inform George that there's nobody fighting this thing harder than I am. Since George first brought it up, I have been with Steve Hayduk or Hodek close as I can name-- "

Supervisor Janoski: "It's not Haizlip."

Steve Haizlip: "No. If it was, he wouldn't be up here squawking. I would have had the job done. So anyway, I'm working on it, George, and I am pursuing it every day. And I'll be pursuing it again tomorrow. But you know what? You ain't going to move and he ain't going to move."

Supervisor Janoski: "Why don't you two guys get together and go down there?"

Let us take up the Resolutions. Did I kid you? Isn't this a good show?"

Councilman Prusinowski: "Calling for a Public Hearing to increase and improve the Riverhead Sewer District. So moved."

Councilman Stark: "Seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

Councilman Stark: "Authorizes the Supervisor to execute contract reference acquisition of real property adjacent to the Riverhead Sewer District Main Plant. So moved."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "I'm voting no because I have a fundamental disagreement with Department Heads being treated as contract employees and I also object to some of the terms in the contract, most notably the uniform and cleaning allowances which are still part of the contract for essentially what are white collar supervisory employees."

The Vote (Cont'd.): Creighton, yes; Stark, yes.

Councilman Prusinowski: "I'm voting yes because these contracts are a major improvement over the previous management contracts that we've had from a management point of view. In addition, I want to thank the Department Heads who have agreed to wage freeze, which I don't see too many other municipalities who have an amicable agreement with their employees to have a wage freeze a way for us to control spending and stabilize taxes in the Town. So I thank them for that. I vote yes."

Supervisor Janoski: "I was just looking at the list of who's included here and I have to agree with Harriet that the day should come that there are no contracts, individual contracts, with the Department Heads. What I would-- looking at this list, I would think that we can agree that most of these people are not white collar workers. They are all uniformed people who wear that green uniform that the Town provides, some of them anyhow. But anyhow, I think these contracts are a major improvement over what had existed previously. I vote yes."

Barbara Grattan: "Okay. The Resolution is adopted."

Resolution #365

Councilman Stark: "Reduces park and recreation fees bond for subdivision known as Calverton Homesteads. So moved."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #366

Councilman Creighton: "This approves the change of zone and special permit petition of Stanley K. Tanger and Associates which pertains to the factory outlet mall off the Expressway on Route 58. So moved."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "And seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes.

Councilman Stark: "It gives me great pleasure to vote for this. This was a conception, a philosophical conception Jim brought to this Town a couple of years ago. He had been talking about it. He brought the conception to the Board. The Board did it and now we're getting very close to having our own factory outlet zones which will bring some tourism and bring an increase to our tax base, and I vote so yes on that basis. Thank you."

The Vote (Cont'd.): Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. The Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #367

Councilwoman Gilliam: Awards bid for snack vendors for various recreation beaches and parks. So moved."

Councilman Creighton: "And seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #368

Councilman Prusinowski: "Appoints part-time police officer. So moved."

Councilman Stark: "Seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #369

Councilman Stark: "Appoints a school crossing guard in the name of Gina Greenwood. So moved."

Councilman Creighton: "Seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Councilman Prusinowski: "Appoints summer intern to the Accounting Department. So moved."

Councilman Stark: "Seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #372

Councilman Stark: "Appoints summer intern to the Highway Department. So moved."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #373

Councilman Creighton: "This amends the site plan of Hess Realty Corporation. So moved."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "And seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #374

Councilwoman Gilliam: "Declares the month of May Senior Citizens Month in the Town of Riverhead. And as was stated, we really appreciate the contributions that seniors make throughout the year. They provide dedicated service and contributions to our Town and our community and we are all benefiting from them being a vital part of the Town of Riverhead. And I so move the Resolution."

Councilman Creighton: "And seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes.

Councilman Stark: "As I'm closing in on those years, yes."

Councilman Prusinowski: "I'm happy to say that our senior citizen programs are very successful 12 months of the year. And Henry, I know a lot of people over there-- sitting over there, participate in them. I vote yes."

The Vote (Cont'd.): Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #375

Councilman Prusinowski: "We request the County of Suffolk to signalize the intersection of Route 58 and Harrison Avenue, Riverhead, and I do disagree with some of the criteria the State uses for requesting such a device. I don't believe that it should be based on data that is fatalistic, if I might add. This is an intersection

that even without the proposed new project, that by the nature of the type of traffic that comes out of the school area, we have the public schools that enter out of there, and I ride up and down Route 58. We do need a little bit more organized flow of traffic and I also am going to write to the County. I believe it's time that the traffic circle be signalized. It can be done. It is done in Massachusetts where my sister lives. I go up there all the time. They they can synchronize the lights on Route 58 and have a more intelligent flow of traffic. Most people drive out from the city, don't know how to use a traffic circle. It's a beautiful circle. We don't want to take it out, but it can be controlled better. I move this Resolution."

Councilman Stark: "I second the Resolution."

Supervisor Janoski: "The Resolution is moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. The Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #376

Councilman Creighton: "This Resolution establishes a monument in honor of Private First Class Garfield M. Langhorn, who was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor posthumously for gallantry above and beyond the call of duty in the Republic of Viet Nam on 15 of January, 1969. As you recall, the Board established a committee to review recommendations for an award or a monument to memorialize PFC Garfield Langhorn several weeks back, and that committee has come forward to the Town Board with a concensus recommendation that a monument be established, essentially a bust on a pedestal to be placed on the southwest corner of the Town Hall property. To your right front, is a display of the Medal of Honor and a rough sketches, artist sketches of what the monument might look like. And this Resolution permits that to go forward. It also established a budget for the Supervisor to execute the contracts necessary to do this. While the Town Board is underwriting this, the committee felt that it was appropriate the community do a fund raising program in order to permit members of the community who wish to contribute to this worthwhile memorial to a citizen of our Town who has honored not only himself and his family, but also the Town of Riverhead with his act. So moved."

Councilwoman Gilliam: "And seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "I would ask that this be done by acclamation. So worded by acclamation."

Resolution #377

Councilman Stark: "Amends site plan of Bluffs II. So moved."

Councilman Prusinowski: "Seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #378

Councilwoman Gilliam: "This Resolution authorizing the design of an additional access ramp at the Reeves Beach facility. So moved."

Councilman Creighton: "And seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Resolution #384

Councilman Prusinowski: "I make a motion to pay the bills."

Councilman Stark: "Seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Motion to pay bills moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolution is adopted.

Councilman Prusinowski: "I make a motion Number 385, 386 and 387, which would adopt respectively the three Public Hearings that we held previously this evening. So moved."

Councilman Stark: "Seconded."

Supervisor Janoski: "Moved and seconded."

The Vote: Gilliam, yes; Creighton, yes; Stark, yes; Prusinowski, yes; Janoski, yes. Resolutions are adopted.

Supervisor Janoski: "Okay. Without objection, this meeting is adjourned."
