Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. The first scheduled public hearing and it is not yet time to call that. We do have a list of Unfinished Business and I would point out again that the status is where it is in the process in each of the applications. I would recognize anyone who wishes to be heard at this time on any subject including what is on the agenda as far as resolutions. Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich, Wading River, "I come here to you people who have accepted the minutes of the Town Board meeting of August the 2nd, to inform you that you have accepted minutes of a public hearing that is neither true, accurate or complete. At the last meeting, you postponed the acceptance of this section that I'm referring to. And here two weeks later, you have just added a couple of asterics and a comment. But as far as being of good conscience to see that you function correctly and properly, it appears that you have not. I don't know if you're provoking me to a court action. Maybe that is what you want. But certainly, the memory of six people up there could present a reasonable picture of what transpired. Now, the subject of that particular public hearing, you have as resolution 608 tonight and you say that all persons wanting to be heard were heard. Certainly it is a bold faced lie. And you introduce in the resolutions the same kind of deception and concealment that I was objecting to. I started to ask that credit, where is the credit to the maps that were presented. And Mr. Pike interpreted this as the people who did the graphic work. I was referring to where it was copied from. It wasn't created by any work in Riverhead by Riverhead officials. Now, in the resolution you refer to critical environmental areas together with a map. No description, no title, no source of information, no nothing. Just a map. Well, that in itself should indicate that this is deception and concealment. For in and whereas in resolutions and will not have a significant adverse impact on the environment. Resolved, will not have a significant impact on the environment. Well, what is the resolution all about? If this will not effect or have an impact, you talk about critical environmental areas having exceptional or unique characters which will benefit human health. Yet to balance the stagnant water to drive out the mosquitoes is totally ignored. So where the concern for human health is, I don't know. Certainly an assessment of the conditions which has been done by the County and the State far exceeds in detail the things that were done. And certainly, Riverhead is putting up some sort of deception here by presenting a resolution of this kind. My other item is for a resolution which you are having a public hearing on this evening. No, I'm mistaken there. Resolution 596 which adopts amendments to various paragraphs in section 108 under major subdivision, section three;

going one sketch plan, two; preliminary plat, three; final plat. The subdivider shall submit one linen print and twelve paper prints, etc., etc. and may submit one linen tracing. Linen tracing is an antiquated legal term and I haven't heard it used for many years. Now whether that is referring to the same piece of paper as linen print, linen tracings, that just isn't done today. The linen print is for permanent record that can be folded, not necessarily for reproduction. The linen tracing is a rare item on Long Island. It has been replaced by transparencies such as mylar. And a few of the townships ask for the linen print and a mylar transparency. So either there is misnomer here or there is an item here that is just antiquated and not being done today. So for practical measures, I would suggest that that be looked into and corrected. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. Yes sir."

Brad Berthold, Northville, "I'm not officially representing the Northville Beach Civic Association, but I feel I can speak for most of the members. Our attorney, Mr. Arthur DiPietro, from Riverhead, hand delivered some copies of a letter to most of the Councilmen's offices this afternoon. In case you haven't had time to read it, Mrs. Pendzick mentioned the Town Clerk's Office has a copy if everyone didn't get one. Essentially, at the work session yesterday, my impression was that the Board members were informed that the simple dropping off and reception of the draft environmental impact statement from Long Lake started a thirty day clock. Wherein the Board as Lead Agency, would have thirty days to write their scoping letter basically to the applicant and with a possibility of another thirty days. Our attorney looked into the law and found (apparently) that's not the case at all. Essentially, when the Board decides to accept the draft environmental impact statement. At that time, the thirty day clock starts. So I got the impression that there was some sense of time constraint and pressure on the Board requiring them to perhaps take a more hasty look at this than we would like to see. So I would implore the Board to read this letter and realize that it's entirely at the discretion of the Board as to how much time they should take to do a thorough relaxed job and investigate the draft environmental impact statement. As noted in the letter, there's a blank space on the draft environmental statement for the town to insert the date of acceptance which then starts the clock. We were a little bit surprised. Normally, the State Environmental Quality Review Act process is the Lead Agency, in this case the Town Board, has the scoping hearing. In this case has a two week period to look at written correspondence and then deliberates and then writes a letter to the applicant, Long Lake, to determine the scope of the draft environmental impact statement. However, in this case, the Board passed a resolution declaring them the Lead Agency on September 6th. On September 7th, the draft environmental impact statement or initial impact statement was submitted. So we would implore the Board to dispense with the time constraint as is noted by our attorney and please be sure you allow yourself time enough to do a very thorough job looking at this draft environmental impact statement. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Let the record show that the hour of 7:47 has arrived. The Town Clerk will please read the notice of public hearing."

PUBLIC HEARING - 7:45 p.m.

I have affidavits of publishing and posting for a public hearing to be held at Riverhead Town Hall on Tuesday, September 20, 1988 at 7:45 pm. to hear all interested persons who wish to be heard regarding: The Special Permit Application of North Fork Nursery to construct a new workers building for seasonal use.

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you. Peter, are you representing the applicant?"

