TOWN BOARD REPORT

Councilman Dunleavy announced that on March 12, 2016 the Riverhead Lions Club will be having a corn beef and cabbage dinner in recognition of St. Patrick's Day and Councilman Hubbard announced that the meeting for the 225th anniversary committee scheduled for March 2, 2016 is cancelled and is rescheduled for March 16, 2016.

PUBLIC HEARINGS

Supervisor Walter: "Let's move on to public hearings. The first public hearing is scheduled for 2:05 and it is now 2:10 and this is for the Consideration of a Local Law to Amend Chapter 101, Entitled "Vehicles & Traffic" of the Riverhead Town Code, Article V, Parking, Standing and Stopping (101-10. Parking Prohibited – Sound Avenue S., Intersection with C.R.105), John do you want to talk about this?"

Councilman Dunleavy: "Yeah, this is just to try to help traffic move along Sound Avenue during the summer months when traffic is almost horrendous on Sound Avenue. We're making no parking for four hundred feet on the south side of Sound Avenue by intersection 105 so people can come out of 105 and see traffic that's approaching at that intersection and Briarmere Farms is cooperating with us, they're going to put in a parking lot inside Briarmere Farms to get people off of Sound Avenue and into their property. So that's what this is about."

Supervisor Walter: "Ok, does anybody wish to be heard on this matter? Not seeing anybody I'll close the public comment portion and leave it open for written comment on March 11th in the Town Clerk's office, 4:30 p.m."

Supervisor Walter: "The second public hearing was scheduled for 2:10 p.m. and it is now 2:11 so we'll open up the public hearing for the Consideration of a Local Law to Amend Chapter 101 Entitled "Vehicles & Traffic" of the Riverhead Town Code, Article III, Traffic Regulations (101-3. Stop and Yield Intersections, Railroad Crossings, Parking Fields – Grumman Blvd. and Burman Blvd); John."

Councilman Dunleavy: "Ok, this is to protect all the cars that come along Grumman Blvd. It passes a private road, Burman Blvd. so we had to put a stop sign coming out of Burman Blvd. so the cars would stop before they enter the public highway so that's what we're putting up there."

Supervisor Walter: "Alright, does anybody wish to be heard on this matter? Not seeing anybody we'll leave it close the public comment portion and leave it open for written comments until March 11th, 4:30 in the Town Clerk's office."

COMMENTS ON RESOLUTIONS

Supervisor Walter: “Alright, moving right along, resolutions; Sal how did we do?”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Sal Mastropaolo, Calverton, Resolution 152. In the first whereas it says *by resolution #70 adopted 1/21/16* and then the third whereas says *did adopt a subsequent resolution #103 on February 3, 2015* so one of those two dates is wrong.”

Supervisor Walter: “Annemarie this is the grinding.”

Annemarie Prudenti: “Ok.”

Supervisor Walter: “Say it one more time Sal.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “You have Resolution 70 being adopted on January 21, 2016 and the subsequent resolution which means after being adopted on February 3, 2015.”

Supervisor Walter: “No, the original was January 1, 2015.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “So either the original one was 2015 or the second one was.”

Supervisor Walter: “Nope it was the first, 2015, January 21, 2015, correct Annemarie, I think that was right?”

Councilman Wooten: “No, it wasn’t this year.”

Annemarie Prudenti: “That’s correct.”

Supervisor Walter: “So we’ll amend that to 2015, good catch.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Resolution 155, there’s no attached license.”

Supervisor Walter: “I don’t have it either but that’s a county license, don’t know that we’ve ever had it, that’s a county license. I sign it every year. You want a copy of it Sal?”

Sal Mastropaolo: “No as long as there’s one attached.”

Supervisor Walter: “Ok, we’ll make sure the Clerk has one attached.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Resolution 157, the March 15th meeting is at 7:00 not 2:00 so the please take notice needs to be changed.”

Supervisor Walter: “That’s a good catch Sal because that would have cost us money.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Yeah well there’s three of them.”

