PERSONAL APPEARANCES

Supervisor Smith: "This brings us to that portion of the agenda, although it is not listed, calling for anybody choosing to address the Town Board on any topic. For those of you who are not regular attendees, please do step forward to the microphone give your name and address before you speak."

Miles Fairley, Merritts Pond Road, Riverhead; "I'd like make one or two comments, Mr. Supervisor, Members of the Board about the proposed sign ordinance. I have seen no record of what modifications or changes in the existing ordinance that have been proposed, but I do know that for a number of Tuesdays I'm going to be quite involved, and I'm not sure that I will be able to be present at the hearing, I understand that you're going to call tonight.

For one thing, I think, those people in the Town who wanted a tighter sign ordinance or a relatively strict ordinance, a number of years ago such an ordinance was passed — sort of set back, relaxed and say okay, we got it, this is it. I've seen in the last couple of months a lot of activity from people who are rightfully concerned about signs in this Town, but I felt should have been on the job long before they were proposing some changes just on the fact of it seem would just loosen up the whole ordinance too much. I have yet to be convinced that bigger is better, that more is better, that because you have a bigger sign in front of a place that someone rushes in on the spur of a moment to buy a new automobile. I would also like to pass one comment, I may be in error, but Southampton has a relatively good type of sign ordinance and I haven't heard of anybody in that Town going out of business because of it. Thank you."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Smith: "Thank you Sir. Anyone else choose to address the Town Board on any matter? Yes Mr. Denis?"

Donald A. Denis, Riverhead; "I'd like to speak out in favor of the present sign ordinance. I think the Town was very fortunate to pass this ordinance. There's been a lot of opposition to it. I think the opposition is unreasonable.

I think a lot of the signs in the Town of Riverhead are signs for other business that are outside of the Town. If you drive down 58, you'll notice that a lot of the signs are for restaurants in Southold, for businesses in Southampton. I don't think they do the Town of Riverhead any good except to pay a rental fee to some landowner who happens to have the sign on his property. The State of Vermont has a very very strict sign ordinance. There are absolutely no billboards at all on any of the highways. The whole State of Vermont has done very well with the tourist industry. The State is very attractive. People are able to find accommodations, they're able to find hotels, they're able to find restaurants, and it's all done with a very small index system that lists the accommodations on a very small standard form throughout the entire state. So I would hopefully respect that the Town Board sees fit to maintain the ordinance in its present form and hopefully it will help to improve the appearance of the Town and I think it will not restrict anybody's business and the conduct of their business. Thank you."

Supervisor Smith: "Thank you Sir. Anyone else on this or any other topic?"

Shirley Smith, Route 25, Calverton; "Mr. Supervisor and Members of the Board, my comments are in the form of questions. Was there a report received from Mr. Winter in reference to the conference that we had in November?"

Supervisor Smith: "Yes Ma'am."

Shirley Smith: "And at that time, there was a very serious consideration being given to some more leniency perhaps in the addressing of particular regulations for signs in particular areas and districting the Town as to signs. Has that been considered by the Board?"

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Supervisor Smith: "Yes Ma'am. We will have on the agenda later this evening a resolution calling for a public hearing. What we have done and which will be refined before it's put in the paper to take the proposals of the merchants group, some of the recommendations of Peter Jakes who is North Fork Sign and several other people and I'm going to try to hold a notice and then a public hearing in terms of examining alternatives. Some of it may be inarticulate to some degree, hopefully the notice will give a sweep to all the proposals, including 100 square foot signs."

Shirley Smith: "Thank you very much."

Supervisor Smith: "Yes Ma'am. Anybody else?"

Gregory Blass, Jamesport: "May I ask what the status is of the proposed salary increases for the Town Board?"

Supervisor Smith: "It is not going to be acted upon this meeting. The salaries at this particular point in time remain the same as they were the prior year."

Gregory Blass: "Is there a proposal under consideration by the Board at this time?"

Supervisor Smith: "There is. We published a notice a notice prior to the adoption of the 1979 budget which indicated that the Councilmen were entertaining the idea, a possible salary of \$12,000 per annum. I believe it was — \$11,000 per annum and that my salary would move from it's present place of \$25,000 to \$28,000."

Gregory Blass: "And when does the Town Board anticipate on voting on this proposal?"

Supervisor Smith: "We do not know at this point."

Gregory Blass: "Would it be before the spring, for instance?"

Supervisor Smith: "It will be before elections."

PERSONAL APPEARANCES - continued

Gregory Blass: "And would it be at a time that would be proceeded by a chance for the public to speak their opinions on or have hearings already been closed on this?"

Supervisor Smith: "You may do that Sir, but that's why you put it in the paper. It is part of the budgetary process."