Peter Danowski, Attorney, "That's correct. For Mr. Leifkuchner and his organization at North Fork Nursery on Herricks Lane. We currently have on site two buildings which house agricultural workers. These buildings have been constructed and used consistent with the town code provisions. Mr. Leifkuchner who is present tonight, farms approximately 180 acres of farmland mainly raising nursery stock. As many of you know, and I know fairly recently you heard another application come before this Board to consider a similiar type application. The raising of nursery stock is a very laboring intensive type of farming. Much of it can not be done with machinery and therefore, requires as a necessary function of pulling out these plants and planting them, the use of hand labor. As a result, we've seen the need to hire more people. And as a result of that, we need more housing. Coupled with that however, we seek to improve the existing housing by taking some of the people out of that housing and putting them into the new building. So actually, we're seeking to build a new structure of cement block construction which will be built 90 feet back off of the road exactly parallel to the existing cement block building that currently exists on site to provide for this housing. This application is consistent with a special permit application procedure of this town."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Peter. Is there anyone present who wishes to address the Town Board on the matter of this application for agricultural worker housing?"

John Kujawski, Riverhead, "I would just like to ask Mr. Danowski one question. I think when this other applicant applied for labor camp, Mr. Leifkuchner opposed it and hired an attorney. How come he's applying for one now?"

Peter Danowski, "John and I have known each other. Leifkuchner never opposed and I was not the attorney. But he never opposed that particular application. What he did oppose was the location of the building. If you recall that public hearing with regard to Mr. Rasweiller, and I was not the attorney because on other matters I represent Mr. Rasweiller. The question was; should that building have been located next to the property line or should it have been put with the other agricultural housing. That was his point as I understood it to be. In this particular case, we're proposing to locate all of the housing in one location close to the very same existing location. Put it back parallel to the other building which is 90 feet off of Herricks Lane in a somewhat wooded area. I know John is familiar. We gave him

notice as required under the statute. And I believe it was John's (probably) grandmother's house that one of the buildings that houses the workers."

John Kujawski, "I was told with the other applicant that with his labor camp, he had to put it on another piece of property away from the original one."

Supervisor Janoski, "As I recall, the application that you're referring to is that some of the workers would be working at another farm."

John Kujawski, "Yes. As far as this one, I think it would be a lot better if it was put in another location because you put all of those people together, there could be a problem in one spot. I'm not opposed to labor camp. I don't have one. We hire all people from Riverhead. But I just don't think all those people should be in one spot. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you John."

Peter Danowski, "Just in response, I think with Mr. Rasweiller's application, he wanted to locate, and I don't know if I'm accurate in saying this because I wasn't there for the whole meeting and I didn't represent him, but I think he wished to locate his new housing on the separate farm and he had housing across the street. I don't know that the town mandated him to separate them but rather he wanted to have them separated. And the Board might raise the question; why don't you keep them together. That was my own recollection."

Supervisor Janoski, "Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Board on the matter of the application for agricultural worker housing? That being the case and without objection, I declare the hearing to be closed."

Supervisor Janoski, "Town Attorney."

Patricia Moore, Town Attorney, "This is a change to the ordinance which involves swimming pools and fencing around swimming pools. This was directed by the Building Department and we are trying to integrate the New York State Building Code requirements on fencing around swimming pools with our current Town Code. You'll also see on the agenda for republishing and reposting after our time dead line for publishing this particular ordinance, the Building Department requested that some additional changes be made. So it will continue next week."

Supervisor Janoski, "Would you like to point out some of the changes."

Patricia Moore, "Sure. The swimming pools are to be completely surrounded by a fence. The fence, you will have the option of the type of fences that are available. They have to be at least four feet in height with a maximum vertical clearance grade of two inches. That's the bottom rung to the ground. The finished side of the fence shall be away from the pool. You may have picket type fences, chain link fences. The enclosures must not provide footholes and various other things."

Supervisor Janoski, "Basically what it does is to make sure that what the state requires, the town requires so they both say the same thing. Is there anyone who wishes to address the Town Board on the matter of swimming pools? That being the case.... Yes, Mr. Kasperovich."

William Kasperovich, "Having read this public hearing notice this afternoon and not being able to tie it in because of the time element, I really am not clear whether you people are concerned with meaning building law or state law or whether you're seriously interested in the safety of the children of Riverhead. From what I read, many ambiguous and mind boggling paragraphs there. You talk about not having footholes in one paragraph and then they say they allow chain links with two and three-eighths inch openings. Which in my youth, was a good toe hole in which to climb up 20 and 30 feet to get over a fence. So now what are toe holes. Now four feet doesn't take much to climb over. The other aspect is using one side of a, a building wall as one side of the fencing. But what is done to prevent a kid from going through a door or if the door is accidentally left open to go out to the water? Nothing is spelled out. Windows have to be at least forty inches above the ground. But the door, the kid can walk right out to the pool. Now, from your description and what this so abbreviated presentation by Mrs. Moore, I can't understand this to be serious concern towards the safety of the children. You're just trying to comply with some artificial requirements of the law. But

the safety of the children are not covered here. And I'm not going to be accused of being long winded this evening. But that is the sum total of it. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. Is there anyone else present who wishes to address the Board on the enactment to swimming pools? Yes sir."