Supervisor Walter: “What do we have on the seventeenth? Oh yeah this is going to be the First Baptist. How many public hearings do we have on that date?”

Diane Wilhelm: (Inaudible)

Supervisor Walter: “And we did the First Baptist. This has to be pushed back I think. The First Baptist one’s going to be a very long hearing, I think. I’m going to guess.”

(Inaudible)

Supervisor Walter: “Leave it on, it’s going to be a long meeting, whatever. I’m fine with it, are you fine with it; it’ll be a long meeting. I don’t know the community benefit district is probably the first one so do we have the times right here?”

Diane Wilhelm: “The Community Benefit is 7:05 and they’re all actually 7:05 (inaudible).”

Supervisor Walter: “Yeah we’ve got to put them.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “Put the short one first.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Can I offer a suggestion? The subject of these three resolutions probably should be a separate day than the about the Community Baptist.”

Supervisor Walter: “Well that’s what we were talking about but these.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Because I think you’re going to get a lot of feedback on these three resolutions.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “Me too.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “This one, the next one and the one after that about the fishing permits, the docking permits, the launching permits.”

Supervisor Walter: “This has got to be a different day so either were tabling these or you come up with a date in April. You have to see what’s on the calendar?”

(Inaudible)

Supervisor Walter: “You already have four public hearings that date. It’s going to be a long meeting.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “It’s going to be a long meeting.”

Supervisor Walter: “It’s going to be a long meeting.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Alright, Resolution 158, it’s the same comment; 159 is the same comment.”

Supervisor Walter: “I think, I don’t which ones are going to be quicker but I’d like, I think we should open all of these up at the same time so make them all 7:00 as Jill said and then we will open these all up at the same time.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “159.”

Supervisor Walter: “What’s the issue with 159?”

Sal Mastropaolo: “First of all you talk about New York State fishing permits and I was not aware that you needed a permit to fish for salt water fish.”

Diane Wilhelm: “Yes you need, it’s a registry and yes.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “There’s no mention made about Iron Pier or Wading River. You go out of the way to talk about East Creek boat launch and you talk about Reeves Beach only permitting emergency police and fire to launch but you make no mention of any kind of permits required for Wading River launch and Iron Pier launch. Was that by design or an oversight?”

Annemarie Prudenti: “By design. The Town Board had determined that those facilities really don’t have the volume and are not adequate for launching large boats.”

Supervisor Walter: “We would be hard pressed to charge anybody to launch out of Wading River.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “I agree, I’m not giving you an argument and I agree with Iron Pier too but I just mentioned it because I wasn’t sure if you did it on purpose.”

Councilman Hubbard: “That was the thought behind it.

(Inaudible)

Supervisor Walter: “That was a different issue. This is a boat launching permit. Iron Pier probably gets about thirty percent, I think that’s what Ray says, right about thirty percent? I mean we probably could pick it up at Iron Pier but what we’re trying to do cause in the era of tax caps, it’s how governments are raising money now.”

Sal Mastropaolo: “Tell me about it. I’m waiting for the permit to breath air in this town.”

(Inaudible)

Sal Mastropaolo: “That’s it.”

Annemarie Prudenti: “Resolution number 139.”

Supervisor Walter: “Is that one? Now how are these, I wish we had spoken about this. We don’t know how these fees corresponded to the original fees. Are they mostly the original fees?”

Annemarie Prudenti: “Correct nothing, the new fees are the boat launch permit, fishing permit they’re charging a processing fee of five dollars. Transient docking is the same.”

Supervisor Walter: “Daily permit passenger vehicle, what is that, thirty-five dollars?”

Annemarie Prudenti: “That’s what it was before.”

Supervisor Walter: “Ok, beach access forty-five, beach access fishing permit, that’s a new one, a hundred?”

Annemarie Prudenti: “Nope that’s an old one.”

Supervisor Walter: “And the boat launch permit?”

Annemarie Prudenti: “Those are all new.”

Supervisor Walter: “Fifteen bucks.”

Annemarie Prudenti: “Per resident.”