Gregory Blass: "Inasmuch as it might be, I'd like to make some comments on it now. I don't know if the Town Board is going to vote on such a proposal in such a crucial time when the majority of the Board is up for election in this community, but I do know that there's speculation, I heard just in here before I came in here in the room, that it's being raised as a proposal so that eventually the Town Board can vote it down, which would have even more substantial effect in the community races that are ahead.

This reminds me of — I don't know whether this is true or not, I'm not saying it is. This reminds me of a story, a young fellow who knocked over the baby carriage of his younger sister and his mother came on the scene and asked what are you doing and he was in the process of putting everything back together and she said well that's very good and I'm glad to see that when your sister is in trouble, you make a point of helping her out. So he took a policy of whenever he had the chance, he would knock something over when his parents weren't looking and then fixing it up much to their pleasure. I don't know whether this is true or not, if such a proposal mysteriously would come up this time of the year, but I would say that I believe that the Town Board, that the majority of the Board is under delusion that they deserve almost a 25% increase in their salaries, at least as that would apply to the Town Councilmen.

I think that when the Town is considering that kind of a proposal, a good discussion is in order for what the philosophy of public service is and a person that holds public office is about. It would seem to me that private gain and the idea of a lucrative salary is forsaken when a person holds a public office that he has given up the opportunity of the private service to himself or herself in order to take on the benefits to the public of what his efforts might produce and it's almost a public trust in that sense which would call for the Town servant, if you will forego the renumerations, or high salaries, or good money.

The Town Councilmen, though, more than anybody else, perhaps even more than the Supervisor has a unique opportunity because he has the best of both worlds. He has a part-time job and not a full-time job and therefore, he can pursue his own private interests to obtain as much money as he can for

salary benefits that he'd like to get, but he seems to be violating that trust the public gives him when he goes about voting to give himself his own salary raises.

There was a time when Abraham Lincoln said, I know someone like that isn't quoted in public hearings, but he said the legitimate object of government is to do for a community of people whatever they need to have done, but cannot do it all or cannot do so well for themselves in their individual capacities. Now consider whether the legitimate object of government is to do for a community of people whatever they need, and that considered, then decide whether the community of Riverhead really needs a Town Board that makes such a sum as \$12,000.00 a year or somewhat less than that for a part-time job and I would submit to you that with those considerations, perhaps the legitimate object of government would call on the Town Board not to select an increase of themselves and if they should consider that an issue, that the community should consider perhaps they should have it to the community referendum to decide it. That's all I have to say."

Supervisor Smith: "Is there anybody else?"

No one else wished to be heard at this time.

RESOLUTIONS#1 APPOINTS TOWN ATTORNEY

Councilman Menendez offered the following resolution which was seconded by Councilman Young.

RESOLVED, That Henry S. Saxtein, of the Town of Riverhead, be and he hereby is, appointed Town Attorney for the term beginning January 15, 1979, at a salary of Seventeen and 00/100 (\$17,000.00) Dollars, per annum, payable in equal installments every two weeks, and be it

FURTHER RESOLVED, That the Town Attorney shall represent the Town Board at its direction on such matters assigned to him by the Town Board.

Supervisor Smith then stated: "For those of you that never met Mr. Saxtein he is sitting in the front row, he was a former intern here in Town Hall while he was in law school, for a brief period of time with the District Attorney's Office and now with us. Welcome aboard Henry."

RESOLUTIONS - continued#18 AUTHORIZES SUPERVISOR TO SIGN CONTRACT WITH RIVERHEAD UNIT OF CSEA OF SUFFOLK COUNTY FOR THE YEARS 1979/1980

Councilman Young offered the following resolution which was seconded by Councilman Menendez.

WHEREAS, Negotiations between the Riverhead Unit of the Civil Service Employees Association of Suffolk County and the Town of Riverhead have resulted in the proposal of a contract for ratification by this Board and the members of the employees' Unit for the years 1979 and 1980,

NOW, THEREFORE, be it

RESOLVED, That the Supervisor be, and he hereby is, authorized to sign a contract with the Riverhead Unit of the Civil Service Employees Association of Suffolk County for the years 1979/1980 in substantially the form which is filed in the Office of the Town Clerk.

Before the vote, Supervisor Smith stated: "We have, what the resolution says is substantially in the form. There are some language things to be resolved. What has been presented to and discussed by the Employee negotiating team is what is attached to the resolution, there will be some changes. Mr. Barth can you and I try to sign this agreement on Thursday morning. Is that okay? And then I would add the caveat that the resolutions 20 through 23 are conditioned on Mr. Barth and I actually sitting down at a table and executing the contract when we get to those."
