

Minutes of a meeting of the Town Board of the Town of Riverhead held in the Town Clerk's office Monday January 14th 1924 at 2-00 P. M.

Minutes of previous meeting read and on motion adopted.

Mr. Hamilton of the Automatic Registering Company of Jamestown, N. Y. addressed the board relative to voting machines for the town. Same was thoroughly discussed but no action taken at this meeting.

On motion made seconded and carried the following petition was duly adopted, signed by the members present and ordered to be presented by the Supervisor to the Board of Supervisors for action at its next regular meeting, and the Town Clerk was directed to prepare and attach the proper statement and certificate as to the result of the vote upon the proposition in this proceeding, and to file a copy thereof after such certification and the signing thereof by Justice Dwight T. Corwin;-

To the Board of Supervisors of the County of Suffolk, New York:

A proposition having been duly submitted at a bi-ennial town meeting, held in and for the town of Riverhead, on the 6th day of November, 1923, pursuant to the provisions of Sections 48 and 57 of the Town Law, and Section 97 of the Highway Law, and other statutes in such case made and provided, providing for the construction of a permanent concrete road-bed, eighteen feet in width, on that portion of the highway known as Roanoke Avenue, between the northerly termination of its present concrete road-bed and the highway known as Sound Avenue, and on the highway known as Edwards Avenue, between the northerly rail of the tracts of the Long Island Railroad Company and the highway known as Middle Country Road, and for the borrowing of a sum not exceeding Eighty Thousand (\$80,000) Dollars and the issue of town bonds therefor for the purposes aforesaid, and such proposition having been duly adopted by a majority of the taxpayers of such town voting at such town meeting, as

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will more fully appear from our statement of the proceedings of such town meeting as to such proposition duly certified by the town clerk, all of which is annexed to this petition and hereby made a part hereof;

THEREFORE, pursuant to the authority conferred upon us by Section 37 of the Highway Law, we, the undersigned the members of the town board of the town of Riverhead, State of New York, do respectfully petition your honorable board for authority to construct a permanent concrete road-bed, eighteen feet in width, in and upon each of the following highways in said town, to wit:-

Upon Roanoke Avenue, between the northerly termination of its present concrete road-bed and Sound Avenue; and

Upon Edwards Avenue, between the northerly rail of the tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company and Middle Country Road.

The approximated distance upon each of said highways to be ~~constructed~~ <sup>constructed</sup> as aforesaid is as follows:-

Upon Edwards Avenue, one and one-fifth miles.

Upon Roanoke Avenue, two and three-fifths miles.

We do further respectfully petition that your honorable board authorize the said town of Riverhead to borrow the sum of Eighty thousand (\$80,000) Dollars, and to issue its bonds therefor, under such terms, conditions and restrictions as your said board may legally impose, which sum is to be expended for the construction of such concrete road beds in said highways.

The fair cost and expense of the construction of the concrete road-beds in said highways, is as follows:-

Edwards Avenue, one and one-fifth miles, Twenty-seven thousand (\$27,000) Dollars.

Roanoke Avenue, two and three-fifths miles, Fifty-three thousand (\$53,000) Dollars.

Dated this 14th day of January, 1924.

On motion made seconded and carried that the Supervisor appoint a committee to confer with the different bankers in the town relative to the \$80,000 dollar bond issue.

Supervisor appointed Justice George E. Penny and Justice Raymond H. Vail to act as such committee.

Tax receiver Forrest G. Downs appeared before the board and asked for an extension of four weeks for his clerk making a total of ten weeks at \$30.00 per week.

On motion made seconded and carried Tax receiver was granted an extension of four weeks for his clerk.

There being no further business meeting adjourned.

It was decided to hold the next meeting of the board on Monday January 21st, 1924 at 4-30 P.M.