Supervisor Walter: “Wow. That’s pretty reasonable is that where?”

Annemarie Prudenti: “Well we did our research, we compared it too other towns.”

Councilman Hubbard: “Other towns and.”

Supervisor Walter: “What is Brookhaven charging? They’ve got to be fifty bucks. They were fifty bucks when I was a kid.”

Councilman Hubbard: “They were a good bit more than this but we just really didn’t want to hammer the residents any more than we felt we could.”

Annemarie Prudenti: “So we felt we’d capture by the commercial permit at three hundred.”

Councilman Hubbard: “A non-resident.”

Supervisor Walter: “I just wanted to make sure that somebody didn’t put like a hundred dollar fee in there.”

Councilman Hubbard: “No.”

Supervisor Walter: “So fifteen is fine with me. I wouldn’t have been happy with a fifty dollar fee but if that’s where I thought it would land.”

Councilman Hubbard: “Because they still have to buy the parking fee for the (inaudible) trailer.”

Supervisor Walter: “(Inaudible) same thing. They have to buy both.”

Councilman Hubbard: “Right.”

Councilman Wooten: “And then after April 15th the docking fee is going up to seventy-eight dollars, (inaudible).”

Councilman Hubbard: “Correct, no. Well next year we’re going to wait and see. We’re going to re-coop everything October 1st and see how these new fees have come in and help out (inaudible).”

Councilman Wooten: “(Inaudible)”

Councilman Hubbard: “Right, that was the original.”

Supervisor Walter: “The only thing, you put the East Creek fee in here. The only thing that I wanted to do is, I want to make sure that we hold fast to October 1st reevaluating this fee to make sure that the (inaudible) picked up the income it needs to.”

Councilman Hubbard: “Everyone’s been advised of that and that’s what we’re going to do.”

Supervisor Walter: “Listen I’m a boater. I’m guess I’m probably the only boater on the Town Board but we can’t let this thing run (inaudible)”

Annemarie Prudenti: (Inaudible)

Supervisor Walter: “I mean I hope we don’t have to raise it; I hope the other fees help. How are you doing? Miss, what can we do for you?”

Ethel Sussman: “Ethel Sussman, South Jamesport. I wanted to speak to 149 regarding the Animal Shelter but I know there’s been some letters requesting that the resolution be held over to an evening meeting when more people can attend the March 15th meeting and I’m wondering if that’s being considered I would certainly endorse that request. If that’s being considered then I can reserve my questions for then.”

Supervisor Walter: “I don’t think it’s being considered. The contract’s up today so we really don’t have a choice but to move forward.”

Ethel Sussman: “Is it not possible to extend the contract by a few weeks?”

Supervisor Walter: “I think the Town Board has made a decision to move forward with this resolution. They’re going to be asked to move forward with it shortly.”

Ethel Sussman: “Ok, without hearing the comments from the public.”

Supervisor Walter: “You’re welcome to make comments.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “You can make comment right now.”

Ethel Sussman: “Ok, really. I have some questions. Perhaps you can respond. What is the process by which the current operator’s performance was evaluated?”

Supervisor Walter: “I’ll tell you what, that’s the easiest softball question. I give you two answers.”

Ethel Sussman: “That’s just my opening shoot.”

Supervisor Walter: That’s the easiest softball question there is. For the first three years as Town Supervisor we had nothing but criticisms, complaints, problems at the animal shelter; unbelievably, unmitigated, just problems.”

Ethel Sussman: “I’m aware of that.”

Supervisor Walter: “In this past three years has any Board member heard a problem from them?”

Councilman Dunleavy: “No, no complaints.”

Supervisor Walter: “I never heard a complaint, not one in three years.”

Ethel Sussman: “So is that?”

Supervisor Walter: “I’m going to give you the second one. So the second thing is in 2010, this is from my prospective, we started bringing dogs in for afternoon meetings and I would kind of mosey on up to those dogs but I was afraid of those dogs we tried to adopt. Now I get down on my hands and knees and I pet them and I would adopt a dog from my animal shelter. I have nothing but profound respect for North Fork Animal Shelter League. In fact I can’t vote on this resolution quick enough, that’s my opinion.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “And Councilman Hubbard’s been up there.”