Bill Rowe, Baiting Hollow, "Can I be for instead of against? I just want to indicate that I'm in favor of the...."

Supervisor Janoski, "Could you tell us who you are?"

Bill Rowe, "...that I'm in favor of the part B of that change as Pat well knows. I just want to indicate that. I'm very much in favor. And it does comply state law, I believe word for word."

Supervisor Janoski, "You're going to make it very hard on the poor girl that has to transcribe your comments. So if you could just come closer to the microphone."

Bill Rowe, "Well, I believe that the legal notice that was written in the paper is, if I'm not mistaken, word for word with the state code. It does comply as far as New York State is concerned."

Supervisor Janoski, "Bill, you know that you can't do that. Absolutely. And one of the things that I often try to tell people who testify here is talk to us. Don't talk to the audience because we don't want this kind of debate to break out. But you're in favor of this?"

Bill Rowe, "I'm in favor of the part B change. And I did look up the building code in a Riverhead Library last week. And as I said, I think it is word for word, the changes that you're making, word for word according to the New York State Building Code which I guess most people agree, is ok. So it certainly seems ok to me and I've got kids. And as far as his talking about....."

Supervisor Janoski, "We're not concerned about it. We're concerned about how you feel."

Bill Rowe, "Well, it should be indicated that it does say self-closing, self-latching doors. As far as using a wall for the safety of people going out or not."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you for your comments. Joe."

Joseph Sykora, Riverhead, "Chain link fence is not safety. Any child can climb over a chain link fence. Especially four feet high. When I lived in Lake Ronkonkoma and that's Brookhaven, I had to put an eight foot stockade fence around my yard."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Joe. Is there anyone else who wishes to comment? Mr. Kasperovich. You asked for a period of time."

William Kasperovich, "This is the kind of thing that gets my blood pressure up and gets me up here fighting mad. I've been in the construction world enough years and in enough directions to have formed some very firm opinions. And one of them is that the New York State Code is not the gospel. They have enough loopholes and omissions and discrepancies to where they can not be considered the last word. And a lot of people think because it's New York State Code, it's all encompassing and covers all disastrous and dangerous conditions. It does not and neither does the Riverhead Building Code. So how we think in the extent we want to put safeguards for our children, is put in the hands of you five people. And New York State Building Code is not adequate to cover this. It is your judgement. It is your concern. And I think you're to look at it that way and spell it out to the way you want safeguard to exist in Riverhead. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Thank you Bill. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Town Board on this? Henry."

Henry Pfeiffer, Wading River, "Just one question. How are you going to handle pre-existing conditions where the fences do not meet this condition or the conditions set out here? Will they be required to be enforced?"

Patricia Moore, "Assuming the fence has a valid permit or the pool has a valid permit, it would be grandfathered. If you do not have a valid permit, then the new code would apply."

Supervisor Janoski, "And most of them do because they have been built according to New York State Building Code. And what we're simply doing is removing the confusion of what the old Town Code says and what the new regulations are according to New York State. Is there anyone else who wishes to address the Town Board on swimming pools? In that case and without objection, I declare the hearing to be closed. Let us continue with the resolutions. Yes, Betty."

Betty Brown, "Representing the North Fork Environmental Council. I just wanted to briefly reiterate our support for the critical environmental designation that the Board held hearings on for the twelve wetlands in Riverhead town. These areas represent very valuable natural resources that will be vulnerable to impacts of development. This designation affords them more protection than they have had in the past. This resolution means quite a lot to the residents of Riverhead town and we would like to see full Board support for this resolution this evening. Thank you."

Supervisor Janoski, "Let us proceed."

#608 DESIGNATION OF CRITICAL ENVIRONMENTAL AREAS.

Councilman Pike, "I'd like to defer to the Town Attorney for a minute."

Patricia Moore, Town Attorney, "I would request that we amend the designation with an additional two paragraphs in the resolved. Resolved that the Riverhead Planning Department and the Town Clerk be directed to attach a copy of the critical environmental map to each copy of the official zoning map as made available for and provided to any party seeking the zoning map. And be it further resolved that the Planning Department take steps to insure that the critical environmental maps be integrated into the official zoning map of the Town of Riverhead at such time of the next major rezoning of the official map."

Councilman Pike moved the resolution as amended above.

#609 DIRECTS NOTIFICATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF BUS LAYOVER POLICY.

Councilman Boschetti, "For many years, the town has been trying to get the buses that you're probably accustomed to seeing on Main Street and that layover on Main Street, off of Main Street and on to Railroad Avenue where there is provision for layovers. So what we're going to do now is we're going to direct the Town Attorney and the Chief of Police to investigate if the existing law will allow us to immediately enforce the layover provisions of a resolution that we're about to pass that would require that the buses now in fact layover at Railroad Avenue and not on Main Street and that they are to report their findings to us no later than October 3rd. And if in fact the existing law will allow enforcement, we are going to proceed immediately. So moved."

Supervisor Janoski, "Without objection, this meeting is adjourned."