Councilman Hubbard: “I spent quite a time up there yesterday going through the entire process, met every dog, went into every room, every part of the facility and I was entirely impressed. I go back with my experiences when I was a police officer when we would take a dog

up there and chain it to the gate and drive away because nobody was there and we didn't have access to the pound. The kennel attendant would come in the morning and find a dog chained to the gate with a tag on it with a number that corresponds to our report. Those dogs are taken care of much, much, much better. They go out of their way up there, each one of those dogs are trained up there. They have a trainer come in; work with each one of those dogs. I'm thinking of taking my three dogs and take them up there and bring three of their dogs to my house because they behave better than my dogs at home. I was very impressed; clean, sanitary and humanly done."

Ethel Sussman: "Well I've been to the shelter myself and I think you misunderstand my question. My question is not have you been there and do you think the dogs are happy, I'm just wondering if there are any objective criteria and I guess it's a part two question; have any other operators been considered for this roll or is it sort of if you don't hear from the dogs that they're not happy or you don't get any complaints."

Supervisor Walter: "We had RSVP three years ago put in a bid. We found them unqualified. North Fork Animal Welfare League put in a bid and they're really qualified and we follow AG & Markets law with respect to the operation of the kennel. We have found them to be extremely efficient in what they do from objective stand points from Ag & Markets inspections so we're very comfortable that this is a professional service and we're going to move forward with them."

Ethel Sussman: "Ok. My next question is, I understand that the cost is ten thousand dollars more."

Supervisor Walter: "It's about what; Phil, it's about seven?"

Annemarie Prudenti: "No, last year I think it cost two hundred and twenty-nine eight so we're up a bit. It's about a four thousand dollar increase for this year."

Supervisor Walter: "Yeah it's like a two and a half percent. I thought it was seven percent then two and a half and two and a half, something like that?"

Annemarie Prudenti: "Over the cost of the next three years it will be a total; from last year to this year it's four then next year it goes up an additional five and then the following year an additional five."

Supervisor Walter: "Which is well under what it would have been if the town was running the shelter."

Ethel Sussman: "Ok, that wasn't my questions. I think you're running faster than you're being chased. So the additional money is coming where?"

Supervisor Walter: "General Fund Budget."

Ethel Sussman: "Ok, thank you."

Supervisor Walter: “You’re welcome. Ok, does anybody else wish to be heard? Not seeing anybody let’s take up the Resolutions.”

They were very happy with what they’ve been doing and they’re in the process of offering them a long term contract so I vote yes.”

Vote Continued: “Giglio.”

Councilwoman Giglio: “I agree that North Fork Animal Welfare League does a great job managing the shelter and the conditions have tremendously been accommodating to the animals that come there. There were some concerns that I had with some complaints that had been given to me and after speaking to my fellow Board members we have amended the contract to clarify some of those issues and I have no problem extending their contract for another two years. I think they’re doing a great job, three years, yes.”

Vote Continued: “Wooten.”

Councilman Wooten: “I have only one comment. It’s been a long road for me with this particular organization so I say yes.”

Councilman Dunleavy: “I want to say for the first part of my Councilman all I got was complaints. Every meeting we had somebody up here from Smithtown, from Nassau County complaining about our animal shelter but for the last three years I haven’t received one complaint and no one has got up in front of the podium and complained so I think they’re doing a great job so I vote yes.”

Annemarie Prudenti said they were cautiously optimistic that they would hear from the committee within forty-five days.

Supervisor Walter: “Thank you. Alright, does anybody else wish to be heard today? Not seeing anybody can I get a motion to adjourn?”

Councilman Dunleavy: “I make a motion we adjourn the Town Board meeting.”

Supervisor Walter: “And seconded, all in favor aye, opposite, abstentions. Town Board meeting is closed. George you’re official done.”
